Foreword

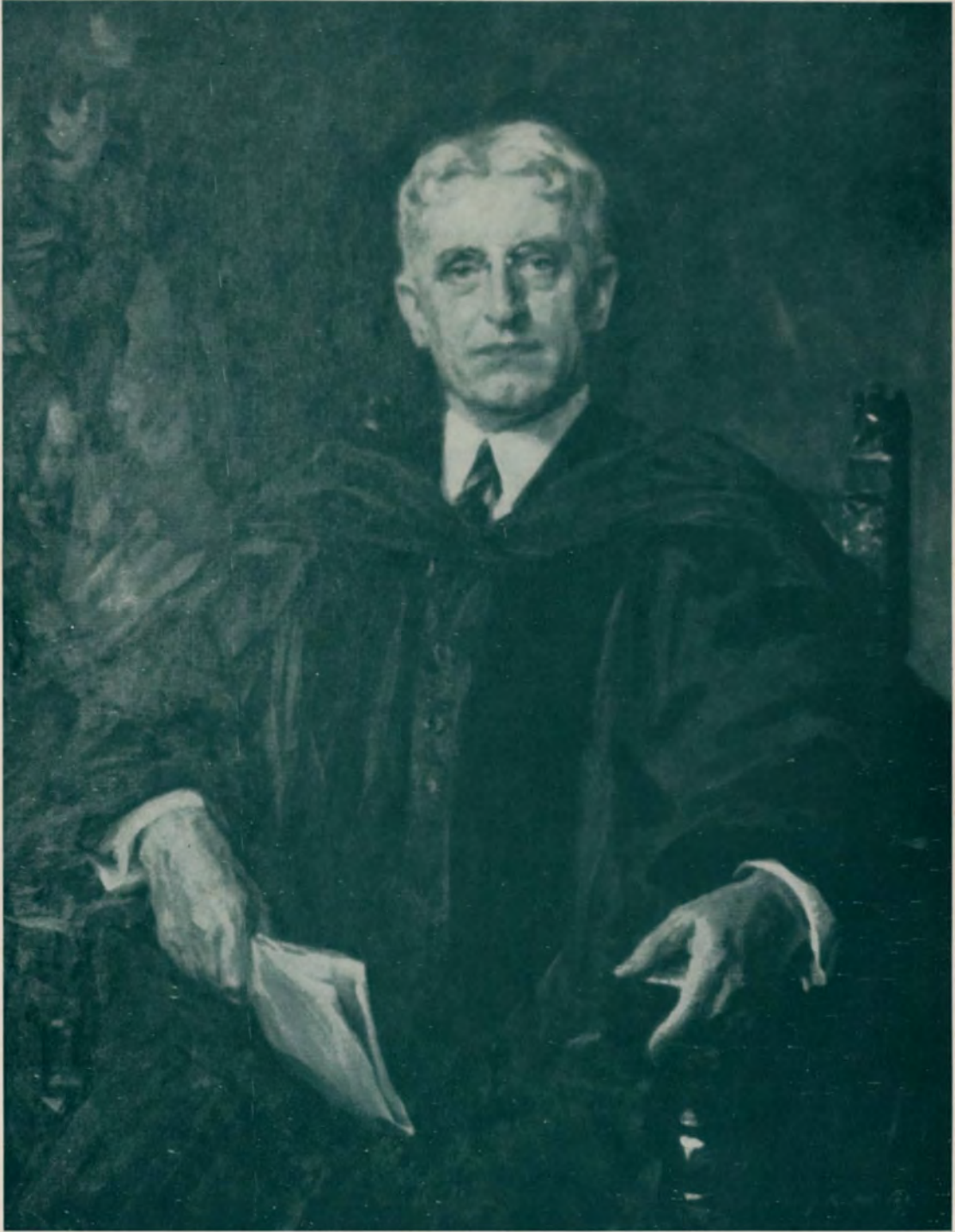

To the Class of 1949:

The Class of 1918, the first to receive degrees under the present administration, was graduated during World War I. It was in consequence quite small. There were only five bachelor's degrees awarded that year at the commencement exercises in Clarksville, Tennessee, all of them to men.


