

## Marcia Calmer Wins Gracey Scholarship; To Study in France

Paris and Tours, France, will be the home of Marcia Calmer for six weeks this summer, as recipient of the 1955 Marianna Gracey Award for Summer Study Abroad.

She will study at the University of Paris for three weeks in June and then live with a French family in Tours for three weeks while studying at the University of Poitiers. She will spend two additional weeks travelling in France before returning by student ship in September for her senior year at Southwestern.

The scholarship, in memory of Marianna Gracey, graduate and assistant dean of women of Southwestern in 1953, is awarded to a junior woman student who will return to Southwestern for the following academic session. The award covers room, board and tuition for six weeks study at any European university.

### Committee Approved

The committee, composed of the chairman of the Faculty Committee on Admissions and Student Aid, the Dean of Women and the Dean of Men, selects the winner on the basis

## Amacker To Attend Washington Meeting

D. M. Amacker, professor of political science, will attend a meeting of the Committee on Foreign Trade of the National Cotton Council in Washington March 16.

The meeting was called to receive and act on the report of a special Cotton Council subcommittee appointed at Houston February 1 for the purpose of exploring the possibility of expanding the foreign cotton trade.

Prof. Amacker represents the producer interests. Memphians representing the exporter interests will be Everett Cook and Sidney West. A. E. Hohenberg is chairman of the Committee on Foreign Trade.

## 100 Hi School Seniors In Scholarship Competition

Some 100 Memphis and Shelby County high school seniors were on the campus last Saturday to take competitive examinations for 15 four-year scholarships, totalling \$18,000, offered each year by Southwestern.

Ten Honor Scholarships will be awarded on the basis of students' high school academic activities, achievements on the competitive examinations, character, and promise of future usefulness, Dr. Hon said. Honor scholarships are for \$1200, payable at the rate of \$300 a year, and subject to renewal each year as long as the holder maintains a "B" average.

### Leadership Awards

Five leadership awards, also for \$1200, will be made on the basis of character and applicants' demonstration of qualities of leadership as evidenced by their extra-curricular activities in publications, band or music, athletics, student government, and the like. These are also payable at the rate of \$300 a year, renewable as long as holders maintain "C" averages during their first year and "C-plus" (2.4) averages during the remainder of their college careers.

Twelve out-of-town Honor Scholarships and Leadership awards totalling \$24,000, for \$2000 each, are also offered by Southwestern. Examinations for these, payable at the rate of \$500 a year and subject to the same renewal terms as the Memphis and Shelby County awards, will be placed in the hands of principals and head-masters of schools in the Mid-South. Shelby Countians who wish to live in the dormitories are eligible to compete for the boarding students' scholarships.

## Three Week Fraternity Rush Vetoed by Faculty

The Faculty Committee announced last Wednesday that an appeal by the Interfraternity Council to change fall rush rules has been denied.

The Student Welfare Committee, which last Saturday morning reconvened in session after a recess of one week, took a vote of 3 to 5 to defeat a motion that the Committee endorse the three-week fraternity rush program as proposed by the Interfraternity Council. This action was not final in itself; it simply meant that the Student Welfare Committee did not go on record as approving the proposed changes in fraternity rush.

The motion was called after several weeks debate, during which arguments for both sides were thoroughly aired. The decision of this committee was submitted to Faculty Committee at its meeting last Wednesday afternoon; the final action was in the hands of that committee in light of the Student Welfare Committee's recommendation.

### IFC Proposals

The proposal which the Interfraternity Council submitted to the Faculty Committee was that the 1956 fall rush program be altered

from a pre-school rush lasting one week to a three-week rush beginning at the start of the school year.

The main arguments in favor of the proposed changes, as discussed in the Student Welfare Committee meeting last Saturday, were that a three-week rush plan would allow the new and old students to get to know each other better, to give the rushees the opportunity to make their choices with more permanent wisdom, and, therefore, reduce the number of unhappy choices and broken pledges that were experienced this year. It was brought up that there were five broken pledges resulting from this year's rush program, and it was suggested that an altered program might tend to eliminate this unfortunate condition.

### Factors Discussed

During the course of this meeting, several important factors were brought up for discussion. It was suggested that there might be ad-

## A More Workable Constitution

The Student Council this week reported two constructive pieces of legislation. Some badly needed changes in the Elections Commission's constitution were made, and the outdated point system was revised. In connection with these actions a question has been raised as to the proper method of presenting the Council's work to the Student Body.

Article V, Section 2, states that "New legislation or by-laws shall be published upon the bulletin board to take effect three days subsequently . . ." This neither tells how soon after the Council's meeting its action must be published nor designates any particular bulletin board for the Council to use.

### Outdated

We understand that, when this Constitution was adopted, the now unused board called "Little Nell" between Palmer Hall and the science building was the only space available for student use. Since then, however, we have come to use boards in the different parts of Palmer.

