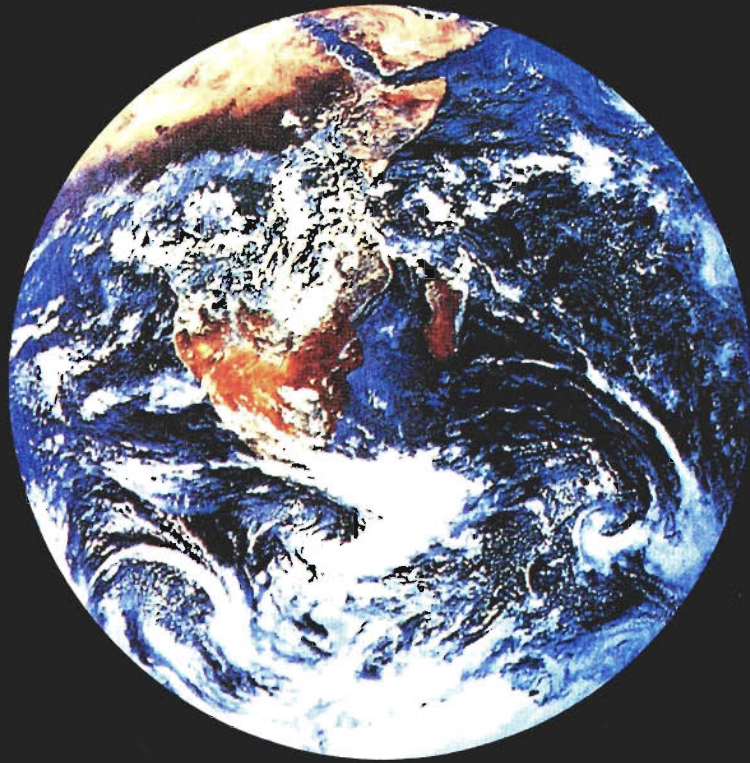

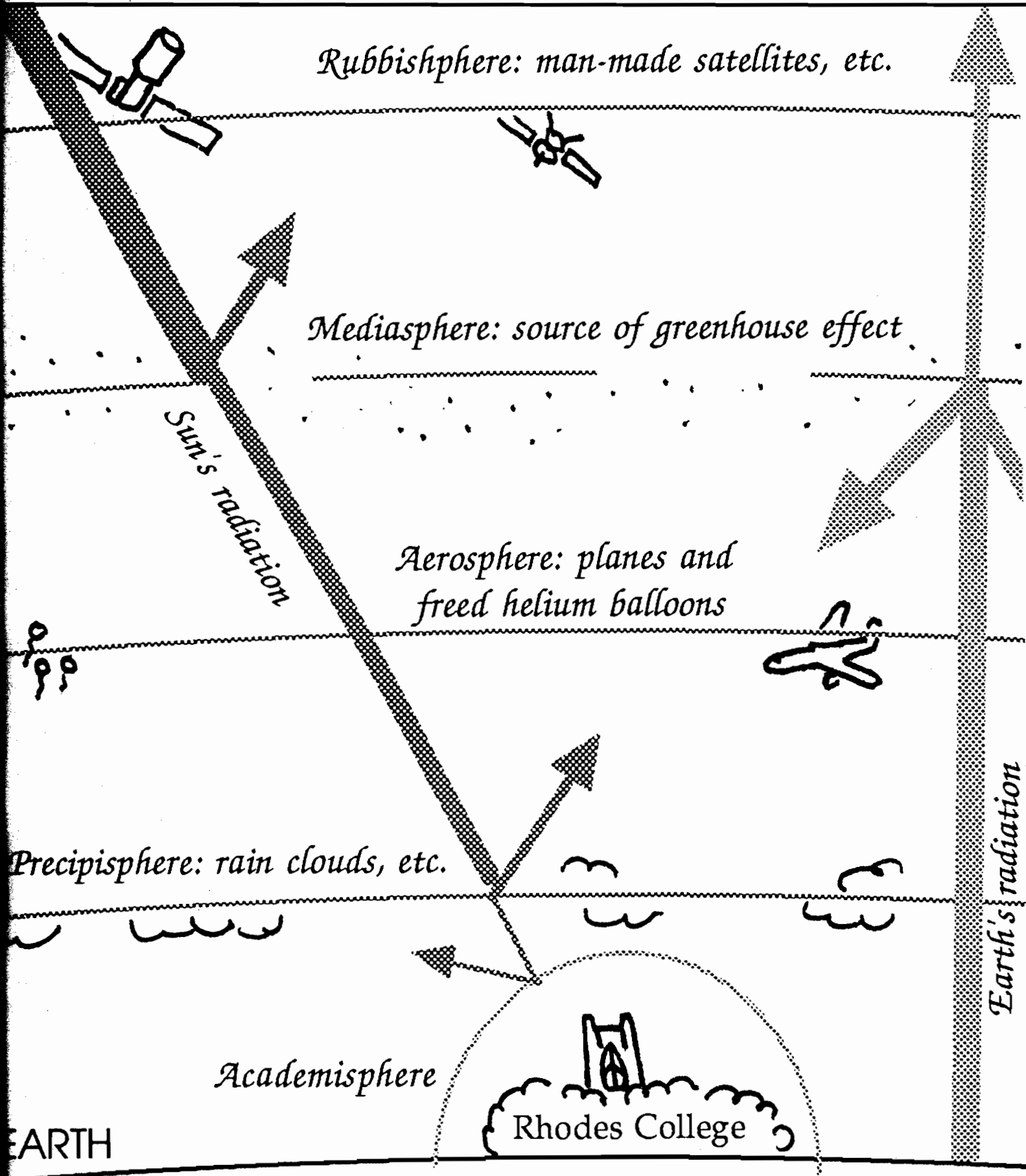

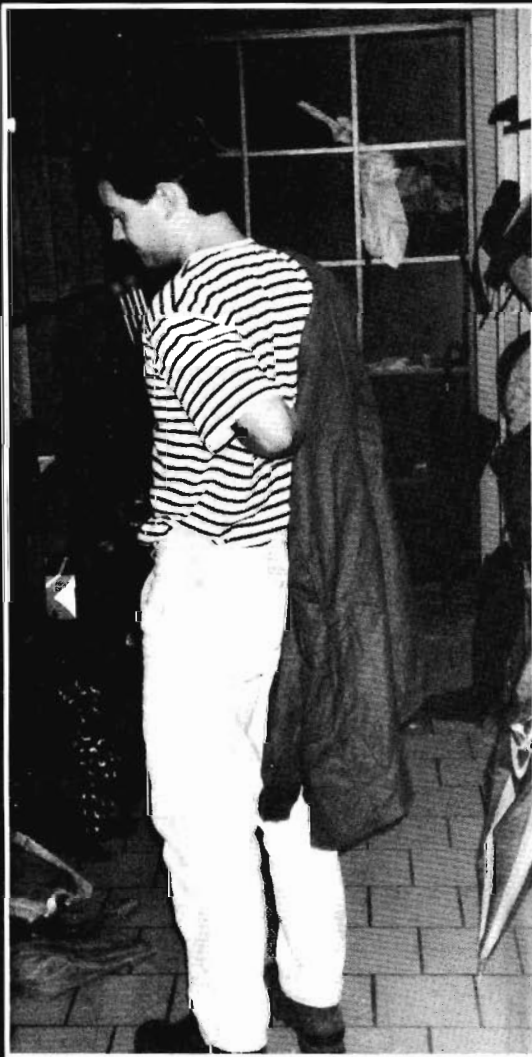

Feeding Frenzy

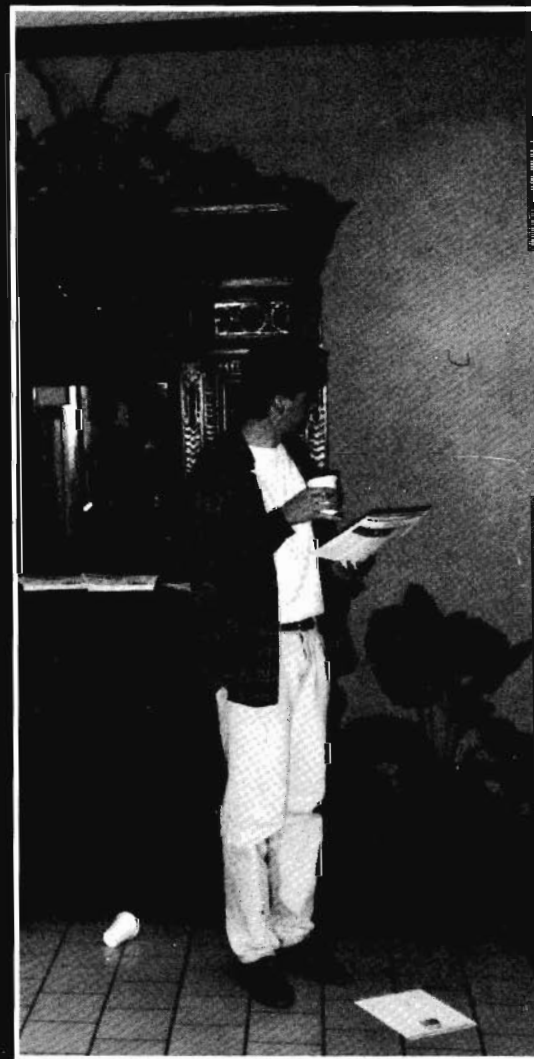

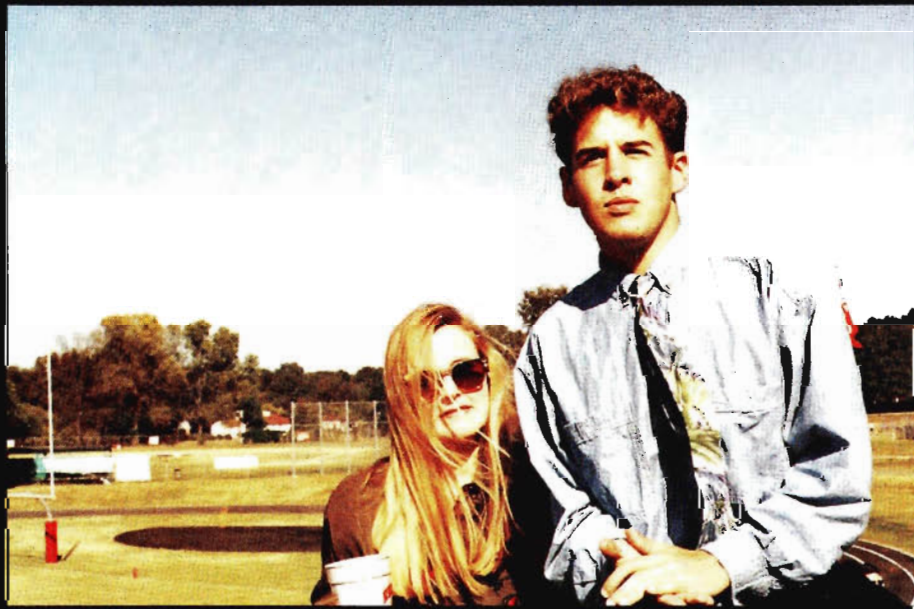

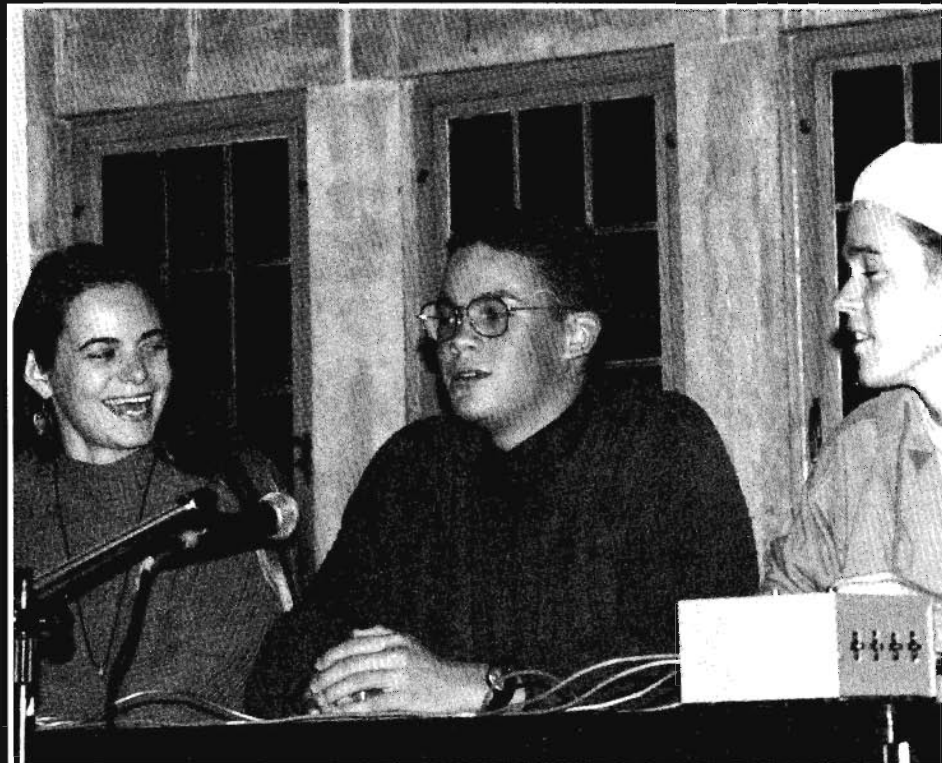

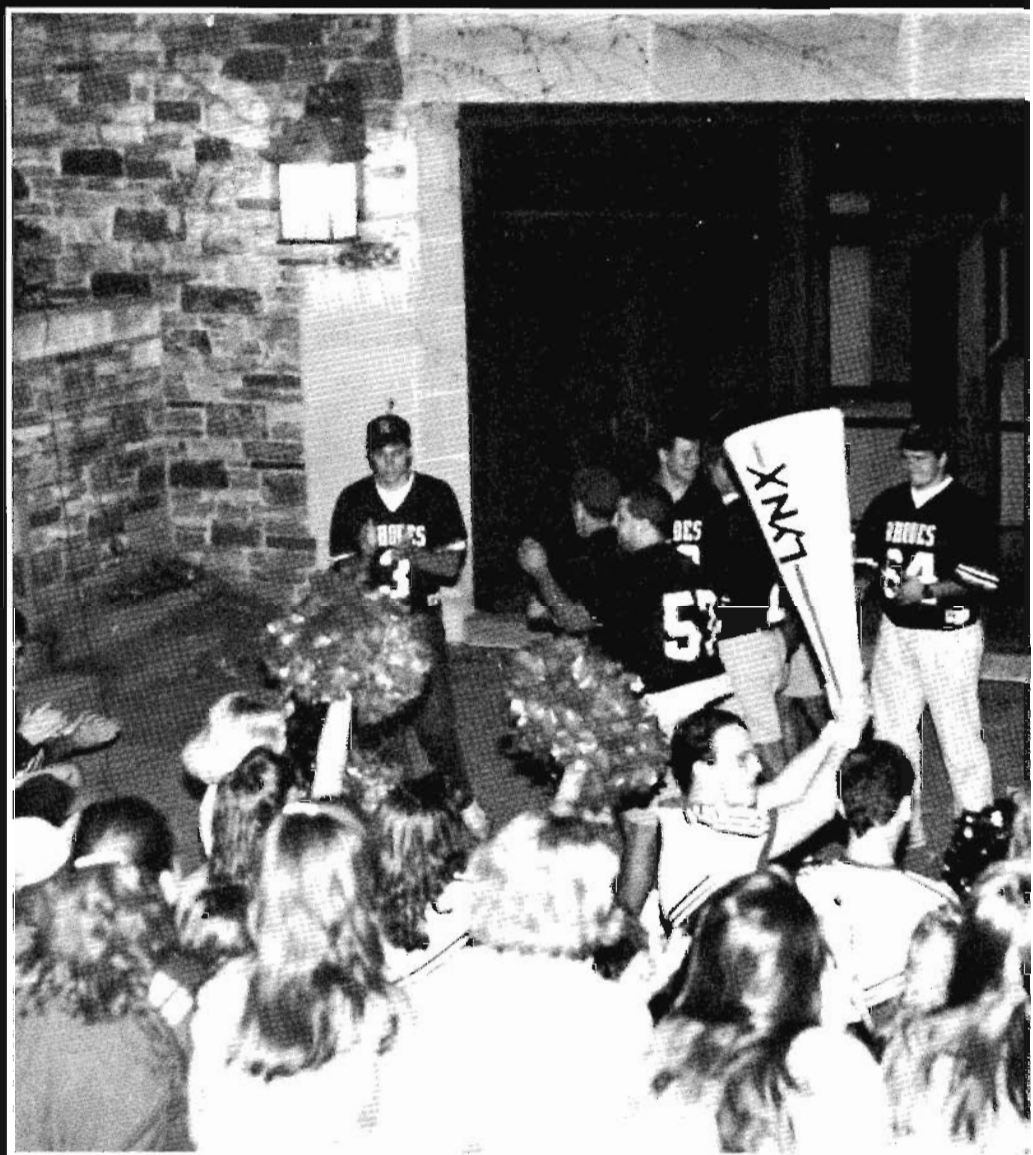

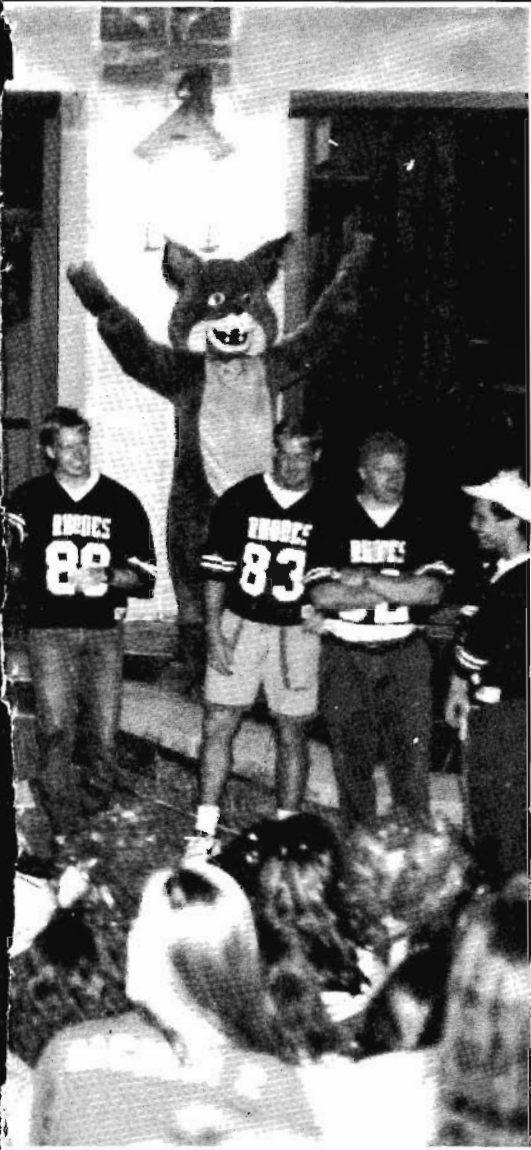

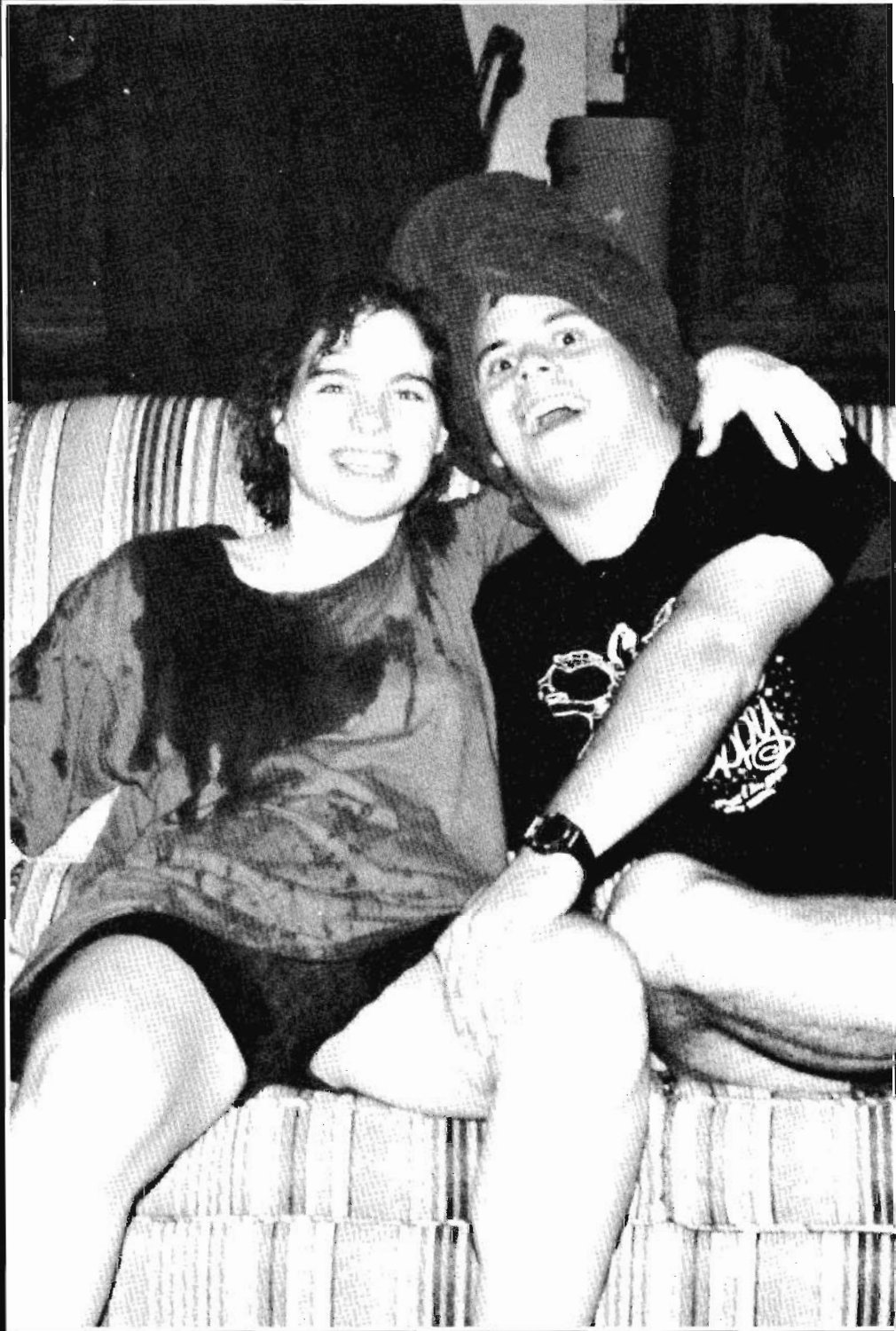

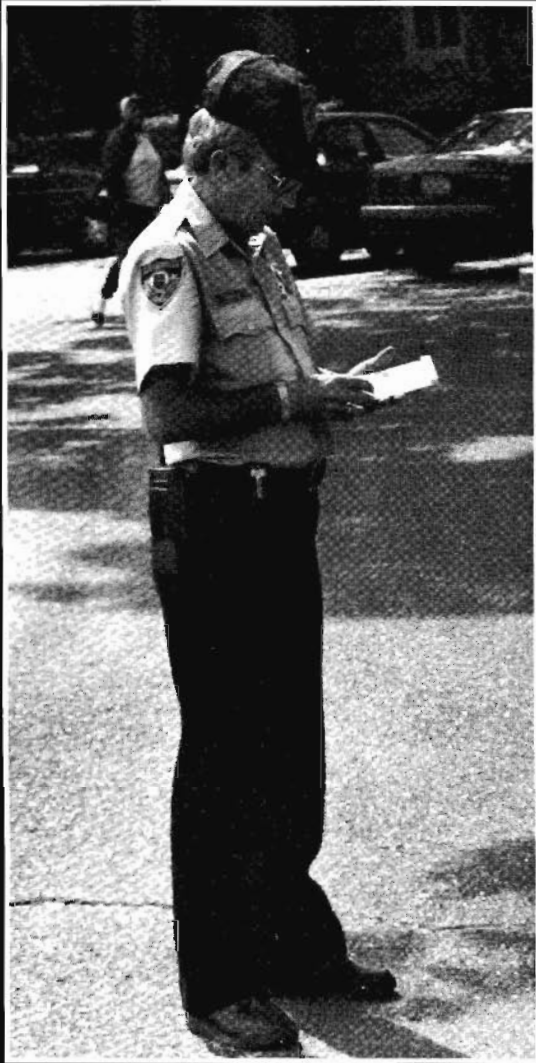

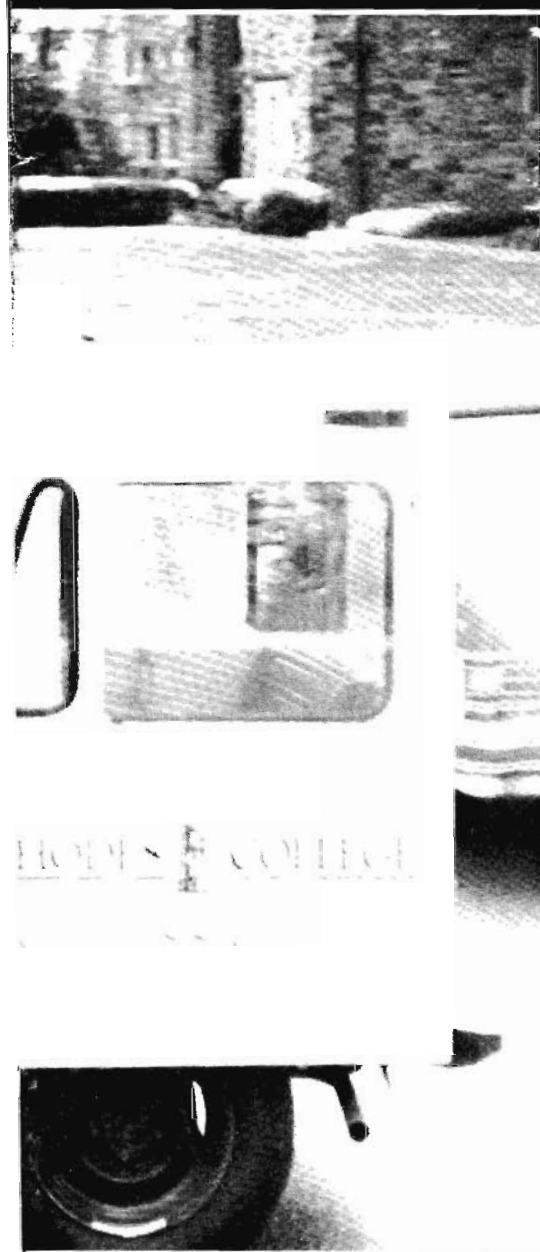

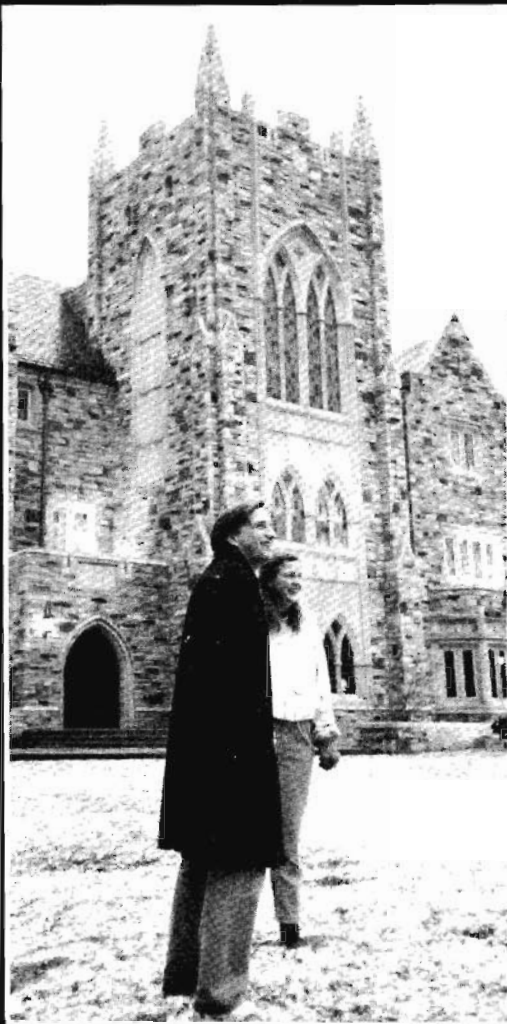

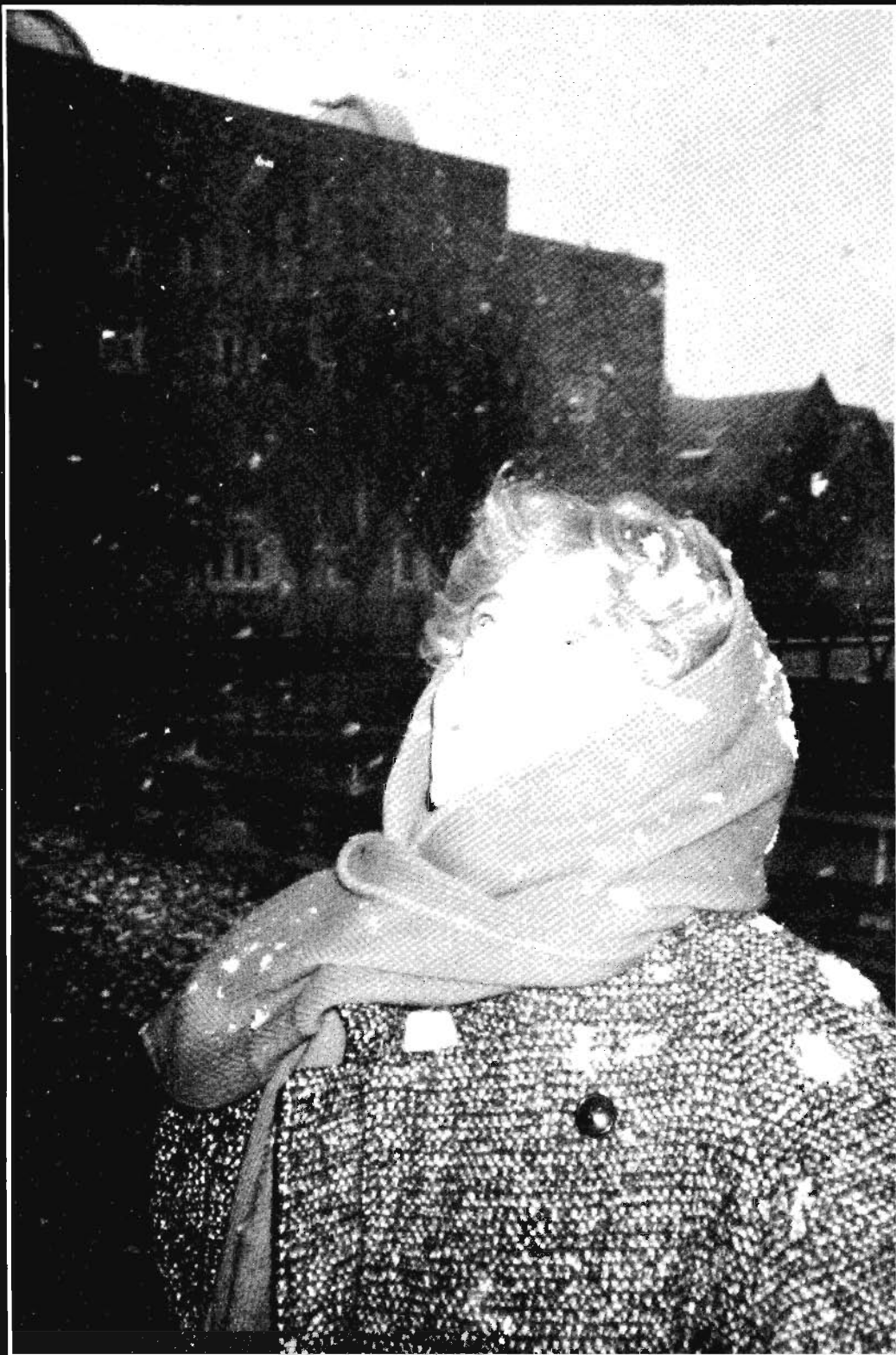

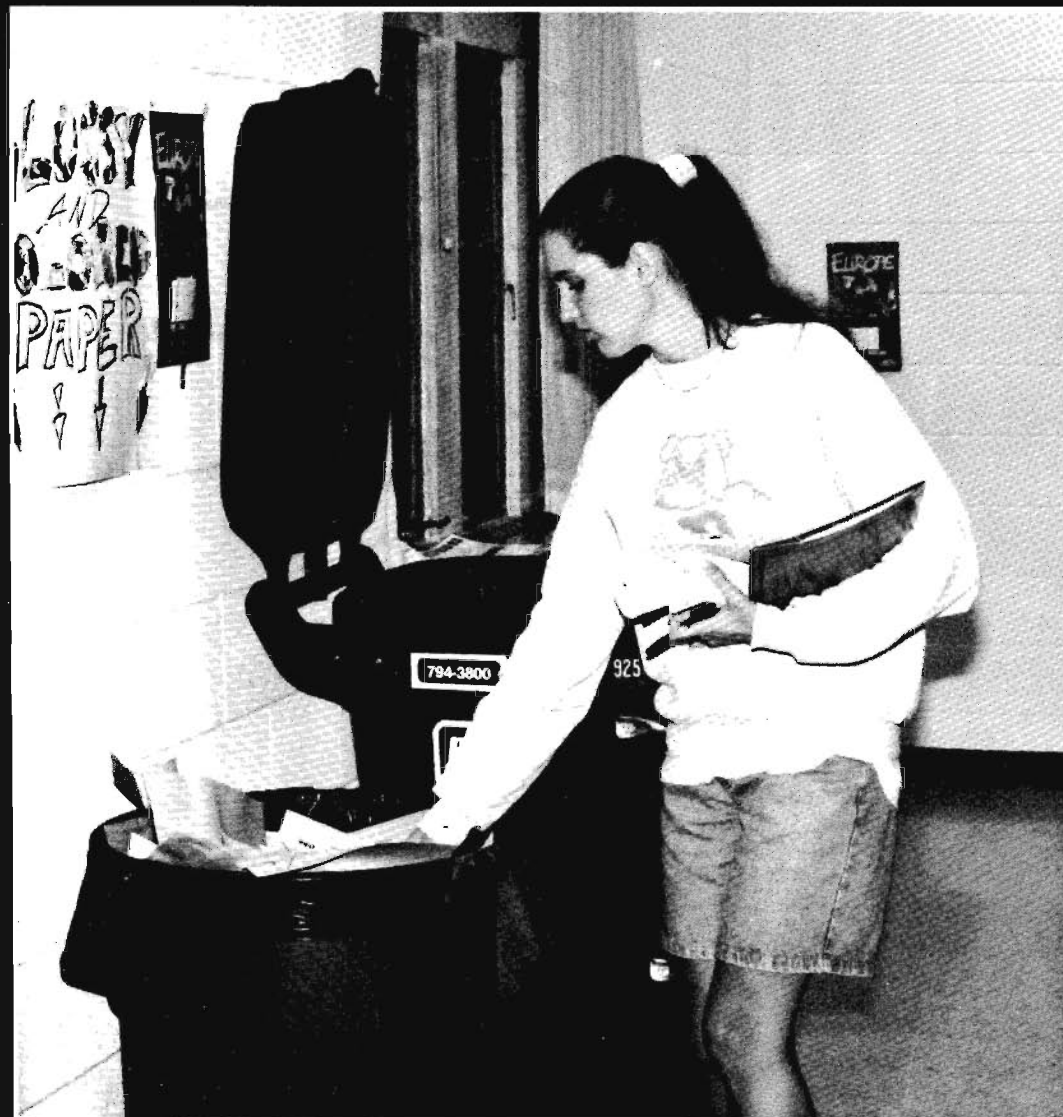

From Outside the Greenhouse

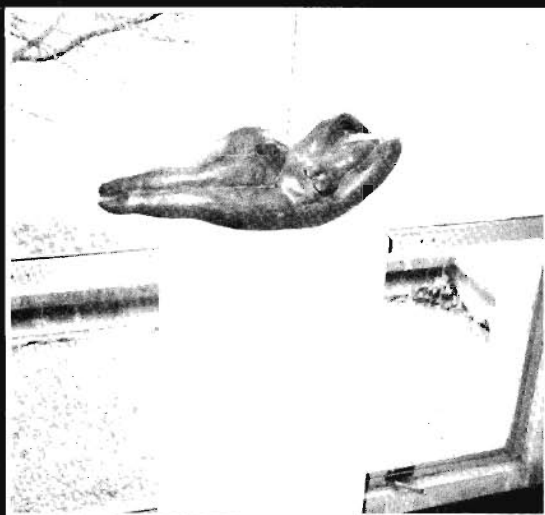

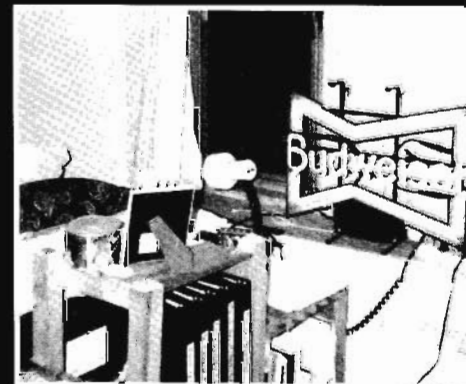
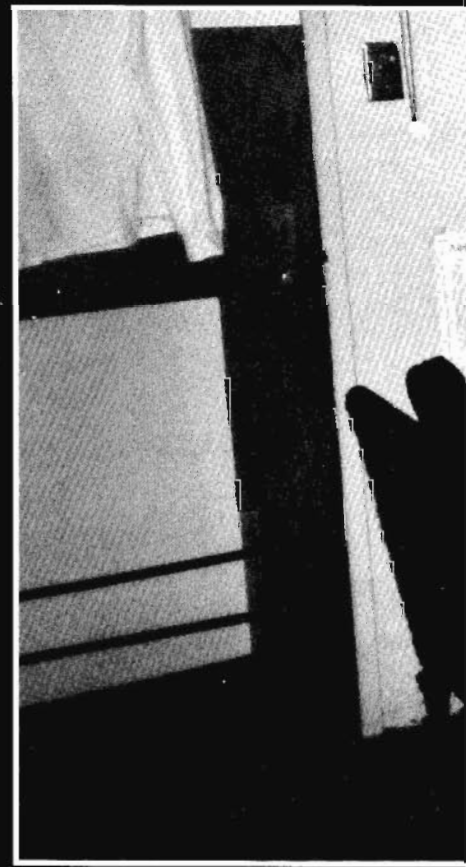

