#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

Narrative is the most common type of writing found in the Hebrew Bible, and many of the most well-known biblical texts are written in story form. This course is an introduction to how to study and interpret biblical narratives. Employing the method of narratology, we will examine a variety of texts in order to better understand the characteristics and aims of narrative in the Hebrew Bible. The course will enable the development of the skills necessary to engage in literary analysis of stories both within and outside the Bible.

### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

## 1) Attendance and class participation/preparation

Attendance is expected. Only through class attendance will you gain sufficient mastery of the course material to succeed on exams. More than three unexcused absences will adversely affect your grade.

Active class participation is also expected. The Life program is built on guided discussion of common readings. The readings on the attached schedule are to be completed prior to each class. Students are to come to class with the text, having read the material and being prepared to discuss and/or briefly write about it. **Attendance/participation will account for 10% of your final grade.** 

## 2) Daily writing assignments

There will be an on-line quiz for most class periods. This will be a multiple choice quiz that will be related to the day's reading and must be completed prior to the class meeting.

The course has a website where the quizzes and other information can be found. Details about this website and how to access it will be given during the first few classes of the semester. On-line quizzes will account for 10% of your final grade.

#### 3) Exams

There will be three exams during the semester (February 6, March 6, and April 24). **Each exam will be worth 20% of your final grade.** 

#### 4) Final Paper

Each student will write a paper that analyzes a particular biblical text. This paper will be due at the end of the semester, and the details of the assignment will be explained in class. The paper and presentation will be worth 20% of your final grade.