Article V, Section 2, also provides that within the three-day period, fifty members of the student body may sign a petition to refer the measure to a referendum vote by the Student Body. No time for the posting of such information is given, but it is only natural that it be done immediately following the Council's action. Inasmuch as the Council now meets Thursday evenings, the weekend publication of actions taken would hardly give petitioners enough time to collect signatures.

The Constitution does not state whether legislation is valid if not published as directed by the Constitution. Here, again, the only body which interprets the Constitution is the Council itself, a fact which is contrary to the principle of separation of powers.

### Proposals

In order to reduce the chance for quarrel and misunderstanding, we suggest that (1) a way of presenting to the Student Body the official legislation of the Council be designated; (2) that the length of time for petitions for referendums be increased; and that (3) a group, separate from the Student Council, be designated to rule on questions involving the Student Body Constitution. The Sou'wester has requested the Student Council to form a committee (composed of Council members or other students or both) to study these proposals. This committee would be instructed to form Constitutional amendments wherever necessary, and present them to the Student Body as soon as possible.

The matter will be under consideration next week. We hope to report definite action in the next issue.

of leadership, character and scholarship, after the applicant's course of study has been approved by the Faculty Committee on Curriculum and Instruction.

Miss Gracey, who came to Southwestern in 1947 from Covington, studied in Europe as an exchange student in 1950 following her junior year. In 1951 she received her bachelor of arts degree with distinction in Spanish. On July 4, 1953, two months after her acceptance of the position of assistant dean of Southwestern, she died of a heart attack. The fund was set up the following year in her memory.

# Student Council Releases Revamped Point System

## Four Revisions in Elections Commission Constitution Approved by Student Council

The Student Council met in the Bell Room on March 3, 1955. The business that took place at the meeting is as follows:

Mary Rodriguez reported that students are invited to join the "Friends of Burrow Library" group. The amount paid by the "joiner" of this group is \$1.00 (Mary has been made a member of the Executive Committee of the "Friends of Burrow Library").

Ann Barr reported that the members of the Christian Church are considering forming a group on the campus similar to the M.S.F., W.F., Canterbury Club, and B.S.U.

#### New Point System

The point system was re-evaluated, and the following offices were changed from the number of points listed in the hand-book to:

Pres. Honor Council	30 pts.
Sorority and Fraternity Pres.	40 pts.
Managing Editor of Sou'wester	25 pts.
Pres. of Women's Dorm Board	20 pts.
Pres. of Women's Pan.	20 pts.
Pres. of Interfrat Council	20 pts.
Senior Chairman of Religious Seminar	20 pts.
Treas. of Sorority or Frat	30 pts.
Alpha Psi Omega Pres.	15 pts.
Student Council Rep.	15 pts.
Pledge Trainer	20 pts.
Secretary of Choir	15 pts.
Cheerleaders	5 pts.

The last two offices were added to the points system. They have not been credited with points before this time.

#### Revised Constitution

David Kaylor read the new Elections Commission Constitution. The changes, which were suggested by the Elections Commission, were accepted. These revisions are as follows:

1. In the old Constitution no system was outlined for the conduction of individual elections. Revised const. provides that: "Tables are to be set up in the east end of Palmer upon which shall be a locked, metal ballot box. Those voting shall sign a list placed on the tables for that purpose, have their names checked off in Student Directory being used for that purpose, and receive their ballots. There are to be two members or alternates for the Elections Commission at the tables at all times while ballots are available."

2. The time of Spring election has been changed. Formerly officers of the Student Body and class Presidents were elected the last week in April. Now Student Body officers will be elected the second week in April, and all class officers will be elected the third week in April.

3. Formerly there was no stated punishment for persons found guilty of infractions against signs, etc., during campaigns. Revised const. states "In the case of removing or despoiling any signs the penalty shall be the revoking of the guilty party or parties or organization(s)' right to vote in said election and a \$25.00 fine imposed upon said person or organization."

4. The by-laws were amended according to the new method of holding nomination conventions for the Student Body elections as approved by the Student Body last year. "Two conventions shall be held one week prior to the election of Student Body officers. The first convention will be composed of the delegation from the fraternities and sororities and independent groups; the ticket shall be called the Red Ticket. The second convention will consist of twenty-two people chosen by the Student council (four freshmen, five sophomores, six

juniors, and seven seniors). These people are to have no fraternity or sorority obligations. The vice-president of the Student Council will act as chairman of the convention. This convention on the second day will make the Black Ticket, which will have its choice as to whether it will present its platform first or last in chapel." Holly Mitchell's comment on the meeting was, "The council accomplished two great undertakings in its meeting of March 3—revising the point system to more accurately reflect the amount of work required for the various campus offices, and the approval of the revisions in the Election Commissions' Constitution."

# Stuart Currie To Conduct Religious Evaluation Week

Stuart D. Currie of Austin, Texas, will conduct the spring Religious Evaluation Period Sunday through Wednesday.

At present Mr. Currie is enrolled for advanced studies in the Graduate Institute of the Liberal Arts at Emory University, Ga., pursuing a course leading to the Ph.D. degree.