Residence Hall Life: An experience in Communal Living

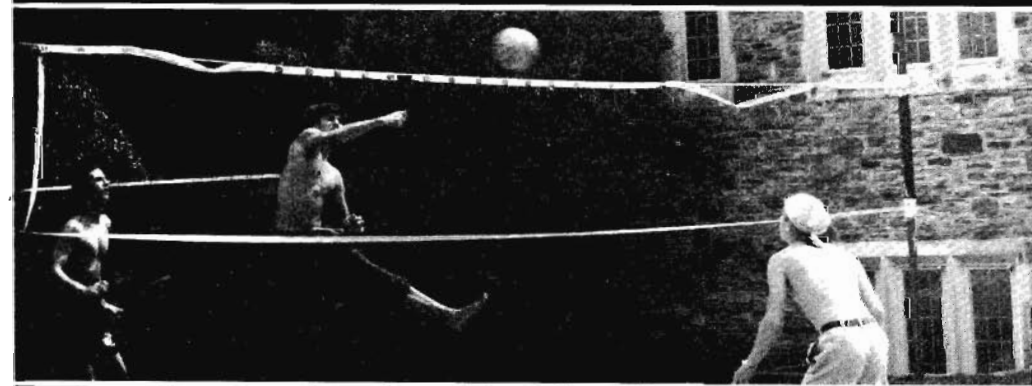

Getting Down to Business

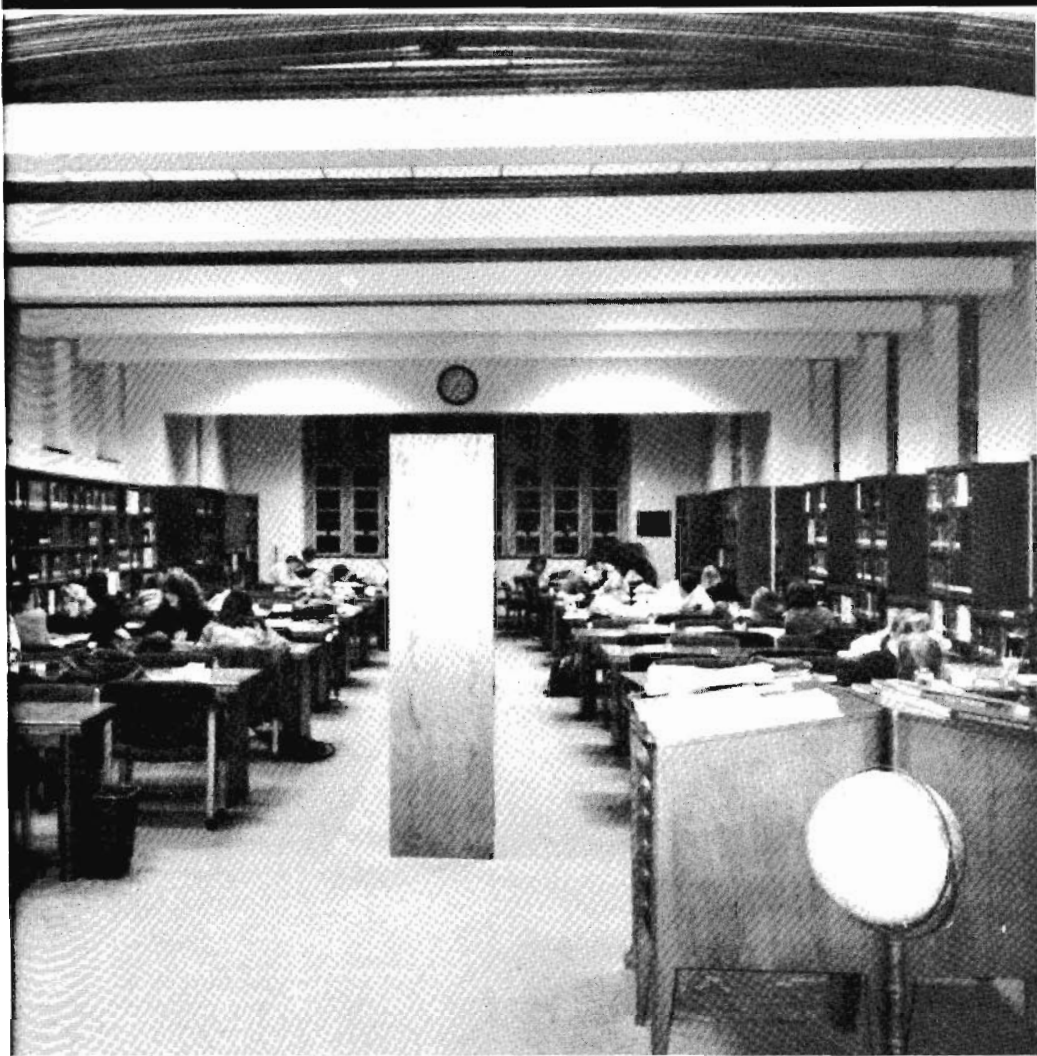

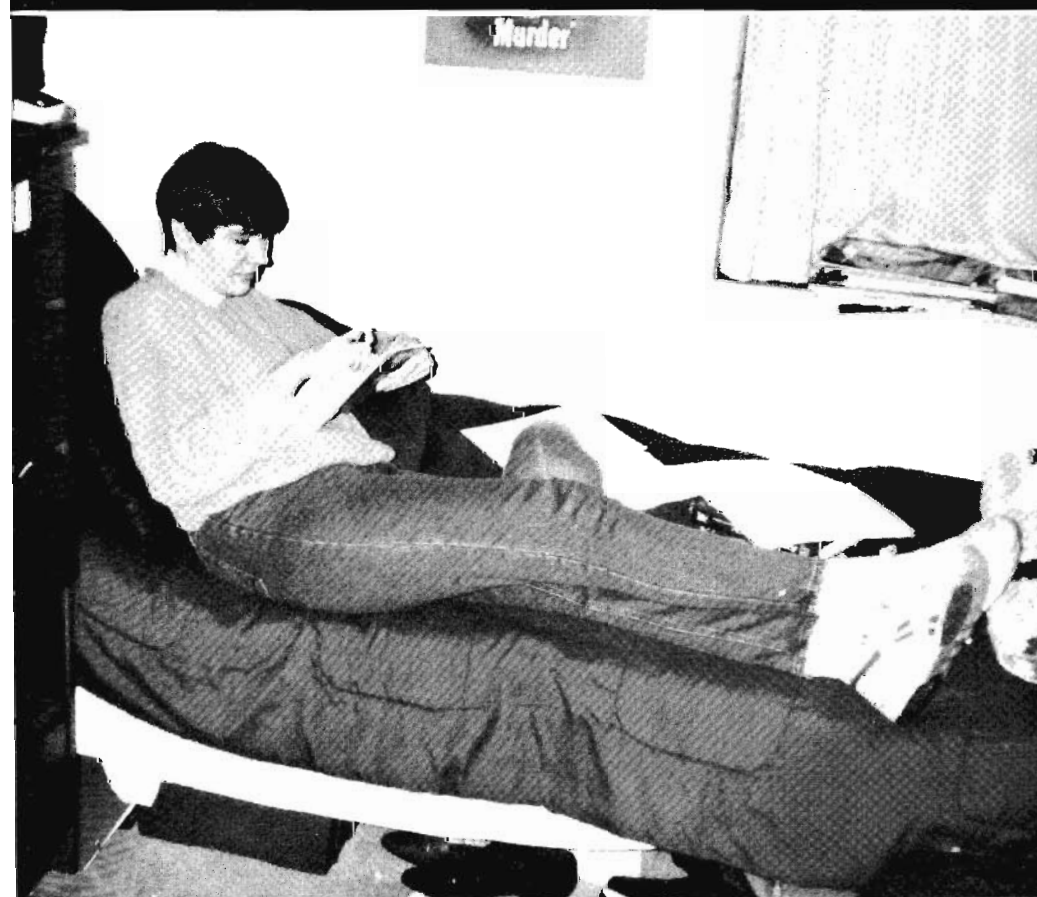

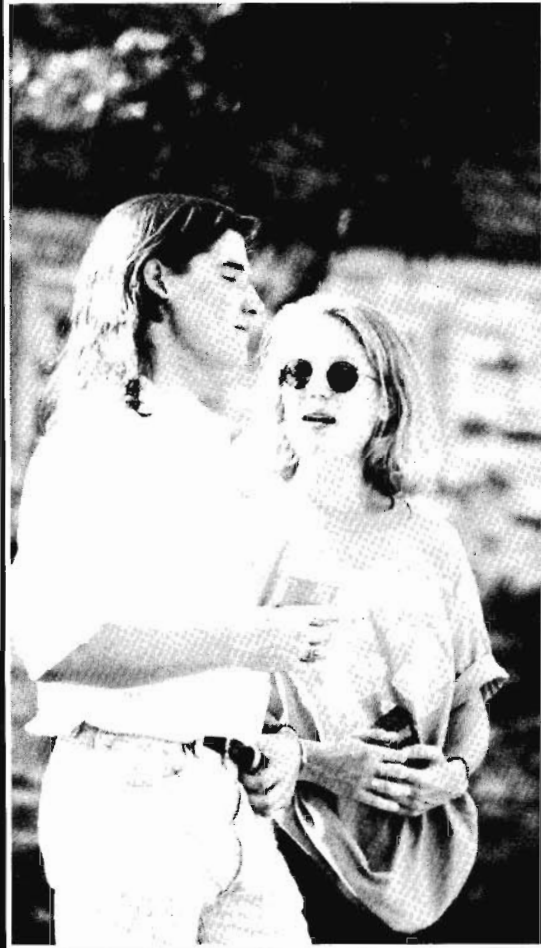

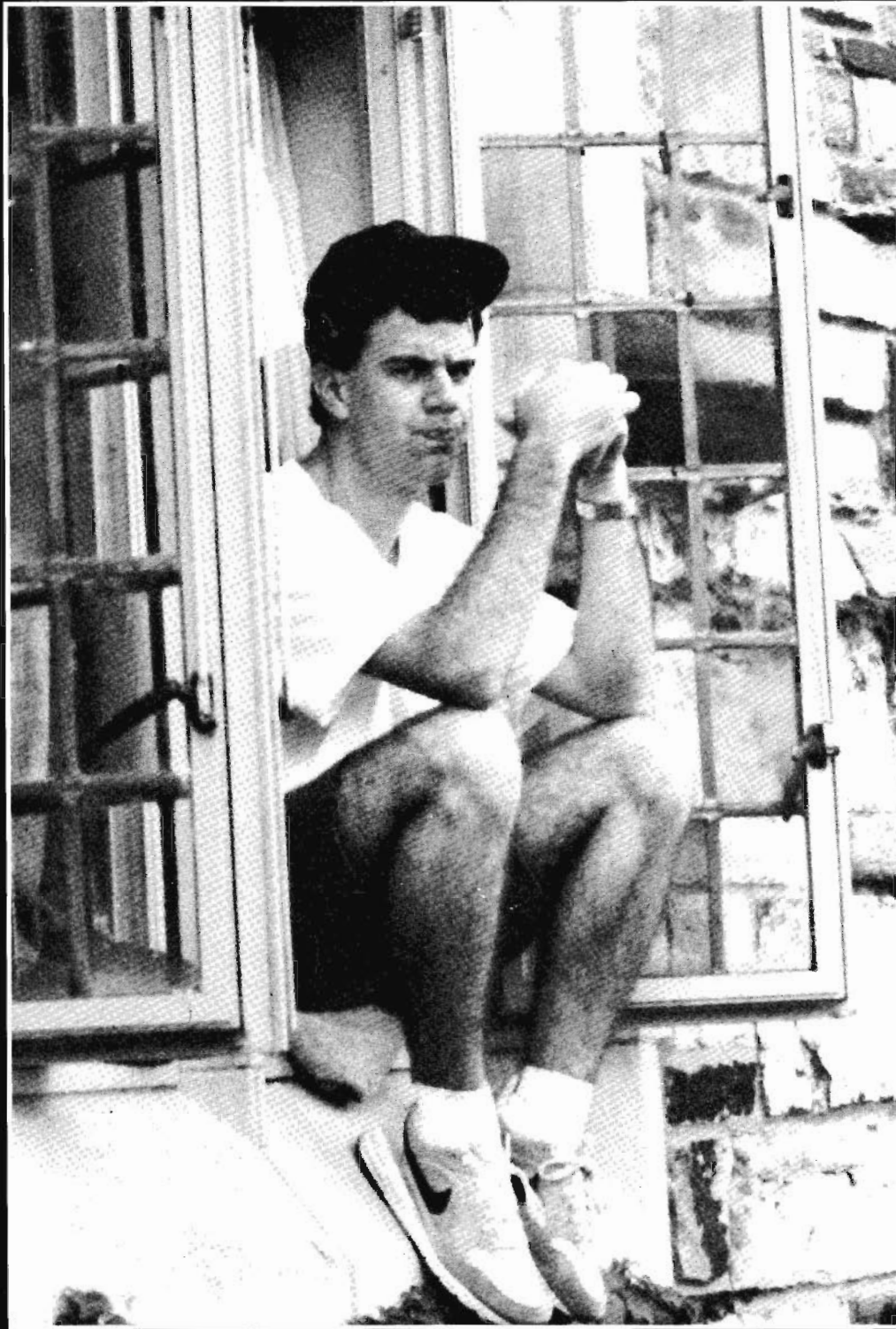

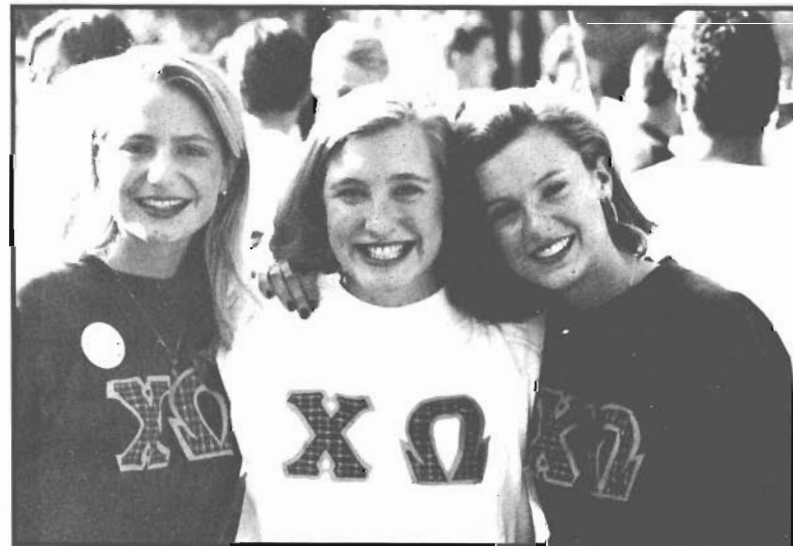

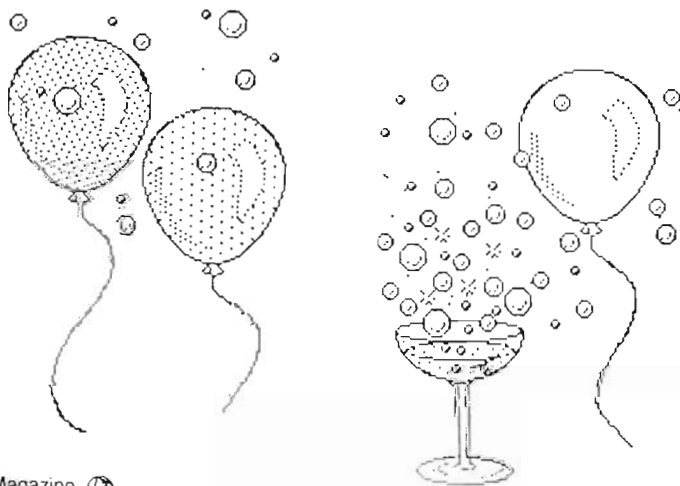

Student: Well,...um...I sat at a desk. It was quite exciting. I watched people open the door; sometimes I even had to get up and let them in myself. It was a great learning experience.

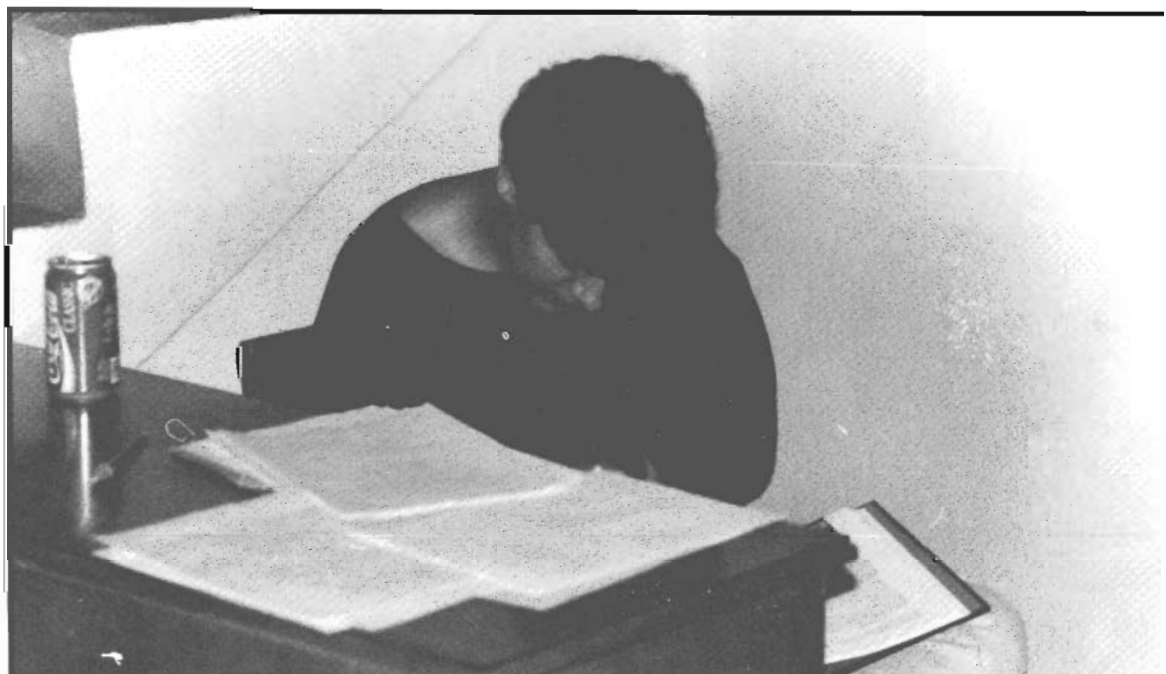

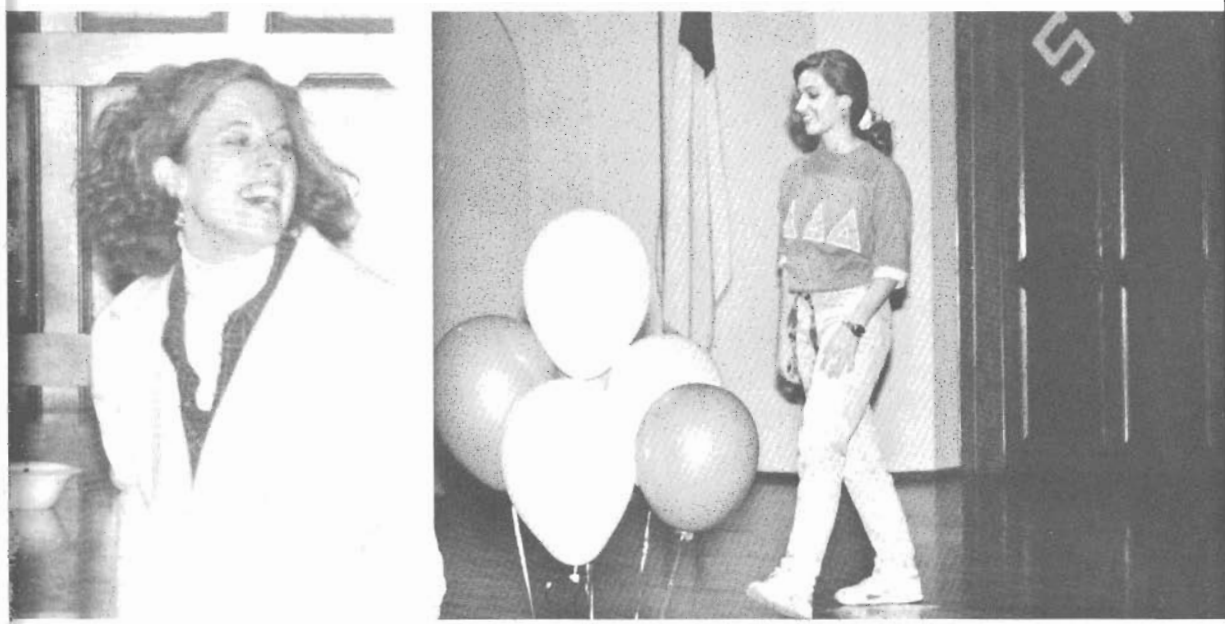
Choice (although sometimes dictated by force) of cars widely varies. There are the bugs, the BMW's, the limos, and the clunkers.

