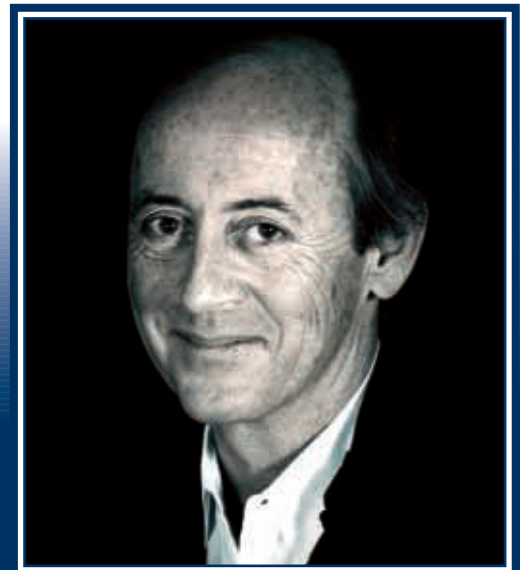

Billy Collins is an American phenomenon. No poet since Robert Frost has managed to combine high critical acclaim with such broad popular appeal. The poems themselves best explain this phenomenon. The typical Collins poem opens on a clear and hospitable note but soon takes an unexpected turn. No wonder Billy Collins sees his poetry as “a form of travel writing” and considers humor “a door into the serious.” Mr. Collins is a Distinguished Professor of English at Lehman College, City University of New York. In June 2001, he was appointed United States Poet Laureate (2001-2003). In January 2004, Mr. Collins was named New York State Poet Laureate 2004-06.
