General course information

Prerequisites: Completion of core courses.

Course description: This course will address various topics in advanced accounting. Accounting for

investments including fair value, equity, and consolidation of financial statements will be covered in depth. Bankruptcy and partnership accounting issues will be reviewed. Foreign currency transactions and translation will be examined. Emerging issues related to the accounting profession will be discussed as an

integral part of the course.

Course objectives

Essential objectives: - You will **gain factual knowledge** about advanced accounting topics.

You will learn fundamental principles, generalizations, or theories that will

help you handle advanced accounting situations.

Important objectives: - You will learn to apply course material to solve problems and make

decisions encountered in advanced financial accounting situations.

The exams will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions, problems, and discussion questions. They will begin a little before 9:30 AM on the mornings of the tests. No make-up exams will be given except

for emergencies, as determined by the professor. Permission for making up the final exam will almost never be given.

Once the exam has started, <u>you may not leave the room</u> until you are ready to turn in your exam. The only exception to this rule is if you are leaving to consult me in my office (if I'm not in the classroom at the time you have a question).

The take-home quiz will be open book. Students may **not** work together on this quiz, **nor** may any answer keys be consulted. I will specify the format in which the take-home quiz must be submitted. Late take-home quizzes will not be accepted for any reason, but you may submit them any time before the due date that you wish.

The papers will be short summaries of relevant topics in the literature. You will receive detailed instructions after the first exam.

12 Connect homework sets will be assigned. Satisfactory, timely completion of all six assignments in the first two units and four of the six assignments in the last two units will earn a perfect homework score.

At the end of the term, if a person's numerical average is near a different letter grade, I will consider participation (including attendance) in determining whether the final grade is rounded up or down. There may be opportunities for a few additional assignments that will earn a very small amount of extra credit.

Expectations

Regular participation in class is necessary for good results in this class. In particular, it is essential that you keep up with homework, attend class, prepare for each class, and take notes.

Attendance:

While I do not require attendance, I do expect you to come to every class <u>on time</u>. Professional courtesy to the class requires that you <u>not leave early</u> unless you notify me in advance. Learning accounting is very much a function of regular practice. If you miss classes, it will directly affect how much you learn.

Academic ethics and honor code