October 1, 1991. The date that will live in infamy. Well, maybe not. But, it was the first time that many breakfast go-ers had their cereal.

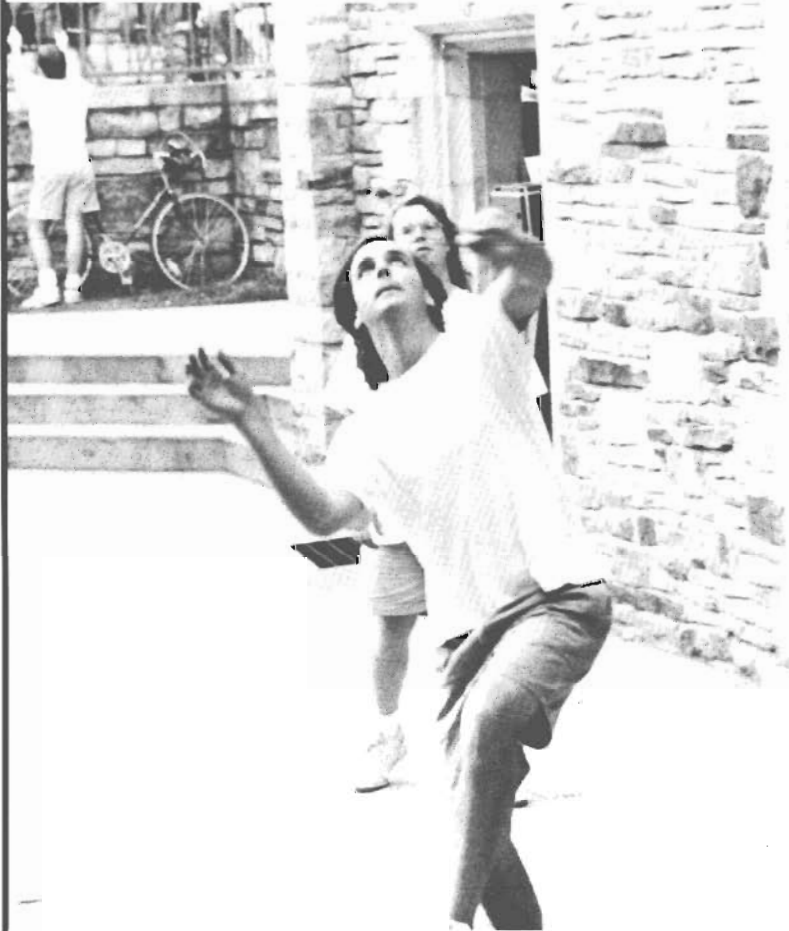

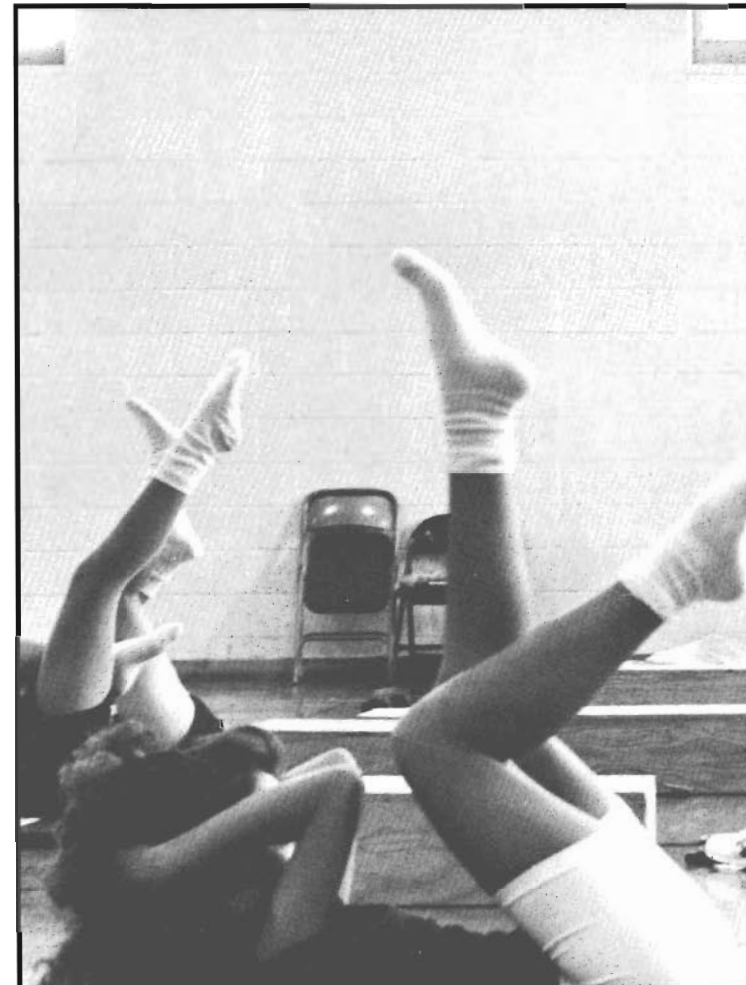
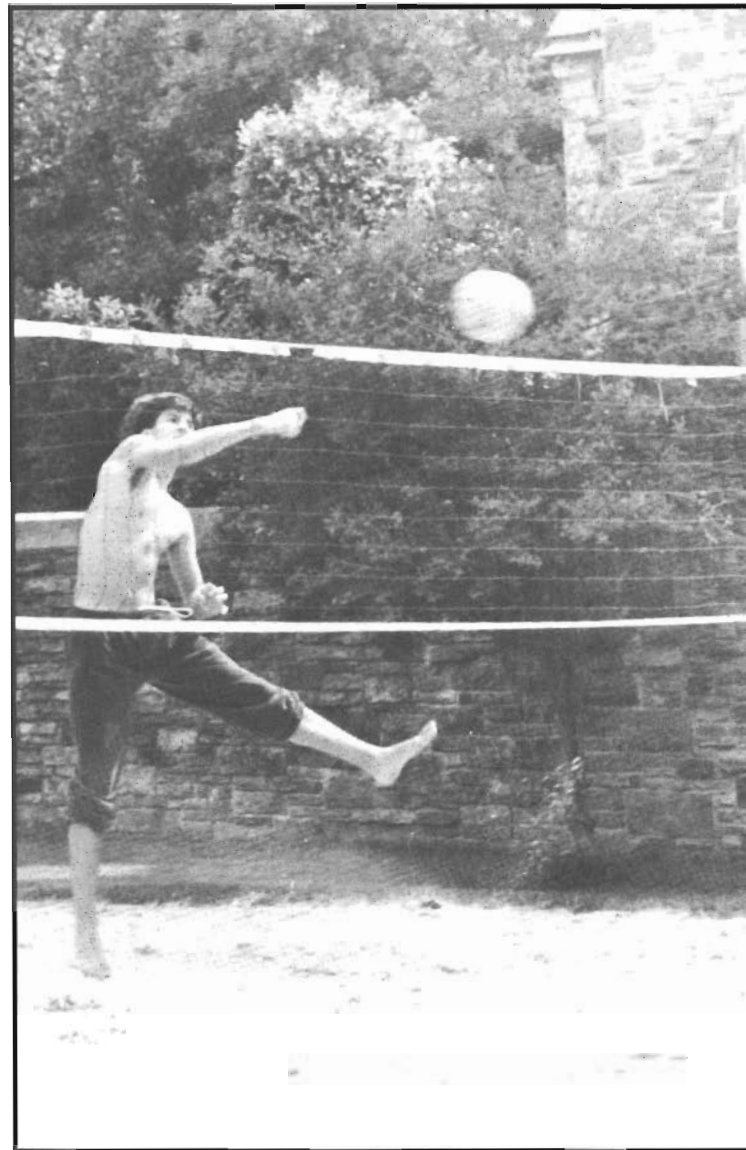

There has been a focus on sex education all over the U.S., and the Rhodesian campus has been no exception.

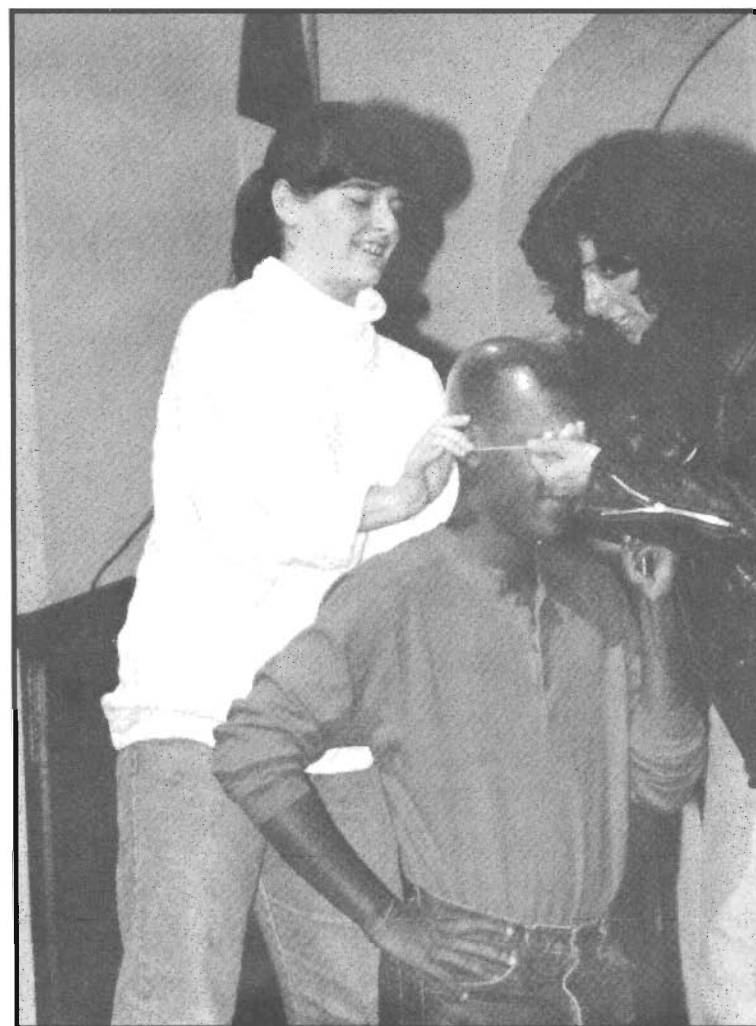
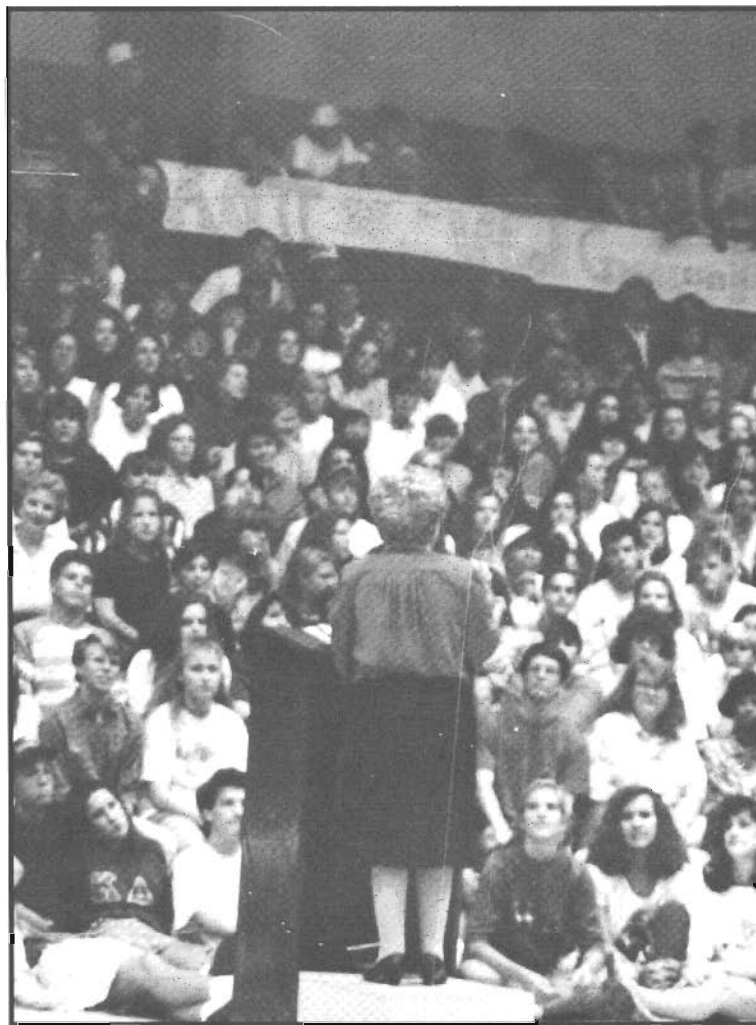
In October, the Rhodes student body was enlightened as Dr. Ruth spread her knowledge of sex. She fielded questions from the audience and made students more sexually aware.

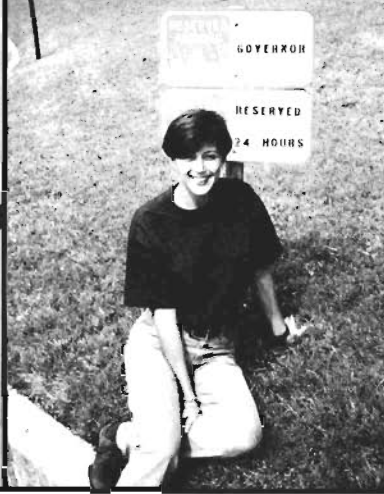


August 28, 1991

Ask Me! Robert Browning and Ben Scott enjoy the fruits of orientating freshmen.



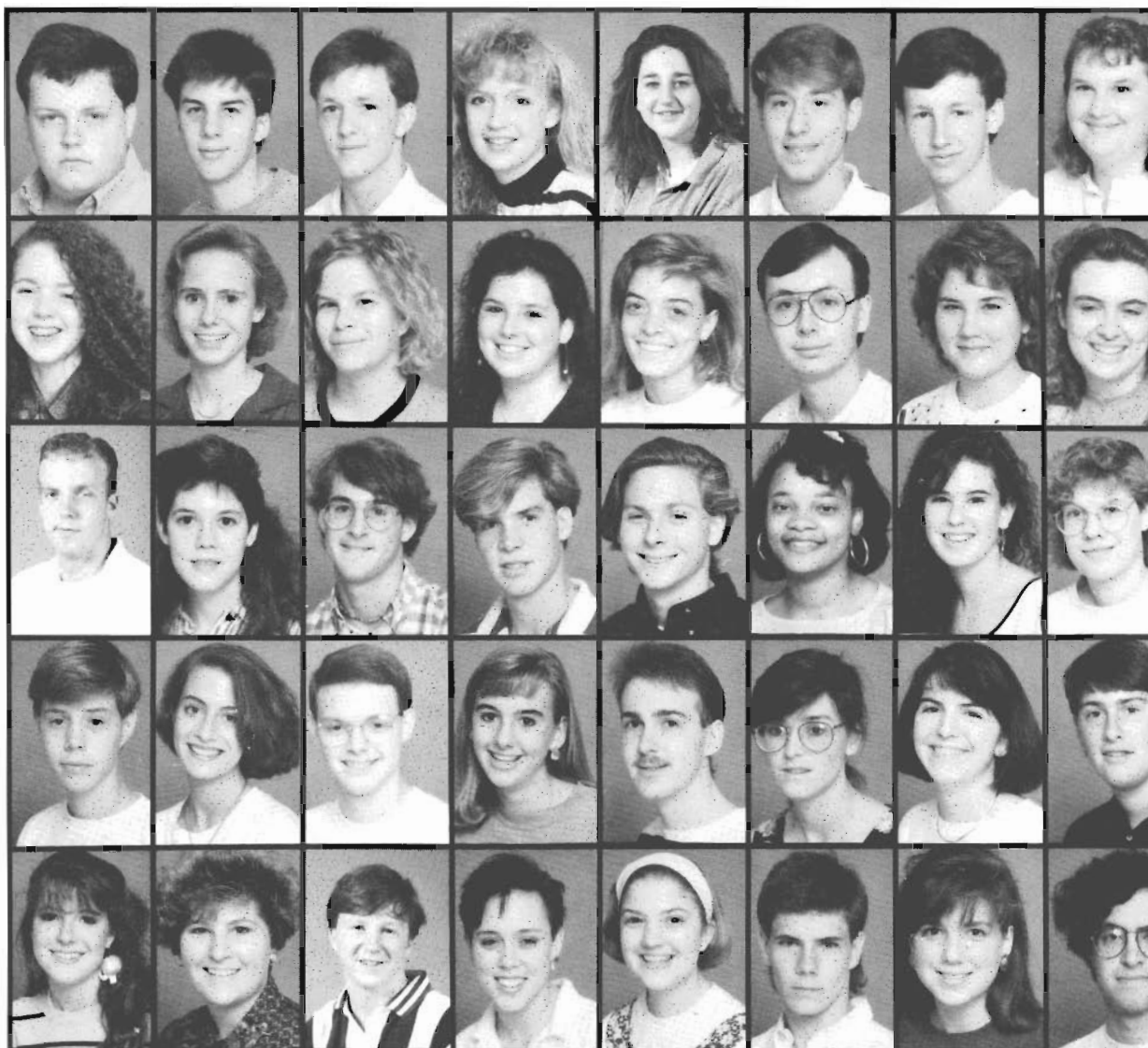

Or better yet-how about the slightly remodeled Bellingrath bathroom that used to be a men's room. But actually that's a whole other story for another day.



