Southern Leaders To Meet In Memphis

TO MAP STRATEGY FOR SOUTHWIDE REGISTRATION

The Southern Christian Leaders Conference in a one-day session is scheduled to convene at Mt. Olive CME Cathedral, 538 Linden Ave., at 9 a. m. Nov. 5, announced Rev. Henry C. Buntin, pastor of the church and member of the organization.

The conference, headed by the internationally famous, Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., of Montgomery, Ala., is expected to announce plans for a southwide vote-registration campaign, which will start in the immediate future.

Rev. Buntin said "the main purpose of this meeting is to stimulate interest in 'participation in all elections.'"

Immediately after a close executive session, the conference will be climaxed with a mammoth public mass meeting. Main speakers at the rally will be Dr. King, who successfully led the famous Montgomery bus boycott last year and was instrumental in the Prayer Pilgrimage to Washington, D. C. in May.

Also speaking will be Rev. C. K. Steele of Tallahassee, Fla., who spearheaded the bus boycott in Tallahassee and Rev. F. L. Shuttlesworth of Birmingham, Ala., who has pushed a fight for integration in public schools and on public transportation.

The Southern Christian Leaders Conference was formed last January nearly 100 Southern ministers and heads of civic organizations met at Ebenezer Baptist church in Atlanta, Ga., where Dr. King's father, Rev. Martin Luther King, Sr., is pastor.

The organization was formed to "educate the Negro to the value of the ballot in his struggle for first class citizenship."

Since that time the organization has met in Baton Rouge, La., and Montgomery, Ala.

Co-sponsors of the November meeting will be the Citizens-Ministers League of which Rev. Buntin is president and the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance which is headed by Rev. S. A. Owen pastor of Metropolitan Baptist church.

The public is invited to the mass meeting.

BROWNELL LEAVES CABINET; ATTORNEY PUSHED CIVIL RIGHTS

Mayor Of Little Rock Sees Crisis Resolving Itself

DENVER—(INS)—The Mayor of Little Rock, Ark., said Wednesday he believes the integration crisis at Central High School in his city soon may resolve itself.

Woodrow Wilson Mann, 40, commented in Denver:

"The time is approaching when President Eisenhower can remove the federal troops from the school."

DAY BY DAY

The tall and soft-spoken mayor explained that conditions are improving steadily and "tension is lessening day by day."

However, the mayor would not pinpoint the time he thought federal troops would depart.

Mann stressed he was not being critical when he said the end of the integration trouble could have been averted. He said Little Rock citizens had 30 months' warning of the school board's plans and there had been no objections raised to integration of Central High School.

Mann did not hide his bitterness, however, at what he termed the "playing of politics with peoples souls to gain a vote."

Referring to Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus, Mann said:

"Had the Governor of Arkansas been a leader, inasmuch as he (Faubus) was elected by the people—and again I stress this is not meant to be in a critical tone—and assumed the position of a real leader we would not have had any trouble."

The Little Rock Mayor said Faubus should have appealed to people to "push personal feelings back."

Mann, in Denver to visit two sisters, said there is not only a gradual lessening of tension in Little Rock but throughout the entire state of Arkansas. He plans to leave Denver for Little Rock Friday.

Dr. King On NBC Television Sunday

NEW YORK CITY—The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., will be interviewed by Reporter Agrensky on NBC TV's "Look Here" program Sunday, Oct. 27, at 3:30 p. m. (EST).

The live telecast will originate in the historic Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Ala., of which Dr. King is pastor.

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—(ANP)—The axe fell on detective Mack N. McCollum here last week.

The 45-year-old policeman and 15-year veteran on the St. Louis police force was dismissed from service following a hearing of the Police Board of charges growing out of an investigation of illicit narcotics traffic here. Four other Negro officers are implicated with McCollum. They are detectives Wardell Spencer, Roland Norton, Henry Ryland and Lorenzo Jackson. However, their trials were scheduled for later.

During the hearing detective David McNealy, Jr., a white fellow detective who was shot and seriously wounded last Sept. 11 by a convicted narcotics peddler, testified against McCollum.

CHARGED WITH NEGLIGENCE

Six charges preferred against McCollum ranged from neglect of duty, accepting a gift from a dope peddler and failure to make an arrest of an armed suspect, to mak-

Social Change In U. S. Part Of World Struggle, Patterson

GREENBORO, N. C.—That the incidents which have accompanied the movement for social change in the United States are a part of a world-wide movement toward freedom was the view expressed by Dr. Frederick D. Patterson, of New York City, in his vespers message at Bennett College Sunday.

