Alcohol Evidence In "Death March" Trial

PARRIS ISLAND, S. C. — (INS) — The prosecution produced court-marital evidence Wednesday of tests showing an alcoholic content in the blood of Sgt. Matthew McKeon a few hours after he led his Marine recruit death march at Parris Island last April.

Two New Housing Projects Coming To Memphis Area

Two more Negro housing projects totaling 519 units and costing a total of \$8 million, are expected to get the approval of the federal Public Housing Authority soon.

The announcement was made by Walter Simmons, executive director of the Memphis Housing Authority, who said Memphis has already signed "federal contracts for the two projects. The federal government will pay 55 per cent of the cost, and MHA will pay the rest through sale of short term bonds, he added.

One project, totaling 319 units, will be built in the North Memphis area, on 26 acres on the east side of Thomas. The other, totaling 200 units, on 13 acres on the south side of Crump Boulevard.

The tests showed an alcoholic content of .015 per cent.

The test—called a Bogen's test—was taken under the supervision of Navy Lt. R. J. Atchison, a doctor, at midnight of April 8, a few hours after six members of McKeon's platoon drowned in Ribbon Creek.

The single lined entry, "results .015" was contained in a log that was offered in evidence by prosecutor, Maj. Charles B. Sevier. Its presentation brought vigorous objection from Chief Defense Counsel Emile Zola Berman.

Authorities say that under Naval medical procedure, a Bogen rating of more than .015 per cent is generally accepted as indicating the person had been "under influence" of liquor.

NINE HOUR PERIOD

It is alleged that McKeon, who is charged with involuntary manslaughter in the death of six young recruits, had taken several drinks of vodka in the nine-hour period prior to the ill-fated trek to Ribbon Creek.

Says Russia Has Vast War Machine Poised To Strike

MANILA — (INS) — Am. Arthur W. Radford warned Tuesday that the Russian-dominated communist bloc, despite its current emphasis on economic-political "infiltration," still has a vast war machine poised to "strike out in any direction at any time."

The chairman of the U. S. Joint Chiefs of Staff uttered the warning in a major speech prepared for delivery at the commissioning of a new multi-million-dollar naval air station on Bataan Peninsula in the FREE WORLD.

Radford told a distinguished audience at the ceremony unveiling the Cubi Point Air Base that the free world must remain alert against the peril of sudden aggression lurking behind the present Red facade of "peaceful co-existence."

The top officer of America's global armed force declared: "The moment the Communists are placing increased emphasis on political and economic infiltration, I see no convincing evidence that this shift of tactics represents

any intent to abandon their efforts to subvert, weaken and overthrow the political, economic and social systems of the free nations.

"What I see is an aggressive Communist bloc stretching from the Baltic to the South China Sea. This bloc has large military forces which are deployed widely and which could strike out in any direction at any time.

"We should not close our eyes to this."

BY COMMON DANGER

Radford said the United States and the Philippines are "united by a common danger... that stems from the (Communist) sino-Soviet bloc and international Communism."

Rights Bill Blocked By Ga. Senators

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Senator George (D. Ga.) who presided over the Senate Tuesday in the absence of Vice President Nixon made use of his temporary office to provide a nail for the casket of civil rights. Senator Richard Russell drove it in.

The controversial bill was passed by the House Monday, but there seems little chance that it will ever reach a vote in the Senate. It remains in the Judiciary Committee.

Senator Hennings (D. Mo.) supported by Senator Douglas (D. Ill.), and Senator Lehman (N. Y.), introduced a resolution in the Senate which would have had the effect of bringing the bill out of Committee and on to the Senate floor for immediate action - had it been adopted. However, George (then presiding), ruled that the resolution required unanimous consent. Senator Russell immediately offered his objection - thereby effectively blocking consideration of the bill.

Senator George was supported in his ruling by Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson of Texas who said that "any other ruling would circumvent 'orderly procedure.'"

