Day-Long Homecoming Features Football, Friendship, Fanfare

Widespread Construction Will Greet Homecomers

The sound of the hammer and the stone chisel is heard from widely scattered construction activities over the campus and a number of additions and changes will greet Homecoming visitors this year.

Those approaching from the west will be surprised at the size and progress of the new building which parallels University Street and completes the men's residence complex. It, Ellett, Robb, and White are interconnected. The new hall will house 105 men students.

Farther north on University at the gymnasium entrance footings for the new Gaylon Smith Memorial Gateway may be seen. The south section, which includes a length of stone wall on which a bronze memorial tablet will be placed, will be built first.

Those entering the campus from the east will be impressed by the architectural beauty of the new women's residence hall, which is connected with Freshman Hall on the north end by a gothic cloister and forms the eastern and northern screening for a grass quadrangle in the center of the women's residence complex. When this is landscaped a very beautiful and pleasant effect will be achieved.

The least construction but perhaps the greatest surprise will be the changes in Palmer Hall. The first exterior alteration since the building went up in 1925 is a north entrance at basement level reached by stone stairway and leading to two new classrooms in the basement of Palmer. The largest, accommodating more than 100 classroom chairs, will be used principally for the "Man" course. The other is much smaller and will

Athletic Picture, 1960

As Southwestern entered its 112th year, varsity athletics once again got underway with two winning seasons immediately behind the Lynx and rosy prospects ahead.

Two years ago varsity athletics, under Bill Maybry's direction, turned in the first overall winning year since World War II with a record of 47 wins to 46 losses in 93 outings. This record, a tribute to both the athletes and the coaching staffs, was bettered during the 1959-60 season when a record of 52 victories against 40 defeats and one tie was set.

Coach Derrick Barton came to Southwestern in 1953. Since that time tennis has brought consistent laurels to the Lynx. For the fifth straight year Coach Barton's team won the TIAC championship. Mike Truscott, the South American standout, was rated top man in the meet. During the regular season the netters lost only three matches in 16 outings. The best individual record was turned in by Bill Davidson, who was undefeated in 16 matches. Although three men graduated from the 1960 team, Davidson and Truscott along with Tommy White should spark the team to another outstanding season in 1961.

Winning Record

Without exception Coach Freeman Marr's track team turned in the best record of last year's athletic teams. The cinder men recorded a perfect year, winning seven and losing none in dual meets. Four new records were set on Fargason Field: Mallory Chamberlain in the 880 yard run and the mile run, and Wes Busbee in the javelin throw and in individual points. Only two men on the 1960 team graduated, leaving 17 lettermen to carry the colors next spring.

With athletic director Bill Maybry as coach and Memphis Country Club's Pat Abbott as pro, the Lynx produced the best golf year in the history of Southwestern. Although the record was ten wins to three losses, the members of the squad were still disappointed because two of the games were lost by only one stroke. Since there was only one senior on last year's team, the squad should be set for another winning season. Jim Stowers and Stewart Thames promise good support as senior members of the squad while Doug Janss and Charles Rich are strong sophomore assets.

Basketball Season Ahead

Three years ago Coach Woody Johnson came to Southwestern to take command of the baseball and basketball squads. In the past season his baseball team won more games than any previous one, winning 10 and losing 11. With nine monogram winners returning for the 1961 season, the Lynx baseball team should be well equipped. A good crew of well experienced freshman pitchers will make a much needed addition to the nine during the coming campaign.

The basketball team will be young and somewhat inexperienced, as five of the top six players graduated. Coach Bill Maybry produced one of the strongest cross-country teams in the history of the college in 1959. Last year's record was damaged by a few in-

juries, but with three of the first five men returning another strong team is expected. The 1960 cross-country schedule is the most ambitious one ever set up in the history of the college. Eleven meets are scheduled, with the NCAA meet in Wheaton, Ill., ending the season on November 12.

Fine Coaching Staff

Coach Rick Mays has chalked up an impressive record during his stay at Southwestern. As he started his seventh year as head coach of the Lynx, Coach Mays set a record of staying at Southwestern at least two years longer than any previous grid mentor. In his first six years Mays won 22 ball games. This number of games is more than any of his predecessors can boast.

Supporting Coach Mays is one of the most brilliant coaching staffs in small college football. Coaching the backfield for the sixth year is Dr. Ross Pritchard, a former star halfback at the University of Arkansas and one of the best known coaches in the South. Coach Floyd 'Preacher' Roberts will once again coach the Lynx line. Since playing his college football at Tulane, Coach Roberts has coached many great teams in and around Memphis. Coach Woody Johnson will again be the head scout for the Lynx this fall. Coach Johnson was formerly a scout for the Los Angeles Dodgers, and he turned in nationally-ranked football teams while coaching at Little Rock Junior College.

