Maybry Leads Cross Country Team to Victory

Southwestern extended its string of winning cross country seasons to eight this fall, as coach William R. Maybry led the Lynx harriers to a 7-5 record. At the beginning of the season the outlook was not so favorable, but Maybry attributes the team's success to the great improvement of returning squadmen.

The schedule was the toughest to date, including Arkansas State, Mississippi College, Union University, and Washington Uni-

versity—annually rugged teams.

Senior captains Howard Romaine and Dossett Foster continued in their stellar ways, but the high spot was the improvement of John Poolman and Ted Morris; they were often high in the top six finishers. Neither ran much last season.

Another great contribution to the Lynx cause was freshman Gary Nichols, who will be a top man next season. He was fourth in the Lynx ranks this year and always a threat to the opposition.

Southwestern has never had a losing season in cross country since Maybry took the reins in 1956, and the prospects for the next season are excellent, despite the loss of Foster, Romaine, and Poolman.

Craddock, who has the following faithful lieutenants working for him: Buford Norman, James Breytspraak '38 (General Business); John Porter '31 and John 'Buddy' Thomason '51 (Legal); Dr. Robert F. Ackerman '42 and his co-chairman Dr. William T. Tyson '39 (Medical); Robert Elder '40 and Judd Williford '50 (Alumni). These leaders and their willing workers have their sights steadily set on a goal of \$75,000.

Football and Basketball FEW PLAYERS—FIGHTING HARD

Southwestern's football team, called the "fighting few" by Coach Jesse Johnson, enjoyed moderate success this season but lost some real heartbreakers.

The Lynx, under the guidance of this new and aggressive coach, ended with a 2-5-1 record—somewhat short of some predictions—but the feeling of accomplishment still lies in the fact that the "fighting few" fought hard and lost valiantly. The main trouble all season was the lack of depth. Only about 12 points were scored on the Lynx in the first half of each game, with exception of a 36-point production by Washington and Lee. The second half was always a different story with the lack of replacements causing physical fatigue for the regulars, most of whom played the full 60 minutes all year long.

A season with a losing record often means failure to many people, but not so to me or the members of the team, or the members of the athletic department. Some people pass it off lightly saying the Lynx "play for fun," something that I wage personal war against. We play football and all other sports merely for the love of the sport and the desire to succeed. I quote from the article in the February, 1963 issue of Coach and Athlete Magazine: "The Lynx may not win all their games, or even the majority, but the real aim of the athletic program will be met-to lead, shape, and build the leaders of tomorrow in the tradition of sportmanship, and physical accomplishment that made our nation's forefathers the best leaders and followers in the world.'

Our sports philosophy holds that sports are for the playersfor their pleasure and development. Alumni support, such as attendance at games, pointing out recruiting prospects to the coaches,

etc. aids Southwestern in attaining this goal.

Southwestern's current basketball squad appears to be a vast improvement over the teams of the past two years, which won only 10 games. This sport also has a new head coach—Donald Duckworth who was formerly with Washington University, a fellow member of the College Athletic Conference.

The basketball schedule is a tough one, but presents a good challenge to the young team, composed mainly of freshmen and sophomores. This will definitely be a building year for the Lynx, but that does not indicate that it will be a losing one. The team is aggressive and fast, and will be a headache for most opponents and a pushover for none.

William Ingram '49 Elected Mayor

Elected to the office of Mayor of Memphis in the November election was Judge William B. Ingram '49. Bill was born in Hollandale, Miss., reared in Brownsville, Tenn., and moved to Memphis in 1940. In 1957 he won the bar association's recommendation for the position of judge of the proposed new city traffic court and was appointed to serve until the 1959 City election which he won. He has been active in Masonic, Democratic Party and bar activities, is married to the former Beverly McCall and has four children. The Ingrams live at 4712 Kaye Road.

From the Ivy-Covered Tower

As the very prosperous year of 1963 drew to a close, the Alumni Office recorded a total of approximately 1,200 gifts to the college for a final figure of \$66,000. This is quite impressive when one compares it with a total of less than \$10,000 per year in the 1940's and 1950's. These gifts from alumni along with those of the Annual Sponsors' Program from business leaders and individuals in the city constitute 15 percent of the operating income of the college. Without such significant financial assistance the college could not hope to sustain a first-rate educational program.

The one disappointing aspect of alumni support, however, has been the relatively low percentage of those who do contribute to the college. Out of 6,000 alumni, only 1,200 (or one out of five) gave to the college in 1963. Another 20 to 30 percent have given sporadi-

cally over the past five to ten years. The disturbing fact is that approximately 50 percent of the 6,000 alumni have never given to Southwestern. Why should there be such apathy and lack of response on the part of Southwestern alumni - at least on the part of 50 percent of them? Has the college failed to inform its alumni of the tremendous role which they can play in supporting their alma mater? Have we who work in this area of development and alumni relations failed to provide adequate objectives or techniques for giving in our attempt to illustrate the urgent need for in-

creased support by alumni? Or does alumni apathy in giving simply indicate a lack of "school spirit" or real love for alma mater that never really existed even during the course of the student's days in college?

