






A Global Classroom

Incorporating a global perspective into the learning experience is a major focus at Rhodes. Students who see and experience the world are ultimately much more prepared to improve it. We offer a number of international opportunities to students, including European Studies programs, British Studies at Oxford, faculty-led Intensive Language Programs and study abroad programs in more than 20 countries.

Mertie W. Buckman International Internship Program

In addition to international courses, field work and research, International Studies majors can spend up to eight weeks over a summer at an internship abroad through the Mertie W. Buckman International Internship Program. These programs include mentorship and work assignments, and grantees receive a stipend that covers airfare, housing, meals and educational sightseeing.

With an average class size of 13, the learning process at Rhodes is refreshingly interactive.





Step out of the classroom

Rhodes has developed a network of local schools, organizations and businesses that students can tap into. One example of this commitment is the Learning Corridor, a program where Rhodes students and faculty take part in science projects in nearby Memphis City Schools. Past projects include hands-on research at the Memphis Zoo, an archaeological dig at Ames Plantation just outside of Memphis, biomedical research at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and NASA Stars, a mentorship that prepares students for science camp.

At Rhodes, we understand that much of the learning you will do over four years will happen outside of the classroom. Community service has been a major part of the Rhodes experience for more than 50 years, and more than 80% of our students engage in courses, research and extracurricular activities that improve the lives of those around us. Here are a few of the community engagement programs offered every year.

Souper Contact Soup Kitchen

Working with the chaplain's office, students operate a weekly soup kitchen for the homeless and hungry.

Tex-Mex Border Ministry

For more than two decades, Rhodes students have had opportunities to build homes and friendships in communities along the Texas-Mexico border.

Laurence F. Kinney Program

Participants devote time on a weekly basis to more than 100 programs across Memphis in a dozen areas of service, from youth services to environmental action to health care.

A World of Opportunity

In addition to local service in Memphis, you will have opportunities to help communities around the world.

Launched at Rhodes in 1992, the pioneering Bonner Scholars community service and leadership program is now offered at 25 colleges across the nation. Bonner Scholars earn \$10,000 annually, a stipend and additional awards. They also get to wear red sneakers at graduation.

Admissions



As one of America’s top liberal arts colleges, Rhodes is a selective institution. Sure, we look for highly motivated students who have demonstrated high academic achievement. But we are also looking for creativity, character and leadership skills. At Rhodes, we value each person’s unique attributes. We invite anyone who believes Rhodes is the right college for them to apply and allow us to consider them carefully.

Early Decision

Have you decided that Rhodes is the college for you? If so, you may apply Early Decision (ED), letting us know that you will attend Rhodes if accepted. If you apply ED you will receive your admission decision by December 1 for ED I and by February 1 for ED II.

ED I Deadline November 1
ED II Deadline January 1

Regular Decision

Most applicants will apply by January 15. If you apply Regular Decision you will receive your admission decision by April 1.

Scholarships, Fellowships & Financial Aid

We know that going to college is expensive, so we use a combination of state, federal and Rhodes funds to assist families who cannot afford the whole cost of attending Rhodes. Do not let the “sticker price” keep you from applying. More than 50% of our new students receive scholarships or fellowships ranging from \$5,000 to the full cost of attending Rhodes. Our Fellowship program goes beyond traditional scholarships, rewarding students with the vision and drive to incorporate research, professional opportunities, community service and more into their Rhodes education.

Rhodes welcomes applications for admissions from all persons and does not discriminate on the basis of gender, race, color, age, religion, disability, sexual orientation or national and ethnic origin in its admission policies, loan programs, or other college programs, policies, and activities. In compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, Rhodes will make every reasonable effort to accommodate the needs of its students with disabilities.

In accordance with the Clery Act, the Rhodes College annual security report includes statistics for the previous three years concerning reported crimes that occurred on campus; in certain off-campus buildings owned or controlled by Rhodes; and on public property within or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. The report also includes institutional policies concerning campus security, such as policies concerning alcohol and drug use, crime prevention, the reporting of crimes, sexual assault, and other matters. According to the Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act of 1991, all institutions participating in Title IV student financial assistance programs are required annually to disclose the graduation rate for the most recent cohort of first-time students that has had an opportunity to graduate within 150% of normal time. For Rhodes, that means giving a six-year graduation rate. The cohort of first-time students who entered Rhodes in 1999 had a six-year graduation rate of 74 percent.





Student/Faculty Ratio

Rhodes has a student/faculty ratio of 11:1.

The Honor System

Established more than a century ago, the Rhodes Honor System emphasizes honor and integrity as important core values. Students sign a pledge affirming their personal commitment to this honored tradition.

Campus Life

More than 90 student clubs and organizations include campus publications, fine arts clubs, special interest groups, community service groups and Greek organizations.

Financial Aid

Rhodes offers one of the largest merit-based scholarship and fellowship programs per capita in the nation. More than 80 percent of our students receive some form of financial aid—totaling more than \$26 million each year.