Assuming that all candidates for the bachelor's degree this year successfully complete their requirements, the Class of 1949 will number one hundred and twenty-seven—eighty-six men and forty-one women. As World War I accounts for one of the smallest graduating classes thirty-one years ago, so World War II accounts this year for the largest graduating class in the history of the college.

The class this year is made up in part of those who matriculated in former years (one as far back as 1936), whose college work in the cases of fourteen was interrupted by service to the nation during the war period.

One thing at least the writer has in common with this class—the fact that this is the last, as it were, official commencement here for all of us. If your briefer pilgrimage at Southwestern has been as happy and as rewarding as mine has been, you will carry away only pleasant memories and deep and abiding friendships.

More than that, you will, as I do, rejoice that Dr. P. N. Rhodes has been chosen to succeed me, for he is one who is tried and true, one whom you know and respect and love. With him as the President, the college will be in safe and capable hands, and with the continued loyal cooperation of our fine faculty and staff, supplemented by you and other alumni and friends, Southwestern faces a bright future as it enters upon its second century of service to the church, to the nation, and to the world.

To all of you of the Class of 1949, including those who will be recorded x'49, we extend our greetings, our good wishes, and our affectionate regard. It has been a grand pilgrimage together.

The Memphis College of Music having been affiliated with SOUTHWESTERN since 1938, became the music department of SOUTHWESTERN during the summer of 1943, at which time it moved from Union and Bellevue to the Galloway Mansion located on Overton Park Avenue.

Accepting beginners at all ages, it carries their studies through intermediate and college work leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Arts with a major in music, which degrees are conferred by SOUTHWESTERN. All academic and most music courses are given on the SOUTHWESTERN campus, a short distance from the College of Music.

The Memphis Academy of Art

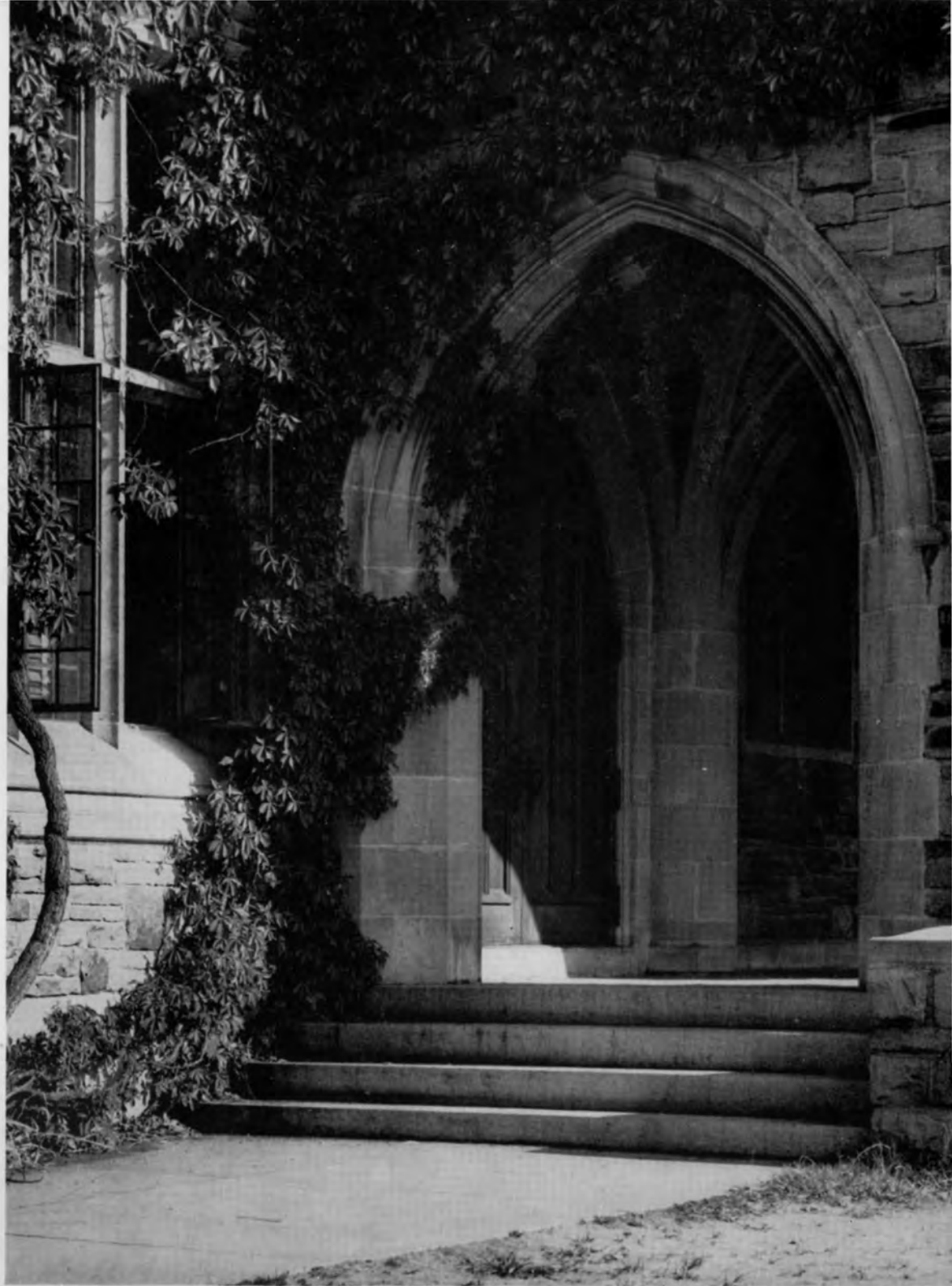
Recognizing how important the statements of the creative artists are to the understanding of a culture, Southwestern believes that no education is completely liberal which has not included at least an elementary study of the fine arts in their traditional and contemporary forms. Last year their dream came true, when Southwestern became affiliated with The Memphis Academy of Arts located at 680 and 690 Adams Avenue in the historic old residences given by the James Lee Family to the City of Memphis for an Art School.