Divers Reasons Given

Many reasons are advanced by alumni for their failure to contribute:

"I've been away from the campus so long I really don't have much interest in the college."

"My husband went to X University and he gives to its alumni fund rather than to Southwestern.'

"The Bible Department is too 'liberal'."

4. "I went to another school after Southwestern and feel a greater loyalty to it."
"I didn't like the chapel speaker the college had recently.

He sounded too liberal to me."

"Why should I give? I don't owe Southwestern anything! It cost me enough to go there anyway."

Are these valid reasons for a refusal to support a private liberal arts, church-related college which is attempting to provide the finest individualized instruction to the young men and women of this region?

The Positive Side

Let us put the matter in a more positive perspective. Why should I, as an alumnus, give to Southwestern? There are undoubtedly many reasons, but let us consider a few of the more obvious

1. Our dual system of private and public higher education simply cannot survive unless alumni, the church, and others who believe in the private college or university give it sufficient support. Is Southwestern, as a small liberal arts college, performing a role in education that is unique and valuable, as contrasted with the state university, etc.?

2. Colleges such as Southwestern are the primary educational agencies of the church. As such they seek to provide not only ministerial candidates for seminaries but also an educated laity which is a significant asset to the administration of our churches and their programs. Does the church (e.g. the Presbyterian Church in the United States) really need the colleges as an integral part of the total program of Christian education?

3. Any student at Southwestern has been subsidized even if he

paid full tuition. For example, in 1962-63 tuition was \$800 and the instructional cost per student was \$1,500. If a student did not receive a scholarship and paid his "full fare" for four years, he would still obtain a \$2,800 subsidy which was provided by alumni, the church, and other friends who established endowment funds, gave buildings or contributed annually so that others could receive a splendid education at almost "half the actual cost." Is it logical then for an alumnus to say "I don't owe Southwestern a thing?"

4. The college continues to provide cultural and educational services to its alumni, as well as to the general public. Concerts, film series, discussion groups, art exhibits, and lectures are offered throughout the academic year. In 1962-63 over 2,600 persons registered in 104 different programs offered by the Adult Education Center. This included 28 programs offered outside of Memphis in Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Mississippi, and Tennessee. Of special interest to Memphis and the Mid-South area have been the yearly Institute for Executive Leadership (now in its ninth year), the Urban Policy Conference and the University Lecturers Series, which will bring in distinguished speakers this winter from Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Duke, Washington and Lee, Michigan and Virginia. Should the college continue to offer such services and opportunities to this region?

5. Corporations and many foundations, as well as wealthy individuals, are raising the question? "Do Southwestern alumni support their alma mater?" The obvious conclusion which can be drawn from this is "Why should non-alumni sources contribute to Southwestern if those who have been a part of the institution and have received an education from it do not give their

wholehearted commitment?"

To those of us who work so closely with the college these seem to be excellent and obvious motivating factors for alumni giving. Perhaps we do not effectively communicate these points to you, our alumni. Or is this a question of not only informing alumni of the need for contributions but also challenging the individual to play a more significant role in a particular project?

How can an alumnus give to the college?

1. Memorials can be sent to the Library. 2. A gift to the Loyalty Fund can be undesignated or specifically given for a purpose such as scholarships, Science Fund,

3. A Memphis alumnus can give personally and/or through his business in the 1964 Annual Sponsors' Program. (This is also credited to the Loyalty Fund and to the individual's class in the case of an alumnus.)

4. An increasing number of alumni parents are contributing to the Parents Fund, which is being dedicated at the present

to the completion of the Briggs Student Center.

5. Many alumni are making provision in their estate planning to leave a specific amount or a percentage of their final estate

to the College for its endowment or scholarship funds.

There are some colleges which stress the point that alumni should budget a certain amount (e.g. one percent of income before taxes) each year for their alma mater, just as one would make provision for their church pledge, the Community Chest, etc. Over the past five years, an increasing number of firms and individuals in Memphis have included Southwestern's Annual Sponsors' Program in their annual budgets. Although the great majority of the officers of these companies are not Southwestern alumni, they are firmlyeven enthusiastically—convinced of the fact that Southwestern is a tremendous asset to Memphis and to the future development of privately supported education in this country.

What should an alumnus give Southwestern? How much do I "owe" the college as my alma mater? Each alumnus must answer these questions for himself or herself. To a certain degree the future progress and development of the college will depend upon your

response!

Professor of mathematics and chairman of the mathematics department, Dr. Marion L. MacQueen '19, holds the E. C. Ellett Chair at Southwestern. Dr. MacQueen is the senior member of the faculty in point of service. He taught briefly at the old Southwestern in Clarksville, Tennessee and as a young professor moved with the college to Memphis in 1925. He received his B. A. degree from Southwestern, M. A. from the University of Wisconsin where he was an instructor, and Ph. D. from the University of Chicago in 1933. Dr. MacQueen is a Phi Beta Kappa, a member of Sigma Xi, Chi Beta Phi, and Gamma Alpha national honorary scientific fraternities. He belongs to the American Mathematical Society, the Mathematical Association of America, the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, the Tennessee Mathematics Teachers' Association and the Tennessee Academy of Science.

