Exciting Play Promised By Lynx Team This Fall

Barring injuries to key men, Southwestern's current football team should be the best since big-time ball was abandoned in 1941. Beginning September 1, Coaches Rick Mays, Oscar Wright, Bill Maybry, student coach Reg Germany, and volunteer coach Jack Caskey, a senior at Vanderbilt who played under Mays at Central, have been conditioning the squad and teaching them the Mays version of the "T."

The squad is a little thin in places, and overall depth is needed, but the quality is highly pleasing to the coaches. A substantial nucleus of men from the squad of last year and an unusually promising crop of freshmen provide the reason for optimism. In an intra-squad game on September 11 the new men edged the veterans by one touchdown.

Among the veterans are Captain Tom Tosh, Huntington, Tennessee, and Jim Edens, Okolona, Mississippi, ends; Earl Browne, New Orleans, and Jim Breazeale, Crenshaw, Mississippi, centers; Gerald Smith, Sumner, Mississippi, Jim Brankstone, Whitehaven, Tennessee, and Roxie Lee, Spring Hill, Alabama, guards; Jim Gillis, Whitehaven, Tennessee, and Jim Jones, Lucy, Tennessee, tackles; Jim Turner, Memphis, and Crawford Street, Whitehaven, quarterbacks; George Harmon, Memphis, Harry Heidelberg, Memphis, Jim Higgason, Pine Bluff, Arkansas, Rick King, Memphis, Gene Maddux, Nashville, Tennessee, and Smoky Russell, Memphis, halfbacks; George Gracey, Covington, Tennessee, and John Lawhorn, Lebanon, Kentucky, fullbacks.


Several locally well-known players are numbered among the newcomers. Halfback Johnny Martin was an all-Memphis, all-Tennessee, and all-America back at Central High; Bobby Rose was all-city end at South Side last year; and Billy Young was Treadwell's all-city quarterback.

A number of others are on a parity with these and probably will contribute as much to the team. At end are John Dunlap, Memphis Central; and Sammy Shaifer, Leland, Mississippi. Tackles are John Kopsinis, Memphis CBC; David Simpson, Memphis Central; Charlie Sullivan, Tunica; and Buck Wade, Batesville, Mississippi. The only guard is Bob Templeton, Memphis Treadwell.

The squad was seriously handicapped by injuries during the first month of practice.

Coach Mays is making no prediction about the success of his team. "We may lose every game," he says. "But we will play good football."

Faculty Is Augmented By Ten New Professors

Ten new professors are now teaching in the College, some of whom are additions necessitated by the increased size of the student body and by new fields of study now offered for the first time.

John Pierre LeCoq, a native of France, joins the Department of Romance Languages as John Hay Whitney Foundation Visiting Professor.

The Whitney Foundation selects certain professors of national prominence who have recently retired but whose health is good and whose intellectual vigor is unabated, and sends them, salaries paid, to a small selected group of colleges. This is only the third year in which the Whitney plan has been in effect. Southwestern is very fortunate in being one of seven liberal arts colleges chosen for this honor during the academic year of 1954-55.

Mr. LeCoq was educated in France, at Rennes and the University of Paris. He joined the faculty at Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa, in 1918 and was for many years and until his recent retirement, head of the Department of Romance Languages in that university. He is the author of a number of publications in linguistics and philology.

Dr. Perry D. Scrivner has been named Associate Professor of Education. He comes to Southwestern from Arlington State College, Arlington, Texas, where he had been

Mallory Gymnasium To Be Dedicated On Dec. 10

The campus is looking forward to the dedication of the Neely Mallory Memorial Gymnasium, which will take place on the evening of Friday, December 10. The highlights of the occasion are (1) an address by Mr. Edwin Foster Blair, a fellow student at Yale and long time friend of Neely Mallory, and (2) a basketball game between Sewanee and Southwestern. The public is invited to attend without charge.

On the evening following the dedication ceremonies, Southwestern will continue its celebration by meeting Ole Miss in a basketball game and Davidson College will be pitted against Sewanee.

The gymnasium has for some time been completed and has been in use by the football squad since practice started September 1. Classes in physical education for both men and women are in full swing. The coaches have been ensconced in their new offices since early summer, and equipment rooms have for weeks been bulging with gear.

The college is very proud of its splendid new gymnasium, and only a leisurely tour through it reveals its many points of excellence. In addition to the usual rooms and equipment found in gymnasiums it has a number of interesting features, such as the fifty-bed sleeping quarters for visiting teams and two handball courts which the students are already using and enjoying.