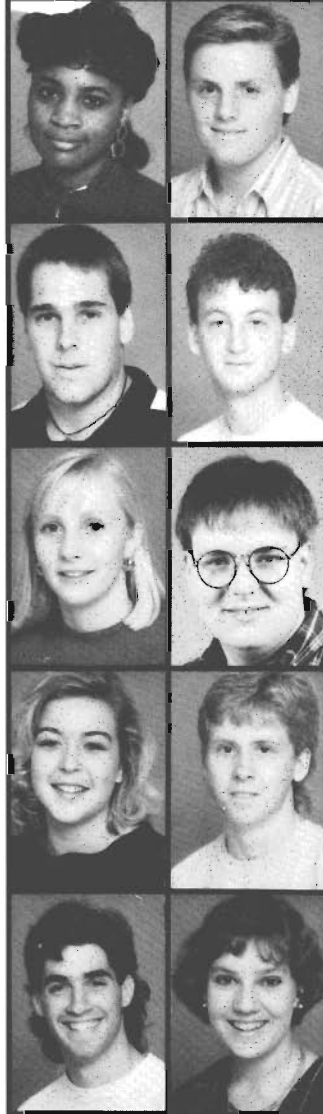

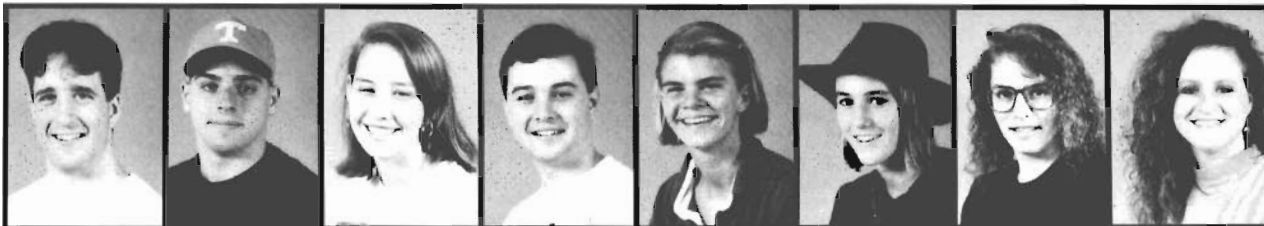
Caught in the Time Warp

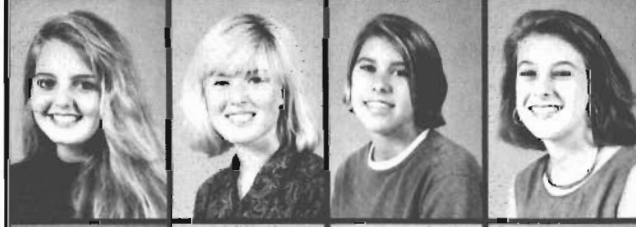

Munch a Bunch of...

