Jameson M. Jones Will Become Dean On July 1

On July 1 Dr. Jameson M. Jones, of the Class of 1936, will leave Centre College and return to his Alma Mater as Dean. He will succeed Dr. A. Theodore Johnson, who since 1934 has carried the double responsibilities of Dean and Professor of English and who for some time has planned to retire from the Deanship and return to full time teaching. Henceforth he will occupy the newly created Thomas K. Young Chair of English Literature

Dr. Jones came to Southwestern as a student from Corinth, Mississippi, where his father, Paul Tudor Jones, has long been prominent in business and civic affairs, and distinguished in the work of the Presbyterian Church. His uncle for whom he was named, Jameson M. Jones, also a prominent Mississippi businessman and churchman, recently served as state chairman of a fund-raising campaign for Southwestern.

The young Mr. Jones proved to be a brilliant student at Southwestern and graduated with distinction in English and Greek in 1936. Distinction in two fields is one of the rarest of honors at Southwestern.

His qualities of leadership on the campus were recognized by his election to the local chapter of Omicron Delta Kappa. He was also elected to membership in Alpha Theta Phi, honorary scholarship fraternity.

Following his graduation, he enrolled in Louisville Theological Seminary and received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity from that institution in 1939. For further advanced work he went to the Graduate School of Duke University and was granted the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1942. The superior quality of his work there was recognized when he was elected to membership in Phi Beta Kappa.

When in 1942 the call came to join the faculty of Centre College as Professor of Religion and Philosophy he accepted and has since been associated with the college.

In 1947, at the age of thirty-three, he was made Dean of Centre College, an unusual distinction in that all his predecessors in that position at Centre had been older men. In 1952 he received a graduate fellowship from the Board of Higher Education of the Presbyterian Church, which enabled him to devote a year to study in Oxford University, England.

As an ordained minister of the Church he has served as stated supply for the churches in Caruthersville, Missouri, and Hattiesburg, Macon and Hazlehurst, Mississippi; but as he regards college work as his chief calling, he has never held a pastorate.

With his wife and three sons, Calvin Nichols, 7; Samuel Nichols, 6; and John Miller, 1, he will move to Memphis in midsummer.

Dr. Jones' brother, the Rev. Paul Tudor Jones, Jr., came to the pastorate of the Idlewild Presbyterian Church in 1954.

Dr. Johnson came to Southwestern in 1926 and has been one of the real builders of the College during its period of rapid development in Memphis. There has been in that period scarcely a noteworthy development in Southwestern's widely acclaimed curriculum and academic system in which he has not had a hand and in which he has not played a leading part.

Shortly after joining the faculty he was made head of the English Department and served in that capacity for twenty years. As Chairman of the Administrative Committee and a member of other key committees of the faculty he has exhibited the sound judgment and wide knowledge in the fields of learning that have characterized all his academic work. He was named Dean in 1934, and his services in that capacity have been incalculably valuable.

During recent years he has given much of his time to the affairs of Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic fraternity. He was admitted to membership in the fraternity while he was a student at the University of North Carolina, where he took his Ph.D. degree, and was instrumental in securing a chapter at Southwestern.

He has been secretary and treasurer of the Southwestern Chapter since its organization and has served as president of the Alumni Chapter of Memphis.

Girls' Residence Hall Is Under Construction

Southwestern has another new building in the process of construction, a residence hall for girls, probably freshman girls in particular, which will be erected immediately north of Voorhies Hall and will adjoin that hall on the north side.

The building will accommodate approximately sixty girls. College officials hope and believe that it will be ready for occupancy by the time college opens in the fall.

Evergreen Hall, located just across the street from the main campus, has long been used as a residence hall for freshman girls, but it has been found that there are certain disadvantages in having the halls for girls located in two areas.

Evergreen Hall will henceforth be occupied by men. This arrangement will allow space for sixty additional boarding men.

The new hall will be the third building constructed in the last three years, the others being the Burrow Library and the Mallory Gymnasium, completed in 1953 and 1954 respectively.

Union Carbide Places Two Scholarships Here

Southwestern is honored in having recently been chosen one of the forty-five colleges in the United States which will receive scholarships offered by the Union Carbide Company, one of the nation's great industrial corporations. Next fall two of these scholarships will be given, one to a sophomore and one to a freshman. Thereafter one scholarship will be awarded each year.

The scholarships are unusually valuable. They cover the full cost of tuition for a four-year period, plus an allowance to be set by the college which will cover the outlay for necessary books and fees.

The college will receive double benefit from the scholarships, since each scholarship carries with it an additional gift of five hundred dollars to the college, plus a one-hundred-dollar bonus for a faculty advisor.

When the scholarship plan was first inaugurated by Union Carbide in 1953, it was provided that only colleges of five hundred to fifteen hundred men were eligible. Southwestern could therefore not qualify; but when, at the beginning of this year, the conditions for awarding the scholarships were broadened, Southwestern was immediately selected as one of the few additional colleges where the program is to be made effective.

The administration deeply appreciates the honor and the generosity of Union Carbide.

General Electric has announced a program which may prove of benefit to Southwestern. Last year the corporation released the news of the Corporate Alumnus Program, by the terms of which General Electric will match gifts of its employees to the colleges or universities from which they hold bachelors

The program went into effect on January 1, and to date a number of employees have made contributions to their alma maters. General Electric is now in the process of matching all of these gifts.

All gifts eligible under this program must be sent directly to the college and not to any alumni association, foundation, or other agency connected with the college.

It is believed that Southwestern has a number of alumni who are in the employ of General Electric and who may therefore want to take advantage of this opportunity to do a good turn for their alma mater.

In making the announcement of this program, Mr. Philip D. Reed, Chairman of the trustees, said that the reason for General Electric's promoting this program is their realization that American colleges and universities need increased support. The physical plants are, in most cases, inadequate, the teaching staffs are overtaxed and often underpaid, and the costs of maintaining the colleges have gone steadily upward.