Dr. Patterson, who in addition to being chairman of the Bennett board of trustees, is also president of the United Negro College Fund and director of the Phelps-Stokes Fund, referred to the resistance to school desegregation in Little Rock, Nashville, Charlotte and Greensboro as symbols of prejudiced behavior.

"Such behavior," he declared, "is almost always foolish and shortsighted behavior because it is selfish behavior. But the world today demands new outreaches of understanding and cooperation. If the world is to survive, we must learn to live together in peace and

Attempting To Prevent Removal Of Mallory Depot

Civilian personnel and Memphis public officials were attempting to have Mallory Air Force removed from the list of U. S. Armed Force installations which will be closed in an "economical gesture" by the U. S. Defense Department.

A reliable source who requested that names be withheld, told the Memphis World that "if the Armed Force really wanted to save money, then Mallory Depot should not be removed from Memphis but should be transferred to Army's General Depot which is not far from Mallory." The source added "it would be much cheaper than spreading the functions to Alabama, Georgia and California installations."

Rumored Former Legal Aide May Run For Governor

WASHINGTON, D. C.—U. S. Attorney General Robert Brownell has resigned his post in the President's cabinet and rumors are that the eminent lawyer who courageously fought for civil rights, will run for Governor of New York State.

President Eisenhower, who accepted Brownell's resignation with surprise said he will name Deputy Attorney General William P. Rogers to the cabinet post.

PRIVATE PRACTICE

Brownell has held the job since the start of the Eisenhower administration.

He is returning to private law practice in New York. There has been speculation that Brownell—whose name arose with frequency in connection with the Little Rock, Arkansas school integration crisis—may seek a state governorship.

Brownell expects to turn over the reins of the Justice Department to his successor in about two weeks.

In a letter accepting the resignation, Mr. Eisenhower praised his services as Attorney General highly and expressed sorrow at his decision to leave the cabinet.

SUPREME COURT VACANCY

Brownell has been considered a likely candidate for a Supreme Court vacancy, but administration insiders point out that he could have had such an appointment before this time if he had wanted it.

If he should choose to run for Governor of New York he would probably face a contest within the Republican party for the nomination as well as a stiff battle with Democratic Gov. Averell Harriman.

FORMER POLITICAL INTIMATES

Another of President Eisenhower's former political intimates, Leonard W. Hall, ex-chairman of the Republican National Committee, also has been reported as seeking the Republican gubernatorial nomination in the state.

Brownell early became one of the most controversial members of the Eisenhower cabinet because of his partisan attacks on Democrats. A shrewd politician, he served as campaign manager for Thomas E. Dewey when the former New York Governor made his two unsuccessful bids for the White House.

Brownell was one of the chief political strategists in Mr. Eisenhower's 1952 campaign and entered the cabinet both as a Dewey protégé and a trusted adviser of

Racial Segregation Must Go Former Sen. Lehman Says

NEW YORK—(NPPA)—All racial segregation must go, former Senator Herbert H. Lehman, Democrat of New York, declared Tuesday.

Speaking at the luncheon meeting of the New York State Committee on Discrimination in Housing, at the Hotel New Yorker, Mr. Lehman outlined a program of Federal action in the field of civil rights. He proposed:

TRAVEL, EMPLOYMENT

1. That Congress enact legislation in statutory support of the Supreme Court decision outlawing racial segregation in education.

2. That Congress ban discrimination in education, travel employment and use of public and publicly-supported facilities.

3. That Congress act to protect such organizations as the NAACP and the National Urban League from harassment and prosecution by state governments.

4. That the Senate amend its rules to outlaw the filibuster.

5. That the President exercise moral leadership and rally all men of good will in the north and South for the tasks ahead.

Integration in housing is the most urgent target for efforts in New York, Mr. Lehman said.

LOCAL ORDINANCES

"Integration in housing is the key to integration in the schools," he added.

The former Senator called for a local ordinance outlawing discrimination in housing. "Such a law, he said, would result 'in comprehensive fiscal savings to the city and the community.'"

Mr. Lehman praised as "the truly heroic folk of America" patient colored men and women, who have "endured the degradation of segregation, and still work with restraint and reason to achieve their goal of simple equality of treatment as American citizens."