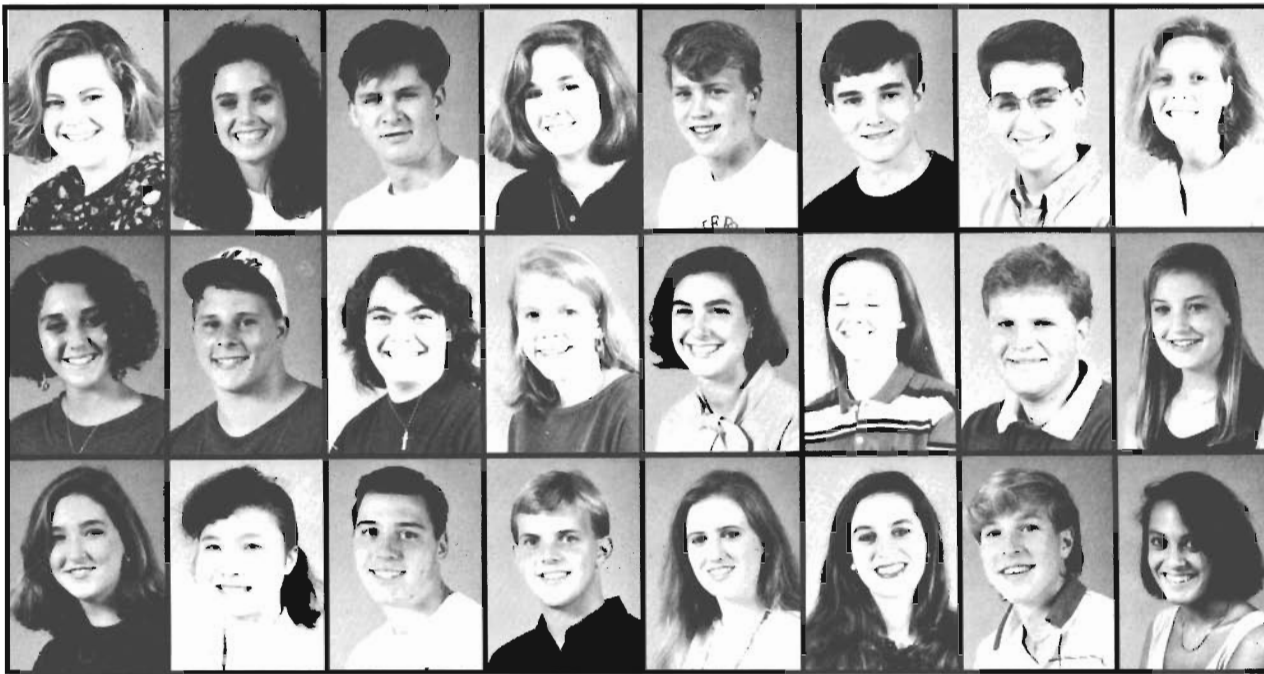

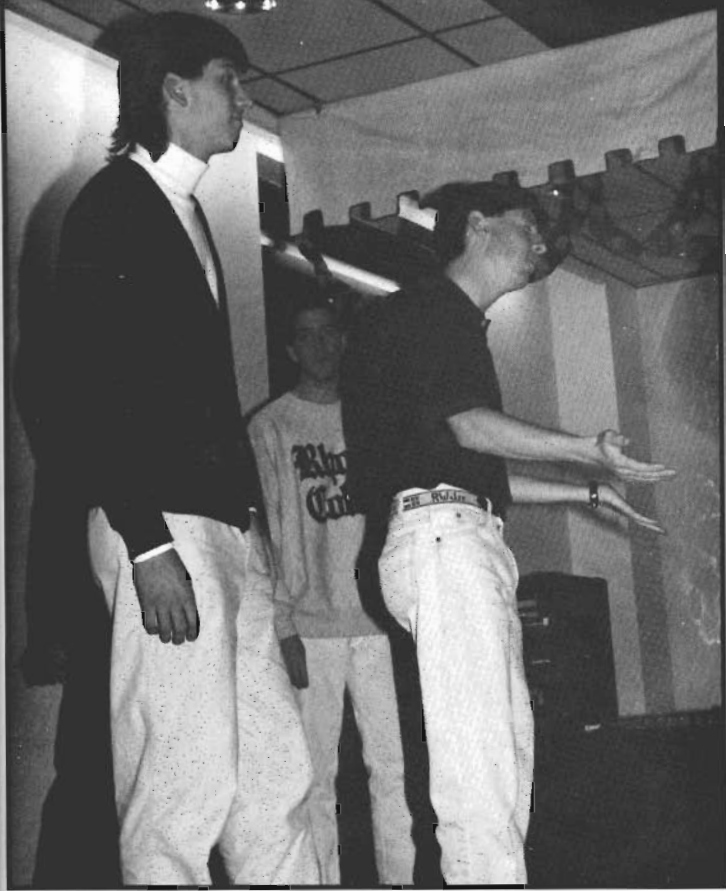

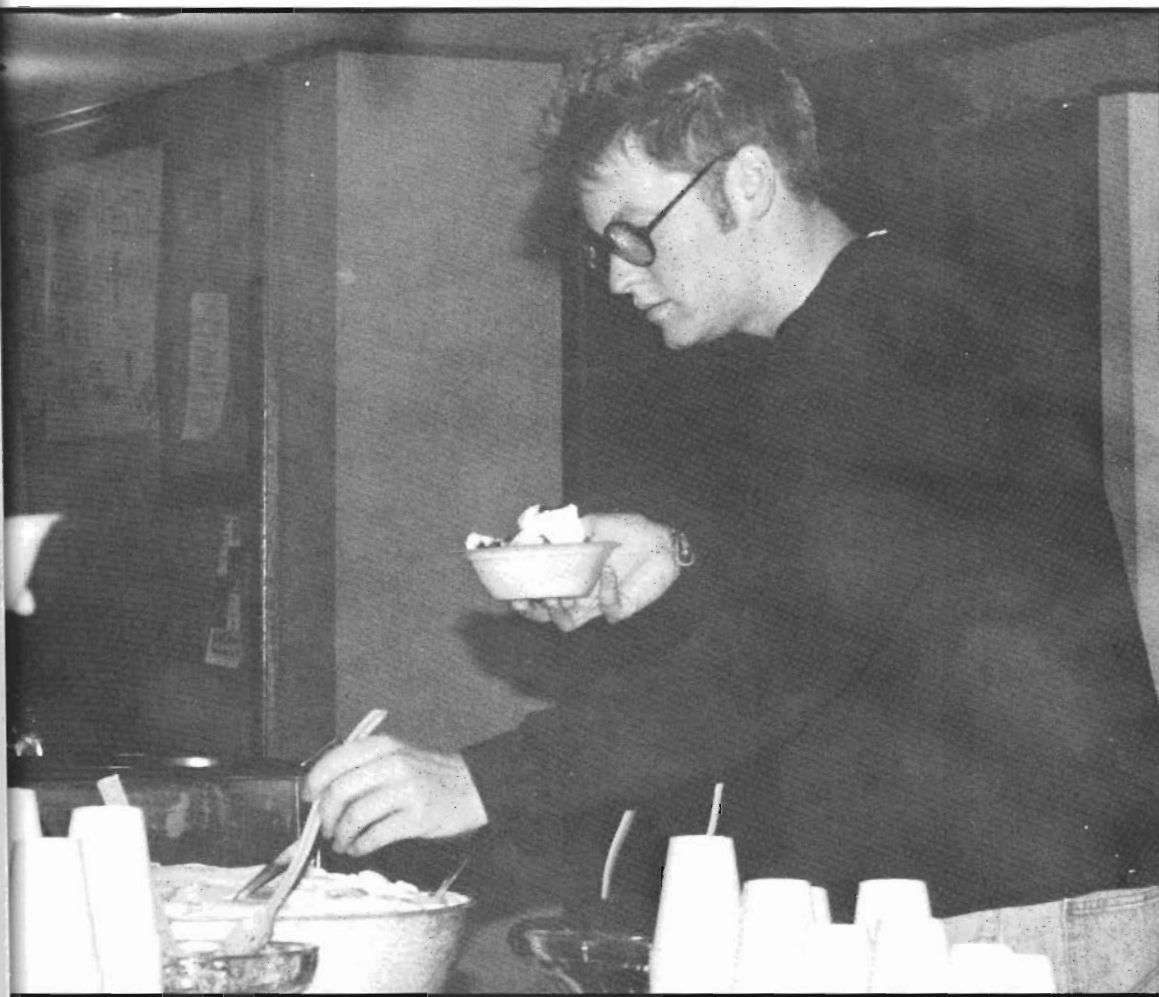

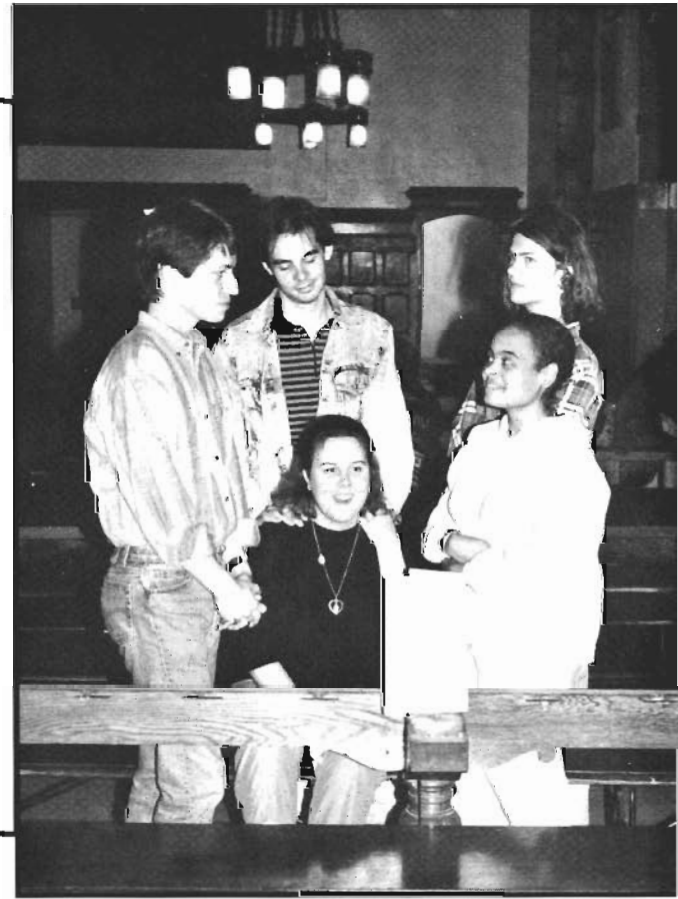


Smart Outlook on Life

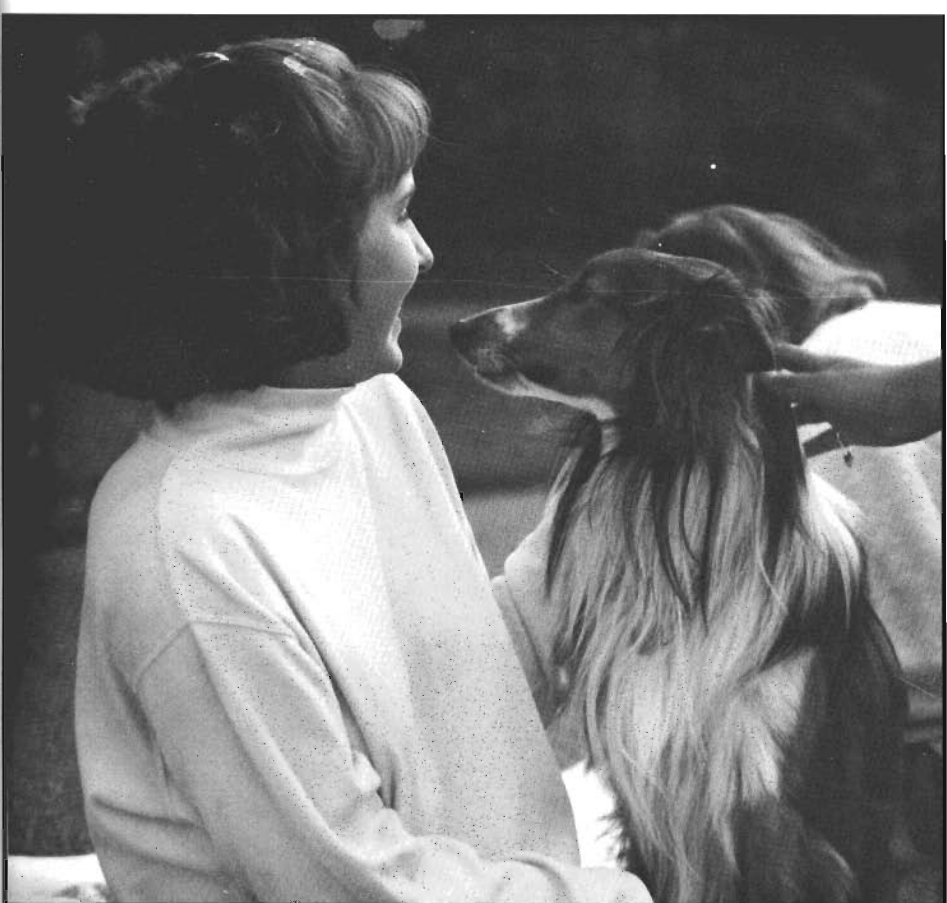

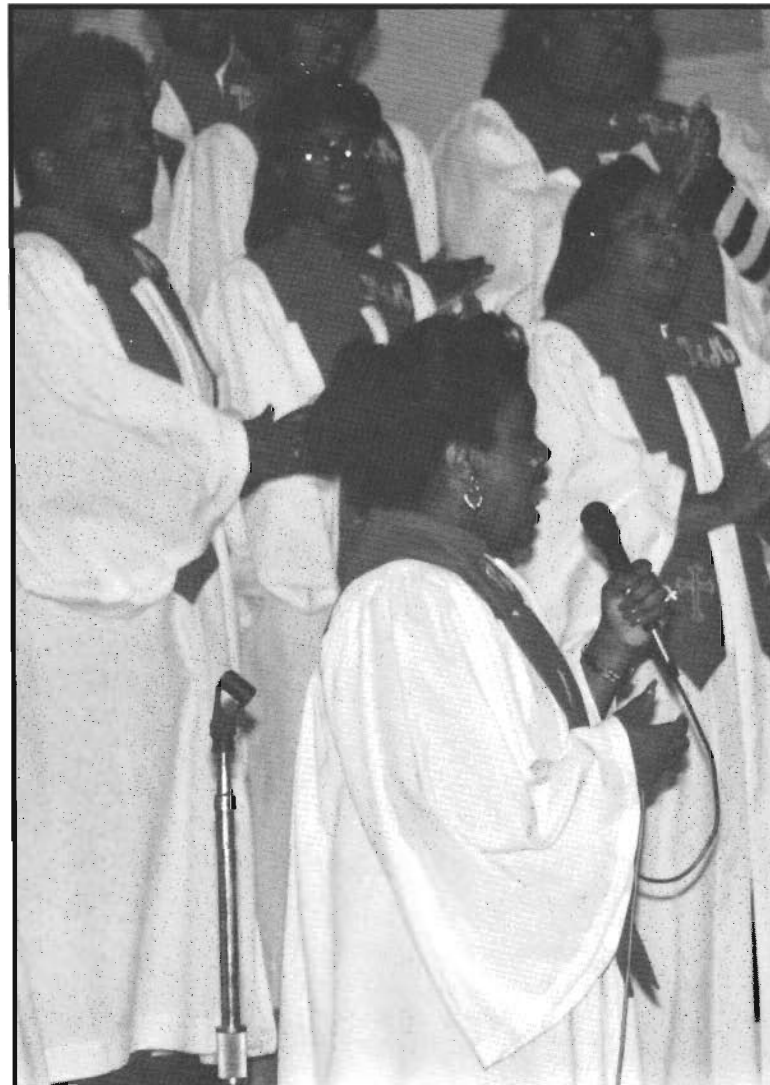

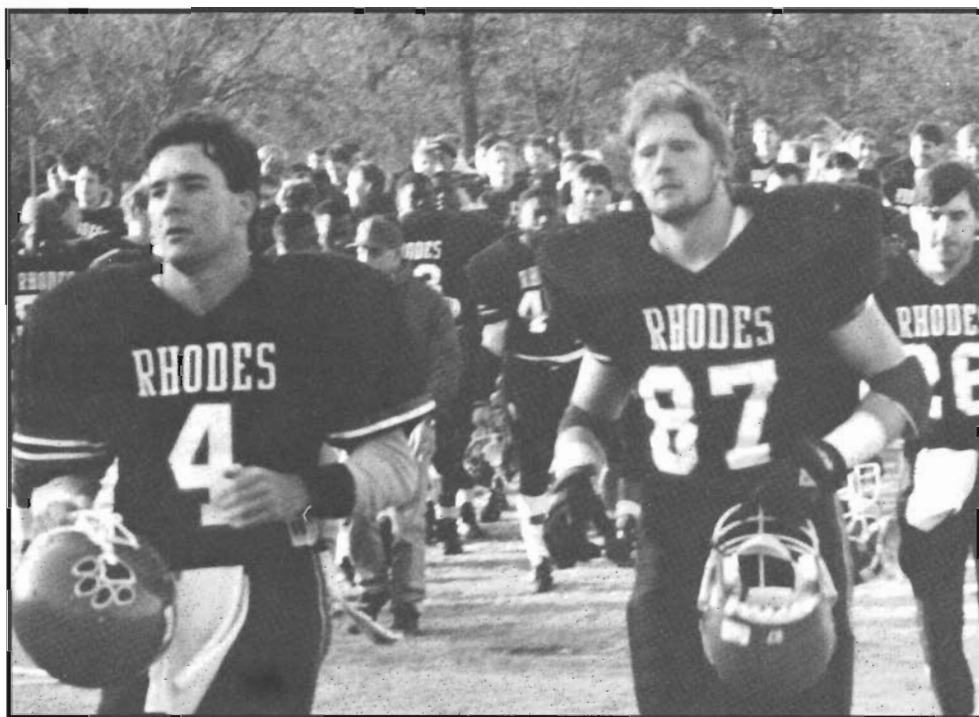
Keeping Opponents on their Toes

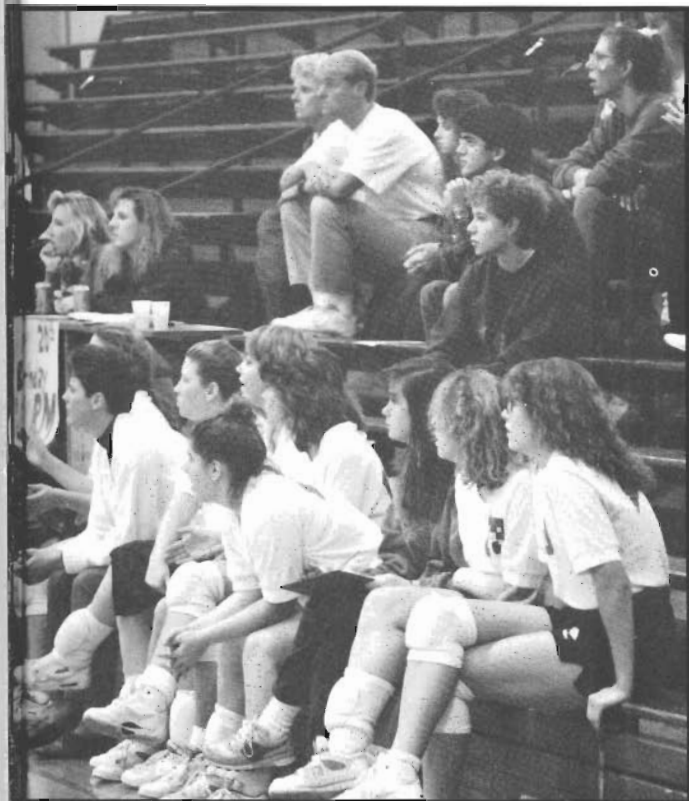

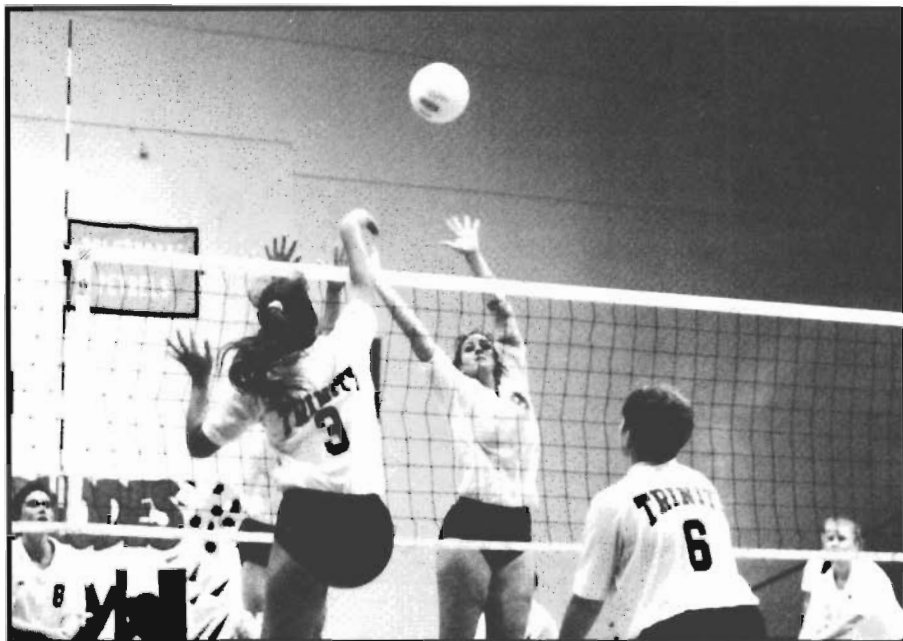

Double Whammy

This year's Volleyball Team, guided by second year coach Julie Bowen, returned ten of last year's veterans, losing only one senior to graduation. As defending conference champions, the Lynx showed promise with both young and experienced players. This year the team played in two conferences, the WIAC and the SCAC. There will be no WIAC next year and the team will move permanently into the SCAC. The volleyballers began their season with home victories against Emory and Hendrix. Throughout the season, the team competed against Division II and NAIA schools and gave a good showing in all the matches. One of the victories was against cross-town rival CBU, won in three straight games. In the WIAC Kick-off Tournament in Berea, KY, the Lynx boasted a perfect 6-0 record. They were equally successful in the SCAC Round Robin held at Rhodes, where they defeated Centre, Fisk, and Sewanee. This left Rhodes and Trinity the only undefeated teams, with the SCAC Championship to be decided by a match between the two later in the season.

Later came on October 26, when the Lynx defeated the Tigers 3-2 in a nail-biting match for the SCAC crown. Rhodes took their number one rating into the WIAC Tournament, which gave them a first round bye. The team defeated Asbury and then Maryville to secure a spot in the championship match. Maryville would have to come up through the loser's bracket and beat Rhodes twice in order to steal the championship. Though they lost the first match 0-3, the Lynx came back in the second contest to win their second consecutive WIAC championship title. Three Rhodes players received both All-Conference and All-Tournament honors: Katie Braden, Lynette Breedlove, and Tori Taugner. The team ended the season with a 20-14 record overall and was 9-1 in the WIAC and 5-0 in the SCAC.

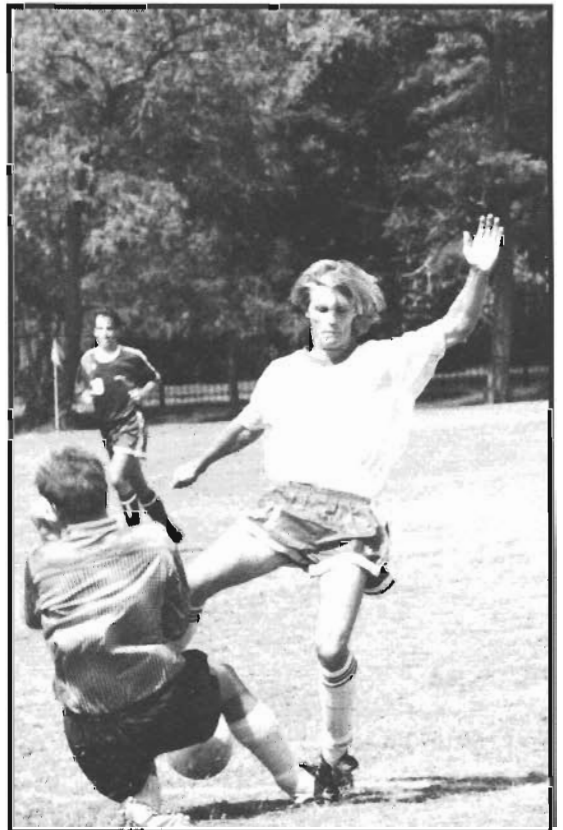

Starting a New Tradition

The Women's Soccer Team competed at a higher level of play this season, as they not only battled with their opponents, but also with a recent tradition of disappointing seasons. Players put aside the record books and took the conference by storm under the direction of first-year head coach Andy Marcinko. Fresh faces and diligent play led to a successful and rewarding season. The team compiled an overall 10-3-1 record on their way to capturing the S.C.A.C. championship. The capstone of the women's season was this tournament. Rhodes defeated Trinity to claim the championship with a victory in the second overtime. Five Lynx players were named All-S.C.A.C. These final results reflect the team's high level of competitiveness in a comeback season of remarkable proportion.

The Men's Soccer Team also garnered conference honors, as it placed 3rd place in the tournament with a 2-1 defeat of Sewanee in second round play. With an 8-10 record, the men's team provided a season of exciting soccer action. Other highlights of the season included several upsets. Rhodes defeated Centre, who was ranked 5th in the region, with a 2-0 shutout on September 21. One week later, the team posted a come from behind victory over Trinity by an overtime score of 4-3. Trinity was ranked 6th in its region at the time. With its third place finish, the men also earned conference recognition. Four players were named to the All-S.C.A.C. team.

