## The Boosters Club



THE BOOSTERS CLUB is synonomous with student government at Southwestern, and is a democratic organization whose membership consists of the entire student body. All matters to be passed on by the student body are brought before the Boosters Club, and each member of the student body is entitled to one vote.

The formation of the Student Council, which at the time of this writing has just been announced, represents the latest addition to the system. It is the function of this Council to consider all matters of importance and to pass on their worth before these are formally presented to the Boosters Club.

The 1927 Boosters Club has been extremely active, and it is responsible for the election to such honors as the most popular girls, the best all around athlete, the best students, the biggest liars, and the like. Many of these elections are recorded in the feature section of The Lynx.

Interest in athletics has been greatly magnified by regular Boosters meetings in which the cheer leaders have taken the leading part.

At the opening of the second semester of this year, the Boosters Club voted to various causes a sum amounting to approximately $\$ 900$. This was fairly equally distributed among such causes as Girls' Athletics, The Lynx, Insurance Fund, Campus Fund, and Memorial Fund.

Early this fall the arrival of a new publication, the Journal, called for a new addition to the tuition fees, amounting to $\$ 1.00$ per semester for each member of the Boosters Club.

Ralph McCaskill is due much credit for the successful introduction of the measures mentioned above and for others which cannot be tabulated for the lack of space.

## Season of 1926

X 7 HEN Coach Neely issued the call early in September for "pig-skinners," he was answered by over forty huskies from Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Illinois. The curtain of the greatest football year in the history of Southwestern was about to be raised. Such foes as Birmingham Southern, Vanderbilt, and Ole Miss, were to furnish the meat for the Lynx, and the Cats, realizing the bigness of their task, got down to work. In the three weeks that followed, the foundation for the smoothest working football machine in the history of the college was laid. Farnsworth, as a triple threat man, and Sid Davis as veteran center, along with Arthur Dulin, furnished the ccgs around which this machine was built.

The result was the best football team ever prcduced by Southwestern, and when it is remembered that the team was composed largely of raw recruits, its record is amazing.

A resume of the season is given in the following pages.

$\square$ VERYONE was wondcring what Southwestern 1 football of the season ' 26 would be, when the Lynx met Will Mayfield College from Missouri. The Lynx showed them what they had and easily piled up a 59 to 0 score. The Mayfield Mules showed little of the drive that had characterized them when they held Southwestern to a 6 to 0 score in '25. But the Mules had encountered what was to prove the most superior football aggregation in the history of the College.

The next to fall before the Cats was the heavy and widely feared Birmingham Southern combination. Although Freshman gridsters were ineligible to play in this contest the old men turned the invaders back with the short end of a 16 to 14 score. The Panther's defeat at the hands

of the Lynx upset all predictions, and it immediately became evident that Southwestern had taken a great stride forward in the football world. Dode Farnsworth, with his steady punting and accurate passing, may be remembered as the star of this affray.

Psychologically reinforced by this victory the Lynx Cats next met the "Reddies" of Henderson Brown, and much to the surprise of all critics, went down in defeat to the score of 13 to 0 . The brilliant work of several Reddie stars was partly responsible for the victory of the Arkansans. The failure of the Lynx to function in the machinelike way that had characterized their first two games was also responsible in part for the defeat.

backs for two quarters, and the half ended 6 to 0 for Vandy. The Lack of reinforcements caused the Cat defense to wilt in the second half before the brilliant field running of Spears and Hendrix (Spears has since been unanimously chosen All-Southern quarterback.) The final score of 50 to 0 lowered the curtain on a brilliantly and hard-fought game.

Then came the old story repeated again, but not so emphatically. Again a Southwestern football team was destined to fall before an Ole Miss grid machine. The Lynx allowed the Mississippians to count a score of 26 to 7 in the first half, but came back strong in the second to run

up 20 points in almost as many minutes. The final whistle found the score at 27 to 32 in favor of Ole Miss, with the visitors glad encugh of their eked out victory. Two minutes of play would probably have told a different story, for the game ended with the ball deep in Mississippi territory. Throughout the game the outweighed Lynx fought an up hill fight and gathered momentum as the game progressed. Though they suffered defeat, it was the greatest moral victory of the season.

