Dilemma '68 has announced that U.S. Congressman Gerald B. Ford and artist Dan Howard have officially filled two more speaker positions for the March 1-2 symposium.
Ford and Howard join Malcolm Boyd, Robert L. Short and Ashley Montagu in addressing the problem of communications posed by Dilemma '68.
Michigan Representative Ford

took his B.A. degree at the University of Michigan, where he starred at center on the football team. After working his way through the Yale law school as an assistant varsity football coach, Rep. Ford received his law degree in 1941.
Eight years later Congressman Ford began his political career in the House of Representatives. The same year he was selected as one

of America's Ten Outstanding Young Men.

Minority Leader
In Congress Ford has been a member of the House Appropriations Committee and the Department of Defense subcommittee. He chaired the 1963 House Republican Conference and now heads the GOP leadership committee. Congressman Ford has served as House Minority Leader since 1959.
According to the tentative schedule, Rep. Ford will speak Friday night, March 1.

Miss Bott and Scott Arnold, 21, of Tunica, Miss., Southwestern senior, were both injured when the car in which they were passengers went out of control and crashed on Highway 61 just south of the Mississippi-Tennessee state line.


Miss Bott suffered severe brain contusions and internal injuries. Mr. Arnold underwent surgery for removal of a ruptured spleen. He is now recovering in Methodist Hospital.

The three other persons in the car were unhurt.

Tower Slackens Garb Rule

The Administrative Committee approved a new dress ruling for women at a meeting last Tuesday. The new guidelines provide that "informal attire such as shorts and slacks may be worn in the student center, the library, to intramural events and like activities," said Dean of Women Anne S. Caldwell.

The ruling stipulates that "shorts and slacks are not appropriate for classes or the refectory."

The statute will go into effect next semester. The Women's Dormitory Governing Board had petitioned Dean Caldwell to make this change following a proposal which originated in the Welfare Commission.

Students Are Adults

"We are in agreement that the values and ideals attached to dress can best be achieved and maintained when student members of the community are, like all adult members, given the responsibility of deciding what is appropriate and in good taste on different occasions," said Dean Caldwell.
"One cannot legislate rules for every individual case, but these

standards would be appropriate."

The Administration Committee, consists of President Alexander, and Deans Jones, Caldwell and Diehl.

The Honor Council confronted the "Dorm Board" this week with a proposal that would shift the responsibilities of evening dates and overnight visits from the administration to each resident woman's parents.

The parents would indicate on a permission slip signed at the beginning of the year whether or not

the coed would be required to leave her destination, date's name, a phone number, or any other information in an envelope before leaving the dormitory at night.

Any discrepancies in the execution of the proposed system would not come under Honor Council jurisdiction.

"The college has a right to expect a certain level of conduct from its students, and to make rules to that effect governing activities on the campus," said Ming

Morgan, vice-president of the Honor Council.

Only On Campus

"However, the Council does not believe that a girl's morals off the campus should be the responsibility of the school nor an official matter of honor.

"We want a system whereby the responsibility will be solely between the girl and her parents."

The Honor Council will petition the members of the Dorm Board Sunday to hasten action on this proposal.

British M. P. Will Analyze Common Market Struggle

Dr. Norman St. John-Stevens, Member of the British Parliament, author, barrister and journalist, will be on the campus Monday, Jan. 15 and Tuesday, Jan. 16 as a Danforth Visiting Lecturer.

The public is invited to hear him on Monday at 8:00 p.m. in the Adult Education Center. His topic for that lecture will be "The Atlantic Community and the Common Market - Conflict in the West."

Topics for consideration in his student convocation and informal meetings will be "Religious Freedom: A Reconciliation of Faith

and Liberty" and "How the British Parliament Works."

The visiting lecturers program under which Dr. St. John-Stevens comes to Southwestern was initiated in 1957 by the Arts Program of the Association of American Colleges and is supported by a grant from the Danforth Foundation.

Top Debaters Flail Foes

Southwestern's rapidly improving debate team continued to reap the fruits of its dogged labor by snaring ninth place in the Robert E. Lee Memorial Tournament, held last weekend at Millsaps College.

Powerhouses Baylor and Houston University headed the 113 entries. Debate was on the national topic, Resolved: That the Federal Government Should Guarantee a Minimum Annual Cash Income to All Citizens of the United States.

The senior team, Brad Foster and Steve Ramp, bested Baylor, Texas A & M and Mississippi State University in the preliminary round, losing only to Houston.

In contests involving only the tourney's top sixteen teams, Southwestern again lost to Houston. The Cougars finished fourth in overall scoring.

Southwestern demonstrated important depth in its junior ranks. The junior team, Bill Matthews and Cary Fowler, beat the University of Southern Mississippi.

Greeks, Convocations Meet Coming Committee Perusal

Two committees studying the convocation and Greek systems at Southwestern are swinging into operation this month.

A committee on convocations has been appointed as a subcommittee of the Community Life Committee to study Southwestern's convocation system, and to make recommendations to the parent body on their place at the college.

Dr. Robert Patterson will head the study group.