Although Southwestern does not allow a major in the field of art, three semester hours credit for each program per semester is given. Courses offered are Advertising Design, Interior Decoration, Crafts, Oil Painting, Watercolor Painting, Jewelry and Metalcraft, and Sculpture.

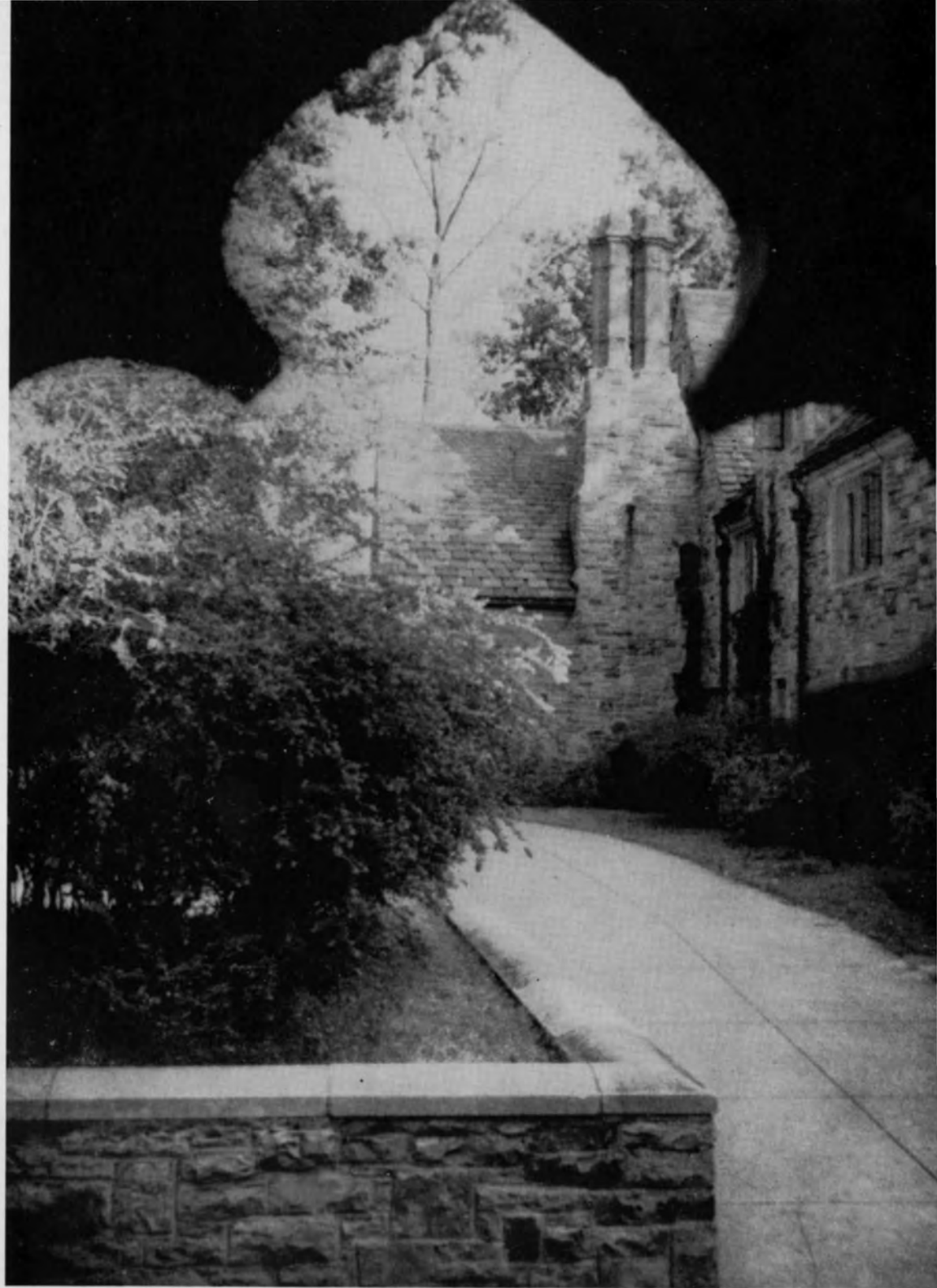
"Twelfth Night"

