DR. RHODES CHOSEN "EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR"

Dr. Peyton N. Rhodes, president of Southwestern At Memphis, was selected "Educator of the Year" on November 24, 1964, by Greater Memphis State, Inc., during a banquet attended by over three hundred members and guests of the organization.

Dr. Rhodes, who had no previous knowledge that he had been chosen, was introduced and awarded the "Educator of the Year" plaque by Mr. A. L. Whitman, first vice president of the organization, who described our president as "a man with a sense of humor and a warm friendly manner."

Mr. Whitman continued to praise Dr. Rhodes' contributions to higher education since the latter came to Southwestern as an associate professor of physics in 1926. Rising to vice president in 1944 and president in 1949, Dr. Rhodes received encomium from Mr. Whitman for his establishment of the Adult Education Center at Southwestern and for his untiring contributions in the field of continuing education.

Who's Who Among Students

Sixteen Southwestern seniors have been named to Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities. The national honorary recognizes the outstanding college seniors across the nation.

The group of nine men and seven women set a new Southwestern record for the largest number in the history of the school to be selected for this honor.

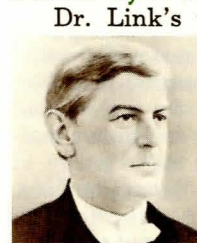
The University Lecturers Series

Southwestern annually joins with a number of distinguished institutions and their local alumni groups to offer all responsible citizens an intellectual experience and to strengthen the vital ties which bind the alumnus to his alma mater in mind and spirit.

In charge of this plan, which is termed The University Lecturers Series, is Dr. Alfred O. Canon, Southwestern's dean of alumni and development.

The present Series began on January 14 when Dr. Arthur S. Link, professor of history at Princeton University, spoke on "Woodrow Wilson." Dr. Link is director of the projected forty-volume Woodrow Wilson Papers and has written eight books concerning the great figure.

Dr. Link's topic brought to mind the fact that former President Wilson's father, Dr. Joseph R. Wilson, joined the faculty of Southwestern in 1884 (then Southwestern Presbyterian University at Clarksville, Tennessee) as head of the new School of Theology. At this time Woodrow Wilson was a student at Johns Hopkins, but his younger brother, Joseph, Jr., entered Southwestern, taking an active part in all phases of college life.

Book Review

Professor's Latest Publication

Southwestern's Professor of Sociology and Anthropology

Jack Conrad, **The Many Worlds of Man,**

Thomas Y. Crowell Co., N. Y., 1964, xii + 305, \$6.95

The Many Worlds of Man is Jack Conrad's second book and a third one on creativity is gestating. **Many Worlds** can be read for both fun and profit and at several levels:

You can read it at the sheerly entertaining level of anthropological scuttlebutt: At least thirteen peoples (not including ourselves and a few other famous examples) regard themselves as the chosen people, for example. Or among the Ainu, when a man meets his sister, he "holds her hands for a few seconds. Suddenly releases her hands, grasps her by both ears and utters a cry. Then each strokes one another on the face and shoulders."

And you can read it solemnly like a good anthropology major: All men work, play, mate, obey laws, and approach the gods—their ways being many but their essential human



needs and goals being about the same. Conrad will not let you be too solemn, though. "First in line is Miss Alor," he begins a real Miss Universe contest . . . "displaying two rows of teeth carefully blackened and filed down to points." And finally there is another beauty who "has painted her mouth, fingernails, and toenails" (ye gads, it's one of our own) "bright red." All of this, by the way, is brilliantly illustrated.

Or you can read it for the message and the man beneath it. And the message is a simple one: Races and societies are different. **Vive la différence!**

Here Conrad parts company with both the sentimental liberal and the prejudiced bigot. Both of these assume, along with most members of our culture, that "different" must mean either "inferior" or "superior." So the liberal argues in the face of all evidence that differences do not exist while the bigot argues that differences must be stamped out. Not so, this book counters. Races and societies do differ, and in this variegation is given the sign that man is almost endlessly ingenious, that he will prevail under a wide array of circumstances (a keen "Survival" checklist is appended), and that he is just about the most fascinating thing to turn up in nature thus far. It makes you almost proud to be a member of the species.

Although this book is a deep level plea that men respect men, it is not a philosophical heavy breather. It is affectionate, gentle. When I saw a Maori's preserved head depicted, my cultural emancipation collapsed for a moment and it seemed to me, "This I cannot stomach!" But next I read, "Remember too that in life this beloved visage was never photographed or painted and after death would disappear forever but for the art of head saving." Then I remembered the picture on my own wall. I understood. I respected.

