This was a developmental year for the Rhodes Cross Country Team. The team was full of new faces, particularly on the women's squad. However, it didn't stop Rhodes from winning the SCAC Men's Conference Title for the third year in a row. The women improved from a last place finish last year to a good third place finish this year.

The women's team had two seniors, Elizabeth Lowe and Tracy Nelson, and very few were returning veterans. Freshman Billie Ann Snodgrass, Jennifer Farringer, Kristin Oswalt, Elizabeth Irvin, and Meredith Neer all rose to the occasion to give Rhodes Cross Country some feminine running prestige. Billie Ann Snodgrass was an All-Conference runner this year. Also providing leadership were sophomores Pam Baugus, Gwen McCarroll, and Bonnie Binkley.

It is hard to imagine how much better this team is over last year's team. Rhodes was extremely competitive with the other teams in the Conference, as seen in a fourpoint loss to Oglethorpe and Sewanee at Regionals. However, the team came back to beat Millsaps, which had beaten them earlier in the year.

On the men's side, Freshmen Jon Michael Morgan, Felix Vasquez, and Bancroft McMurphy all provided some inspirational leadership by each leading the team at some point in the year. Vasquez and McMurphy were both All-Conference athletes, and they were joined by Sophomore Eddie Dieppa who improved much over last year to help lead the team.

Juniors Scott Haines and Edgard Cabanillas were able to guide the young team, with help from last year's All-Region runner and two-time All-Conference athlete in Cross Country, James Westphal, who graduates this year. Freshman Miles Bogner and Sophomores Tom Oberding and Ken Phelps all gave what they had to make the team successful this year.

Overall both teams are very young, but are steadily improving. The men's team dominated the Conference this year and looks to doing much better than the sixth place finish at Regionals this year.

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## Basketball

The Lynx basketball team entered the 1992-93 season with high expectations. Coach Hilgeman's squad was coming off a twenty-win season, and had added several talented newcomers. Led by tri-captains Thomas Johnson, Andy Pippenger, and Mike Gonda and defensive specialist David Rayfield, the Lynx were even highly ranked in several pre-season basketball publications. Rhodes fans would settle for nothing less than a Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) championship and a NCAA Division III tournament berth. And their Lynx Cats did not disappoint.

Rhodes posted an outstanding 6-2 record before Christmas, including impressive victories over Asbury and Fontbonne College. The Lynx even took home the title in the prestigious Maryville(MO) Classic, sweeping both games. In addition, the Rhodes players made basketball news of another sort when they trounced the Bees from Savannah College of Art and Design, who featured Melissa Burden, the only female playing men's college basketball at any level. After Christmas, the basketball team routed Principia College on the road in its final tune-up before its grueling conference schedule began.

For the third consecutive year, Rhodes went undefeated at home in Mallory Gymnasium in conference play. The Lynx Cats won crucial SCAC games at home against the likes of hated rivals Sewanee, Oglethorpe, and Millsaps. But, perhaps the most important Lynx conference victories occurred when they avenged their only four SCAC losses over the previous two seasons by beating both Fisk and Centre on the road in the same weekend. So, when they beat Centre again, this time at Mallory, in a thrilling come-from-behind victory, the Lynx wrapped up the SCAC conference championship and with it an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament.

Rhodes finished its regular season with a 20-5 overall record, including a 9-1 mark at home, and a final ranking of 4 th in the extremely competitive South Region. Kinney agencies are roughly divided into six separate areas and each area has a specific student coordinator. First, is the literacy and tutoring area headed by Gayla Bassham. It covers programs such as the Time to Read literacy program and Evergreen Afterschool Tutors.

The Hunger and Homelessness coordinator is Trent Taylor. Calvary Street Ministry and Soup Kitehen fall into this area. Susan Fondren leads the Counseling, Crisis/Health, and Human Services division which includes Special Olympics and Crisis Center Hot Line.

Another group of agencies is the Children/Youth/Recreational Services run by Beth Webster. Some of the agencies in this category are Big Brothers/Big Sisters and Kinney Clowns. Jennie Beth Harris directs the Peace, Justice, Environment, and International area with examples such as the Memphis Humane Society and the Ghandi Institute for Nonviolence. The sixth group is the Adopt-a-School program headed by Laura Porter. Services include the Snowden Homework Center and The Science Project.

For no matter what interest, a volunteer opportunity can be found at an agency where Kinney volunteers already participate, or by introducing new agencies to the program.

# Rhodes Offers Creature <br> Comforts to Unlikely Resident 

Rhodes' most unusual transfer this year was a 2,700 pound, 22 -footlong pentaceratops which joined the campus after a six-month stint at the Memphis Zoo.