The cabinet serves as the co-ordinating and directing center for all student religious activity on the campus.

Currie as the leaders, weekly vespers, dormitory prayer services, and a service drive in which over \$1100.00 was raised for the University of Frankfurt. Also the annual apple sale was conducted with the proceeds being used to provide a Christmas party for the underprivileged children in Memphis and the bi-weekly discussions were held on topics of interest.

The Y.W.C.A. is composed of women students who wish to take part in its program of Christian service and growth of Christian character. Our theme for 1948-49 was "World Relatedness" and programs were presented at the monthly meetings which helped us see what we can do to promote world friendship. Mrs. Textas, a native of Turkey, and Dr. Paul Caudill, chairman of the World Baptist Relief, were two of our outstanding speakers. This year the "Y" adopted an Italian child of twelve and took care of her throughout the year. We paid for her school, board and tuition, wrote her letters, and played Santa Claus to her all year. For our local social service, the 150 members gave a Thanksgiving basket to a needy family, collected and dressed dolls for children in the mountains near Sewanee, Tennessee, helped with the Christian Union party for under privileged children, and had an Easter Egg hunt for the 50 boys at Gailor Hall. We are very proud of the work which our "Y" has done, but most of all, we are proud of the spirit with which our girls went into each project.

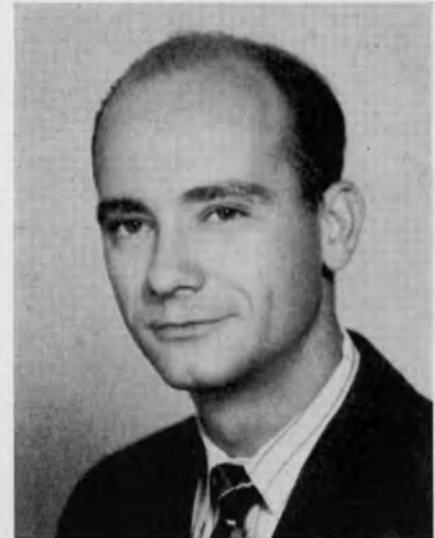

Tau Kappa Alpha has just finished its second year of activity at Southwestern after its reactivation during 1947-48. The Lynx debating team of Denby Brandon and Bill Rawlins were ranked third among the nations best debating teams at the Grand National Tournament April 14-16 at Mary Washington College of the University of Virginia. This is the first time in Southwestern's forensic history that one of her teams has placed in the national tourney. Over 60 colleges and universities from nearly every state in the union accepted the invitation to compete in the Grand National. Southwestern won 6 out of 7 debates in the competition. Being ranked 3rd in the nation climaxed the northern tour of the team in which they had previously defeated the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York and the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland. During the 1949 season Brandon and Rawlins won 20 out of 26 debates competing at the Southern TKA, the Mid-South and the Bluegrass Tourney. Their two years of intercollegiate competition have netted 43 victories out of 54 decision debates. Outstanding in this record are triumphs for 2 straight years over West Point, the 1948 Southern Debating Championship in the Junior Men's Division, and winner of Third Place in the 1949 Grand National Senior Men's Division. The first tapping Ceremony since the war was held on April 1 and 2 with Amos Rogers, Bill Roberds, and Professor George F. Totten being invited to membership. Roberds and Rogers won three out of six debates at the last tournament they attended at Georgetown, Kentucky. Gerald Pierce and Tommy Stergios also participated in the debating activities.

