COURSE INFORMATION AND REQUIREMENTS

Course Description, Purpose, and Method:

Religious Studies 101 is designed as the introductory course to the "Life: Then and Now" sequence. As such, it has several aims. First, it introduces scholars to the academic study of the Bible as a central and influential sacred text in the West. Such a study is necessarily different from the sectarian, denominational, devotional or confessional approach offered by the synagogues or churches, although the interpretation of the Bible cannot be divorced from its meaning in a religious context. Second, the course introduces scholars to the contexts – historical, religious, literary and social – in which the various texts of the Bible arose. Third, it introduces the study of the idea of a scriptural canon and the processes by which the Jewish and Christian biblical canons were formed and closed. Fourth, the course introduces scholars to hermeneutics, the method of biblical interpretation over history and within various cultural contexts. Finally, it introduces scholars to the major questions involved in the study of religion in general and especially in the traditions known as "Abrahamic," "Western," or "Judaeo-Christian." The overall organizing principle of these sections of Religious Studies 101 is how the relationship between God and a people is portrayed and understood in the Jewish and Christian Scriptures and by those responsible for their composition and preservation.

No prior knowledge of the Bible, especially as a subject of academic study, is presumed. The class will consist of several types of instruction: information-giving (lecture, background reading); intensive reading and study of the primary texts assigned; response to, reflection on and discussion of the ideas contained and questions raised in these texts; and testing of the knowledge gained.

Course Requirements:

The most important requirement of the course is *active* involvement, by which I mean reading the assignments and interacting with them critically in class discussions and in written work. This written work includes submitting one 3×5 card with a question, comment, or reflection on an aspect of the reading assigned for that day. Completing the following requirements will constitute the final grade.

NOTE: ALL REQUIREMENTS MUST BE COMPLETED TO PASS THE COURSE.

2 in-class tests, each 15%, for a total of 30% of the final grade

1 final examination, 20 % of the final grade

Class attendance and active participation for a total of 15% of the final grade (includes the 3 \times 5 cards)

- 2 "reflection papers" of one to two pages on the readings in Neusner and Weaver, for a total of 15% of the final grade
- 1 three to four page critical response paper on a topic to be assigned, completed according to stated guidelines, for 20% of the final grade

N.B.: All tests, final examination, papers, and comments or questions are due on the dates specified in the syllabus. **NO EXTENSIONS OR EXCEPTIONS OTHER THAN THE FOLLOWING:** If you are absent from class for travel to athletic competitions or for other college-sanctioned unavoidable purposes, I will need to know the occasion and you will have to make arrangements to make up the work missed. If you know that you will be traveling on a date when a test is being given, you will need to make

preparations to make up that test, preferably ahead of the scheduled time. *The only other possible exceptions are serious personal illness or death in the family*. If you are ill, you should arrange to have me notified as soon as possible, and to make up the work missed.