The dinosaur was part of the "Dinosaurs Live!" exhibit, a large assemblage of life-sized, computer-animated models that attracted more than 283,000 people. The pentaceratops was originally slated for return to the owner that leased it to the zoo: Dinamation International Corp. of Irvine, CA. But when a computer malfunction silenced and paralyzed the prehistoric beast early during its stay in Memphis, the company decided to give the model to the zoo which in turn donated it to Rhodes.

The dinosaur--which can stand up to 10 feet tall with its head raised--now resides in the lobby of Frazier Jelke Science Center, just a few feet from the real-life remains of a mastodon which once frolicked in the same spot. Two mastodon leg bones were unearthed at Rhodes in 1966 when workers were excavating for the science center. The bones have remained in cases in the lobby since the building opened.

The biology department faculty believe that dinosaur ownership will be a mark of distinction for the collegiate Gothic campus.


## Angel Tree Encourages the "Gift of Giving"

Many children in Memphis experienced the excitement of Christmas giving with the help of members of the Rhodes community who participated in the campus' third annual Angel Tree program.

Sponsored in the local community by the Salvation Army with the on campus assistance of Omicron Delta Kappa, the Angel Tree program allowed students, faculty, and staff to enjoy the gift of giving" by purchasing toys and clothing for children whose families were unable to afford the added expense of Christmas.

The names of one hundred children were placed on the Angel Tree (which was located in the Student Center lobby). Each tag also had a list of things the child wanted for Christmas.

Campus organizations and groups (for example, residence halls, faculty departments, and fraternities) also got involved by pooling their resources to purchase large gifts such as bicycles, jam boxes, bean bag chairs, and basketball backboards.
"People seem to be so happy buying the toys, games, and clothes for these kids," said program coordinator Don Price. "They have a good time and feel good doing it."




## Asbestos-Coated Pipe Closes First Floor Halliburton

The Admissions Desk and Reception Area on the first floor of Halliburton Tower were temporaily closed in September due to asbestos which was found on a leaking pipe above the ceiling.

During the day, the area was surrounded with huge poastic sheets. Signs on the sheets warned, "asbestos area, keep out." At night, a special company came in to remove the asbestos and to clear the air of free floating asbestos particles.

Students expressed little or no concern about the asbestos. "Oh, it really was asbestos," said one student, "I saw the signs one day, but when I went by the next day, they were gone. I figured that some prankster put them up as a joke." Many were unaware of the problem. "I never to over there," one said, "so I didn't even know about it."

Those that did express concern worried abou the remaining pockets of asbestos on campus. "Most of these buildings were built befor 1970," observed one student, "and I wonder how many still have pipes and things with asbestos coatings.".
"The thing to keep in mind," remarked one student, "is that we are still seeing the effects of asbestos use. If anything, it should teach us to be more careful in the future."

## Dead Silence Speaks Loudly on Alcohol Deaths

A group of students was dead serious about exposing the dangers of drinking and driving. On Tuesday, November 17, with the help of the Counseling Center's Lynn Dunavant, twenty-eight students took part in "Dead Day," dramatizing the nation tragedy and frequency of alcohol-related fatalities.

Every twenty-two minutes in this country, someone dies in an alcohol-related traffic accident. To symbolize that sad fact, a sudden on campus figuratively "died" every twenty-two minutes by tying a black arm band around his or her arm. At the same time the participant put on a sign, explaining the participation in "Dead Day" and refused to speak (except during class) until 6:00 p.m. that evening. Simultaneously, a wooden cross was erected every twentytwo minutes on the lawn to the east of Kennedy Hall.
"This is a nation problem," said Dunavant. The Tuesday initiative was one way to remind and educate students to the perils of drinking and driving. "We're trying to teach students a different pattern of behavior."
"Dead Day" was sponsored by Student Assembly as well as the Counseling Center.

## Fair Advantage?

Many sororities and fraternitie on campus have organized test files. This is a file in which the active members usually put their old tests, according to subject. Both active members and pledges are free to use these resources whenever needed to help them to prepare for an upcoming test. Pledges and members of the sorority are encouraged to use the test file if it is believed that a past test may help her because good scholarship is promoted within all sororities.
Is using a file cheating? Most professors at Rhodes are aware of the existing test files and therefore change their test questions from year to year. However, some professors do not necessarily approve of them. Professor Chris Wetzel of the psychology department, when asked if he opposed the use of test files, said, "Yes, I do. From year to year I don't like to change test questions. It takes a lot of time and effort to think of questions that truly test the students' knowledge of the subject. And I also don't like them for a more subtle reason. Students use them as a study method. It would be okay if they used them as practice tests, but they don't."
Is it unfair to others for sororities to have test files? Amy Toole, an independent, said, "Yes, I think it's unfair. But I don't not like the sororities for it. All the independents could get together and make their own test file if they wanted. There just aren't as many independents."
The final, possibly most important question concerning test files is, do they really help, or do they only mislead a student into thinking that they are useful? After all, many of the teachers do make up new tests each time. But according to Sarah Frinks, they are very beneficial. "I think they help a ton. I've used ours for three different classes. It didn't help me much to look at tests by other professors, but it did help when I looked at past tests from my professor. Especially being a freshman, I didn't know what to expect, so they gave me some sort of an idea."