G-E "College Bowl"

Southwestern Bows to Lawrence

Southwestern was represented on the NBC-TV live color program G-E "College Bowl" on December 20, and was defeated by Lawrence College of Appleton, Wisconsin.

No rationalization intended, but the Southwestern team, comprised of students Mike Hendrick, Bob Seibert, Ed Scrimger and Dennis Spiers, faced one of the most competent opponents ever to appear on the show.

All things considered, including the pressure of appearing on a live network television program before a studio audience, the boys represented our college admirably, and there are few among us who would have changed places with them!

To put it simply, to have a winner there must be a loser. This time . . . we lost. But there will be other contests . . . other challenges.

Five Hundred Dollar Scholarship

Our boys did return with a five hundred dollar scholarship from the Corporate Alumnus Program of the General Electric Foundation, which has just completed its tenth year of operation.

Since January 1, 1955, employees and Directors of the General Electric Company have reported contributions totaling \$3,631,403 and \$2,582,469 of that amount has been matched by the Foundation: \$6,213,872 in support of higher education.

At the present time, it is estimated that approximately 63,000 employees and Directors of the General Electric Company are eligible to have their gifts matched. Attendance for one year is required and the maximum eligible gift for matching is \$2,000 annually.

Southwestern Scenario Shooting Started

1965 Annual Sponsors' Program Seeks \$150,000

The 1965 Annual Sponsors' Program, although already in motion, has its official kickoff dinner on February 24, according to Dr. Alfred O. Canon '44, dean of alumni and development.

A goal of \$150,000 has been set for this year, earmarked mainly for scholarship support for deserving students without proper financial backing.

General chairman of the 1965 A.S.P. campaign is Memphis attorney S. Shepherd Tate '39. Working under Mr. Tate in the various divisions are: Edward C. Boldt '45 (Business), William F. Hughes '29 (Alumni), Dr. John R. Maxwell (Dental), John Thomason '51 (Legal), and Dr. Henry B. Turner '39 (Medical).



From the Ivy-Covered Tower

The academic year of 1964-65 represents the fifteenth and last year in office for President Peyton N. Rhodes. The period of his tenure has been one of unusual growth and development at Southwestern and this has been especially true over the last decade. It could be of some interest to alumni, parents and other friends of the college to know the tremendous developments that have been made in one or two areas of the college during this period. It should be noted of course that these accomplishments were possible, not only through the efforts of President Rhodes, but also as a result of the work of such men as Mr. Sidney W. Farnsworth, Chairman Emeritus of the Board of Directors and Mr. A. Van Pritchard, currently Chairman of the Board, as well as a good many other friends and supporters of the college.

During the ten-year period 1955-65, Southwestern received \$6,956,000 in gifts, grants and bequests, and completed two government loans for residence halls for a total of \$1,200,000. The sources of funds raised can be broken down in the following categories.

1. Industry and Business—In the period of 1955-60 the President, assisted by a few board members, secured contributions averaging approximately \$40,000 per year from the business community of Memphis. In 1960 this solicitation was extended to encompass a volunteer team of men and women who personally visited carefully selected firms and individuals in the Annual Sponsors' Program. An average of \$135,000 yearly has been raised from this source over the past five years and this has proved to be a key factor in the college's ability to increase faculty salaries and to balance its educational budget.

2. Alumni Gifts—Gifts from this source for current operating income have risen from \$5,000 in 1955 to well over \$50,000 in 1964-65. For the past two years, Memphis alumni have been solicited in the Annual Sponsors' Program with excellent results.

The class agent technique and direct mail campaigns have been used each year, but the best results in recent months have come from area solicitation on a "direct contact" basis. Alumni committees are now active in each state and especially in urban communities where they (1) recommend high school students for entrance and (2) make contact with fellow alumni by personal call, telephone or letter in behalf of the college's Loyalty Fund Campaign.

3. Governing Boards—\$809,000 has been given by present or former board members during the decade. This includes over \$300,000 contributed to the college's endowment fund by one former director who is an alumnus. A substantial gift by another director was responsible to a considerable degree for the construction of the Catherine Burrow Refectory, while a third director provided by bequest, funds to construct the Moore Moore Infirmary. It should be noted that gifts by directors who are alumni are included in the category **Governing Boards**. The term "alumni gifts" therefore is not completely indicative of the total contributions made by alumni.