Harriers Take Conference Crown

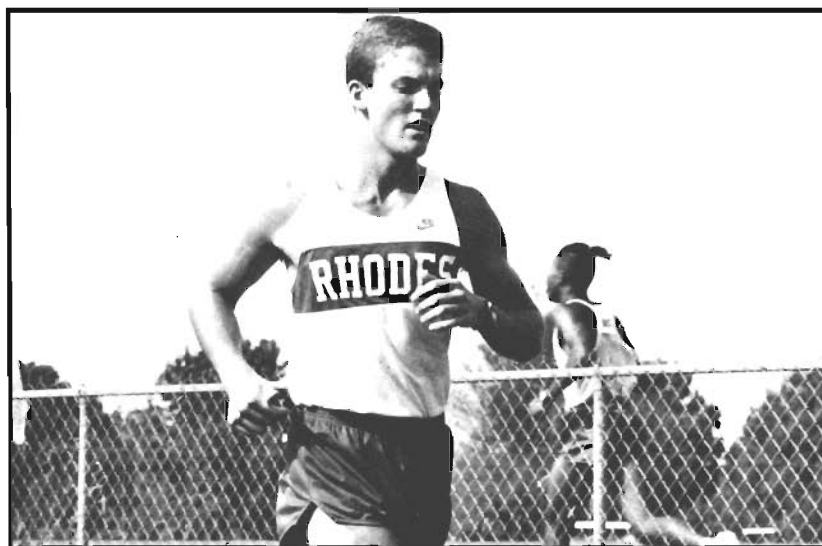
Picture yourself running on a road, up a long hill, in the midst of fifty or sixty huffing and puffing skinny maniacs, and abruptly entering a trail in the woods that's barely three feet across. Picture doing this for five miles, in wind, rain, heat, snow, or a combination thereof, and picture running forty to fifty miles a week for three months in order to get ready for it, and you have a decent idea of what collegiate cross country is like.

For the men's cross country team, enduring such joys as these paid off on November 9th at Oglethorpe University in Atlanta, where the Lynx won their second consecutive S.C.A.C. championship. The improvement of several key veterans and the addition of a talented freshman class enabled the Lynx to far surpass all expectations for the season.

Junior and captain James Westphal and freshman Welch Suggs traded off leading the Lynx throughout the season, culminating in 4th and 5th place finishes for the duo at Conference. Along with these two, sophomores Scott Haines and Edgard Cabanillas placed 8th and 10 to give the 10-man All-Conference team a decidedly Rhodesian flavor. At the South/Southeast Regional Championship in Newport News, Virginia on November 16, Westphal placed 11th to make the All-Region team, the first Rhodes runner to do so in recent memory. The team placed 7th, a respectable showing in the highly competitive championship.

These strong showings in post-season competition were the result of long hours of hard work by the 8-man team which also included sophomore Sean Moran, freshmen Eddie Dieppa and Ken Phelps, and junior Jeff Bean. Highlights of the season included an early season victory at Arkansas College (where Suggs was the individual champion), a strong third-place finish at the Arkansas State Invitational, and a second place finish, first among Division III schools, at the Rhodes College Invitational on October 12.

The Lady Lynx also had a productive 1991 season. Paced by seniors Cindy McCraw and Kortney Christensen, the women's team won several of their meets during the season, including the Arkansas College Invitational and the Ouachita Baptist University Invitational. At Conference, the women placed a respectable 4th. Other key team members included the freshman quintet of Bonnie Binkley, Allison Hawks, Katie Randolph, Erin Smith, and Jennalie Travis, sophomore Gina DeLuca, juniors Dani Boyce and Angie Pippin, and senior Allison Fuss.

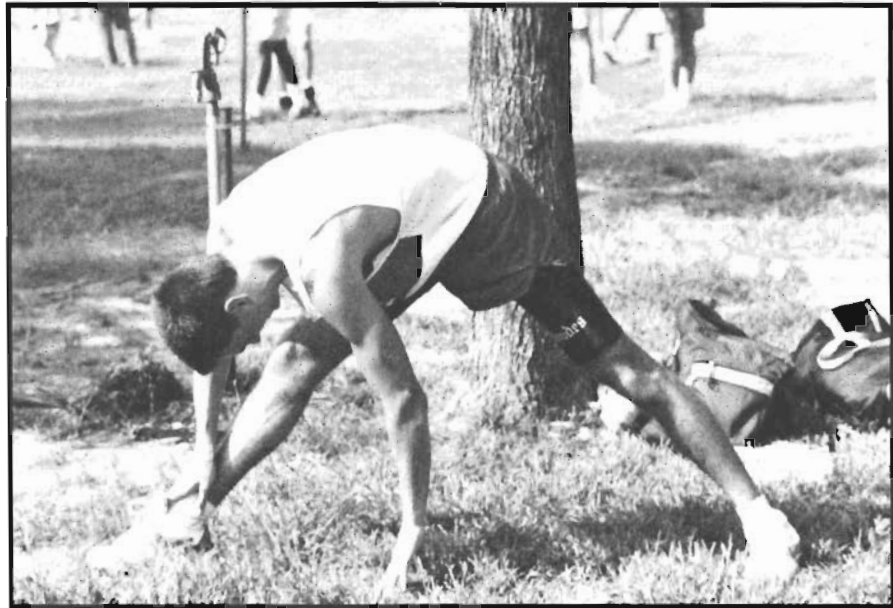

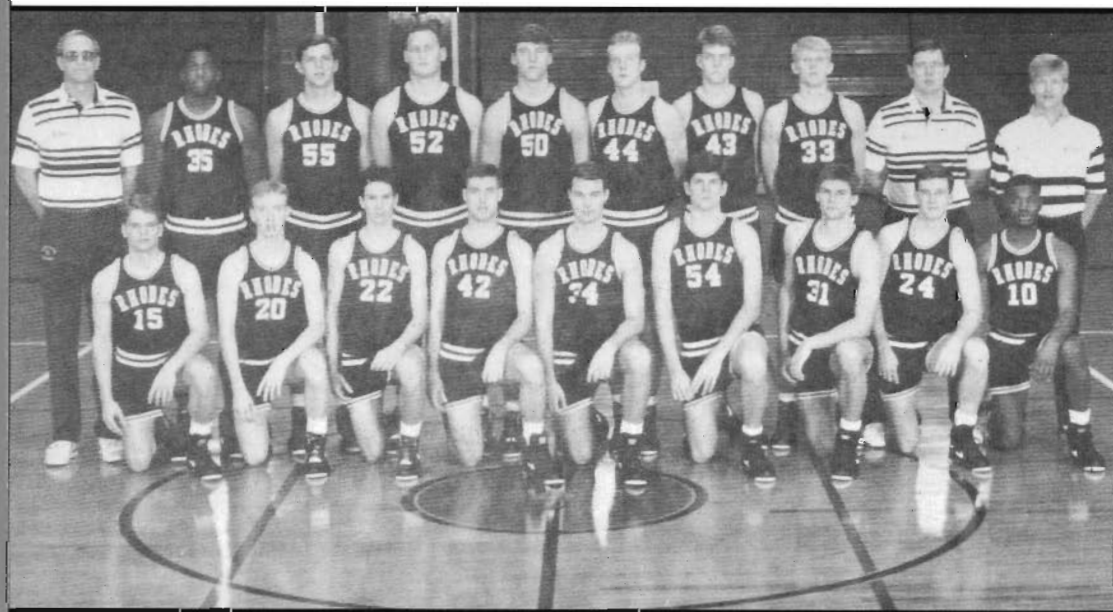

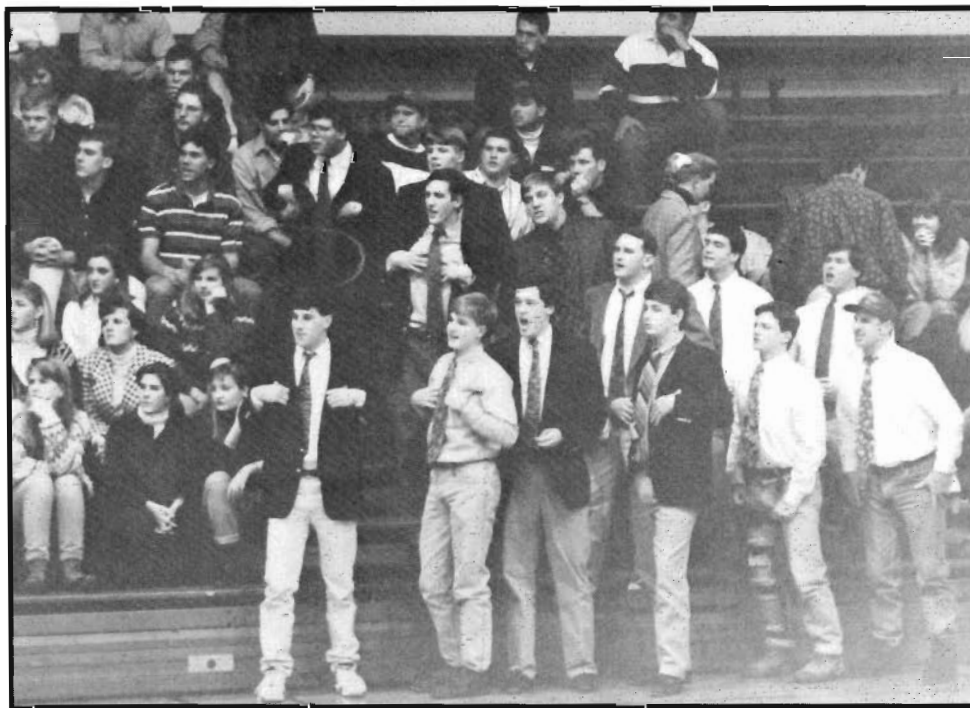
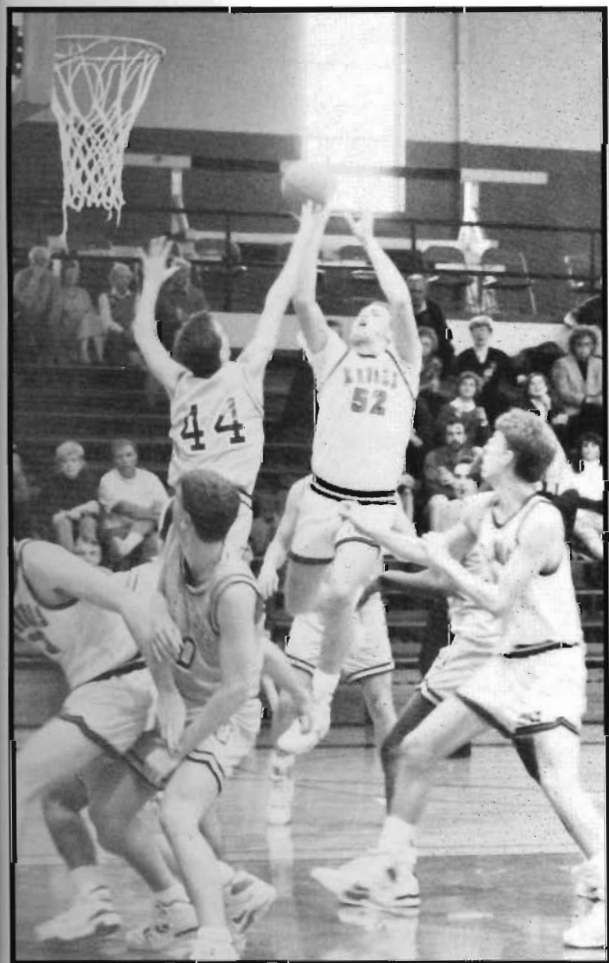
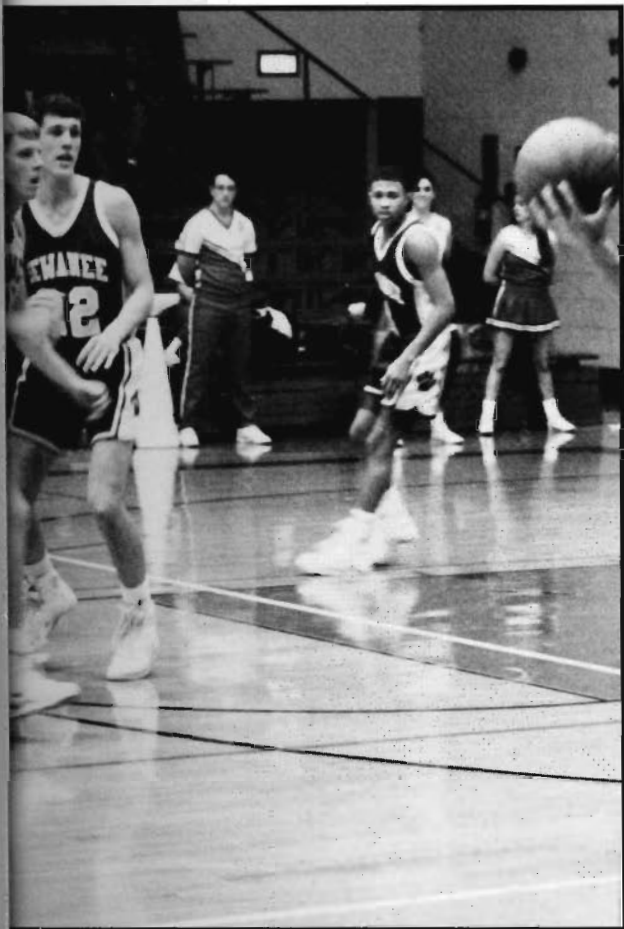


Dominating the Court

The Rhodes basketball team entered the 1991-2 season with very high expectations. The Lynx were coming off a CAC championship, and despite losing three starters to graduation, they were expected to contend again for a conference title - this time in the newly-formed SCAC. Leading the way for the Lynx were pre-season all-conference selections Thomas Johnson and Mike Gonda. Henry Lindeman, the team's lone senior and captain, provided strong inside play for the Lynx. Rhodes' starting line-up also featured a three-point shooting threat in junior Andy Pippenger. In addition, the Lynx had a great recruiting year, with newcomers Pat Thompson, Steve Smith, and David Rayfield leading the way.