Dr. Fred Neal, chairman of the Community Life Committee, stated that the prime task of the subcommittee is "to study reasons for and values for, as well as criticisms of present policy, to consider any new recommendations which might come to its attention, and to recommend such retentions of former procedures and whatever changes it feels are conducive to the best values of the college community."

The subcommittee, which will meet weekly, will consult persons now on the Convocations and Religious Life Subcommittee. It is also expected to get fully representational opinions from students, faculty and administration.

"It is hoped that the committee can complete its work as quickly as possible without sacrificing objectivity or thoroughness," said Neal.

The policies and procedures adopted by the Community Life Committee and the faculty will be implemented during the second semester.

Serving on the committee in addition to Dr. Patterson are Professors John Henry Davis and Charles O. Warren, students Peggy Early, Jinger Jackson, Nibs Stroupe and David Massey, Admissions Representative James E. Pruitt, and Mrs. M. K. Vollmer of

the Office of Development.

President David Alexander told The Sou'wester that the Greek evaluation committee will begin meeting in February. The initial conclave had been scheduled for the middle of January. It is headed by President Alexander.

The president said that a questionnaire would be distributed today to the Greeks. He invited written opinions from any interested person or groups.

Professor T. M. Lowry, who is a member of the committee, expressed the hope that students will begin thinking and discussing the fraternity and sorority system at Southwestern.

"We need student opinion in or-

der to give the committee some basis on which to proceed," Lowry commented.

Other members of the committee, appointed by President Alexander last November, are Fred W. Neal, Chairman of the Community Life Committee; Associate Professor Donald Tucker; IFC President Jim Stewart; PAN President Becky Wynn; Jane Mando and Larry Woodard.

Mrs. David K. Wilson, Walter P. Armstrong, Memphis attorney, and Frank England, Jr., vice-president of the England Motor Company in Memphis, and all members of the Board of Directors are also serving on the committee.

Jones Takes Appointment To Metro Planning Board


Dean of the College Jameson Jones has been appointed to serve on the city's Planning Commission. His appointment was announced by Mayor Henry Loeb on Tuesday.

"The Planning Commission is an important body in urban development," said the Dean, "and the professional staff of the Commission are very competent people. I have confidence in their ability."

During Mayor Loeb's previous administration, Dean Jones sat on the commission for three years. The appointment was Loeb's second to the commission since his election.

Of Jones, the mayor said, "The city is fortunate to get his (Jones') services. He is, in effect practicing what he preaches at Southwestern in agreeing to serve."

The Dean will replace Wayne Mink, former chairman of the board, who recently resigned.

Leaping Lynx Lance Bulldogs After Clansmen Foil Holiday

Southwestern's Leaping Lynx bounced back from a 70-56 holiday setback at the hands of Belhaven to shock the highly regarded Union University quintet by a 72-58 count Tuesday night.

The win snapped Union's six-game winning streak. Southwestern was 6-2, going into last night's game against Sewanee.

The Lynx bombed the hoops at a 60 per cent clip and waltzed to an insurmountable 44-26 halftime lead over Union. Southwestern connected on seven of its first nine field goal attempts, to build a comfortable 15-4 margin, with 14:42 remaining in the half.

Senior co-captains Mike Hettinger and Jimmy Riggan dominated the first five minutes of the tussle. The fired-up guards brought 500 spectators to their feet by sacking 6 successive field goals in the 20-foot range.

Not to be denied in the second half, the Bulldogs made a determined comeback, although with 17:14 remaining in the game Hettinger netted a 15-foot jump shot for a 50-30 lead.

In the ensuing ten minutes Southwestern committed 6 turnovers, notched only one free throw and did not score from the field. With less than seven minutes on the clock Union pulled to within 6 points, but sophomore Eddie Hart sank 6 charity tosses to squelch

the Union effort.

After the contest, a jubilant Southwestern Coach Don Duckworth commented, "This was a tremendous game for us and an outstanding team effort. The defensive play of Jimmy Riggan and Jack Patterson on Union's Dan Rudesill was a key to our success. Riggan, who sustained an ankle

injury early in the initial period, and Patterson held Rudesill, the Bulldogs' ace point produced to a season's low of 4 markers.

Another key factor in the Lynx victory was the rebounding of Hart and 6'6" Center Ken Brooks. Hart corralled 11, while Brooks picked off 10.

Junior forward Jerry Bell con-

tinued his consistent play by scoring 13 points and turning in a fine defensive game.

With 22 points, Hettinger took scoring honors for the third consecutive outing. The scrappy competitor has a 24.3 average in the last three contests.

Hart accounted for 18 points in the Lynx' biggest victory of the young season. Union had suffered only one setback, a 54-41 decision to Memphis State University.

Belhaven avenged an earlier 75-73 loss to Southwestern in the championship finals of the Dixie Tournament. The Clansmen garnered their fifth victory in ten decisions by hitting 28 of 57 shots from the floor, while Southwestern managed only 20 of 58.

James Kennedy led Belhaven's onslaught with 19 points and 12 rebounds. Hettinger tossed in 20 points and Bell chipped in 11, while Brooks snared 12 rebounds for the Lynx.


Kappa Sigma has snared the "A" League volleyball crown with a come-from-behind victory over Sigma Alpha Epsilon.
