Committee Reports

THEOLOGY OF GUEST SPEAKER SUMMARIZED

(NOTE: The Sou'wester feels that since this semester's Religious Evaluation is featuring Dr. H. Richard Niebuhr as its main speaker, it will be helpful to offer a brief summary of his basic theological position, so that what he has to say may be considered and understood in the light of his over-all viewpoint. Accordingly, Prof. Robert G. Patterson, Southwestern Chaplain, has most graciously consented to present the following summarization of Dr. Niebuhr's thought.)

Both Richard Niebuhr and his brother, Reinhold Niebuhr, are professors in the field of Christian ethics. Though the two brothers diverge in many ways, their theology has some points in common. Both have become convinced that the older "liberal social gospel" must be revised in the light of a more realistic awareness of the selfish, "sinful" tendencies in man if the Christian message is to be meaningful in the modern world. Richard Niebuhr's writings show this, for instance, in his critique of a type of Christianity which he calls "the Christ of culture" in *Christ and Culture*. But he also shows a deep appreciation of the good points of this kind of Christianity alongside his sense of its shortcomings. This is characteristic of his theology. Whatever subject Richard Niebuhr is dealing with, his listeners usually end up with a greater appreciation for its values than before.

Richard and Reinhold Niebuhr also share the conviction that the "social gospel" emphasized some truths which must not be lost in modern Christianity, especially the social relevance of the gospel. Their expression of this conviction has been somewhat different, however. Typically it has been expressed by Reinhold Niebuhr through a keen perception of injustice and hypocrisy in modern society against which he has waged a continuing battle. The emphasis of Richard Niebuhr, on the other hand, has not been so much a battle against injustices as a search for ways in which redemption can be made real in the modern situation. This can be seen in the last two chapters of *Christ and Culture* as he speaks of the need for culture to be transformed by Christ. It may also be apparent in his Tuesday lecture at Southwestern, "Faith and Hope,"

H. RICHARD NIEBUHR, YALE THEOLOGIAN, IN 3 ADDRESSES

Dr. H. Richard Niebuhr, Sterling Professor of Christian Ethics at Yale Divinity School and one of America's truly outstanding contemporary theologians, will open Southwestern's Spring Religious Evaluation Week in Hardie Auditorium at 5:00 p.m. Sunday.

Niebuhr comes under the sponsorship of the Protestant Religious Council, interdenominational campus group headed by Billy McLean.

Dr. Niebuhr, who was born in Wright City, Missouri, is a graduate of Elmhurst College; he received his BD at Yale Divinity School and his PhD at Yale University. He was President of Elmhurst College from 1924-1927 and Professor of the Philosophy of Religion at Eden Theological Semin-

ary from 1927-1931. As well as being Professor of Christian Ethics at the Divinity School of Yale University, he is director of graduate studies in the department of religion there.

He was given leave of absence from Yale Divinity School in 1954-1955 to direct an important study of theological education in America, sponsored by the American Association of Theological Schools.

He is the author of such books as *The Social Sources of Denominationalism*, written in 1929 and reissued in 1954, *The Kingdom of God in America*, *The Meaning of Revelation*, written in 1952, and *Christ and Culture*, which is one of the books placed in all United States overseas libraries by the State Department. The latter book is now available in the Southwestern Bookstore.

Southwestern is indeed fortunate to have this great Christian thinker on the campus for this period of religious evaluation and inspiration, and we feel that there is little need to urge every student to take the fullest advantage of this opportunity to hear and to think about the ideas and concepts which he will present for our consideration.

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Across The Desk

A proposal to amend the Constitution of the Student Body of Southwestern will soon be brought before the student body for its consideration and vote. Because of the nature of this proposed amendment, we feel that it should be presented for discussion at this time in order that when the final balloting comes, the decision made will be one which is not in haste and one which will be fully understood by all.

This proposal, as informally presented to the Student Council at its regular meeting this week by Denton McLellan, IFC President, and stated in its simplest terms, is this: To give representation on the Council to the Inter-Fraternity Council and to the Pan-Hellenic Council.