"But in my judgment," he added "the greatest heroes of all must be written down as those little school children, in Little Rock and in many other places less renowned, who walked the gauntlet of hate and prejudice to break the tradition of the onward march of the brotherhood."

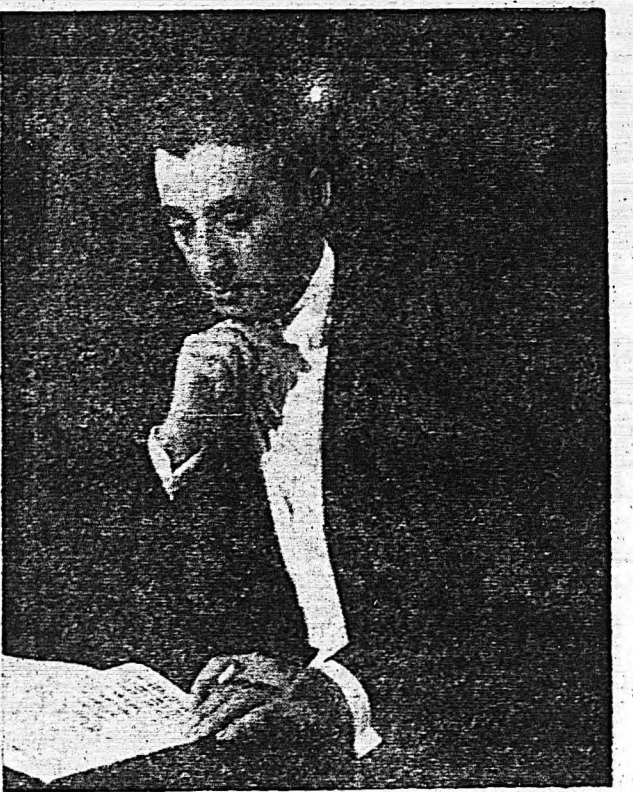

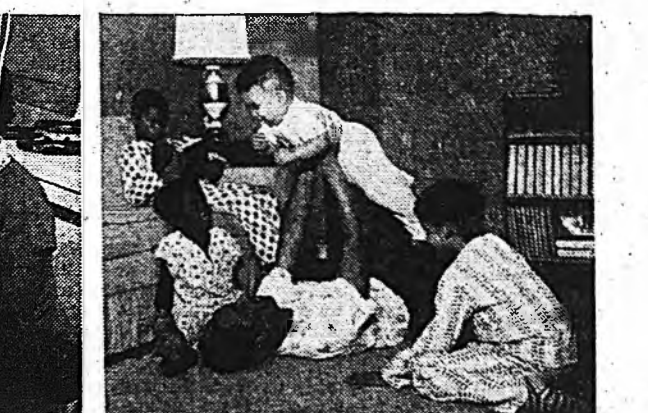

Larry Doby To Benefit Dinner

NEW YORK. — Larry Doby, star outfielder of the Chicago White Sox baseball team, will be among the celebrities attending the NAACP Freedom Fund dinner here on Nov. 22. Jackie Robinson, chairman of the association's 1957 Freedom Fund drive and head of the dinner committee, announced Monday.

Mr. Doby is the first of the nation's outstanding athletes to purchase tickets for the \$100-a-couple dinner, although several others have indicated that they will get their tickets and be present. Among leaders in the entertainment world who have arranged to attend the dinner are Nat (King) Cole, Oscar Hammerstein II, Miss Jinx Falkenberg, Sammy Davis, and Steve Allen, who will serve as master of ceremonies.

Dr. George Cannon, popular New York physician, leads the group of volunteer sponsors in the sale of tickets. He has already sold 23 of the \$100 tickets and anticipates selling more, according to Franklin H. West Indians Seek Trinidad Capital For Federation

KINGSTON, Jamaica. — (ANP)—The United States Government came in for harsh criticism again Wednesday, as the Standing Federation Committee met in Port-of-Spain, Trinidad and discussed the Chaguaramas Trinidad Capital site issue.

The meeting was attended by all the important political leaders of the British Caribbean territories taking part in Federation. St. Kitts' member Robert Bradshaw proposed a resolution requesting the United States to release the base. The resolution added that the British Government should protest to the United States and request immediate consideration of the wishes of the British West Indies for the site to be used for the Federal Capital.

