Course Description:

This course explores Renaissance drama from principally the Elizabethan and Jacobean eras. Its focus will be on representative major authors, in particular Marlowe, Jonson, Shakespeare and Fletcher, and on major works by other influential dramatists, including Marston, Massinger, and Webster. We will read tragedies, comedies, and satire of the period.

Evaluation:

- 20% You are required to write an essay of 1500 words on Marlowe's drama. See schedule below for due date.
- 40% You are required to write essays of 1500 words each on **two** of the following three units of the course (Ben Jonson; Fletcher and Shakespeare; Webster or Massinger)
- 20% In-class essay exam on satire by Marston and Shakespeare
- 20% Participation in the seminar, including attendance, preparation for class, and willingness to engage with the primary reading and the scholarship in the field. Students who miss *four* classes will be asked to leave the course and will be given an automatic F in this component of the course.
