

Changes which I have noticed  
since the Sanitation Department  
Strike

The changes I am going to be concerned with are those which have taken place only since the riot Thursday, March 28, 1968.

One major change which I have noticed is the change ~~in~~ in LeMayne's students attitudes toward such a vital communal problem. LeMayne students usually talk very readily about problems which they are in the midst of; but as a whole they seem to be reluctant or a bit frightened to discuss or even speak of rioting incidents

which occurred that Thursday and since they usually try to show that certain problems are justifiable or unjustifiable, but here they are not much concerned or if they are, they definitely won't voice their opinions!

In regards to the curfew which was imposed by Mayor Laub, there were less people ~~less people~~ on the streets in my neighborhood. I thought, people in my neighborhood are not very active but when the curfew was on, nobody was seen on the streets after the designated time.

Expressions on the faces of some of the whites who live on the same street

as I are different. That friendly expression is not there now, but a more less trustful and hostile expression is present. This expression has been present every since the strike but even more so since the riot.

As I have previously stated, my neighborhood is a very quiet, ~~racially~~ mixed neighborhood. It is not but four negro families live in my block. There was not any riot damage in my neighborhood whatsoever - no windows were broken, no looting or any disturbances resulting from the major riot incident downtown that Thursday. Therefore, my statements are very limited.