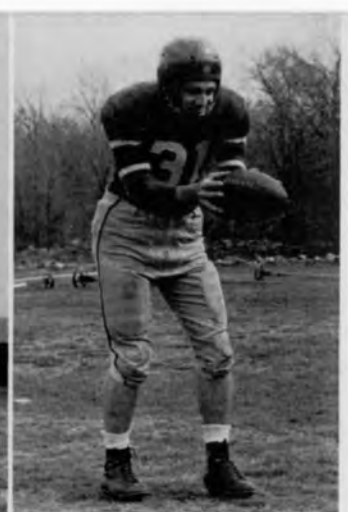

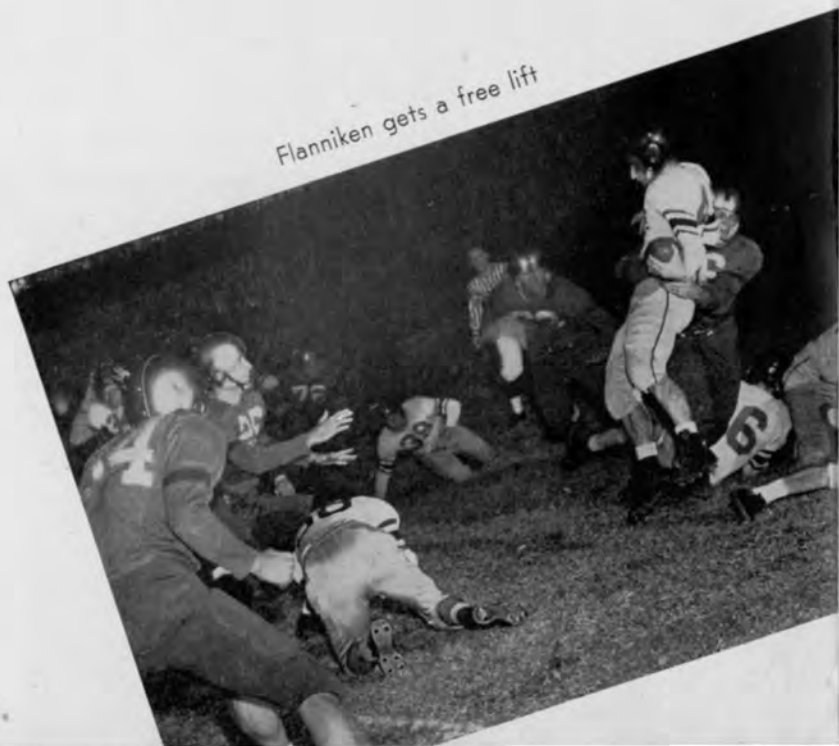

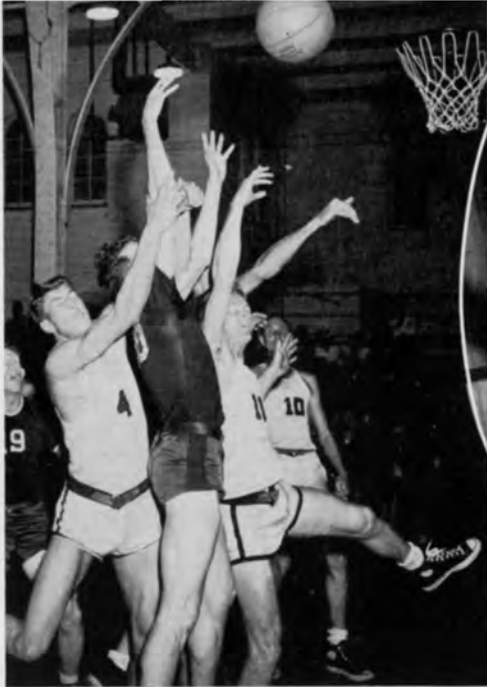
Another outstanding game was the Lynx 73-46 victory over Florence State. This is one of the highest scores that has been rolled up by a Lynx squad in a long time.

