Director’s Notes

I feel compelled to express how much *Treefall* – from the first read – revealed itself to be “a McCoy play.” As a Rhodes alumnus and a product of the Department of Theatre, I’ve always been proud of the fact that what the McCoy does best is to produce small plays which ask big questions. They explore the question of what it means to be human and they provide few, if any, answers. You – as an audience member and a participant in the experience – are given the materials to formulate your own conclusions.

Treefall is certainly one of those plays. It deals with apocalypse and genesis, despair and hope, family and individuality, the comfort of illusion and the power of choice. It says more in a very short time about the human condition than works of much greater length and pretension. This is truly a play whose life begins after the curtain call. I encourage you to let the plot unfold while you are present in the space, then take away what you’ve witnessed and let the story continue. It’s easy to forget how tenuous our grasp on civilization really is. Like it or not, we are living on borrowed time.