And the Rhodes team coached by Herb Hilgeman and Tom Robinson did not disappoint. The early season highlights were numerous for Lynx fans. In early January, Rhodes upset nationally-ranked Ripon (WI) College, a perennial NCAA tournament performer, by a score of 77-76. In a 96-28 trouncing of Loyola of New Orleans, the team set records for the largest margin of victory and fewest points allowed. The Lynx also treated their fans to an undefeated streak at Mallory Gymnasium, which included double-digit wins over SCAC rivals Sewanee and Millsaps.

By the end of the season, this year's Lynx basketball team had posted one of the best records in Rhodes College history, and with the loss of only one senior, next year's team figures to do even better.



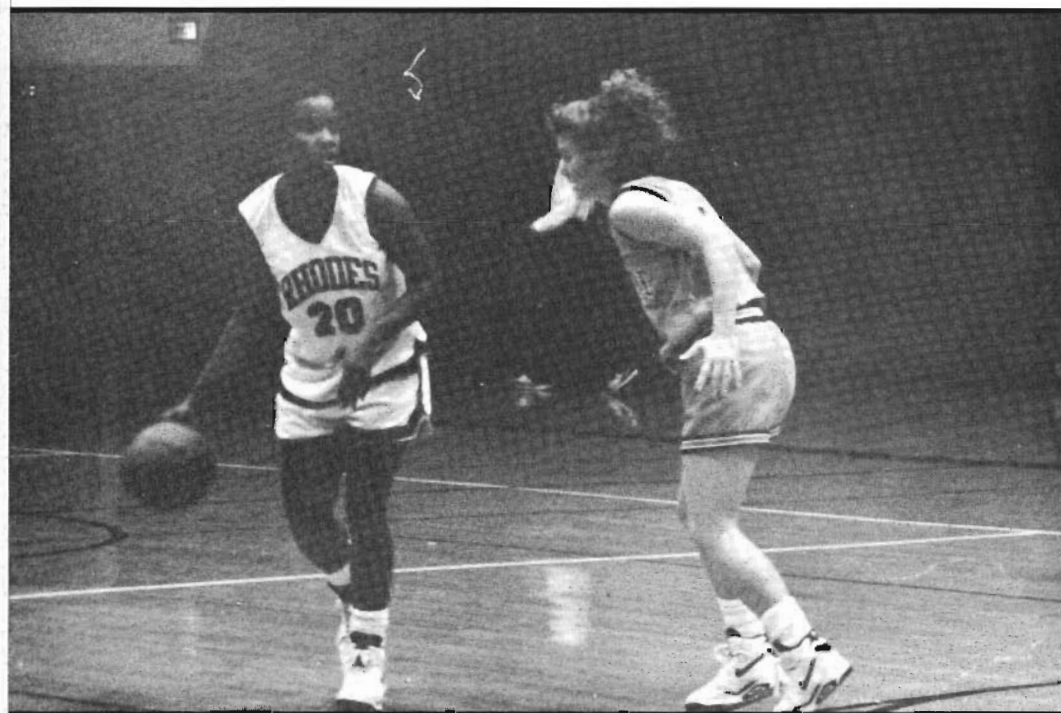
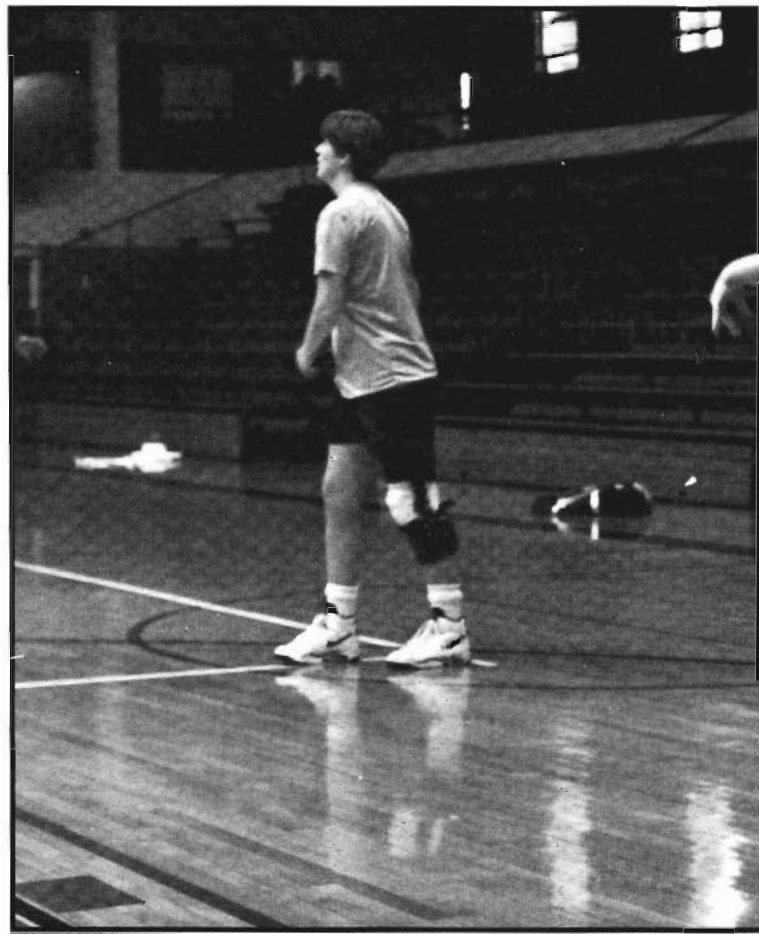

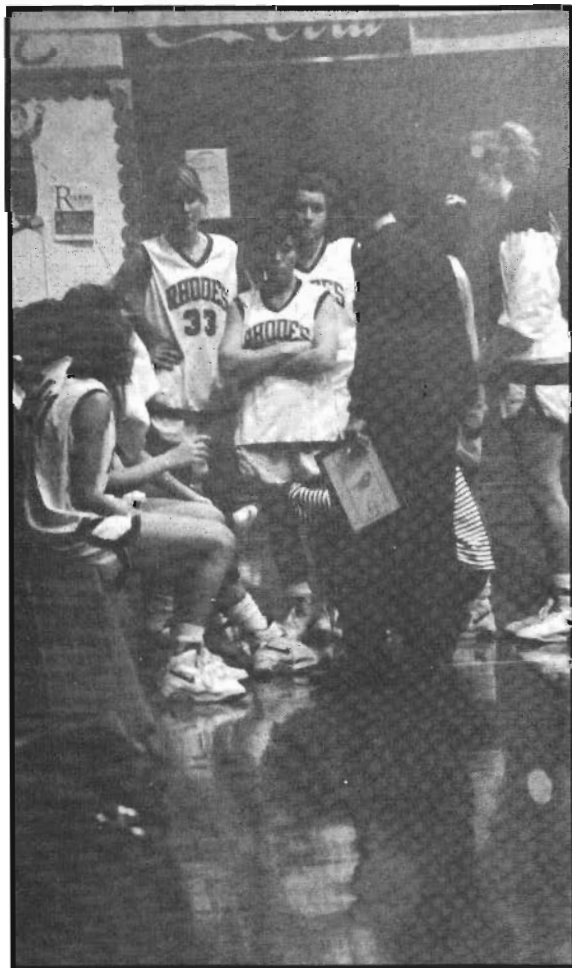
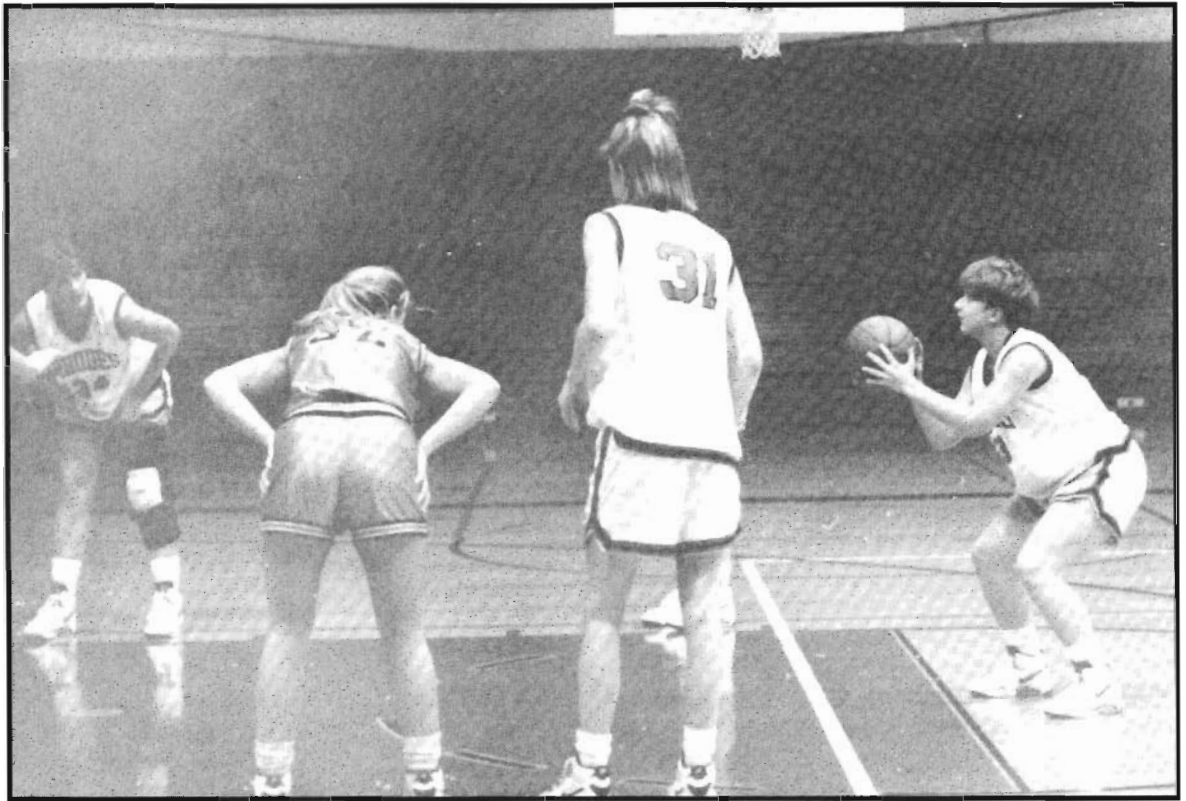

