



# LYNX 2003 BUILDING A LEGACY


Rhodes College 2000 North Parkway Memphis, Tennessee 38112 Palmer Hall, which was the first building to stand after the College's move to Memphis from Clarksville, Tennessee, proves to be one of the most functional buildings on campus with offices, classrooms, and an auditorium.

Burrow Library, which was provided by Mr. and Mrs. A.K. Burrow, will be used for other purposes upon the opening of the Paul Barrett, Jr. Library, which was provided by the 1946 graduate.









Diehl Statue stands adjacent to Oak Alley, which served as the orginal entrance to the College and captures its beauty in the spring. Diehl, a former prrofessor, dean, and president of the College, was responsible for its architectural Gothic code.

Since its move to Memphis in 1925, the College has continued to build its legacy: architecturally, locally, and nationally. The 2002-2003 academic year was no different. With the groundbreaking of the \$40 million state of the art library, the College plans to achieve further success by allowing students more tools to enhance their college experience and better prepare them for their carees that lie ahead. The College expects to open the doors of the Paul Barrett, Jr. Library in August 2004, where the facility will join the beautiful Gothic buildings

which stand today. Palmer Hall, among these builings will reflect the old, while the new library is sure to prove to hold the latest technology.

The College not only continues to build architecturally, but proves to be among the most recgonized liberal arts collegs in the country. The College was once again featured in U.S. News. Best Colleges 2003, ranking as one of the best liberal arts collegs in America. Also, the Princeton Review ranked the College sixth in its "Professors Get High Marks" category and nineteeth for its "Best Quality of Life" category.

Continually serving the Memphis community, the College proved once again to be a dominant force, leaving its mark in various areas. Athletically, the women's cross country team captured SCAC Championship title. Theatrically, many students were cast in the popular daytime soap oprea "As the World Turns" in the fall.







## Religious Organizations

Various religious organizations hold different events on campus. Currently, these student-led groups are principally focused on the Christian faith. The Ministry, Rhodes' Gospel choir, is primarily composed of black students, but welcomes all ethnicities and cultures to participate in its practice sessions and concerts. Rhodes Christian Fellowship and Greek Fellowship are the primary student-led evangelical groups, and each draws roughly fifty students to weekly meetings. If you want to eat and join in fellowship, Pizza Bible Study and Westminster Fellowship remain excellent choices because each serve dinner and have a message or discuss a topic. The Catholic Student Association sponsors a Mass every Sunday night on campus. Of course, the Chaplain's Office provides a crucial cornerstone in the religious life of the College, developing, offering and supporting dozens of service opportunities and Servant Leadership classes. But Christian groups by no means exhaust the religious opportunities of Rhodes. As our student body diversifies, so have the religions groups that are represented. The Jewish Student Union and Muslim Student Association both seek to welcome people of all faiths, while educating the student body about their distinctive beliefs. Those who prefer studying and comparing various faith traditions find a home within the InterFaith Circle, which promotes open-ended discussions about tolerance, pluralism, and under-represented religious traditions. No matter the religious background, the College seeks to support students in the journey of their spiritual lives.





### STUDY ABROAD

As stated on the College's website, "Rhodes tries to promote an informed understanding of the world, which includes interaction among individuals, societies, cultures, and nations." To encourage such studies, the College offers many opportunities to students who wish to travel and study extensively in various parts of the world, including opportunities to explore other areas of the United States.

The College promotes many programs including European Studies and British Studies, which are both dual programs with the University of the South. The College also participates in exchange programs with various countries throughout the world. Furthermore, programs include Washington Semester, in which students study in Washington D.C. throughout the semester.

Study abroad opportunities are open to all students and the College promotes these experiences in many ways, most notably through financial aid and scholarships. The Buckman Scholarships, for example, award up to \$12,500 per semester to outstanding students planning to study abroad.





### INTERNSHIPS



On November 27, 1888, Delta Delta Delta was founded at Boston University, for the purpose of establishing perpetual bonds of friendship amongst its members, developing a strong and womanly character, broadening moral and intellectual life, and assisting its members in every way possible. 







The 2002 Men's Tennis team finished 23-7, ranked #18 in the nation and #5 in the South region. In addition, the team beat Sewanee twice, with the first victory against the Tigers constituting the first time in 16 years.

The #18 ranking was good for a bid to the NCAA Division III National Championships. Beating Sewanee by a score of 4-1 in the opening match, Emory University proved too much as the season ended with a 4-0 loss. Also, Andy Campbell and Duncan Howell were the first players to qualify for the individual portion of the National Championships in the College's history. Campbell lost early in the singles draw while he and Howell fell in three sets in the first round of doubles. Ranked 29th in singles and 16th in the nation in doubles respectively, the team continued success in other areas. Highlights include a second place finish in the SCAC conference tournament with Coach Sarah Hatgas being named SCAC Coach-of-the-Year, Andy Campbell being named SCAC Player-of-the-Year, and Duncan Howell being named to the SCAC All-Conference team.

The 2003 Lynx will return five of its top six players, with Campbell, Howell, Eddy Blanton, Logan Stevens, and Kyle Kamrath looking to build upon the success of 2002.







The Lynx will look to many key returning players to lead the team next season and hope to avoid injuries, defeat conference rivals, and dominate within the SCAC.










Captains, setter Michelle



The team looked to many of its key players in the first round of the tournament with senior captains Rosemary Boner and Anna Kizer leading the way-scoring five points, seven rebounds, five assists, and two steals in 39 minutes of play, and the team high scorer with 21 points respectively. Boner ranked within the highest averages of steals per game within the conference and Kizer entered the College's 1000 Point Club. The team also looked to Taylor Cook, who scored 17 points, five rebounds, and two blocks in the season's final game. Cook also dominated in the conference as a whole, serving as the top scoring freshmen in the SCAC. The Lynx, who defeated Hendrix in regular season play (57-52, 73-55), fell short the Warriors in the first round with a final score of 68-57. The Lynx, who also host the SCAC Championships next season, look to have another successful season and once again dominate in the conference.

The 2002-2003 Men's Basketball season was a milestone year for the Lynx. Head Coach Herb Higleman reached his 400th career victory against Maryville College (105-80), placing him in the top 20 of active coaches in the NCAA Division III.

The Lynx entered January tied for third place in the SCAC. However, team captains Bryan Baird (11.5 points per game) and Austin Lutx (13.4 points per game and 88 percent from the free throw line) suffered injuries that kept them from action. The Lynx were led by Rami Almefty, who was recognized as the SCAC Player of the Week, averaging 14.5 points per game, 88 percent from the free throw line. Also, Wes Cain averaged of 10.1 points per game, 85 percent from the free throw line.

The Lynx ended the season 10-14 (4-10 SCAC), yet managed to qualify for the SCAC Tournament. Historically, this was the first year the tournament has determined the SCAC Champion and automatic qualifier to the NCAA tournament. The Lynx fell short to Depauw University 74-64 in the first round of the SCAC Championships. Ranked as high as fifth in the nation in free throw percentage and leading the SCAC, the Lynx hope to be strong contenders next season.


# Equestrian






# Itimate Frisbee


