

# SOUTHWESTERN AT OXFORD

A Program of British Studies under the auspices of Southwestern At Memphis June 28-August 1, 1970, University College, Oxford, England

In the summer of 1970, Southwestern At Memphis will initiate an annual program of studies in the arts, literature, philosophy, and history of Britain. The school will be held in University College of Oxford University, where students will live and dine in the seventeenth century buildings of the college.

In the first year an integrated series of lectures and seminars will treat with Britain in the Middle Ages. Students will attend all of the lectures in the several fields but elect two subjects only for in-depth seminars. A considerable effort has been made to recruit eminent authorities in the period and for specific topics. Among the authors, critics, historians, and philosophers who have engaged themselves to lecture are the following:

## Cost and Credit:

The cost of the five-week course is \$995, which includes tuition, room, board, transportation, and three days lodging in London. Course credit for the program will be computed at six hours for satisfactory completion of all seminar work and attendance at lectures. An additional three hours credit may be awarded for prior completion of assigned supplementary reading and/or an approved independent inquiry during the final three weeks of residence abroad.

## Transportation:

Included in the cost of the program is air fare from New York to London and return on a regularly scheduled TWA trans-Atlantic flight, transportation by private motor coach direct from Heathrow Airport to a London hotel, and three nights lodging (June 21-22 and August 19). The flight will depart New York in the evening of Saturday, June 20, 1970, and leave London for New York on the morning of Thursday, August 20th. Time has been allotted before and after the program in Oxford for students to pursue their own interests.

## Admission:

The program is co-educational and undergraduate. Applicants must meet the usual requirements for admission to the regular summer session at Southwestern At Memphis. At least one year of college level instruction is a pre-requisite for acceptance. In evaluating applicants, emphasis will be placed on those personal and intellectual qualities which seem to be conductive for success in the program.
