Pre-Registration Starts Tuesday

Malcolm Evans, Southwestern registrar, has announced that pre-registration for the second semester of the 1955-56 session will be held during the period December 5-16.

Students are asked to come to the registrar's office for a copy of the class schedule. The program they are to follow should be worked out in consultation with their adviser, and the courses to be taken should then be circled in pencil on the schedule, which is to be signed by both the student and his faculty adviser before its delivery to the registrar.

So much more time is available during the pre-registration period than in the one day of regular registration in February that everyone should get a better program by being early. The period cannot be extended past December 16 because of the need for getting the course and classification cards typed during the holidays.

The last day for payment of semester fees without penalty is February 7, 1956.

law from persons practicing psychology who do not have the necessary training."

He was chosen a year ago as president-elect and had served in 1953 as the Tennessee Representative to the National Congress of State Psychological Associations. As president his duties include appointing committees to oversee licensing examinations and to handle public relations.

Recently Organized

The Tennessee Psychological Association, which has been in existence for only five years, is an affiliate of the American Psychological Association whose membership numbers 10,000.

One of the purposes of this association is to foster psychology as a science and a profession in the state; the association's main function thus far has been to establish it as a profession. This has taken practical form in Tennessee's licensing law for psychologists, passed in 1954, which means that psychologists are now licensed under the same laws as men of the medical profession.

Elizabeth Rodgers 1955 Campus Maid of Cotton

"Cotton is a magic word," declared Elizabeth Rodgers in her speech for the Sou'wester Maid of Cotton Contest, held November 18. And indeed it is a magic word for Elizabeth, chosen Southwestern's Maid of Cotton for 1956. The brunette Lynx beauty won the coveted title over eighteen other lovely coeds.

Elizabeth, sponsored by her sorority, Kappa Delta, was interviewed by the four judges the afternoon of the contest, as were the other contestants. In evening dresses that night, they gave three-minute speeches about "Why I Would Like To Be Maid of Cotton" and talked individually with the judges onstage.

Carolyn Caldwell, a member of Chi Omega, and sponsored by Kappa Alpha, was chosen first alternate. A sophomore from Shreveport, Carolyn is on the YWCA cabinet, and is a member of the French Club.

Second alternate is Kappa Alpha Rose, Marymax Williamson of Memphis. Marymax is vice-president of Alpha Omicron Pi and a member of S.T.A.B. Intersorority.

Elizabeth was Junior Queen of Cotton the first year the Cotton Carnival was held after the war. She reigned over the Children's Ball in 1947, the year Hilma Seay was Maid of Cotton. what is professional and scientific psychological knowledge as contrasted with the things some popular writers claim it to be. The association also strives to stimulate psychological research in Tennessee by acting as clearing house on work being done at various research centers.

The Tennessee Convention was held November 18 and 19 at Fiske University. The following subjects were viewed at the three meetings: (1) Teaching of Introductory Psychology; (2) A Survey of Psycho-

logical Research in Tennessee (Topics in this area ranged from "Effects of Radioactivity on Rat Learning" to "Experiments on how Mentally Retarded Children Learn Most Rapidly"); and (3) Interprofessional Cooperation in Mental Hospitals, which involves the participation of psychiatrists, psychiatric nurses, psychiatric social workers, and psychologists.

At next year's state convention, which will be held in Memphis, Dr. Queener will deliver a presidential address.




KD All-Sing Set For December 10

Phyllis Thornburg To Be Presented At Faculty Recital

Southwestern at Memphis will present, as part of its series of faculty recitals, Miss Phyllis Thornburg, 'cellist, on Tuesday evening, December 6th, at eight-thirty. The concert will be given at Bohlman Hall, 1822 Overton Park Avenue, and is open to the public without charge. Miss Jane Meriwether, another faculty member, will be co-artist in two program numbers and accompanist in the others.

For her program, Miss Thornburg has chosen an early eighteenth century sonata by the Englishman, Henry Eccles, who lived from 1676-1742, and a contemporary twentieth century sonata by Dmitri Shostakovich. After intermission, she will present Beethoven's Variations on a theme from Mozart's Magic Flute, and will close by playing an Adagio and Allegro by Robert Schumann.

Miss Thornburg is a graduate of Drake University and has subsequently studied 'cello with Mischa Schneider of the Budapest Quartet, and with Raymond Stuhl at the University of Kansas, where she is a candidate for Graduate degree.



Lynx Total 2987 Yards For Season

Averaging 373 yards total offense per game, the 1955 Lynx football team is almost certain to be among the top ten teams in the country in total offense. This includes both small-college and major college teams.

The Lynx finished the season with a total of 2987 yards gained on 489 plays, while allowing their eight opponents (which included Centre, an undefeated eleven ranking among the first three in total offense) only 1310 yards gained.

Top ground-gainer for the Lynx was quarterback Billy Young, who rolled up an astounding total of 1006 yards both on the ground and through the air. Young scored six touchdowns and completed 40 of 73 passes, 8 for touchdowns, in quarterbacking the Lynx to their most successful season in many years.

In summarizing the effectiveness of the versatile Lynx backfield, it will be noted that four of the backs gained two hundred yards or better during the season. The breakdown shows:

Bob Jackson is the captain and a jump-shot artist. Standing 6'4", he is a three year letterman. Bob is a hustler who plays hard every minute.

Maxwell Returns

John Maxwell is a returning serviceman. Maxwell, who has a fine set shot, will see action at both center and guard. He is 6'4".

Jettie Bowen, Harrison Williamson and Eddie Horton are all up from the freshman squad. Bowen, a guard, is a good playmaker. Another guard is Eddie Horton. He is a real hustler and a good floor man. Williamson's specialties are the set shot and push shot. He is a forward.

The new team members are Joe Boals, Ray Gwin, Danny Logan, "Red" McMillion, and Charles Hammett. From Boals great things are expected. He was a fine high school cager at Memphis Treadwell. Joe has an excellent set shot and is an alert defensive man.

Danny Logan is another hot prospect. He is 6'2" tall and only a freshman. The jump shot is his favorite.

McMillion is small, but fast. He has good reflexes, and is an outstanding floor man. Red never misses an opportunity to drive in for a lay-up.