Southwestern sent a small delegation to the Southern Relays and although they failed to place in any of the events, Frank Boswell showed up very well in the 100 yard dash.

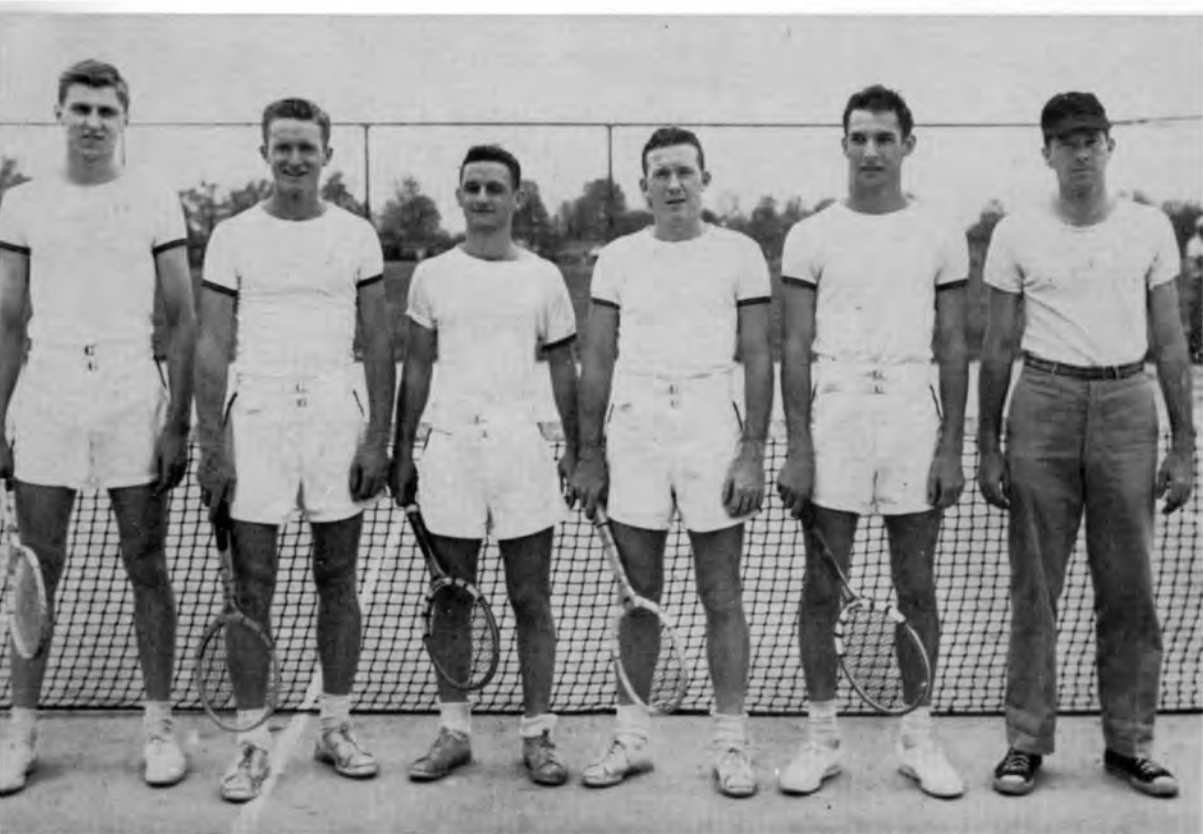
In their only meet so far this season, Southwestern was defeated by Ole Miss 91-37. Gene Osbahr was the high point man for this meet taking 11 points.
