History of England to 1688

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The course traces the history of England from Roman times to the achievement of political and economic stability in the early eighteenth century. As befits a survey, the course will examine political, social, economic, and cultural changes over time, emphasizing those developments which help explain the distinctiveness of English culture - the Anglo-Saxon and Norman conquests, the emergence of common law, the rise of parliament, the Reformation and its "Puritan" offshoot, and the political "revolutions" of the seventeenth century. The course will also examine the lives of ordinary Englishmen and women in the medieval and early modern periods. The course will be taught with a combination of lecture and discussion.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Students will be expected to attend class regularly. Having more than three unexcused absences may negatively affect one's grade.

Students will be expected to participate in class discussion.

Students will be expected to do the assigned readings.

Students will write three out of class papers, each approximately three to six pages in length.

Students will take an in class exam on Barbara Hanawalt's book, <u>Growing Up in Medieval</u> London.

Students will take an in class midterm examination and an in class final examination. Both exams will be entirely essay in nature.

Students will be expected to be familiar with and abide by the Rhodes Honor Code.