Senator Douglas made a second attempt to get the bill to the floor.

Saturday Is Deadline For Absentee Ballot

Five P. M. Saturday, July 28, is the deadline for securing an absentee ballot.

Lester Brenner, Election Commission secretary, warned that Saturday will be the last day to get the absentee ballot. The commission's office will be open until 5 P. M. Application blanks may be secured in person at the commission's office. They must be properly filled in before 5 P. M.

The actual ballot is then mailed to the applicant. The ballot must be filled out in the presence of a notary public (or a commissioned officer, if in the service) and returned in person or sent by registered mail prior to the Aug. 2 election.

Sunday, July 29, is a red letter day for Memphis. That is the day a grateful Memphis is expected to turnout, by the thousands, for the dedication of the George W. Lee Postal Station; reportedly the first of its kind in the nation!

Burn Crosses, Threaten Pastor

RICHLANDS, N. C. — (ANP) — Open threats of violence were made against a white pastor, and crosses were burned last Wednesday night on the lawn of a rural church as a Negro evangelist preached to a white congregation here.

The Negro evangelist, not identified, was invited by the Rev. Herbert R. Marshburn to preach to his all-white membership.

Later, Rev. Marshburn was openly threatened with violence if he ever permitted the Negro evangelist to speak at the church again.

Dedication ceremonies for the Lee Station named in honor of Memphis, civic, business, fraternal and political leader Lt. George W. Lee, the first Negro in the nation to be honored, will be held at spacious Mason Temple and the postal station site.

Dedication ceremonies will begin at 3 p. m. Sunday at Mason Temple, 938 Main, with numbers by the 30 piece Letter Carriers Band.

The Booker Washington high school band, a 500 voice combined choir of 13 churches, the 500-voice Memphis Navy Chorus and preliminary

speeches by a number of local dignitaries.

Speeches will be made by Mayor Edmund Orjill, Memphis postmaster, A. L. Moreland, U. S. Congressman (Rep.-Tenn.) B. Carroll Reece, Guy L. Smith of Knoxville, state Republican chairman, and Millaps Fitzhugh, U. S. District Attorney for West Tennessee.

At 4 p. m., following the preliminary program a parade, led by the Letter Carriers Band, will assemble at Mason Temple and march north to the postal station site on Mississippi near Crump Blvd. next to the all Negro Fire Company, Station 8, for the dedication proper.

In one car will be the honoree, Lt. Lee, who on Aug. 2 in the Republican primary will seek reelection to the state GOP executive committee. Some 1,000 persons are slated to participate in the parade.

Principal speaker for the dedication proper ceremonies will be Ormand Kied, assistant U. S. postmaster general. Mr. Kied will be introduced by Joseph A. Clarke.

Charges Plan Discourages Even Gradual Compliance

RALEIGH, N. C. — (INS) — Two strong Negro groups Tuesday voiced opposition to the school segregation plan of the state advisory committee on education as the North Carolina General Assembly conducted hearings on proposals to amend the state constitution.

John H. Wheeler, Durham, N. C., banker, served as a spokesman for a Negro committee of the state's counties and Carl Devane, of Raleigh, chairman of the North Carolina Teachers Association, protested for Negro teachers.

ASSIGNMENT LAW

Devane proposed a substitute plan which would repeal the 1955 school assignment law pertaining to the Supreme Court's ban on public school segregation.

Asking the legislature to comply with the Supreme Court ruling, Mr. Wheeler said the advisory committee's proposal will "undermine and destroy the public school system which North Carolina has supported wholeheartedly and which we have spent more than 80 years in developing in its present existence."

Mr. Wheeler said bills to implement two constitutional changes were "evidence of bad faith and defiance of supreme law of the land." He said the bills fail to take into account the influences of proposed action upon the quality of education provided for North Carolina children. He added that the bills seek to make parents shoulder the responsibility of making decisions as to who shall attend school with their children.

