Spring Sports Activity To Reach All-Time High

The strongest program of spring sports in the history of the College will be staged during the last two and a half months of the session. A total of fifty-three contests will crowd the calendar, thirty-two of them at home

In all four sports—baseball, track, golf, and tennis—advance reports are good. The new coaches, Derrick Barton in tennis and Pat Abbott in golf, have improved the outlook considerably in those two categories. In baseball and track more and better material is on hand than last season, and with Coach Glenn Johnson at the helm it is pretty well assured that the maximum results will be realized from the material. Coach William Maybry will give valuable assistance in both track and golf.

The baseball season of 1952 was a success in spite of a small squad, and a solid foundation was laid for the coming campaign. Promising newcomers available at most positions guarantee spirited intra-squad competition. A few of the new men are counted on to fill the shoes of veterans who did

not return.

In track the improvement should be even greater than in baseball. Despite the scarcity of veteran material, the newcomers look good enough to raise hopes for a successful series of meets.

Matches have been scheduled with Arkansas State, Howard, Ole Miss, Union University, Mississippi College, and Sewanee.

Derrick Barton, former Davis Cupper, has stimulated more interest in tennis than has been found on the campus within memory. Upon his arrival at Southwestern last fall, 150 students enrolled in his classes in tennis. From this number he selected seven for special attention and has been coaching them almost daily through the winter on the indoor courts at the Fairgrounds.

The tennis schedule includes matches with Illinois State, Emory, Western Michigan, Bradley, Wabash, Memphis State, Memphis Navy, Sewanee, Ole Miss, Alabama, and Georgia. The Tennessee state college matches will be held on the local courts in

Mav.

Like Barton in tennis, Pat Abbott, golf coach, who is resident pro at the Memphis Country Club, is having to develop the material for his team. Like Barton again, he has been successful in generating interest in his sport.

Matches have been arranged with Bradley University, Wabash, Ole Miss, Memphis State, Memphis Navy, Lambuth, Sewanee, and Vanderbilt. In addition, the Tennessee Intercollegiate Athletic Conference matches will be played in Memphis.

Full Steam Ahead On New Gymnasium

Executive Secretary Billman Addresses Phi Beta Kappas

Phi Beta Kappa day was celebrated on the campus on March 3, when Mr. Carl Billman, secretary of the national headquarters of the society, visited the local chapter, Gamma of Tennessee, and delivered the annual address in Neely Hall at 8:00 in the evening.

He was present at the initiation ceremony of Southwestern's new class of neophytes, and also at the dinner given in their honor in Neely Hall immediately after their initiation.

Mr. Billman is a graduate of Harvard, holding the A.B. and A. M. degrees from that university. As a graduate student in history there, he held the George Dilloway Fellowship. Before becoming Executive Secretary of Phi Beta Kappa in 1947, he was with the national organization as Assistant Secretary.

Seven Southwestern students were selected for initiation. They are David Alexander, Bowling Green, Kentucky, who majors in Greek; Eleanor Brown, Memphis, history; Ling-Hong Lee, Kwantung, China, physics; Morton McMillan, Monroeville, Alabama, history; Tommye Virginia Stewart, Memphis, mathematics; Carl Strauss, Memphis, chemistry; and Bill Young, West Point, Mississippi, economics.

In order to qualify for membership a student must average between B and A on 106 semester hours of college work. Not more than ten percent of the class may be elected to membership.

Southwestern boasts one of the three chapters of Phi Beta Kappa located in Tennessee, the others being at Vanderbilt and Sewanee.

\$625,000 Structure Will Be Ready For Use Early in 1954

Work on the long-awaited Neely Mallory Memorial Gymnasium is under way. In the area immediately north of the tennis courts concrete footings have been poured and work is progressing on, or ahead of, schedule. Completion is promised in March, 1954.

The present contract calls for the construction of the main part of the gymnasium, at cost of \$623,000, and it is hoped that very soon, possibly within a year or two, the additional wings, containing among other things the twenty-five meter swimming pool, may be added to the main structure. The completed building will cost more than \$800,000.

