Course Goals: In this course you will develop creative capacities as you become familiar with the materials and techniques of acrylic painting and explore how artists throughout history used painting to express their vision. This exploration will focus on the language of formalism and specifically explore the relationship between content and technique. The course will be supplemented with technical demonstrations, critiques, and slide lectures in which we examine the ways Abstract Painting manifests as a historical movement as well as a contemporary practice.

Course Expectations:

Homework- In addition to the in-class projects you will be given homework assignments. You are expected to put **at least** five hours into your homework project each week.

Critiques- Each project will be discussed during group critiques. Everyone is required to participate in the critiques. They are designed to teach you think critically about painting and share your ideas with the class. Class participation will factor into your grade.

Attendance- Attendance in this class is crucial since every day we will be covering new material and I will be giving you a feedback on your projects. Your late appearance will be disturbing for both your classmates and me. Try to arrive to class at least 10 minutes early to set up. We will start painting promptly at the start of class. If you are going to miss a class for any legitimate reason I must be consulted well in advance. If you have a fever you must be fever free for at least 24 hours before returning to class. You are permitted one unexcused absence. If you miss two classes your grade will be lowered by one half of a grade. Even if your work is not schedule to be discussed do not miss scheduled critiques. If you have not consulted with me about an absence from a scheduled critique your grade for that work will be lowered by one full grade.

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Grading- Each painting you make will receive a letter grade. You will also be assigned homework in this class. Your progress (work put in out of class) will be factored in to your grade for each painting. Grading is based on a cumulative evaluation of effort and quality. With serious effort (no lateness or absence, following the assignment, completing all work, making revisions as needed, concentrating and challenging yourself) it is possible to earn a "B+". An "A" is reserved for work that excels in both effort and quality. Late assignments are unacceptable and will be marked down. Revisions are strongly encouraged. The grade of a revised work will replace the original grade for that assignment.