The Lynx began practice on September 1 for their 1960 football campaign. Some 47 men reported for the opening sessions. Of these 22 were returning lettermen, nine were returning squad members, 15 were freshmen, and one was a transfer.

Lynx Look Promising

After practicing for only four days the Lynx had a controlled scrimmage with the Hellcats of Millington on September 5, outscoring the Navy four touchdowns to one.

With the experience of the 22 returning lettermen Southwestern should be well equipped for the coming campaign. This experience added to the size of the 1960 Lynx line, which will average over 200 pounds, should prove advantageous.

Jim Stowers and Sam Drash are two returning lettermen at end. Both men saw a lot of action in last year's campaign. John Ashcraft, who lettered last year as a freshman fullback, has been moved to end to add depth to that position. Sophomores Joe Duncan and Tom Lowry and freshmen Bob West and Danny McCleary are expected to see a lot of action at end during the coming year.

Co-captain Butch Kimbro, Jerry Duncan, and Larry Cox are the lettering tackles who returned for the 1960 year. These along with transfer Doug Meeks from Vanderbilt make the tackle slot a well manned position.

Buddy Tollison, Mike Rowland, and Robbie Adams give the Lynx three returning lettermen at guard. Freshmen Roy Twaddle and Larry Bucy, added to the list of lettering guards, make the guard position one of the strongest in the forward wall of the Lynx.

Frank Coyle is the only returning letterman at center for the coming season. But two very promising freshmen, Jerry Fong and Lee Carroll, give added strength and depth to that position.

Quarterbacks Robert Echols and Frank Weathersby both have lettered for two years at Southwestern. With them and freshmen Johnny Sarber and Ronnie Splann the field-general spot is well manned.

Captain Tommy Clinton and Billy Landers head the list of returning lettermen at halfback. Pat Burke and Malcolm Gillis round off the list of lettermen while Buddy McAfee and Bill Harwood, both sophomores, are playing outstanding ball. Freshmen Challace McMillin and Bill Vaughan are two very promising halfbacks and they are expected to see a lot of action in the coming campaigns.

New Representatives from Three States on Southwestern's Board of Directors

Three new members of Southwestern's Board of Directors will visit the campus in that capacity for the first time for the fall meeting on Oct. 20.

They are Frank A. England, Jr., of Greenville, Miss., a Southwestern graduate and son of a long-time member of the board; William H. Dale, a Columbia, Tenn., attorney who was graduated from Vanderbilt University and Duke law school; and William H. Mitchell, a Davidson graduate who took a law degree at the University of Alabama and is now a bank president in Florence, Ala. All three are active Presbyterian laymen.

Mr. England, who graduated from Southwestern in 1941, heads the England Motor Co., is a past president of the Greenville Lion's Club, and chairman of the Greenville Industrial Foundation. He is married and has four children. Mr. England Sr., who was a member of Southwestern's board for many years, died in December of 1958.

Mr. Dale, a member of the law firm of Tomlinson & Dale, is married and has five children. He is a Phi Beta Kappa, a member of the Tennessee and Maury County Bar Associations, and the Columbia Kiwanis Club, and enjoys hunting and fishing.

Mr. Mitchell, president of the First National Bank of Florence, is married and has two daughters. He is on the Board of Governors of the Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital and on the Board of Directors of the Muscle Shoals Regional Library and is active in both the Red Cross and United Fund of his home county, in the Florence Chamber of Commerce, and in the Florence Rotary Club. He is also a past president of the last two.

The board's committees will meet, as usual, on the Wednesday night preceding the all-day Thursday meeting.

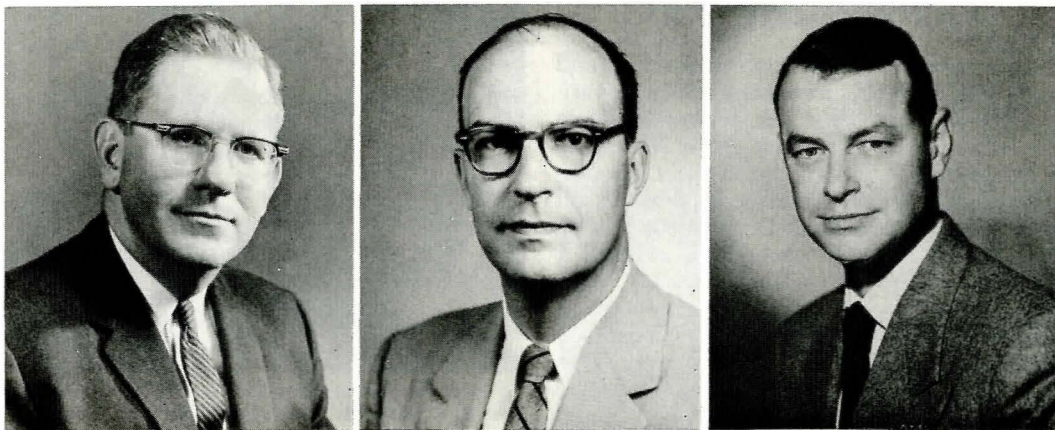
I. L. Myers Dies in N. Y. Was Honorary Alumnus

I. L. Myers, cultural benefactor of Southwestern, of Memphis, and of the entire Mid-South section, died suddenly Sept. 23 during a visit to New York, where he was discussing plans for the Metropolitan Opera's next visit to Memphis.

