Course Description :

This unique course has several objectives. First of all, we will gain an understanding of the Russian Orthodox tradition and Russian culture up until the end of the eighteenth century. Concurrent with this, we will examine some of the most seminal works in Western religious thought from the Middle Ages to the Enlightenment. The dual tracks of our study will provide many opportunities to compare and contrast.

Another important aim of this course is to develop writing skills. Through essay assignments, peer and instructor review of these essays, and their subsequent revision (see syllabus below), students will improve their ability to write clear, convincing, and interesting papers.

**Course Requirements and Evaluation:**

**Class participation** is vital to this course. Each student should be able to make informed comments about the assigned reading. I will take attendance every class. Mid-way through each month I will talk with each student about his/her class participation.

Three absences will cause your grade to drop. If you cannot make it to class for some reason I need to be notified at least two days in advance (you will need to have a good reason). **If you miss a class, make sure you check with a classmate to get both notes and confirm the next assignment (changes will be made to the syllabus as needed).** I do not provide lecture notes to students who miss class. If you are absent, it is your responsibility to catch up on what you missed from someone in the class.

Arriving to class late (no matter how late) three times will equal one absence.

All assigned reading and writing is due at the beginning of the class for which it is assigned. Extensions will not be granted unless approved in advance (at least a week before the assignment is due) and under very extenuating circumstances. There are no make-up essays or quizzes but, as you can see, there will be plenty of “evaluative opportunities.”

**All work for this class must be done in compliance with the Rhodes Honor Code.**

**Three essays** on topics you choose are required in this course. As you will notice in the schedule, for each essay there is an initial and final submission. If you take the advice given after the initial submission, you will probably do fine on the final submission. If, however, you ignore the advice on the initial submission and try to write the final essay at the last minute, you will probably not do very well. The final grade on each essay will be an average of the grades of each submission. Students will also give a 20-minute in-class presentation of their final essay. The grade on the final essay will be an average of the initial submission, presentation, and final submission.

**Quizzes** may be announced or unannounced, but will always deal with very recent readings or issues we discussed in class.