GRADUAL COMPLIANCE

The Durham banker declared the tuition aspect of the proposals provides for separation of races in defiance of the Supreme Court ruling and "discourages even gradual compliance as recommended by the court and requested by Southern states."

NAACP Fined \$10,000 In Contempt Charge

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — (INS) — The National Association For The Advancement of Colored People was fined \$10,000 Wednesday for contempt of court by Circuit Judge Walter B. Jones.

The judge threatened to increase the fine to \$100,000 if the organization does not comply with a court

order to produce its records for the attorney general. The state, through the attorney general's office, is seeking to use NAACP records as evidence to prevent the organization from winning a dismissal of a temporary injunction, prohibiting it from operating in Alabama.

The NAACP is not chartered in Alabama, a requisite for any organization promoting causes or collection contribution. The state is charging the organization is operating illegally.

Under the court's written order the NAACP can ask to have the \$10,000 fine reduced or set aside if it produces the records within five days. If it refuses to comply within that period, the fine automatically increases to \$100,000.

NOT LEGALLY COMPELLED

Jones, reaffirming an order he issued two weeks ago, said the records must be produced, but the NAACP refused, sticking to its contention that it couldn't legally be compelled to bring them into court despite Jones' ruling.

NAACP lawyers, headed by Robert Carter of the NAACP staff in New York, indicated by their lines of questioning and reference to the U. S. Constitution that they intend to appeal to federal court.

OUT OF STATE

Carter and the other NAACP attorneys contended that the organization is engaged in purely interstate business in Alabama which cannot be regulated by state law.

Ike Back At White House And Ready To Wage Vigorous Campaign

WASHINGTON — (INS) — President Eisenhower came back Tuesday from his strenuous three-day visit to Panama fully convinced that he is physically able to wage a vigorous campaign for reelection.

That was the word from the White House, where the feeling was that Mr. Eisenhower had passed with flying colors the first stern test of strength to which he has been subjected since his June 9 abdominal operation.

News Secretary James C. Hagerty declared: "I think his condition is fine." Hagerty added with a grin: "I think he is like everyone who went on the trip — he is tired."

But Mr. Eisenhower gave no sign of weariness when he stepped from the Presidential plane at Washington Airport and strode squarely into the Psychological Center of the controversy created by Harold E. Stassen's surprise "Dump Nixon" maneuver.

His color good, his stride firm, his handshake zestful, his face wreathed in a smile, the chief executive talked heartily with Vice President Richard M. Nixon and less lengthily but still emphatically with other officials assembled at the airport to welcome him back.

He had a brief word with Stassen, his special aide in disarmament, but gave no public evidence that he was in the least disturbed by the latter's "rock-the-boat" suggestion that Nixon step aside and let Gov. Christian Herter of Massachusetts be the Vice Presidential nominee.