Mr. Myers, who was affectionately known as "Ike" by many of the world's great artists, brought many fine arts shows and programs to Memphis through his Arts Appreciation. Just one week after his death the famous young Mexican pianist, Francisco Gyves, gave a concert in Hardie Auditorium. This was another gift, free to the public, from Ike Myers.

He was instrumental in the organization of the Memphis Academy of Arts, the Youth Symphony of Memphis, Arts Appreciation, through which he sponsored and often personally financed cultural offerings, and the Memphis College of Music, which is now Southwestern's Department of Music.

Mr. Myers was an honorary alumnus of Southwestern, having received, in 1948, the honorary degree of Doctor of Fine Arts.

Mrs. Knitzer, Piano Teacher Daughter of Professor

Mrs. Mary Strickler Knitzer, daughter of Dr. R. P. Strickler, retired Southwestern professor who for many years was head of the Greek department, died of a heart attack Aug. 8.

She had taught piano at the College of Music since 1949 and was a talented musician from early childhood. She studied at Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore before moving to Memphis when her father came to Southwestern in 1925. She also studied under Theodore Bohlmann in Memphis and at Chautauqua during the summers. She was graduated from Juilliard Graduate School of Music in N. Y. C., and toured the United States and Canada as a concert pianist.

She lived with Dr. Strickler at their home, 1808 N. Parkway.

Popular Parents' Day Will Be Repeated

Southwestern's fifth annual Parents' Day, a popular campus event, will be held Saturday, Nov. 12.

Under the chairmanship of Dr. R. P. Richardson '17, vice president for development, the day's activities include a sampling of the student's typical Saturday when the Lynx are playing a home game.

Moms and Dads are invited to come early and attend morning classes with their own sons or daughters, or any class which may interest them, to meet other students and professors at a morning coffee hour, to have lunch in the college dining halls, and to attend the annual All-Sing that evening.

This year's talented Lynx football team meets Howard College at 2 p.m.

Dr. Richardson said detailed plans will soon be announced, and parents will receive complete information by letter.

First SW Annual Support Program Helps Swell Loyalty Fund To New High

The 1960 Southwestern Loyalty Fund is well on its way to a record breaking total, reports Goodbar Morgan, alumni secretary. Gifts received up until Sept. 1 exceeded \$21,000, approximately \$10,000 more than on the same date last year.

The increase reflects gifts of larger denominations rather than greater alumni participation, Mr. Morgan says. "We hope that during the remaining months more alumni will participate in the Loyalty Fund, thus increasing the percentage of participation as well as the amount of money." Percentage of alumni participating so far stands at 10.9%. The national annual average is about twice that figure.

He attributes a substantial amount of the increase to the Southwestern Annual Support Program solicitation, during which the college's needs have been emphasized. Gifts to the Support Program from alumni were recorded in the Loyalty Fund as are gifts of any kind.

Recent reports on the Southwestern Annual Support Program, which carried solicitation into the top levels of Memphis business and industry, showed receipts of approximately \$100,000 in cash and pledges. This is about 2/3 of goal in this first year effort which was initiated by Dr. R. P. Richard-

son, vice president for development, and led by William H. Bryce, Jr., '47, as chairman. Three months remain, during which a substantial number of additional gifts are anticipated.

Dr. Peyton N. Rhodes, president, points out in his forthcoming annual report that some five times as many persons have already made contributions or pledges to the college as contributed the previous year. Purpose of the campaign was to broaden the base of giving as well as to reach the stated goal of \$150,000.

Experience also has been gained which will be helpful in future annual efforts.

Contributions from alumni, sent either to the Alumni Office or the Office of Development before Dec. 31, will be credited to both funds and to the contributor's class percentage.

Twelve Newcomers To Southwestern Staff

Three new professors, two instructors, and seven staff members have been added in various departments. Four are former students who have returned to their Alma Mater.

Dr. Milton P. Brown, Jr., comes to Southwestern as assistant professor of Bible to fill the opening in the Bible Department left by Dr. Daniel D. Rhodes, who has accepted a faculty position at Davidson College.