He received his secondary education at the Choate School in Wallingford, Conn., and was graduated cum laude in 1940. He received his bachelor of arts degree with honors from the University of Texas in 1944.

From 1942 to 1945, Mr. Currie attended Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. He took graduate work at Union Theological Seminary in New York during the summer of 1946.

Mr. Currie served the Haskell and Rochester, Texas, churches from 1945 to 1947; the Taylor, Texas, church from 1947 to 1949; and the First Presbyterian Church of Fulton, Mo., from 1949 to 1954.

## Louisville Seminary

At Fulton he served as Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Missouri from 1950 to 1954, as Moderator and as Chairman of the Stewardship Committee. He was appointed by the Synod of Missouri as a member of the Board of Trustees of Louisville Seminary from 1949 to 1954.

Mr. Currie taught freshman Bible at Westminster College for two years. He served as president of the Fulton Council of Churches and was a member of the Board of the Presbyterian Student Association of Columbia, Mo., in 1953. He is vice president of Student Work of the Presbyterian Educational Association of the South.

Mr. Currie's sermons, devotionals and editorials have appeared in "Thy Will—My Will," "Presbyterian Youth," "Presbyterian Outlook," "Presbyterian Men" and "The Presbyterian Survey."

## Vesper Service

The Religious Evaluation Period will begin with a vesper service at 5 p.m. Sunday in Hardie Auditorium. Mr. Currie's topic will be "The Problem of Identity." The Southwestern Singers will sing "Alleluia" by Randall Thompson.

The morning addresses will be "Christ the Constant," Monday; "Three Roads to Commitment," Tuesday; and "The Divine Irritant," Wednesday. Monday the choir will sing "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," Tuesday, "Psalm 120" by Burnet Tuthill; and Wednesday, "O Sacred Head Now Wounded" with setting by Bach.

The subject for Tuesday's Religious Seminar will be "Male and Female Created He Them." Mr. Currie will speak on "Six Foot Six or Five by Five" at the "S" Club banquet at 6:15 p.m. Monday.

There will be student led discussion groups on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. Student leaders will be Dan Adams, James Ayde-Iotte, Charles Kennon, Bernie Larr, Sarah Jane Seissinger, Elizabeth Shaifer, Robert Rickard and William Sullivan.

## Rush Plan Fails

vantages in having rush the second year of college life, allowing the prospective pledges to gain even a better knowledge of the members of the various fraternities.

Dr. Lowry, chairman of the committee, at this point raised the fact that the National Pan-Hellenic, at its meeting in Atlantic City two years ago, had recommended that rush be executed as soon as possible in the student's career.

### Academic Question

The question was then raised as to whether or not the time of rushing had any effect on the grades of the psychological tests which are given to all incoming freshmen during the period of orientation. Dr. Queener answered that he had not

made a study of this, but that he did know that tests given in the army indicated that a man can do better on a test after a crisis than he can during one, or before he has had a period to "settle down."

Committee Member Mitchell then asked if it were correct that the chair had stated in a previous session that it had been found that the longer period of rush did not lower the grades of the men participating in rush. To this question Dr. Lowry replied, "I'm afraid I have been misquoted. What I said was that it lowered the men's (grades) less than the women's."

Dr. Lowry expressed the point of view of the faculty in saying that it was important to understand that "the faculty simply wants to exhibit a sense of fairness. We realize," he stated, "that while many of you students feel very strongly about this, and want these changes very badly, we can see the situation from the standpoint of experience, and can look at it rationally. We want what will be best all around."

### Other Issues

Dr. Dan Rhodes stated that at the institution where he had been previous to coming to Southwestern, every possible system of rush had been tried except the method which presently stands at South-

western. In viewing the relative success of these systems he said, "I think that the students here should give it another chance."

Members of the Interfraternity Council who were present at the Student Welfare Committee meeting stated that it had been the feeling of the Council that pre-school rush did not allow sufficient time for new and old students to be sure of each other. They also maintained that a very real issue lay in the fact that the present system deprived those students who worked during the summer vacation of a week's paycheck if they had to return to participate in fraternity rush.

The Committee acknowledged that although there was an added expense to the college involved in the present system, there was a definite academic advantage as it now stands.

### IFC Meets

On last Tuesday afternoon, the Interfraternity Council again met to discuss, as IFC President Truman Nabors put it, "... what do we want to do about tomorrow?" He had reference to the Faculty Committee meeting which met on Wednesday.

A decision was reached that although the Council did not expect the Faculty Committee to rule in

favor of the proposed rush change, an appeal should be made in behalf of the Council's view before the Committee.

IFC President Nabors made the appeal to the faculty. Members of the IFC were not allowed to remain in the committee room during the discussion and voting, and the Sou'wester reporter was barred from the meeting, but a spokesman for the Committee revealed that the faculty had denied the appeal. It was pointed out that the issue had been most carefully considered, and that the committee felt that it would be best to accept the recommendation of the Student Welfare Committee.