Ground was broken for the new building on January 5, the day on which classes resumed after the Christmas holidays. The entire college community, augmented by a number of friends of Southwestern and of the Mallory family, witnessed the ceremony. After the students, faculty, and friends had gathered on the site of the new structure, trumpets signaled the arrival of the procession headed by Robert Crumby, president of the student body and captain of the 1952 football team. He was followed by the eighty members of the choir, and they in turn by President Rhodes, Mrs. Barton Lee Mallory, and members of the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee, and other groups which have had a part in planning the new building. Dr. Rhodes presided over the ceremony, and the principal speaker was President-Emeritus Charles E. Diehl,



Professor Pond

Campus Pays Tribute To Professor Robert S. Pond

Dr. Robert S. Pond, for nineteen years Professor of Mathematics at Southwestern, passed away on December 31, 1952, after an illness of a few days. He was seventy six.

Dr. Pond's genuine interest in students, individually and collectively, his fine sense of fairness, and his readiness to go the extra mile in helpfulness prompted the phrase "beloved professor" to become associated with him.

To say that he bore the esteem of the college community is an understatement. He genuinely loved people and dealt with them in a forthright and friendly manner. He enjoyed being helpful, and in ways without number quietly performed his acts of kindness. In addition, his sound judgment made his advice of great value in many deliberations in faculty and committee meetings.

Upon his retirement in 1950 Dr. Pond spoke briefly to the alumni at their annual supper held during the Commencement exercises. He expressed his happiness that his four children had graduated from Southwestern and had since been happily married. His concluding statement was, "I love every one of you"; and that remark, spontaneously spoken, without the intent of being his valedictory, was most appropriate and character-

He is survived by Mrs. Pond; a son, John, who teaches at Alabama Polytechnic Institute; and two daughter, Mrs. Albert McLean and Mrs. Charles I. Diehl, of Memphis. His older son, Robert Jr., died unexpectedly last April.

The following expression of esteem and affection for Dr. Pond was adopted by the faculty on January 21:

With sorrow and a deep sense of loss, the Faculty of Southwestern at Memphis records the death of a loved and honored colleague, Robert S. Pond.

Dr. Pond was born at Elmira, New York, on July 19, 1876. He was educated at Washburn College, received his master's degree from Marietta, and his doctorate from the

University of Kansas. He was associate professor of mathematics at Southwestern from 1931 to 1948 and full professor from 1948 to 1952. He was made professor-emeritus in 1950. During his long association with the college he gave generously of his time and effort in the interests of faculty and students alike. He was particularly active on the Committee on Student Welfare, the Religious Life Committee and the committee for planning the Southwestern pension fund. To these he contributed with understanding and foresight. His influence reached also to those organizations dedicated to the maintenance of a high level of scholarship in the campus: Omicron Delta Kappa, the leadership honor society, and Chi Beta Phi, scientific honor society.

As a teacher Dr. Pond was both patient and thorough, inspiring an affectionate regard in his students by showing them how to unite genuine scholarship with fundamental Christian purposes. His helpful interest and ever-present cheerfulness endeared him to a long succession of students through the years, and his unassuming Christian spirit won him the regard and friendship of his colleagues. By his counsel and strength he rendered far-reaching service both as a ruling elder of Evergreen Presbyterian Church and as a member of the Presbytery of Memphis.

It further wishes to offer its deepest sympathy to the members of Dr. Pond's family and to assure them that he will not be forgotten by the friends who knew and loved him.

during whose administration Neely Mallory

served as a member of the Board of Directors and as Treasurer of the College.

Dr. Diehl recalled that when Southwestern unexpectedly found itself without a coach at the beginning of the season a number of years ago, Mr. Mallory, a young Memphis businessman recently returned from Yale, volunteered to act as coach and did so for the remainder of the season, refusing to accept any pay for his time and work. It was a service of great value to Southwestern.


Dr. Diehl praised Mallory as a man who represented the highest ideals of college athletics. Generously endowed by nature, he was the embodiment of the amateur spirit mentally, physically, and spiritually. An All-America fullback at Yale, he considered athletics an exceedingly valuable part of education, but it would never have occurred to him to expect or accept pay for this part of his training. Dr. Diehl commented on his prominence in the business and civic life of Memphis and on his unexpected death while he was serving as major with the U.S. Air

In addition to Dr. Diehl, President Rhodes and Sidney Farnsworth, Chairman of the Board of Directors, spoke. Mr. Farnsworth read a statement from Robert Snowden, who was prevented by illness from attending the ceremony. Mr. Snowden made the original suggestion to erect the gymnasium as a memorial to Major Mallory and has been active in promoting the project.
