

#### **Rhodes** College

Rhodes is a small college with a broad world perspective. We expect our students to excel academically, participate in leadership and service opportunities on and off campus, conduct themselves with honor, and prepare for rich professional lives where learning never stops. The educational experience we provide is like no other in the country.

Learning at Rhodes, as at most liberal arts colleges, is vested in the hands of the faculty who choose to be here because they value the experience of teaching and mentoring. They are gifted in the classroom and generous with their time outside it. But learning doesn't stop with scheduled classes and office hours. Our outcomes-focused curriculum impels students to take classroom skills into the community, where they connect knowledge with practice and learn effective leadership through service, internships, international travel and research. And it means returning to the classroom with the discoveries, problem-solving skills, contextualization, engagement and motivation they have gained through their experiences.

In the words of Becky Saleska '06, "The lines between 'academic and extracurricular' have been blurred at Rhodes. Gone are the days of morning classes and afternoon activities. Our classes have collided with the real world. We learn through service and we serve through learning. It's the best kind of education we could possibly have."





#### **Athletics Facilities**

The Bryan Campus Life Center (BCLC) officially opened on March 17, 1997, to Rhodes students, faculty, staff and alumni. The \$22 million facility has become the centerpiece of campus life at Rhodes. Within the facility, there is the newly renovated Mallory-Hyde Gymnasium; a 6,900 square foot fitness room; a multi-sports forum that can accommodate basketball, volleyball, baseball, golf, track and tennis; an indoor track; three racquetball courts; two squash courts and six locker rooms. Also within its walls are the Lynx Lair, an upscale snack bar and grill for students, and the McCallum Ballroom for lectures, dances and special events.

Immediately adjacent to the BCLC is Alburty Pool. Originally installed in 1977, Alburty Pool received a new deck and pool house with the construction



of the Bryan Campus Life Center. The twenty-five meter pool contains six lanes and is heated. In 1998-99, for the



first time, a bubble was placed over the pool to allow the men's and women's intercollegiate swim teams to practice during the winter, as well as provide some additional lap swimming time for students, faculty, and staff.

The Bryan Campus Life Center also has become the nerve center for Rhodes Athletics. Lynx athletes and coaches have substantial locker room, spacious offices and a tremendous training room. The state-of-the-art, 6,900 square foot fitness room combines free weights with resistive cardiovascular equipment to meet a variety of needs for all users. There is also a state-of-the art sound system and four televisions equipped with cable for users' viewing and listening pleasure. Colleges with fewer than 5,000 students average 1.3 square feet per student in their fitness facilities. Rhodes far exceeds this standard, providing 4.9 square feet per.

Fargason Field is home to Lynx football. All Rhodes home games are played before the 3,300 capacity stadium. The field is settled within the college's newly renovated track facility which boasts one of the region's highest quality outdoor tracks.

#### SEASON PREVIEW

The Lynx finished the 2006-07 season with a 16-10 overall record and lost 73-68 in the SCAC semi-final round to NCAA Tournament representative Oglethorpe. The Lynx return three starters and 11 letter winners in 07-08. Rhodes is led by senior shooting guard Ashley Farrell (Collierville, TN), who has been selected as a 2007-08 All-American by Women's DIII News magazine. Farrell also was picked as the pre-season Player-of-the-Year for the SCAC by the same publication. Last season Farrell was named to the D3Hoops.com All-South Region team, after averaging 19.0 points per game and a SCAC-leading 3.3 steals per game. Farrell currently ranks fifth in Rhodes women's basketball history in career scoring, with 1,226 points.

Rhodes also returns starting sophomore point guard Becky Atnip (Greenfield, TN) and starting forward Kristen

Both Bradshaw and Whitaker received valuable minutes last season, and together this duo will provide the Lynx a solid 1-2 punch in the post.

#### MATT DEAN Head Coach

Matt Dean enters his 6th season as the head women's basketball coach at Rhodes and 16th overall, after leading the Lynx program to a 76-52 overfive seasons at the helm. In 2005-06 the Lynx finished 18-8 overall advanc-

ing to the semifinals of the SCAC tournament and tying the school record for wins in a season. In 2002-03 Dean finished 15-9 and third in the SCAC. Dean returned to Memphis fours years ago after a one-year stint as the head men's coach at Denison University.

During that season in Ohio, he led the Big Red to its first NCAC conference tournament appearance in 4 years, and helped Denison win seven conference games and record its best conference finish since 1997-98. Prior to that, Dean was an assistant coach in the Rhodes men's program for 9 seasons--during which time the Lynx posted a 152-74 record, including a NCAA tournament appearance in 1993.





#### SCAC PROFILE

The Southern collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) was formed to provide an association through which the member institutions may encouragee organized competition in intercollegiate sports among teams representative of their respective student bodies. The conference was founded and began operation on September 1, 1962, as the College Athletic Conference (CAC). Centre College, Southwestern at Memphis (Tennessee) (now known as Rhodes College), The University of the South (Sewanee), and Washington and Lee University of were the four charter members of the conference. Later in 1962, Washington University of St. Louis became the fifth member and the CAC remained unchanged until 1972.

Following membership changes throughout the 1970s and 1980s, the conference went through restructuring and renaming. With the addition of Millsaps College and Trinity University in 1988 and Hendrix College and Oglethorpe University in 1991, membership reached a then all-time high of eight. In 1991, the conference renamed itself the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference, its first full-time commissioner Steve Argo was hired, and a conference office was established in Atlanta, Georgia. The SCAC added Southwestern University in 1993 with participation beginning in the 1994-95 academic year. In 1997-98, the SCAC added DePauw University with participation beginning in 1998-99.

Just this past year, Austin College and Colorado College were confirmed as members of the league with participation beginning in the 2006-07 academic year. Birmingham-Southern College has been approved as the 12th member of the SCAC with play in 2007-08.

The conference and its member institutions are committed to maintaining high academic standards. The member institutions are committed to the principle that a quality college athletics program is beneficial to the well-being of an institution in that it benefits the entire campus community as well as the student-athletes.

With nine member institutions maintaining Phi Beta Kappa chapters on their campuses, the SCAC boasts some of the most prestigious colleges and universities in the nation. SCAC schools are consistently ranked among the top 50 colleges and universities in the nation in such respected publications as Barron's, Peterson's, Princeton Review and National Review College Guide.

SCAC member institutions maintain consistent enrollments through very selective admissions standards and continuing quality education.




