Henry Frederick Waring


Born, October 26, 1907 : Died, March 30, 1929

ENRY WARING was born in Halifax, Nova Scotia. His death at the Methodist Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., was the result of injuries sustained in a motorcycle wreck.

Prior to entering Southwestern he attended Morton High School, Chicago, Illinois, where he excelled in all branches of athletics. After moving to Memphis, he entered Central High School, where his basketball playing gained him a place on the All-Memphis and All-Tri-States teams.

Upon entrance to Southwestern, he became a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity. His athletic prowess soon brought him to the fore in football, basketball, and baseball. He was elected alternate captain for the 1928 football team, but injuries prevented his playing a single game that year. His death marked the passing of one of Southwestern's greatest athletes.

"Chi" was a faithful friend, a loyal student, a courageous sportsman, and a modest hero.



ENTRANCE TO PALMER HALL






The Coaches



Football Squad, 1928

Ending the 1928 season with an average of .600, winning six and losing four games during the course of the toughest schedule the Lynx have ever had, the football team of 1928 made a most creditable showing in the face of numerous handicaps.

Playing their first season in the S. I. A. A. the Lynx won two and lost two for an even break. One defeat was at the hands of Chattanooga, who ultimately won the championship, and the other was at the hands of West Kentucky, which finished in third place. Ole Miss and the University of Arkansas also handed the Lynx defeats.

Chi Waring, alternate captain with Dode Farnsworth, was unable to participate in a single game, due to sickness the previous summer, which rendered him unfit for active duty.

Next year, with an abundance of excellent material recruited from the freshmen ranks, the team should have a most successful season.

When the letter men and the scrubs gathered last fall for the annual grind they found that their old coach, Jess Neely, had been supplanted by the former assistant coach, Pos Elam, and a new head coach, Neely Mallory, of All-American fame. "Memphis Bill" captained Yale and the mythical All-American, and is rated as the greatest defensive back ever to play football.

KING, TACKLE

Bill and Pos looked over the husky crew that turned out to do football for Southwestern and set about an almost impossible task. To begin it all, Captain-elect Trelawney had quit school. Then, about three weeks before football practice started, Chi Waring, who had been elected joint Captain with Farnsworth to succeed Trelawney, so severely injured himself in a fall that he was unable to participate in a single game during the season.


LIDDON. Tackle

BROWN, End




WALTON, Halfback

The redoubtable King tackled a man behind the Oke Miss goal line for two points.

Turkey Day brought the mammoth University of Arkansas team to town. Were they big! The more subs they sent in the larger they got. It was a good game the first half. In that period they scored only fourteen points, but a long third quarter wrecked what hopes Southwestern had. Bobby Lloyd got a tough break when he caught a pass and was well on the way to a score with no one near when he fainted from exhaustion on the Arkansas 20-vard line.

HAGAN, Guard


This man graduated from the Bobcat ranks two years ago and has been out trying to win a berth on the varsity. He is a hard and steady worker and should make the varsity next year.

DIEHL, Forward




RUSSELL, Guard


Baseball Prospects





TRACK

Last fall Freshman L. B. Long was the winner of the fall tournament, defeating Cromwell in the finals.



Last year, after the spring tournament, silver golf balls were awarded the following men: Beard, Harwood, Mitchiner and Cromwell.



The Team






Honor Council


















THE SELECTION OF THE BEAUTY QUEENS





We have been honest and sincere, and absolutely aboveboard in our election this year and we frankly believe that we have solved the problem of impartially selecting the most popular students for the honor.