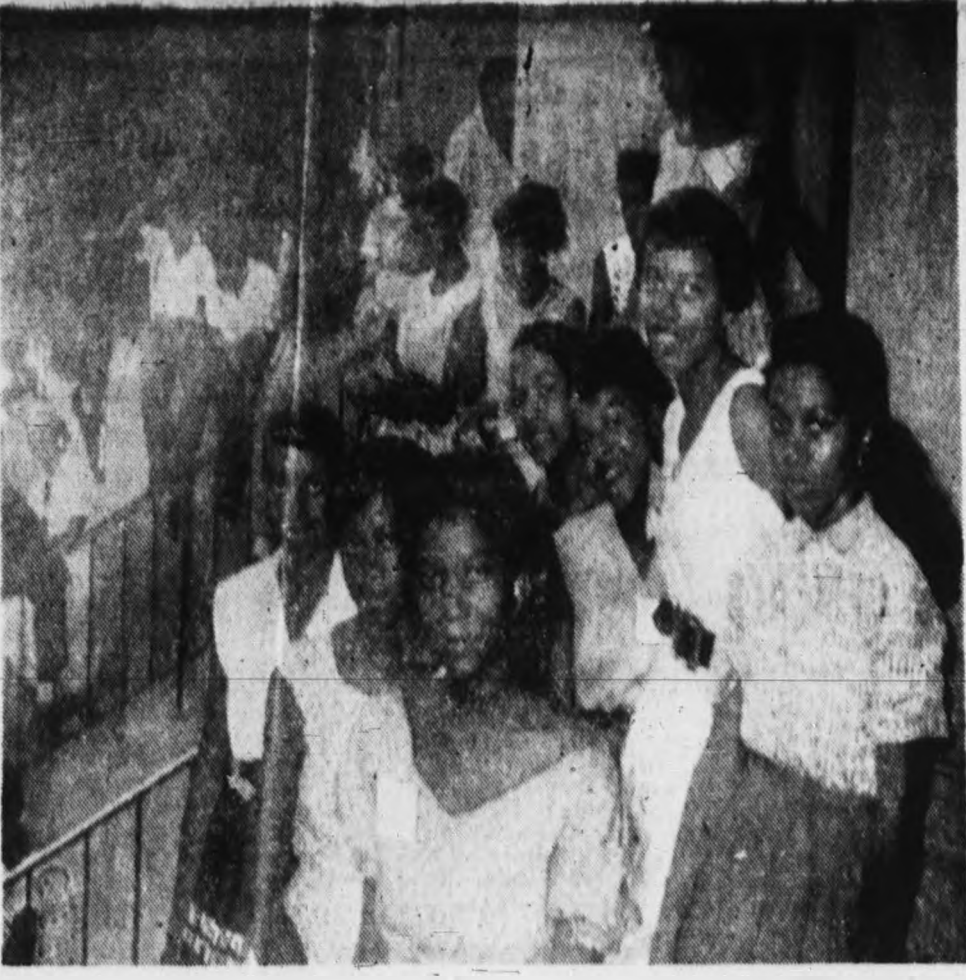

"This mighty base is visible evidence that an enemy who wants to invade the Philippines will have to fight over the sea and through the air before he touches Philippines soil."

Radford stressed that "what we do is directed against no nation, no people."

Mr. X, who admitted he didn't know anything about Spanish needles, had carried his two 'expert' friends along and both vouched that the machine was in perfect working order.

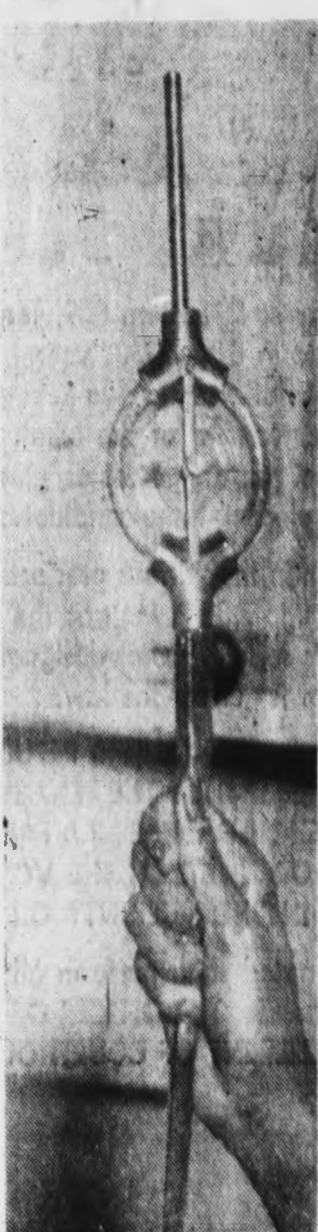
After making the purchase X, before turning the machine over to the buyer, decided to give the machine a workout. He spent the night roaming the Arkansas woods.