A rider of the resolution stated: "This committee notes with regret, reports that installations of Chaguaramas Base, are being extended and considers that this must prejudice the work of the Joint Commission agreed to be established at the London Conference in July and request Her Majesty's government to ask the United States government not to pursue this programme before the report of the Joint Commission has been dealt with."

Wilkins Warns U. S. In Survival Crisis

Says Country Is Face To Face With Serious Moral Issue

TOLEDO, Ohio—Little Rock poses not only a grave constitutional crisis and a serious moral issue but also brings the country face to face with "what might be called a survival crisis," Roy Wilkins, NAACP executive secretary solemnly warned in an address to an overflow NAACP rally which packed the spacious Braden Methodist Church, here October 15.

He pointed to the successful launching of the Soviet satellite as an indication of how surely this country needs to train and utilize its best brains in the race for supremacy in science. He cited the "one lone Negro scientist," educated in the North, who worked on the first atom bomb. "Hundreds like him should have been graduated from the educational systems of the South to serve their country. Instead, they were condemned to schools without adequate mathematics courses, without physics and chemistry laboratories, and even without proper facilities for useful vocational training."

TRIPLING WITH SECURITY
Those who are trying to perpetuate "at any cost the separate-but-equal" doctrine, Mr. Wilkins charged, "are not only tramping upon decency and fairness and the mandates of the American tradition; they are trifling with the security of our country. We can no longer afford the luxury of debating whether nine or ninety, or 900,000 non-white American children, less than the mutual respect and dedication will provide, and less than the maximum employment of our manpower potential may spell disaster."

The rally was preceded by a luncheon attended by 125 guests including many city officials. At the luncheon, Vice Mayor Ned Skeldon presented the glass key to the city of Toledo to Mr. Wilkins at the conclusion of welcoming remarks. Anderson Cheeves is president of the Toledo NAACP branch.

TOLEDO MAN WAITS 5 MONTHS FOR JURY TRIAL, ACQUITTED

TOLEDO, Ohio (ANP)—Accused of an \$8 robbery, a 39-year-old Toledo man waited in jail five months for a jury trial—and then was acquitted.

The delay was attributed to the recessing of jury trials during the summer months. In the meantime, John Green, who was arrested May 4, languished in jail.

He was accused by Claude Isom of following him from a tavern and robbing him in May, 1956. Green denied the charge and asked for a jury trial. Common Pleas

Judge John M. McCabe set the trial for Oct. 14 and remanded Green to jail when he could not post bond.

Had Green pleaded guilty he would have been given a hearing immediately. But he hardly wanted that fate.

Benjamin H. Fisher, assistant county prosecutor, said Green had served three terms previously in the Ohio Penitentiary and another conviction could have meant him confinement for life as a habitual offender.

Ghana Subscription To World Bank \$15 Million

WASHINGTON, D. C. — (ANP)—Officials of the International Monetary Fund and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development have announced that Ghana became the 64th member of the Fund and Bank.

The Articles of Agreements of both institutions were signed here on behalf of the Government of Ghana by His Excellency K. A. Gbedemah, Minister of Finance of Ghana.

The quota of Ghana in the International Monetary Fund is \$15 million and its subscription to the capital stock of the Bank is 150 shares with a total par value of \$15 million.

(It was subsequent to the signing of the Articles of Agreement and attendance at the annual meeting of the Fund and Bank that Mr. Gbedemah encountered racial discrimination at Dover, Delaware at a privately franchised Howard Johnson restaurant. Howard Johnson, head of the national chain, personally apologized to the Ghana diplomat. Ruffled feelings were

smoothed over by an invitation from the White House for breakfast with President Eisenhower and Vice President Nixon.)

Odor Noted In Action of Va. Com.

NORFOLK, Va. — The Norfolk Virginian-Pilot has sharply questioned the "aim and purpose" of the Thomson committee, which was empowered by the Virginia legislature to investigate racial organizations in this state.

An editorial in the October 11 edition of the newspaper charges that although "the Thomson committee started out as an anti-N. A. C. P. committee" the group "seems headed for the more important mission of thought-control."

The committee's chairman is Jas. M. Thomson, Democrat of Alexandria.

Noting that the committee requisitioned a list of school library reference books from the Arlington county school superintendent, which was refused, the editorial asks: "Do these labors of the Thomson committee suggest a faint odor of book-burning?"