We would make it very plain that as yet no details as to how this proposal will be put into effect have been worked out. There are several problems to be worked out, for example: How will the representatives from the respective groups be chosen? To what extent will giving them representation bring them under the control of the Council, in other words, to what extent will they lose their present status of independent bodies having jurisdiction in specific areas? If this is done, should the independent groups also be given representation on the Council, in order that they too may have a fair and equal voice in student government?

These problems are not, we feel, insurmountable. They do, however, demand serious thought in order that the solution ultimately reached may be one of justice and equity.

Since we feel that a practical and profitable solution can be reached, we heartily support and endorse this proposal for the following reasons:

1. We feel that since fraternities and sororities include some 80% of the total Southwestern student body in their membership, and that since they represent a highly organized and actively functioning segment of the Student Body, they deserve representation in the student government, if it is to be truly representative of the campus as a whole.

2. Since there are many questions in the course of a year's activities in which there is joint action by the social groups and the Council, necessitating the referring of questions from the Council back to the groups for action, as in the recent question of the Hungarian relief project, representation of the groups on the Council will make for a more efficient and workable system of government.

3. By officially recognizing these groups as integral units of the student government, we feel that they will be strengthened and better enabled to adequately fulfill the purposes for which they were established. In effect, we will be adding a new and stronger arm to the Council, which will be better able to meet the needs of the student body as a whole directly in proportion to its ability to meet the needs of organized social groups as a whole.

4. By giving the fraternities and sororities direct representation on the Council, we feel that there will be an increased interest on the part of these bodies in the over-all working of the student government.

Finally, we feel that this question should be brought up for some action and decision at this time because it was one of the points in the platform on which the student body president was elected last spring, and his term of office is nearing its close. Hence, action of some sort is, we feel, mandatory.

Next week we shall offer for consideration what we feel to be a possible practical proposal in connection with this question.

SOU'WESTER PRE-ELECTION SERIES - I

(Note: As a service to the student body, and in co-operation with the Student Council, the Sou'wester this week begins a two-article series on the Council and what we feel should be the qualifications for membership on that body. This week we shall consider the five Commissioners.)

Painful experience in the past history of man-kind has shown that if government is to function smoothly, efficiently, and in meeting the interests of those governed on any level, it must have capable and responsible leadership. We feel that since this is true, there might well be some virtue in offering, before the nominating conventions which will meet next month to choose candidates for Southwestern's student body elections, a statement of just what qualities we feel the various office-holders should have if they are to give the Student Body what is needed in the way of strong and responsive student government.

This week we shall consider briefly the five Commissioners: Athletics, Publications, Religious Activities, Social Activities, and Undergraduate Women. Next time we will think about the presidency, vice-presidency, and office of secretary-treasurer.

First, we find that there are four general qualifications which all of the five commissioners should have:


1. **Competence in their respective fields:** This requirement demands that they each have had past experience, either on the commission on which they will serve or in some position of responsibility outside the commission, but in its specific field. This demands, for instance, that the Athletics Commissioner have had experience in athletics, that the Social Activities Commissioner must have had experience in the actual planning and carrying out of social activities of some sort.

2. **Willingness to accept a dual responsibility:** The Commissioners must recognize and be willing to meet a responsibility both to the interests of those students who come under their specific jurisdiction and to the interests of the student body as a whole. Tied in with this responsibility is that of a transcending loyalty to Southwestern which will give them the perspective required to judge truly in questions which involve the interests of the whole, even when this course is in apparent contradiction to the wishes of the majority. At the same time, however, this does not mean that they should not seek to make the reasons for their actions plain, because only by so doing can they stand in the respect of their fellow-students.

3. **Sensitivity to the general campus feeling:** In many ways, perhaps, this is the most difficult requirement for a commissioner to meet. It requires a sort of "sixth sense" which is responsive to every snatch of conversation in the dormitory, to all the chatter around the table in the dining hall, in short to every expression, formal and informal, of student opinion. It must be an unprejudiced sort of thing, which can hear criticism (Continued on page 4)



from one nation to another when any disagreement arises.