## New Additions

As with each school year, several new members were added to the faculty. In fact, there were eight new full-time faculty, five with only term appointments. The full-time faculty included two assistant professors of English, Cary Holladay and Mark Winokur.
Rahel Hahn and Yoshinori Sasaki, both assistant professors, joined the foreign language departments, teaching German and Japanese, respectively.
The international studies department welcomed two assistant professors, Herbert Huser, a Latin America specialist, and Nancy Mitchell, whose focus is American foreign policy.
The physics and history departments both received one new faculty member. Assistant professor Joan Schmelz joined the physics department, instructor Winston S. McDowell the history department.
McDowell first became aware of Rhodes through his acquaintance with a former faculty member, and was further attracted by the fact that Rhodes is a "liberal arts college in an urban setting" with the "historic black population providing outlets" for his study of Afro-American society.
Five taught in term appointments. Assistant professor William Felice in internation studies, instructor Clifford Fox in political science, instructor Eric Heneger in the foreign language department, professor Valerie Kukharenko in Russian, and assistant professor Kenneth Yarnell in mathmatics/computer science.
Yarnell was impressed by the students. "They seem to work hard and are concerned with how well they do. Also. I like the atmosphere-- the relationship between the students and the teachers."

## Beyond Books

In addition to the traditional methods of learning in the classroom, most college students further their efforts through several alternatives offered. Students often gain much experience in their area of study through internships which are available in twelve academic departments. They are designed to combine the traditional academic work with practical application for credit.
Gary Lindquester, coordinator of the intern program for the biology department, felt that "before investing the time in graduate study, it's nice to do an internship." They help to "cement interests in that field."
International studies professor Andrew Michta agreed there were advantages. "An internship gives real job experience so your resume looks different, exposes a student to the real international business environment or to how the government operates, and is often a way of securing a job at a time when you can still afford it."
Other helpful facilities are located on the campus, including the library system (including the Burrow Library, four departmental collections in biology, chemistry, mathematics, and music, and the Human Relations Area File in the anthropology/sociology department), and the language center and MacLab in Buckman Hall.
Some classes, such as Model UN, provide a more direct experience than the traditional book-learning approach. In Model UN, students "get a much better appreciation of what the UN is and how it operates through role playing and debate," said professor Herbert Huser. "They come to understand in more depth a country they may have never known much about-- it broadens their outlook."

## Activism Flares

Rhodes campus came alive with political spirit during the 1992 presidential campaign. This trend was reflected in both the classroom and outside activities.
During the fall semester particularly, the campaign was a popular topic in many political science classes.
In Professor Swain's U.S. Politics course, Clyde Henderson said they "discussed [which candidate] would do well in what states and went through the electoral college and talked about why Bill Clinton was going to win."
During these discussions, Swain predicted that Clinton would receive 415 of the electoral votes, which was close to the final result to 356 votes.
Students in Professor Fox's Mass Media and Politics course worked on research projects that dealt with the election in various forms. The class concentrated particularly on studying the television coverage of the election. Professor Nelson, two weeks prior to the election, declared it was "all but certain that Bill Clinton [would] win the election." Nelson, and expert on the presidency, discussed the topic in length in his course on the American presidency.
Away from the classroom, the College Democrats, which consisted of many students from Clinton's home state, were busy with activities such as making signs at the campaign headquarters the night before Clinton's appearance at the Pyramid and transporting students to the rally.
They also published CD Sounds, a page of editorials written by club members to inform students of Clinton's key policies. A new issue was distributed in the Rat every Monday for students to read.
College Republicans also rallied around their candidate. They scheduled meetings that enabled them to listen to Rush Limbaugh's program. They also organized parties, during which they watched the debates. Memphis State and Shelby County Republican contacts often joined Rhodes' students to discuss the election.
Independent Ross Perot was also represented, with signs appearing across campus prior to the election encouraging students to vote for Perot. Students were allowed to gather in Blount Auditorium in Buckman Hall to view all debates on the big screen.