The basketball court is maximum size, and on either side are roll-away bleachers which seat some 1500 people. The balcony seats an additional 700.

Prominently displayed in the lobby are two large tablets, a dedicatory one of bronze briefly summarizing the major services of Neely Mallory in behalf of alma mater, his city and community, his country, and Southwestern; and a second tablet of aluminum giving the names of the Southwestern men who gave their lives in World War II.

The present structure is only two-thirds of the gymnasium as planned. The remaining third will be constructed as soon as funds are available. The administration is hoping that the necessary funds can be provided in the very near future. The projected third will house a swimming pool and gymnasium for women, who now share the use of the basketball floor with the men.

The new gymnasium fills one of South-western's greatest and most long felt needs, and students are already enjoying it very much. When cool weather arrives to stay for the winter, and the season for basketball, volleyball, indoor tennis, modern dance, and the like open, it will be one of the most used buildings on the campus.

and acquired a master of arts degree in religious education. He also took a master's degree at Yale in the philosophy of education. His Ph.D. is from the University of Texas, and his doctoral dissertation was on the early development of the idea of the common school in this country.

Dr. Myrtle Corliss Nash has been named Associate Professor of Psychology. She leaves Drake University to assume this position at Southwestern. Following her graduation from Swarthmore, she attended Bryn Mawr, which awarded her both master's and doctor's degrees. Her home is in Springfield Garden, New York.

James E. Roper, a Southwestern alumnus whose home is in Memphis, has been appointed to an assistant professorship in English. After his graduation in 1948 he won a Rhodes Scholarship and spent two years in Oxford, receiving the B.A. degree from Exeter College in 1950. During the next two years he held the Sterling Fellowship at Yale and received the master's degree from that institution in 1951.


He has now completed all academic requirements for the doctorate at Yale and expects to receive the degree upon the successful completion of his dissertation on William Blake and William Butler Yeats. He comes to Southwestern from Dickinson College in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Jack Unger Russell, of West Point, Mississippi, has been appointed to the mathematics department as Assistant Professor. His alma mater is the University of Mississippi, where he received his bachelor's de-

partment from the University of Virginia. He holds degrees from Wittenberg College, Springfield, Ohio, and the University of Akron. He is a candidate for the degree of doctor of philosophy at Virginia as of next June. At Southwestern he is assistant professor.

Jack Elwood Dodson, who hails from Fort Worth, has succeeded Olive Westbrooke Quinn, resigned, as Assistant Professor of Sociology.

He received his undergraduate education at North Texas State College and McMurry College in Abilene, Texas. He then entered the University of Texas, took his M.A. there in 1951, and has now completed requirements for the Ph.D. He is a candidate for that degree as of February 1955.

Added to the Department of Romance Languages is Dr. George Russell Raymond.

A native of Waterbury, Connecticut, which he still calls home, he began his higher education as a major in musical theory and composition at Yale's school of music. But during his years in the army he became interested in foreign languages, French in particular, and after his discharge from the armed forces he was graduated from the University of Indiana with a major in French.

He then took a master's degree at Middlebury College, Vermont, and during 1949 and 1950 spent about a year in Paris, studying at the Sorbonne and the Institute de Phonetique. Upon his return to this country he entered Yale University and last June was awarded the doctor's degree.

During these years of higher study he taught for a time at Union College, Schenectady, New York.

Dr. Almonte C. Howell, Jr. of Chapel Hill, N. C., joins the Department of Music as Assistant Professor of Music History and Church Music. He received a master's degree at Harvard and a Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina. He has also studied in France as a Fulbright scholar.

After an absence of two and a half years during which he served in the Marine Corps, Donald L. Warmack has returned to the faculty as teacher of violin.

A native of Arkansas, Mr. Warmack received his bachelor's degree at Hendrix College and later studied at the University of Southern California. He has also studied with Joseph Fuchs of the Juilliard School of Music.

Enrollment Is Up Over 1953

For the third year in succession the enrollment at Southwestern shows an increase. The number of regular students stands at 510. against 486 for last year. In addition there are 16 special students and 67 nurses from the Methodist Hospital taking certain academic courses, making a total of 593.

As was true last year, the dormitories are filled, and some boarding men have had to find rooms off the campus. All space in the dormitories had been reserved by early summer and many applications had to be declined. There is, however, still room for day students.

There is every reason to believe that the increase in enrollment will continue. This being so, high school seniors hoping to enter Southwestern should make reservations early. Applications are already being received for the session of 1955, and it is altogether possible that by spring no more rooms will be available for out-of-town students.