This brings up another point which I think shows a definite lack of faith (and action) in the United Nations. When a nation has a dispute with another nation they will usually bring it to the United Nations. Once there, the situation will be debated for days and weeks on end with no positive action being taken. During the learned discussion on the troubles, one nation is pushed to the point where it has to either mobilize military forces or be attacked, or the opposite is true when the aggressor knows that the matter is safely tucked away on the floor of the U. N. and the time to strike has come.

While not claiming to be an authority on the subject of international politics we wonder why not have a standing Emergency Force at the U. N.'s disposal so they may step in and keep the peace until the battle of the conference table can be solved? This time the temporary Emergency Force has been recalled from the hottest spot in the world.

If memory serves us right, we remember some semblance of a promise made by the United States to the Israeli government that we would guarantee her protection from the aggression of any nation, with Egypt primarily in mind. Now that the Middle East Doctrine is law; that leaves the U.S. in a rather unhealthy position. It should be interesting to see how Dulles squirms out of this one. We can only hope that he won't wince on the policy as it has been put forth. A number of nations have gone so far in the past to say that American foreign policy is unreliable, and this now seems like an ideal time to stand by our commitments. If we don't stand up to our agreements the position as leader of the free world could very well go to someone else. Also, if Nassar gets his way in this episode he will greatly increase his stock among the Arab nations of the Middle East.

To make a long story short it could well be a reincarnation of the old "anything to keep the peace" idea which gave Hitler Poland, Holland, Belgium and other small nations in the late '30's. If there were a repeat of this it could be harder to wiggle out of than the last time, particularly with Russia eyeing warm water seaports, and even more, the great amount of oil in the area. While we think that now is the time to stabilize the situation and make very clear the boundaries beyond which will mean no more Nassar, there is the possibility, and maybe even a probability, that Russia is just waiting for us to make a move towards the Gaza Strip or any other part of that country. No doubt the many implications of the conditions makes the "handle with care" label a must, but it should still be a firm hand that does the handling. To put a stop to this sawing for position and power at this point would seem easier than doing it at a later date.

While we would be among the last to advocate use of the military forces of the United States in this, or any squabble, we still feel that the word of the nation should be given with honor and integrity. If the words given are unsatisfactory,

4. Leadership: It can almost go without saying that all of these office-holders must have those qualities of leadership which can produce maximum effort with maximum efficiency from those who work under them. This is a maxim which applies to any position of leadership, but which must be especially applied to your campus government officers.

Space permits only a summary listing of individual commissioners' requirements. The Athletics Commissioner must serve on the Faculty-Student Athletic Committee, and must co-ordinate the activities of the S-Club, the WAA and the Intramural program.

The Social Commissioner is responsible for the planning of Council social events, and he must work with the Dean of Women's office in the planning and co-ordination of the social calendar.

The Religious Activities Commissioner is responsible for the activities of the Protestant Religious Council and works with the Faculty Convocations Committee in the planning of Religious Evaluation periods.

The Publications Commissioner is responsible for the smooth functioning of all campus student publications.

The Commissioner of Undergraduate Women is in charge of hazing in the fall and serves as head of the WUB which serves as a co-ordinating body between the various women's organizations on campus.

Niebuhr's Theology

for it is clear that if God is acting to redeem men this is related to men's hope.

In his search for possibilities of redemption, much of Richard Niebuhr's writing has centered on the Christian community, the church. This was apparent in his earlier book on revelation, *The Meaning of Revelation*, in which one of his points was that revelation takes place for us as we become one with a community which has a common experience of God and ultimately one with a community which centers in Christ. Niebuhr's concern with the church was also apparent in his decision to write *The Social Sources of Denominationalism*, a searching examination of the causes of the divisions in the Christian church. It is obvious in this book that these divisions are tragic to Richard Niebuhr, but it is also obvious that he realizes that they cannot be lightly overcome. This aspect of his thought may become apparent in his Monday lecture at Southwestern, "Faith and the Common Life."

Recently, much of Niebuhr's thought has centered around the three traditional Christian virtues, faith, hope, and love. The subject is hardly surprising, since Christian ethics is his field. In his lectures at Southwestern, on the theme "Faith and Christianity," some of the theological perspectives which have emerged in his past work will doubtless be present, but specifically he will be bringing to this community the results of putting these perspectives to work in the examination of the Christian virtue of faith.