"The Committee has already exercised censorship by holding its hearings in Virginia cities behind locked doors," the editorial declares. "Is it now preparing to exercise censorship over books on Virginia library shelves?"

British 'Jim Crow' Official In Barbados Forced To Resign

KINGSTON, JAMAICA—(ANP)—Barbados Chief Secretary, Mr. Adie, the Englishman who withdrew his daughter from Queen's College, on the grounds that the school caters to coloured and white children alike, has resigned his job. He is going back to England.

Mr. Adie, it may be recalled, stirred a small storm in B'des when he said that there were not many of his daughter's kind, in Queen's

College. Both the Governor of Barbados and Knight Sir Grantley Adams, agreed that it was a distasteful act.

The matter was forthwith referred to the Colonial Office and Mr. Adie was put on the spot by the Barbados House of Assembly. The view was that Mr. Adie wanted his daughter to attend a segregated school.

Because of his action, the people of Barbados thought he might not be a suitable person to serve the country. He was therefore openly criticized, and was forced to resign.

Admit Bricklayers To Milw'kee Union

NEW YORK — Herbert Hill, N. A. A. C. P. labor secretary, said Monday he has been informed that Negroes have been admitted for the first time, into Local 8 of the Milwaukee Bricklayers Union.

Mr. Hill hailed the development, pointing out that he had worked for more than a year with the Wisconsin Industrial Commission and with local and national AFL-CIO officials to secure the admission of Negro workers into the Milwaukee union.

He called the Milwaukee action "significant because it is a successful attack against the discriminatory practices which are widespread in building trades unions."

"The right to belong to a trade union operating in the building trades industry is not merely an abstract civil right, it is a necessary condition of employment," he noted.

Two Negro mechanics, Randolph Ross and James Harris, had initiated action before the Wisconsin Industrial Commission, which administers the Wisconsin fair employment practices act. The Commission had ordered the union to admit the Negro workers but had been defied by the union. The union's refusal to admit the two Negro mechanics had been sustained by the State Supreme Court of Wisconsin.

15 ROTC Cadets At FAMU Commissionable

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — (ANP)—Fifteen Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets have been designated as Distinguished Military Students (DMS) at Florida A. and M. University. These cadets may now apply for regular Army Commissions and, if selected, will receive their appointments when they are awarded their academic degrees.

The cadets were selected by a board of officers and faculty members on the basis of their superior military grade aptitude for military service, high academic grades, high moral character and outstanding leadership in campus groups and activities. They were rated in the upper third of a group of 1279 cadets who attended the ROTC Summer Camp this Summer at Ft. Benning, Ga.

LITTLE ROCK NAACP BRANCH PONDERS DEMAND FOR RECORDS

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Leaders of the NAACP branch here are pondering what action to take in response to a demand by Mayor Woodrow Wilson Mann for the list of members and other branch records in compliance with a recently enacted city ordinance requiring the filing of such information with the city clerk.

The measure, aimed at the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, was also invoked by Mayor Mann against three pro-segregation groups in the city. The City Council passed the ordinance by a 7-0 vote on October 14. The following day the Mayor called upon the NAACP and the three racist organizations to submit the required information within 15 days.

Mrs. L. C. Bates, president of the Arkansas State NAACP organization, announced on October 15 that lawyers for the association "will study the ordinance and recommend what we should do."

RESPONSE TO STATE ATTORNEY

The action by the Little Rock City Council was in response to a suggestion by State Attorney General Bruce Bennett that Arkansas municipalities enact such ordinances to supplement a statute requiring

the filing of membership and other records and payment of an occupation license for the privilege of doing business in Arkansas. Little Rock and North Little Rock promptly passed the restrictive ordinance. Arkansas thus became the first state in which such measures have been enacted by local governments although several southern states have passed similar statutes.

In the past, the NAACP has refused to turn over membership lists lest they be used by hate groups to penalize members of the organization by firing them from jobs, foreclosing their mortgages, denying them credit, threatening and otherwise seeking to intimidate them. Moreover, the NAACP contends that as a non-profit organization it is not subject to the occupation tax.

Under the new ordinance, the association is required to file the names of its members and contributors, its officers, agents and employees, as well as a financial statement, indicating the source of all its income and a listing of all expenditures. Also required is an affidavit by the president of the branch setting forth the relation of the branch to the national organization.

