Higgason Named '56 Grid Captain

Southwestern's football team has elected Jim Higgason as captain for the 1956 season. Co-captain will be Bill Young. Both boys were named to the Little All-American football team recently, Higgason making the third team and Young receiving Honorable Mention.

The two captains were announced at the football banquet Tuesday night. Coach Rick Mays also announced letter winners for the season. Mays was the recipient of an all-expense paid trip to the Sugar Bowl game on January 2 for he and his wife. The trip was presented him by the Southwestern alumni in recognition of his efforts this season.

Carl Snavelly, head coach at Washington University in St. Louis, was the speaker. Snavelly, who also has coached at the University of North Carolina, which subsidizes its athletes heavily, related the advantages of non-subsidized football.

"That's the way the game should be played," he said. "Football . . . has become a big, involved operation, in which alumni proselyte athletes, presenting them gifts to attend their colleges. Education is too often neglected in bigtime football. Sure, I want my boys to win—but first I want them to get educations."

This international conference will be at Ohio University, Athens, Ohio, from December 27 to January 1.

Westminster Fellowship has selected as their representatives to the conference Chung Sook Pai, Sara Lee Ford, and Billy McLean. John Quinn is being sent as a representative from Evergreen church.

One thousand two hundred fifty overseas students, 1250 American students and 500 leaders will make up the conference.

Freshmen Adopt Own Constitution

"We, the members of the Freshman Class, in order to establish a firm basis upon which the class may function, to define the powers and duties of the class officers, to secure better organization within the class, and to assure ourselves of a fair and consistent policy in class government, do hereby ordain and establish this constitution for the Freshman Class of Southwestern at Memphis."

Third Constitution

Thus begins the newly adopted constitution of the Freshman Class. At their first meeting, the class officers recognized the need of a constitution for the class, and began work on the document which is the third class constitution in the history of Southwestern. The first two were for the Freshman classes in 1948 and 1949.

With the class officers, a student committee of Hal Henderson, Bill Hackleman, Anne Morrison, Lee Gibbs, Michael Lupfer and Elaine Donelson, discussed the class organization as it should be, worked out the problems, and with the help of the two constitutions on file in the Student Council office, formulated the work that was presented to the Freshman class last Saturday and was adopted as the official class constitution.

Council Formed

A new feature provided for in the constitution is the Freshman Class Council which has as its purpose "To originate and direct the activities of the Freshman Class, to act in behalf of the class, promote legislation for the class, and in every way possible to execute the will of the class." The members of this council are all the class officers and elected representatives, but all Freshmen have the privilege to and are invited to attend the council meetings.

Though the council carries on many of the affairs of the class, the "supreme legislative power" belongs to "the assembled Freshman Class." The president has veto powers, but the class maintains its paramouncy as it may override this power by a two-thirds majority vote of the entire class.

KS Plans Founders' Day

The Mothers' Club of Kappa Sigma Fraternity will honor the members, pledges, and their dates with a Christmas party and Founders' Day celebration Thursday, December 15, from six to eight o'clock at the fraternity lodge. A supper of turkey and all the trimmings will be served.

A National Scholarship Award has been won by a member of the fraternity and will be presented at the party. Jim Eikner, president, will make the presentation.

ODK is a national leadership fraternity which recognizes outstanding men in the junior and senior classes. Membership is based on achievement in one or more of the six phases of campus life: scholarship, athletics, religious

Last Sunday, the carolers showed up in local hospitals as among the first of the season's choral groups. They visited the Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat Hospital and the Baptist Hospital. Afterwards they proceeded to Southwestern faculty homes; the afternoon was highlighted by a visit to the home of President Emeritus Charles Diehl where the carolers sang some of his favorite songs.

This is the second year the carolers have formed a group representing Southwestern.

Pianist Lois Maer Presents Concert On Tuesday Night

Continuing its series of faculty recitals, the Music Department of Southwestern at Memphis will present Miss Lois Maer, pianist, on Tuesday evening, December 13th, at 8:30 at Bohlmann Hall, 1822 Overton Park Avenue. The concert is open to the public without charge.

Miss Maer has chosen a demanding program made up of familiar masterpieces and interesting works which are less familiar. Among the former are the great Chromatic Fantasy and Fugue by Bach with which the recital is to begin; the Sonata Opus 22 by Robert Schumann, which is being played in commemoration of the centennial of its composer's death; and a Nocturne and Scherzo by Chopin. Not so often performed are the Variations on an original theme, the Opus 21 of Johanne Brahms.

Quite new to Memphis is a work by the Swiss Arthur Honegger, Prelude, Arioso and Fughetta on the notes which represent the name B A C H. We must remember that in German B means B flat and H means B natural. It is a pure coincidence that news of the unexpected death of Honegger was printed in the Memphis papers of November 28th. He was one of the great among 20th century composers.

Ceylon University Offers Fellowships

The University of Ceylon, Peradeniya, offers two fellowships to American graduate students for the 1956-57 academic year, it was announced recently by Kenneth Holland, President of the Institute of International Education.

Awards cover room, board and tuition. Grantees should have funds to pay their own travel and incidental expenses, although their applications will be considered for Fulbright travel and supplementary maintenance grants.

Closing date for applications is December 15, 1955.

The Ceylon fellowships offer Americans an opportunity to study a variety of subjects: sociology; the economics, geography and history of Ceylon; Pali, the language of the early Buddhist Scriptures, and Buddhist Doctrines, history, art and architecture; Indian philosophy and history; and Indo-Aryan linguistics. All lectures, except a few in oriental languages, are given in English. For field work in the villages some knowledge of Sinhalese or Tamil is required.

Unmarried candidates under 35 years of age are preferred. Other eligibility requirements are: United States citizenship; good academic record (and good professional record if the applicant is not a recent graduate); good moral character, personality and adaptability; broad knowledge of the culture of the U.S.; and good health.

Candidates should apply to the United States Student Department of the Institute of International Education.

Portraying a typical, terrible, teenager, he wears a black leather jacket, black leather boots, black leather holsters, and rides a black leather horse. Generally speaking, he gives everybody a pretty rough time. This show is in technicolor though, and is a top-flight western.

Promising Newcomers?

For all of you who are going to dig the Peabody this Saturday night, please note that George Rank and his band are playing there. From what everyone is saying, including Richard, the headwaiter, George is "real George," and has a fine band.

As usual, the Ritz has imported a couple of foreign-type films; GREEN MAGIC, which is pretty thrilling, is one of them. A gentleman named Fernandel stars in THE LITTLE WORLD OF DON CAMILLO. You may enjoy this second movie. Playing at the Warner is the same show that was there last week and the week before that, featuring the same characters. It's about a rebel.

Last but not least is A LAWLESS STREET at the Malco. Randolph Scott really gets with it as a rootin', tootin', gun-toting sheriff. Hi-ho Silver!

And so, in winding up this here now column, here's wishing you the best in your caperings around, about, and ON THE-TOWN.