4. Other Living Individuals—A total of \$567,000 was raised from this source. The largest gift by any living individual in this period was approximately \$400,000 from Mr. Wesley Halliburton of Memphis for the construction of the Tower in memory of his son, Richard, the well known adventurer and author who was a graduate of Princeton.

5. Bequests—A number of bequests have been received over the decade for scholarship and endowment funds. In addition to these, the will of the late Mr. Thomas W. Briggs, founder of Welcome Wagon International, Inc. provided the principal amount (\$370,000) needed for the construction in 1965 of the Thomas W. Briggs Student Center. A total of \$916,000 in bequests was received from all sources.

6. Religious Groups—The four Synods of Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Tennessee of the Presbyterian Church in the United States participate in the support of the college. Over the decade, the churches of these Synods, representing

approximately 147,000 Presbyterians, provided the largest single source of contributed income—\$1,825,000.

Of this amount, \$342,000 was received in the first half of the decade as a result of additional payments from a Development Campaign held in the four Synods from 1952-56. This is the only instance in which professional fund raising counsel was employed by the college during the period in question.

The remaining portion of the church contribution, \$1,483,000, represents the regular benevolence giving of the church through presbytery and synod channels and the special direct congregational gifts made by certain key churches which have established "chairs" in memory of a former distinguished pastor, etc.

It is believed that the annual average benevolence giving to Southwestern by its four Synods exceeds that received by any other college related to the Presbyterian Church, U. S.

7. Foundations—Through the vision and generosity of the late Mr. Walter D. Bellingrath of Mobile, Alabama, the college received over \$50,000 (on the average) each year in this decade from the Bellingrath-Morse Foundation. Additional foundation grants included those from Carnegie (\$35,000), Danforth (\$30,000), George F. Baker Trust (\$100,000), U. S. Steel (\$20,000), Kellogg (\$10,000), Ford Motor Co. Fund (\$25,000), and Research Corporation (\$37,500).

In addition to these grants two special grants were received from the Ford Foundation in 1955-56 for a total of \$368,000. These made possible a substantial increase in faculty salaries at the beginning of this decade.

A total of \$517,000 was received from the Fund for Adult Education during the decade for the continuing education of adults. A total of \$1,723,000 was received from foundations for all purposes during the ten-year period.

How Was This Contributed Income Used?

Of the total amount of gift income and loans received, \$2,560,000 was used to balance the educational and general budget. This amount was needed to increase faculty and staff salaries and to "close the gap" between tuition and endowment income in the operating expense of the college.

\$577,000 was devoted to the Scholarship Budget. This gift income provided largely through churches was essential as endowed scholarships have been entirely inadequate to provide necessary funds for highly qualified students from homes of modest and low income.

Eight permanent stone buildings were constructed during this period and two others were begun in 1964-65 for a total of \$3,414,000. This program of capital improvements provided for the doubling of residence hall and dining hall facilities, replacement of a temporary infirmary with a permanent structure, and the addition of a beautiful and functional Memorial Tower, an administration office building, music classroom building and a badly needed student center, which will also house a language laboratory of latest design, and a number of seminar rooms.

There was also an addition of approximately one and one half million dollars to the endowment funds of the college, bringing the total of these funds (restricted and unrestricted) to five million dollars book value.

This is undoubtedly a remarkable record for a liberal arts college of this size located in such a region. It is, however, only an indication of greater things which may come over the next few years as many dedicated individuals contribute their time, talent and resources to the building of a greater Southwestern.

Shell Assists

Southwestern At Memphis has been included in the 1965 program of Shell Assists from the Shell Companies Foundation, Incorporated, and has received a \$1,500 donation, according to Dr. Peyton N. Rhodes, college president.

The donation is divided into three grants of \$500 each. The first is "free" money, for any institutional use which the president decides is wise; the second is for general faculty development; and the third is for additional professional development of individual faculty members in departments jointly or separately selected.

One could cavil at a few points, of course. It seems possible, for example, that some forms of religion and art do represent a broader spectrum of human feelings and perceptions than others—but I wouldn't want to bet my sabbatical on it just now. And Conrad may be a little unsympathetic to his fellow Westerners at times, as in describing our local faith-healed "flopping about in the aisles." On the other hand, though, Tacitus made his fellow Romans look pretty bad in contrast to the Germans for a good purpose too.

