## Fighting Hunger and Homelessness

The 14th Annual Conference of the National Student Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness was held at Rhodes on October 18th through the 21 st. Over three hundred students from across the nation participated in this Conference which was designed to help in troduce students to the issues of hunger and homelessness and to make them aware of the instrumental impact they have on social change. ## Knowing the Code

## Service Learning

The Kinney Program has aided service learning at the College for more than forty years. The program helps to develop partnerships among students, churches, and social service agencies to meet the needs of the community. Students serve voluntarily through agencies such as hospitals, crisis centers, environmental programs, churches, and public schools.

Kinney is an umbrella service organization which has coordinators for areas of service such as Hospitals, and Healthcare. These coordinators act as mediators for the volunteer agencies and students. Agencies can approach the coordinators with opportunities and the coordinators can supply them with student volunteers. Students can also approach the coordinators with their interests to find agencies that could need their help.

The main goal of the Kinney Program is to help students get involved with the community, and the students who participate recieve valuable experience.

## Men's Track

Under the tutelage of Head Coach Robert Shankman and senior captains Virren Malhotra, William Henry, and Mike Garibaldi, the men's track team had a solid spring 2001 season on their way to a third place finish at the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) meet and some new school records. William broke the records in both the 100 and 200 meter dashes, and took first place in the 100 at the SCAC meet after three years of finishing rinner placed. JuniorJohn Hamilton placed second in the pole vault at the SCAC meet with a personal best and school record jump of 13 111/ 4*. Jessie tlunt set new records in the long, triple, and high jump, javelin, high hurdles, and tleptathlon, as well as being a member of the record-breaking mile relay team, all on her way to being named the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) Female Track and Field Athlete of the Year. Jessie also qualified individually for the national NCAA Division 111 met in the Heptathlon. She went on to score 4,505 points and place fourth in the nation in the event. Outstanding first-year sprint sensation Ellye Bernardi broke the Rhodes records in both the 100 and 200 meter dashes and was also on the mile relay team to set a new record. The Lynx was printed by Walsworth Publishing Company, 306 North Kansas Avenue, Marceline, Missouri, 64658.