Dr. MacQueen served in 1959-1960 as Director of an In-Service Institute for high school mathematics teachers sponsored by the National Science Foundation. He now serves as chairman of the faculty committee on research and creative activity and is college archivist at Southwestern. Dr. MacQueen and his wife, the former Grace Gilfillan, live at 637 McConnell Street in Memphis. They have two sons, Leigh and Robert, who are graduates of Southwestern. Leigh teaches at the Memphis University School and is married to the former Geraldine Dozier' 56 of Marianna, Arkansas. Robert, who was for two years a member of the Physics Department of Southwestern, is continuing his graduate work at the Johns Hopkins University and is married to the former Caroline Gibbs '60 of Franklin, Tennessee. Another new member of the mathematics department this year is John Harlan Christy, assistant professor of mathematics. He received his B. S. degree in mathematics from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1959 and his Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University in January 1964. He belongs to Sigma Xi and is a member of the American Mathematical Society. During the summers of 1959 and 1960 he did research work in the theoretical physics division of the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory at Los Alamos, New Mexico. Professor Christy and his wife, Nancy Carol, have two children, Katherine Anne and John Harlan III.





William C. Nemitz '50 is associate professor of mathematics at Southwestern. He received his B. S. degree from Southwestern, M. S. and Ph. D. from Ohio State University. He served in the U. S. Navy from 1951-1954, was an instructor at Ohio State University during 1959-1960 and assistant professor at the University of Kansas in 1960-1961.

Dr. Nemitz's field of research involves implicative semi-lattices. In 1959-1960 he had a joint article published in the Mathematics Magazine on a mathematical theory of switching circuits and in 1961 the Transactions of the American Mathematical Society published his article on a decomposition theorem for measures in Euclidean n-space. His article on transformation preserving the Grassmannian will appear soon in the Transactions.

HE TWENTIETH CENTURY has witnessed changes in mathematics which are so extensive, so profound in their implications for education, and so far-reaching that they can be described only as revolutionary.

In an article entitled "The Revolution in Mathematics," (Liberal Education, May, 1961), Marshall Stone has this to say: "While several important changes have taken place since 1900 in our conception of mathematics or in our points of view concerning it, the one which truly involves a revolution in ideas is the discovery that mathematics is entirely independent of the physical world... The discovery that this is so may be said without exaggeration to mark one of the most significant intellectual advances in the history of mankind... At the same time... mathematical systems can often usefully serve as models for portions of reality, thus providing the basis for a theoretical mathematical analysis of relations observed in the phenomenal world."

"Indeed, it is becoming clearer and clearer every day that mathematics has to be regarded as the corner-stone of all scientific thinking and hence of the intrinsically articulated technological society we are busily engaged in building. . . . When we stop to compare the mathematics of today with mathematics as it was at the close of the nineteenth century we may well be amazed to note how rapidly our mathematical knowledge has grown in quantity and complexity, but we should also not fail to observe how closely this development has been involved with an emphasis upon abstraction and an increasing concern with the perception and analysis of broad mathematical patterns. . . . What it now seeks is to adjust its place in education in accordance with its growing importance in the intellectual life of our times. In such an adjustment the central problem is to define a new core of mathematical knowledge embodying the leading ideas and principal techniques of modern mathematics and

to organize the teaching of this core as a well-articulated program, taking advantage of whatever light modern psychology can throw on intellectual development, concept formation, and the learning process."

Mathematics, which has long been used by the physicist and the chemist, has invaded the life sciences, biology and psychology, and is now making important contributions to the social sciences. As a result of this tumultuous growth in mathematics, efforts are being made to insure that the mathematics education provided by our schools and colleges is adequate for the needs of our times. Active steps have been taken to modernize the mathematical programs at all levels. Recognizing the urgent need to improve school mathematics programs, foundations have contributed large sums of money for experimentation. Among the various new programs, the material developed by the School Mathematics Study Group (SMSG) is unique in that it is the result of the largest united effort for improvement in the history of mathematics education. SMSG textbooks and teachers' manuals for grade 4 through 12 are now available for use in our schools.

Today there is an unprecedented demand for well-qualified teachers of mathematics in our schools and colleges. In many cases teachers of high school mathematics and those of college mathematics find re-education is necessary because of the changes that have taken place in mathematics. For such teachers The National Science Foundation provides many opportunities for study through in-service institutes, summer institutes, and academic-year institutes.


Mindful of the general development and major trends in mathematics, the department of mathematics at Southwestern has sought to keep its program at the proper level of quality and to provide courses embodying the essential elements and techniques of modern mathematics.