With the ocean boundaries no longer those fortifications of security and with the shrinkage of the world to neighborhood proportions, it was seen after World War I that this nation would have to incorporate into its normal program such a system as came to the rescue of the old world when mechanized and atomic wars tried the soul of their existence.

An age of cold wars came to seize the land; hardly there is a place on earth but that isn't menaced by the possibility of war. Nations are incorporating in their plans such improvements as conforming to modern warfare. Civil Defense has come as one of the important arms of any system of security. The people back home are the driving powers behind the great scheme of protection of our boundaries. These keep the home fires burning and are the feeders of those who are actually engaged in combat.

Therefore the attention of the nation is rightly being turned just now to the improvement of our Civil Defense properties. Those in charge of this phase of our peace should never let idle periods intercept their programs of education and appreciation in this fine scheme of protection for the nation's fireside in wars that insist upon leaving desert areas, battlefronts and ranking navies, to reap a harvest of casualties of women and babes.

Let the urban and rural population engage the schools, public forums and churches in a reactivation of a real life program of education in the field of defense.

Here is a front in which there never can be declared an open and closed season.

Whether war or whether peace, let there be an operative Civil Defense.

Critical Lawyers
(From The Birmingham World)

In their seventy-ninth annual session, held here in Birmingham, the 300 or more delegates to the Alabama Bar Association unanimously adopted a resolution condemning the school desegregation decision handed down by the United States Supreme Court. In reading the newspaper account of the action, we gathered that the decision rather than the court was criticized. If our reading is correct, it is well to note this. Some notorious thought-control organizations have vigorously attacked the court and attempted to smear its members on religious and political grounds.

That the convention took such action without a recorded dissenting vote doubtless does not mean that every lawyer in Alabama, or better, every member of the Alabama Bar Association subscribes to the spirit and views of the resolution. Of course we have no way of knowing and are not interested in trying to find out.

The ABA delegates in their adopted pro-segregation resolution pledged "to contest" the basic May 17, 1954 ruling. It does not appear from the reported language of the resolution that there was in state defiance. This is again contrast with the thought-control leaders who announced their rebellion against the Supreme Court and also defiance fits racial ruling.

The legal profession no less than any profession is within its freedom rights to comment on and take a stand on any public question. The Supreme Court is the highest legal voice in the nation. How then can indulgence in embittered, emotional and prejudiced attacks on the Supreme Court enhance respect for the legal profession?

The position set forth in the ABA hold-on-to-segregation resolution is untenable in the light of the judicial doctrine of vital growth. It runs counter to the findings of the scholars of political history and constitutional law. It ignores the fact that some of the finest segregationist lawyers of the nation prepared the defense of the dual school system and could not make their arguments stand up in court. Segregation has not only had its day in court and lost but has been rejected at the bar of the national public opinion.

Asks For Directions For Tallahassee Fight

Dear Editor:

Our City Transit System on June 30, 1956 committed suicide, this we lament if it is really dead. We are profoundly positive that there is nothing wrong with our bus system that a good dose of DECEY, CHRISTIAN LOVE and REAL DE-MOCRACY will not cure.

Seventy per cent of the cities bus riders were Negroes. We have suffered chronic humiliation at the hand of bus drivers and local segregation statutes. Our collective sense of humiliation were forced to overflow on May 25, 1956. We did not seek to destroy the bus system, we simply sought justice, this was fairly denied us.

We must now provide transportation for our people. We plan to use 9-10 station wagons (four door), full time drivers, a full time secretary and combination maintenance — dispatchers.

We have not heretofore made public requests for funds as we tried to keep our every effort local, this we have done and our effectiveness has been gratifying. We hope that our efforts have been enlightening to our brothers in other areas of oppression. If you are able to favor us through efforts (individually or collectively) that will aid us financially, you may rest assured that your least effort will be highly appreciated. We must continue to provide or set up permanent transportation for our people. This done we must prepare for a long legal battle to make our victory complete.