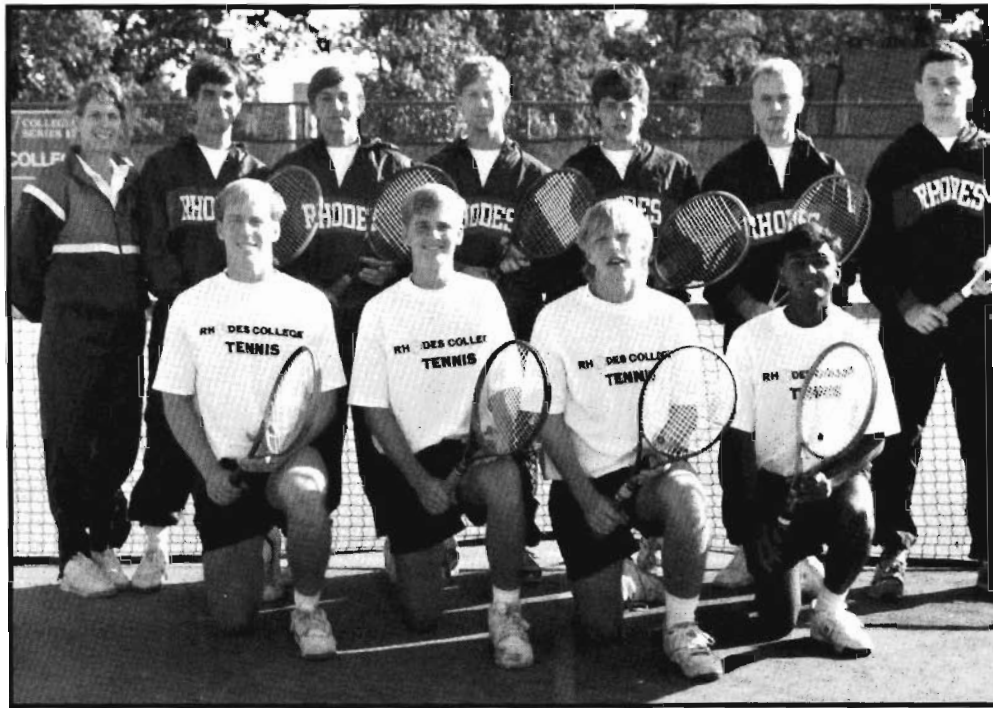

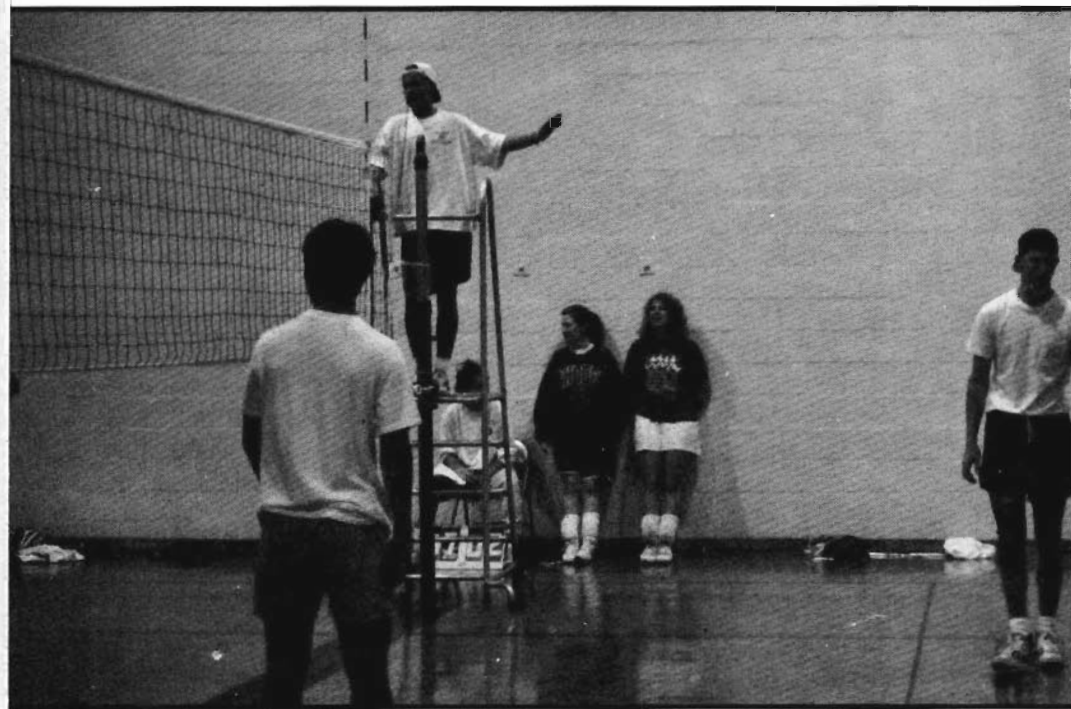

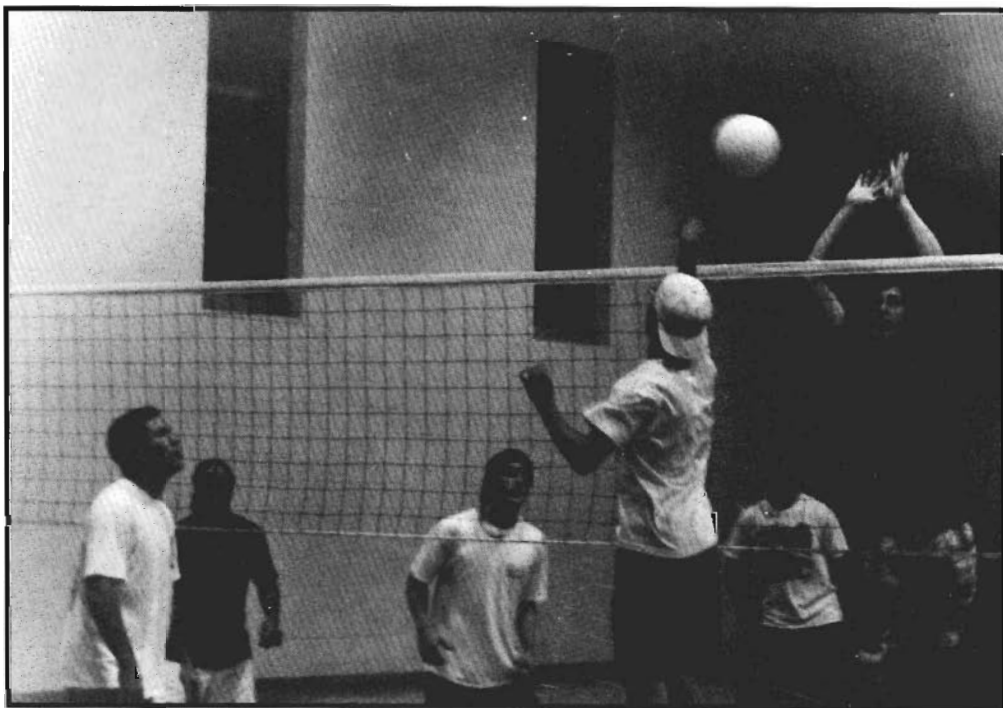
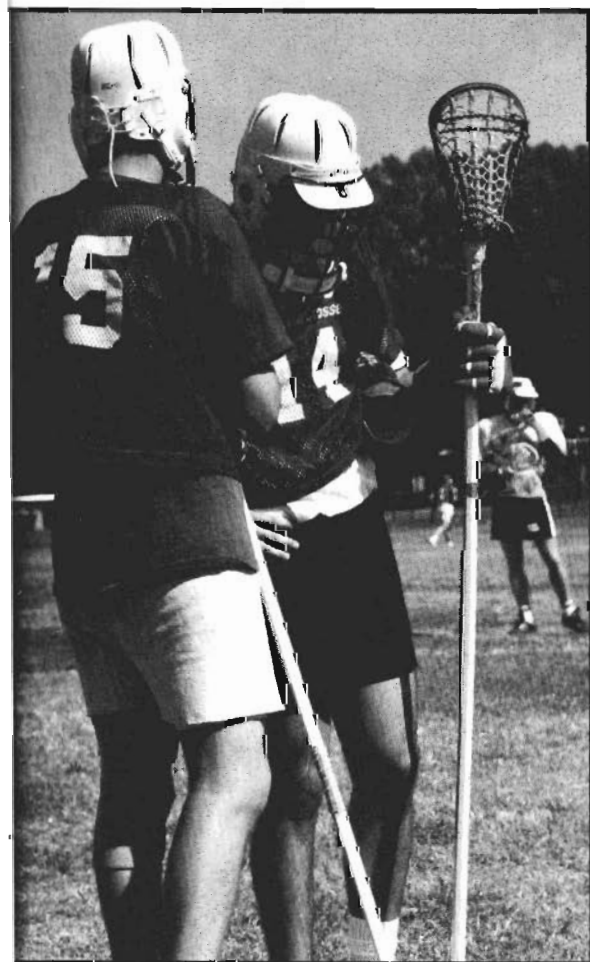
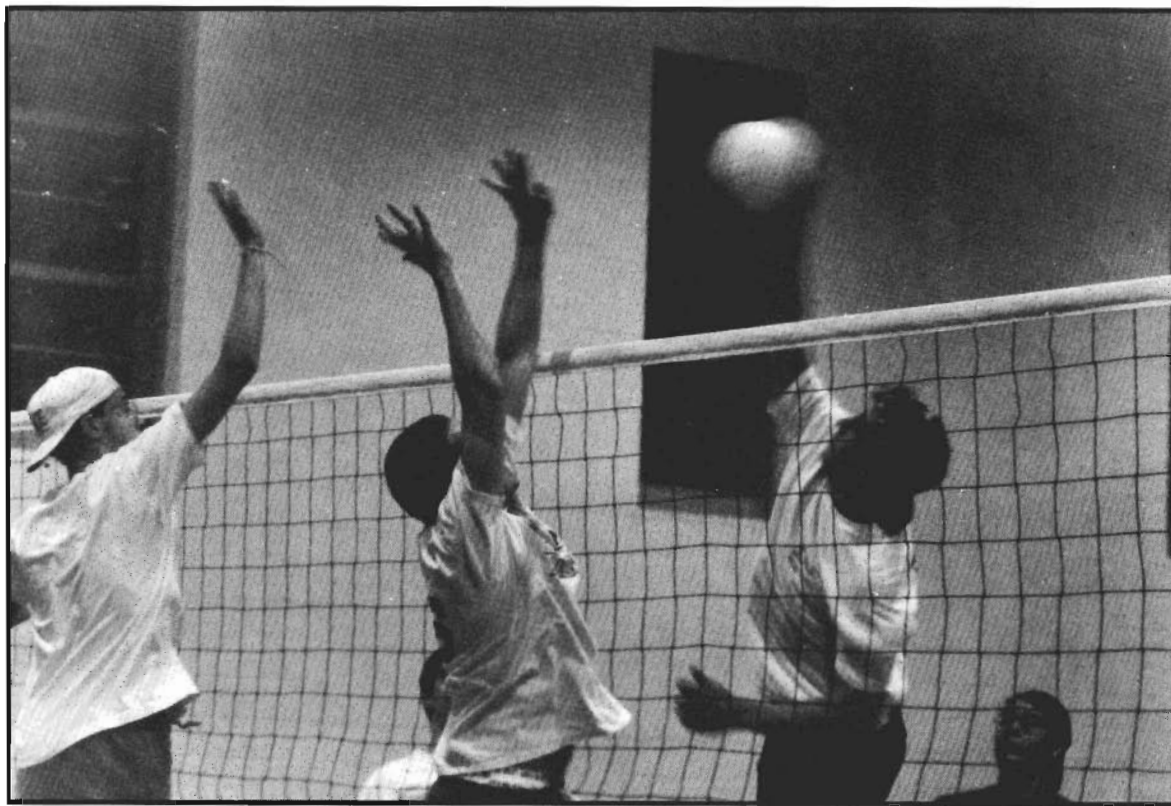

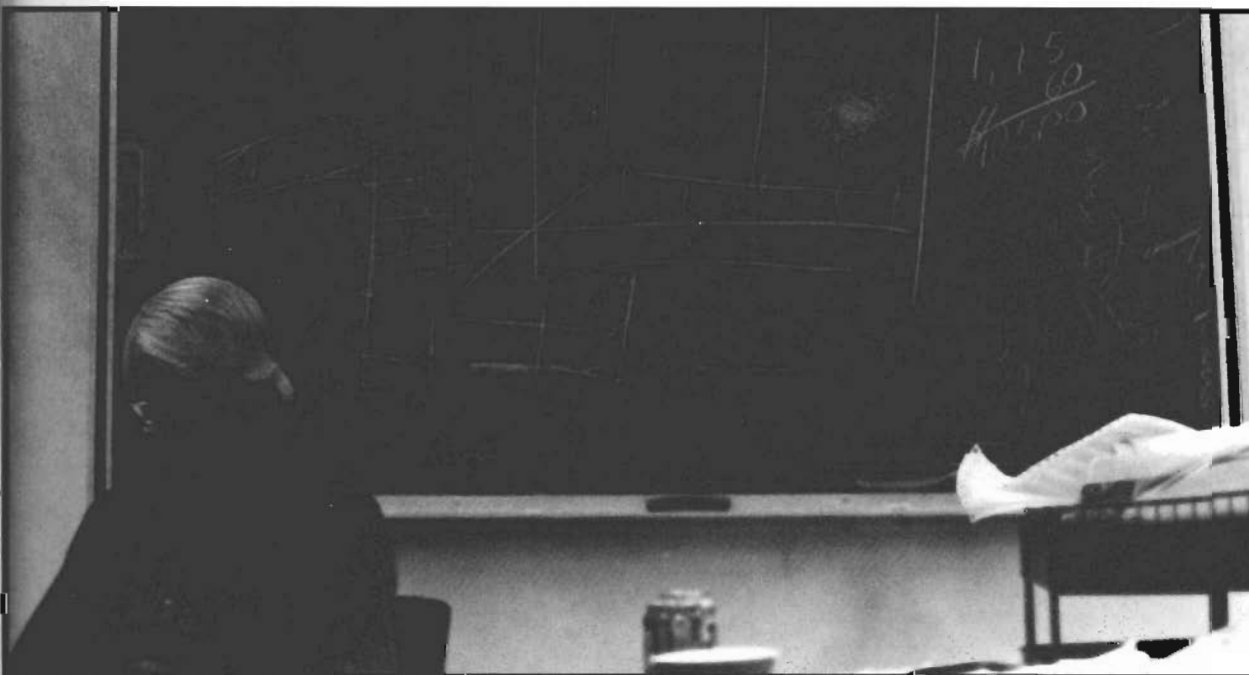

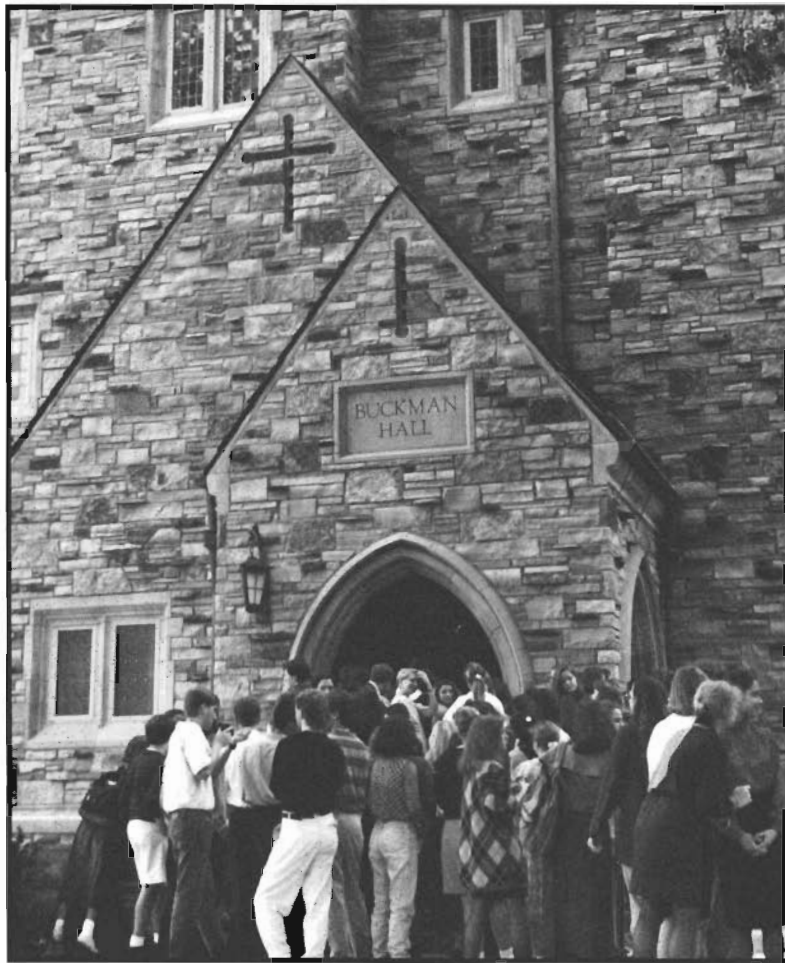

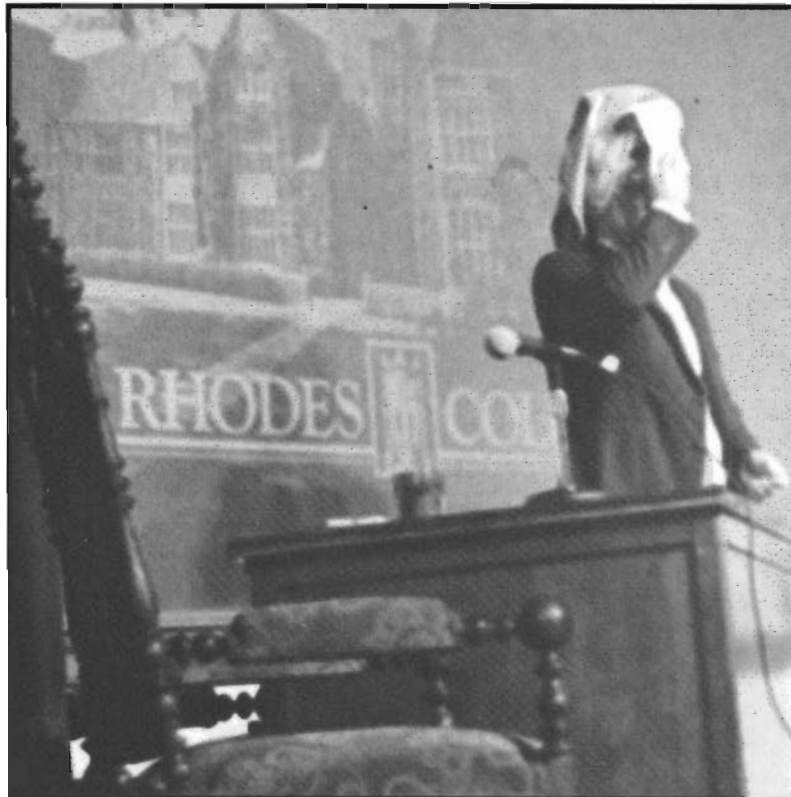

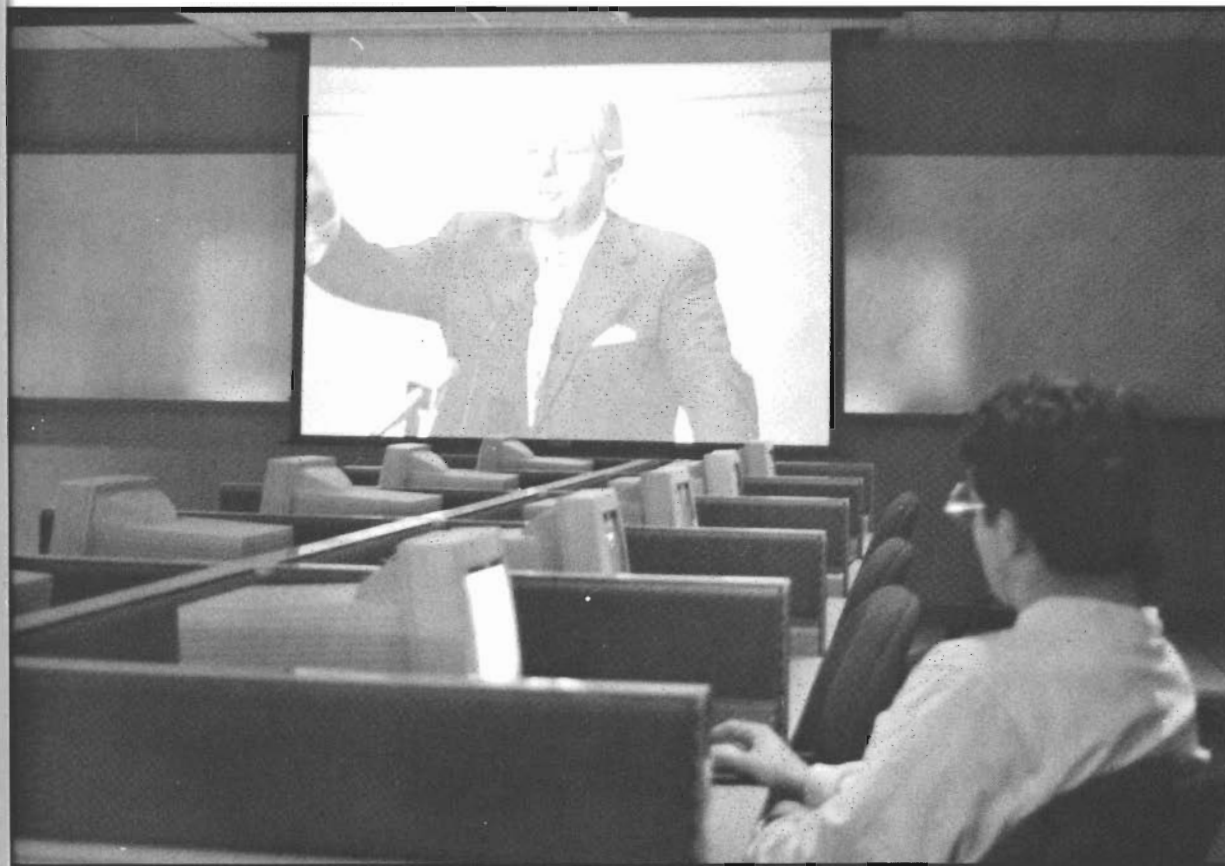

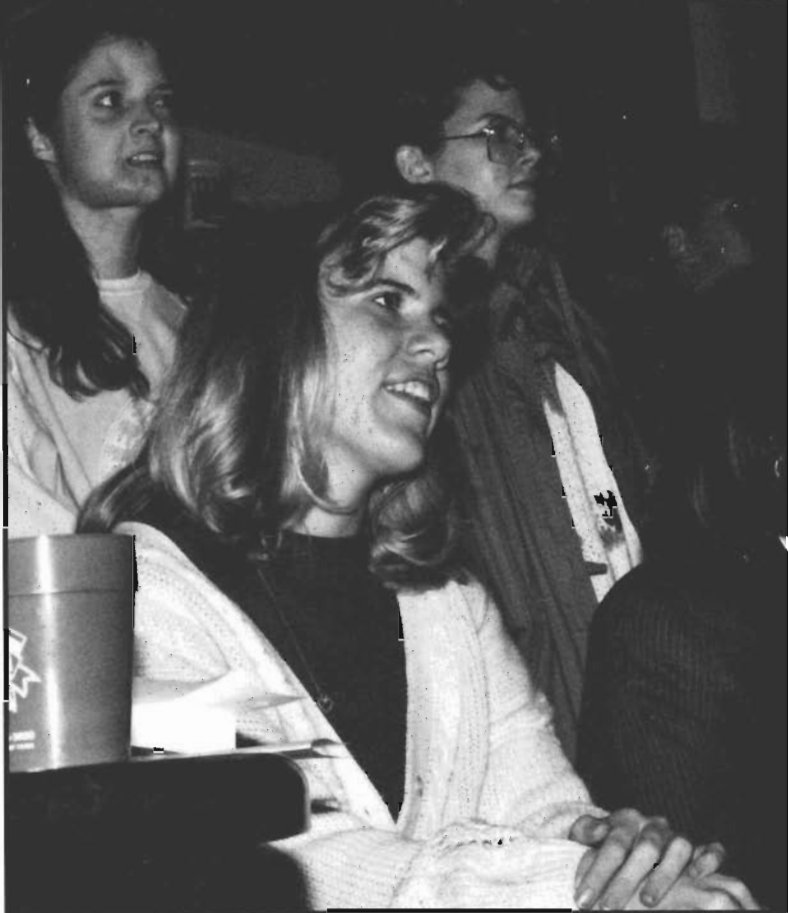

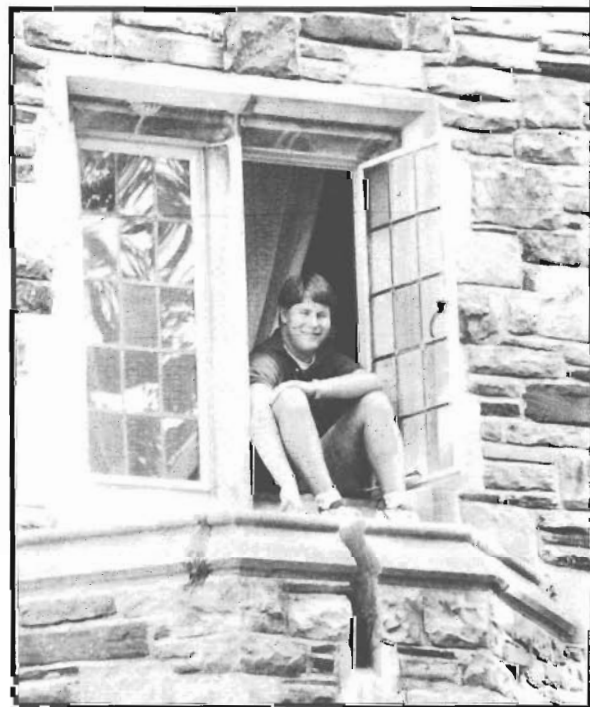
