

Monday, October 26 @ 7:00 PM Blount Auditorium Free and open to the public.

Prof. Lisa Moses Leff (American University) will tell the story of Zosa Szajkowski, historian and archive "salvager," who recovered and then moved tens of thousands of documents about Jewish history from France to the United States from 1940 through 1961.

Professor Leff will address Szajkowski's complex motivations including his sense of what it means to be a historian (as well as money troubles, insanity, and views about where Jewish documents do or don't belong).

This story sheds light on what archives are (not a site of remembering but a site of forgetting) and suggests that they are themselves affected by historical forces, and the relationship between archives, memory and communal identity.

Professor Leff is the author of Sacred Bonds of Solidarity: The Rise of Jewish Internationalism in Nineteenth-Century France.