But I cannot cavil with much enthusiasm, for beneath this book's message is a man who has learned a very precious thing, viz, "that human choice, though it brings anxiety, is man's only hope for freedom." This book is written for men who do not have to find their place in existence by being assured that their way is the best of all, who can respect and appreciate many ways because they have had the courage to make choices within their own.

\$3,000 GRANT FROM ESSO

Southwestern has received a \$3,000 grant from the Esso Education Foundation.

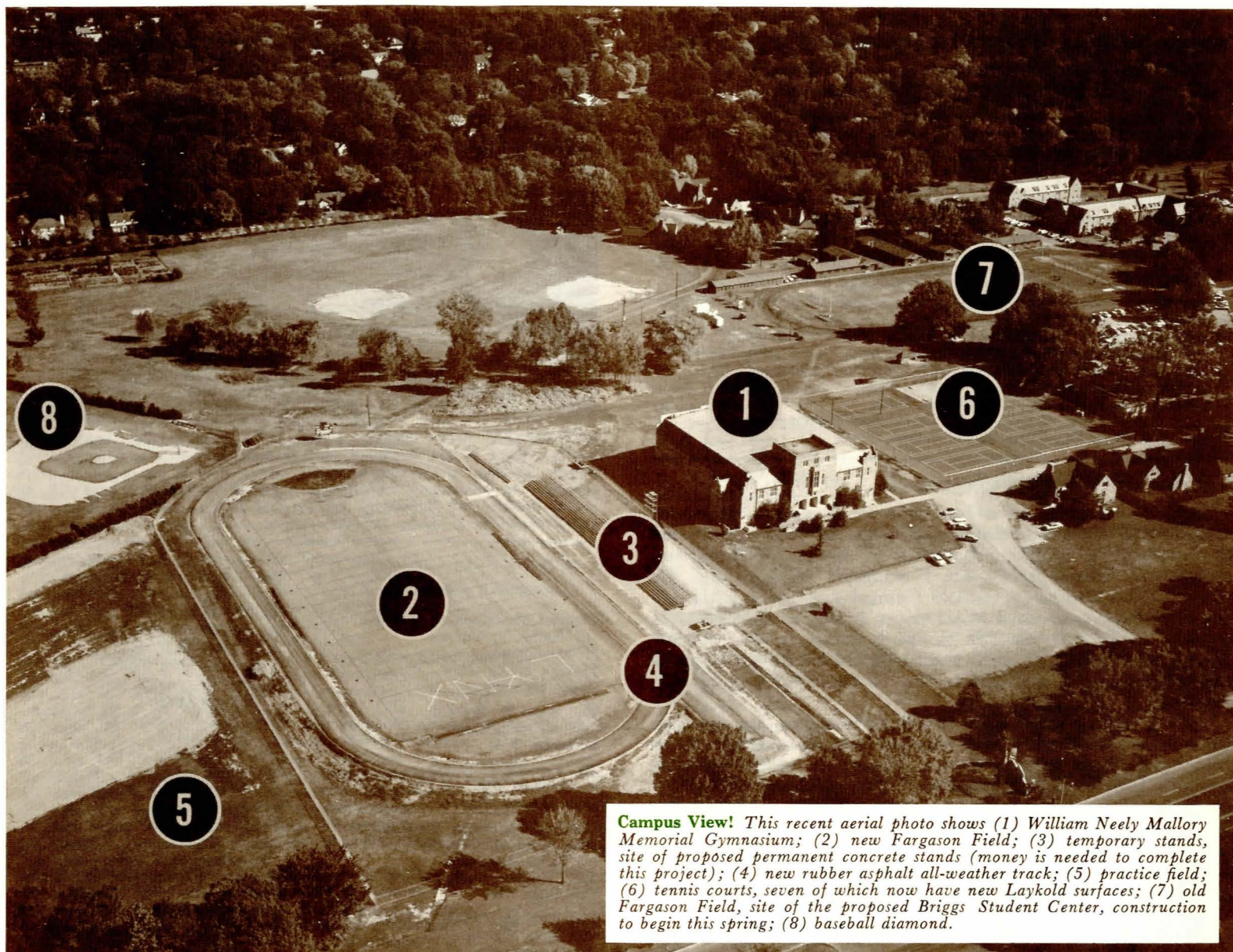
