

RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Rhodes' Department of Religious Studies promotes the academic study of religion by offering courses that explore the diverse aspects of religious traditions. Particular emphasis is given to the origins, history and relevance of religion in contemporary life. Rhodes students often choose to take courses in Religious Studies in order to investigate areas of personal interest, fulfill Rhodes' basic requirement in humanities and acquire valuable career and interpersonal skills in critical thinking about human problems, ethical awareness and commitment and cultural and religious diversity. Religious Studies majors graduate from Rhodes fully qualified to enter seminary and to prepare for religious vocations. Some graduates have chosen to pursue advanced degrees in religion and to follow academic careers, while others have entered the fields of business, counseling, publishing, social work, law and medicine.

Religious studies courses are grouped into three categories: Biblical Studies, Theology and Ethics and History of Religions. A student must complete courses in each of these categories in order to fulfill the requirements of the Religious Studies major: 12 courses are required for a major and seven for a minor. The Department of Religious Studies also encourages students to investigate interdisciplinary majors that allow students the opportunity to design individual programs of study and explore areas of complementary concern. Most of the courses taken to satisfy the college's basic humanities requirement on the Life track are offered in the Department of Religious Studies.



Outside the Classroom

The Department of Religious Studies sponsors supervised learning experiences in the form of internships that Rhodes has established with various Memphis area religious, social and health agencies. Recently, students have participated in internships with social agencies, correctional institutions, churches and hospitals. The department also offers a unique chaplaincy internship program at a local hospital. At Rhodes, most student internships are not paid jobs, but course credit is earned. In addition, the department annually awards the Joseph R. Hyde Award in Religious Studies to a rising senior to allow the student to pursue a Religious Studies project during the summer prior to his or her senior year. Recent winners have pursued research projects in Latin America, Africa, Asia and the Middle East. In recent years, students have represented the department by presenting papers at scholarly conferences.

Graduates

58% take full time jobs.

Recent religious studies graduates have taken fulltime positions with Teach For America, counseling centers, churches and social agencies.

39% pursue graduate degrees.

In the last few years, Rhodes graduates have experienced a 100% acceptance rate into graduate programs of divinity at such institutions as Harvard Divinity School, Yale Divinity School, University of Chicago Divinity School, Vanderbilt, Johns Hopkins, Princeton Theological Seminary, Columbia Theological Seminary, University of Missouri, Auburn University, Washington University, Union Seminary in Virginia and University of Virginia.