Dr. Brown, a native of Bessemer, Ala., was graduated from Birmingham-Southern College cum laude and holds an M.A. degree from Iowa State University and a B.D. degree from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary. He received a Ph.D. degree from Duke University in the field of Biblical literature and languages. He served as pastor of the Bardstown, Ky., Presbyterian Church from 1953 to 55 and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, ODK leadership fraternity, the National Association of Biblical Instructors, and the Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis.

He has spent the last three years at Washington and Lee University teaching Bible and Greek.

Dr. Brown, his wife, the former Miss Anne Marie Cochran of Bessemer, and two children live at 609 McConnell.

German

Dr. Guenther Bicknese joins the faculty as assistant professor of German.

He was born in Guttersloh, Germany, where he took his early schooling and was graduated from Philipps University in Marburg, Germany. He came to the United States in 1951 to do graduate work in English at Duke University and completed his Ph.D. in English at Philipps University where his studies included work in Germanic philosophy.

He has traveled in many European countries, edited a weekly magazine for children, and written a novel which was published in Germany.

Dr. Bicknese's immediate past position was at Graham-Eckes School in Palm Beach Fla.

He is living in a faculty apartment at 649 University with his wife and young son.

Dr. Harvey M. Hanson comes to Southwestern as associate professor of physics.

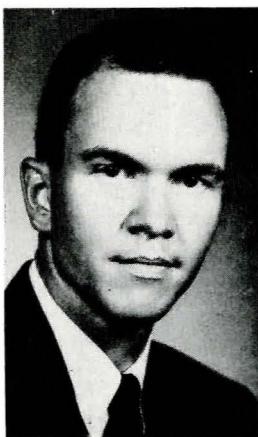
He received his B.S. degree with distinction from the University of Akron and his M.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees from Ohio State University.

For the past two years he has been with the Missouri Department of Public Health and Welfare.

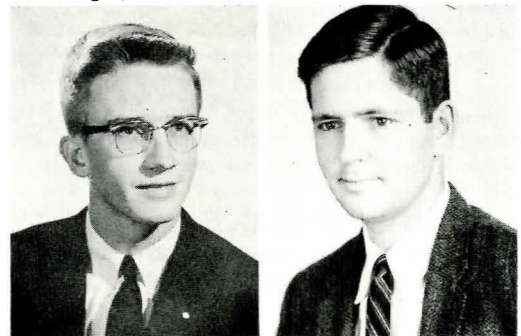
He is married and lives at 3908 Vagabond Drive.

No special recruitment of women students is planned, he said, because of the already overwhelming number of well qualified applicants. However, the college representatives will be glad to talk to interested prospective women students as well.

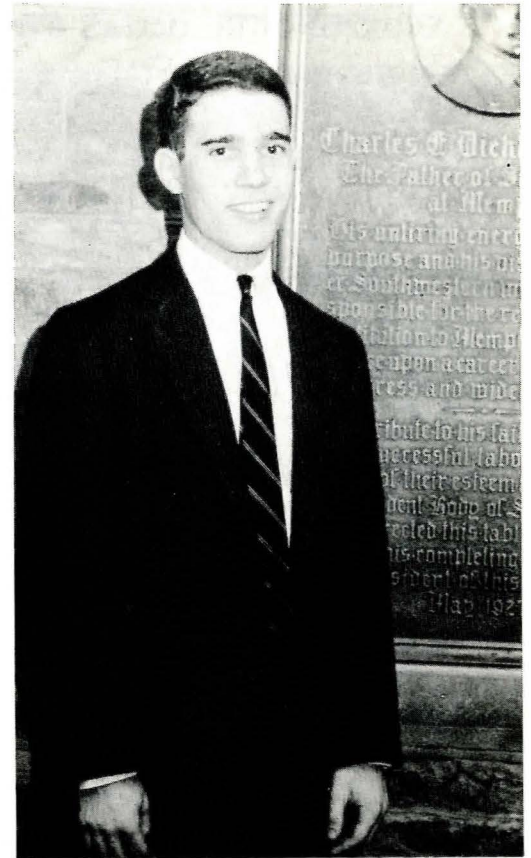

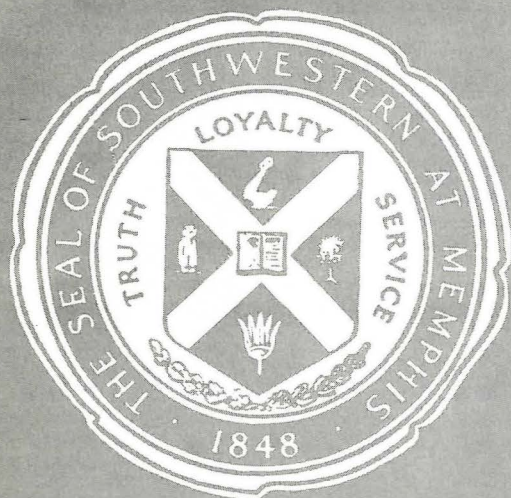