Bethel was next tackled with the second string men, and though the Bethelites were held scoreless for two quarters, the regulars were forced to come to the rescue. The result was 19 to 7 . Southwestern's consistent gains on line plunges accounted for the win.



The reserves got another opportunity against the Tennessee Teachers and accounted for two touchdowns against the Normalites. The opposition was unable to gain over the Lynx reserves but the Lynx varsity was given the opportunity of ending the affray. Not up to their usual standard the regulars were able to put over only two counters and allowed the Teachers to score over them. The game ended 27 to 6 in favor of the Lynx, and credit for the win should go to the reserves.

The third Arkansas team to be encountered by the Lynx was Hendrix College and the invaders were destined to win, 9 to 0 . Hendrix outweighed Southwestern and was probably the more experienced of the two teams. The Lynx were unable to stem the tide of their consistent gains over the line, and again Southwestern went down in defeat at the hands of an Arkansas eleven.

The steady playing of Sammy Hall is something that will be hard to duplicate. Alexander, who held down the catcher's end of the game for two years is no longer with us.

Nevertheless, Coach Neely, casting about for men to fill these responsible positions has found a plentiful supply of material, and the team is rapidly rounding into shape.

The pitching staff looks good. "Lefty" Carrott, the only southpaw hurler on the squad, showed up well in a practice game recently. Neely also has Lee Rehse and Oscar Hurt, from last year, together with "Deacon" Buchanan, Jack Fite,

## Girls' Basketball

SOUTHWESTERN'S girls', basketball team, like every other undertaking, had to go through its pioneer stage.
In December, 1925, a squad of 15 girls organized a basketball team. At first they were coached by Jess Neely, but his other duties prevented him from giving much of his time to the co-ed basketeers.

In December, 1926, the girls again asked permission to have a basketball team. So the students of the fairer sex staged a rally; and 40 girls responded, yet permission to have a team was withheld from the girls. Finally Mrs. C. L. Townsend, dean of women, came to the girls' rescue and gained the permission from college authorities authorizing the team. Then the co-eds asked Henry Waring, a star athlete at Southwestern to shoulder the responsibility of coaching. "Chi" magnanimously agreed to coach the girls gratis. At the first call for practice, which was in the middle of February, 25 girls reported. Among those who reported were May Howry, Miriam Muehler, "Fritz" Montroy, Elinor Clinton, and Corinne Crenshaw, centers; Frances Crawford, Elizabeth Carnes, Elise Porter, Marguerite Pride, and Ernestine Wiggins, guards; Carolyn Stockley, Effie Lee Ingram, Mildred Rainwater, Amalie Fair, Elizabeth Baker, and Louise Ralston, forwards. Letter players from the previous year who reported were Eleanor Beckham, jumping center and captain; Virginia Smith, guard; Louise Stratmann, forward and business manager.

Since the funds of the co-eds were very limited, again they had to content
 late, they played their first game with the All-Memphis sextet at the Y. W. C. A. on February 25, and were defeated by the score of 32-17.

The next game was with the South Side team, in the Southwestern gym, on March 7. The collegiates won after a hard fight, by the score of 25-20.

Then again on March 12, the co-eds clashed with the St. Agnes team at the Catholic Club court. After a rough and tumble game the Kittens defeated the opposition, score 31-25.

The South Side team sought a return game with the Kittens. And the game was played March 16 at the Y. W. C. A. But the co-eds, handicapped by the small and foreign court, were unable to get good team work until the final quarter, and they went down in defeat, score 31-19.

On March 21, in the tar paper gym, the Kittens met the Y. W. C. A. sextet. This game was one of the most interesting games of the season. First one team shot forward into the lead, and then the other. But the Y. W. C. A. team, with its good co-ordination, succeeded in holding the big end of the score at the end of the game, triumphing over the Kittens, score 26-25. Southwestern was eager for à return match but were unable to arrange it.

On March 23, in the Southwestern gym, the co-eds played the Independents, who downed them by the score $18-8$.