Virginia's Resistance To Integration Led Deep South

SUFFOLK, Va. —(ANP)—The "massive resistance" of Virginia to school desegregation was blamed for all the upheaval in the deep South by one of the main speakers at the recent 22nd annual convention of the Virginia State Conference of NAACP Branches held here in Suffolk.

Franklin H. Williams, director-general of the West Coast Regional office of the NAACP, made that charge in a keynote address at a public meeting of the convention Friday night and again Saturday night at the Jackson Memorial-Lawyer Testimonial Dinner, held at First Baptist Church.

Williams was very critical of Governor Thomas B. Stanley, J. Lindsay Almond, Jr., Democratic candidate of the Democratic party for governor and Senator Harry Byrd all of whom he labeled as unpatriotic for fighting the Supreme Court's school decision.

He said one Virginia daily newspaper was as subversive as the communist party. He didn't men-

tion the paper by name, but at one time blasted Mr. Kilpatrick, editor of the Richmond News Leader, which is generally considered by Virginia Negroes the worst white daily in Virginia and one of the most vehement against Negroes in all the South.

The NAACP official asserted that "there is no difference between a Dixiecrat and a communist." Both are subversive, he said, and "both should be treated alike. As to the revolt against the federal government in Arkansas and Virginia Mr. Williams said as long as they are in the union, they will have to abide by desegregation decision of the Supreme Court.

Labor Leaders Work For College Fund

NEW YORK (ANP)—Morris Induskey, secretary-treasurer of the New York City CIO Council, and James C. Quinn, secretary-treasurer of the AFL Central Trade and Labor Council, will head the Labor Committee for the United Negro College Fund. Announcement of their acceptance of the co-chairmanship was made Thursday by Lee H. Bristol, president of Bristol-Myers Company, who serves as national campaign chairman for the College Fund.

Thirty of the Fund's fully-accredited member colleges and universities are located in the South where the majority of college-age Negroes live. The doors of these institutions are now open to all qualified students. Some 23,000 are presently in attendance.

South Africa Still Boycotting Talks On Segregation

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (INS)—The annual U.N. drive to end the union of South Africa's racial segregation policies, known as apartheid, began Monday with the principal party still boycotting the discussion.

The debate by the assembly's special political committee this year is bound to give the Communist nations a new chance to bring the U. S. racial problems, especially the Little Rock school crisis, before the United Nations.

Since 1952 the 82-nation forum consistently has demanded the union government discontinue its apartheid policies. Only South Africa has opposed the resolutions, countries, like Britain, have abstained on the basis the U. N. has no right to interfere in South Africa's domestic problems.

The union government for the past two years has boycotted all U. N. assembly activities in protest against debate on its racial policies.

Iran, Japan and India led off the discussions with strong speeches condemning South Africa.

Japanese delegate Minoru Izawa, speaking in Spanish rather than the usual English used in U. N. debate by Japan's envoys, said the concept of legal equality was universally held and South Africa was a "regrettable exception."

He declared the union's policies "irritated" and were "repugnant" to others.

Editor Hits Racism; Asks Closer U.S. Link

ATLANTA, GEORGIA (SNS)—

American Negro and African "victims of history" were admonished Tuesday to work together to erase the insults, belittlements and designs of Occidental colonizers.

The admonition came from Editor Aloune Diop, of Paris, France, who delivered an inspiring and thought provoking address to the Frontiers at their regular Tuesday evening meeting at Joes Blue Room.

TAUGHT SCHOOL
The native Senegalese, who has written, taught school and worked with French culture and intellectual groups in Paris, said his U. S. State Department-sponsored trip to America was "to strengthen the links between Africans and friends in the United States."

Pointing to the African's pride in his ancestry, M. Diop pointed to what he termed occidental pictures of African barbarity in order to increase their own claims of superiority. The speaker declared there was no reason why the American Negro should not feel proud of his African ancestry and history, since the latter was rich in civilization, universities, social, economic and cultural institutions.

LAUDS NEGRO AMERICANS
The speaker credited the presence of the Negro in America with the development in this country of its democratic government and said that Africans were proud of the accomplishments of great Negro Americans.

"No continent has been emptied of its child population as such as Africa," M. Diop said, while pointing out that "slavery is one of the great crimes history has recorded against the white race."

He deplored the racism which he said was promoted by the occiden-

Token Integration In Housing At Naval Depot Is Charged

SAN FRANCISCO — Lester Bailey, NAACP field secretary, charged here that most Negroes are "solidly Jim-Crowed" at the Naval Ordnance Depot in Babbits, Nevada, despite the filing of housing segregation charges with the Defense Department by the NAACP.

He said reports indicate that Depot authorities "have begun a slow, piece-meal system of housing desegregation," which "amounts to the scattering of several Negro families throughout the housing area."

"But the fact remains that there is deliberate housing segregation in Babbits," Mr. Babbitt asserted. "Civilian and naval authorities in Babbits are not administering the local housing policy in keeping with the letter and spirit of the Executive Order calling for desegregation within the jurisdiction of the armed forces."

Mrs. Roosevelt Hits Demo Leadership

WASHINGTON — (INS) — Eleanor Roosevelt declared Sunday that the Democratic party's leadership in Congress has been "poor."

Asked if she meant Senate Majority leader Lyndon B. Johnson she replied that Johnson is one of the "ablest" men in the country. I see no real decisions as to what the Democratic party stood for."

The former first lady made the comments in a television interview on "Meet The Press" (NBC), directed mostly to her recent 27-day trip to Russia and private, three-hour interview with Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev.

She said she thinks Khrushchev was "honest" when he told her war is "unthinkable" because it would mean mass destruction. But she said there is "no basis at present for 'cooperative coexistence' between the West and Communist worlds."

She said the Russians have made up their minds they "can win what they want without war, and the U. S. must therefore prove to the neutral nations that democracy can do more for them than communism in order to keep them out of the Red sphere."

Asked if President Eisenhower is providing proper leadership in this respect, she replied: "I can't tell." But she added that the "people have not been curious enough to bring about the right kind of leadership."

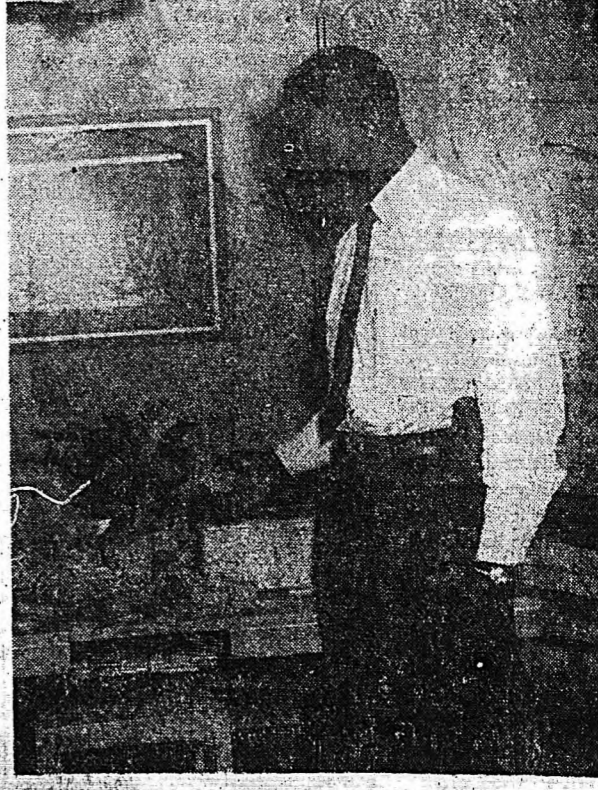

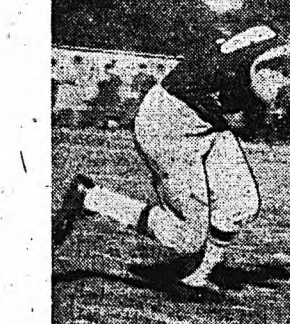

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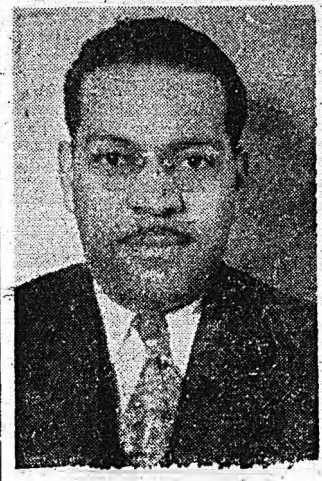
