# Community Service 

## Reaching Outside the Gates

Community service plays a very large role here at the College. Through the Kinney Program, the main coordinating system for community service, students are presented with ample opportunities to venture off campus to meet and help many interesting people. At the beginning of the year, Kinney sponsors a fair that advertises the many different activities from which students may choose, from tutoring and the Adopt-a-Friend program at Snowden school to MIFA Meals, the Crisis Line, and many others. All of these community service programs function as a way to get students out into the community, helping others in need. Not only does it help the community of the greater Memphis area, but it also helps promote understanding of and friendships with those less fortunate.

Over the years, the amount of service opportunities has increased to a phenomenal level. One of the most diverse programs offered by the College is the Tex-Mex ministries program, which allows students to go to the

Mexico-Texas border during spring break to build a house and a playground each year. Both the volunteer and the Memphis community reap the benefits of community service. The same is true of other programs, such as MIFA's Meals on Wheels program. "It's not just the meal, but the smile as well," comments sophomore Carey Corlew. "The elderly and less fortunate really appreciate talking to the students and getting to know them."

All of the community service possibilities provide extremely rewarding services. From the multiple programs offered through the Kinney program to the various activities of Greek life to the Burch Scholars, who volunteer many hours a week, community service is likely one of the most supported and appreciated parts of the College. "There are so many opportunities for service, no matter what interests you," says sophomore Tyler Sanders. "If helping people is something you like to do, there is going to be something out there for you."

The study abroad programs at Rhodes play an integral role in the overall mission of the College by not only teaching students about their world but also by letting them experience that world first-hand. Each year, students span the globe to study everything from English to Ecology through programs as diverese as a semester in Peru to a summer in Oxford, England.

Some of the international programs seek to better develop students' apprehension of a foreign language through direct interaction and immersion in a particular culture. "I learned more about: French from one month in Paris than I ever learned in the classroom," says Jessica Ally, Maymester participant.

The College also offers programs that allow students the chance to participate in internships and service abroad. All study abroad programs give students a deeper understanding and appreciation for cultures other than their own, equipping them with an open mind and preparing them to take on the
life that lies beyond the gates of the College. While the main focus of the study abroad programs is academic, students gain much more than class credit along the way. The unique experiences give students a chance to see life from a new perspective and cultivate their understanding of the world. For Anne Kathryn Rice, her trip was also about "defining and creating myself, becoming the person that I admire. In Spain I learned a little more about what I despise and what I adore, what I am passionate about and who I love."

For the past two years, the College has had over two hundred students study abroad each year. This more than doubles the number of students participating in 1994, when the Office of International Programs was created. With an increasingly wide variety of programs for many majors, the College offers students the opportunity to enhance their education through world travels and studies and, in the process, integrate themselves into an increasingly global society.

Communication on campus has also been greatly affected by technology. Many hours each day are spent checking and sending e-mails or chatting on different instant messenger programs. 75 years in Memphis

The Rhodes Mace led the faculty, a human rainbow of: colored hoods and academic regalia, into the McCallum Ballroom in the BCLC, marking the official beginning of the school year. The College celebrated its Opening Convocation on August 25, 2000 with an emphasis on scholarship and leadership in Memphis. The major focus of the event was the commemoration of the College's seventyfifth anniversary in Memphis. Seventy-five years ago, Southwestern (later to be renamed Rhodes College) moved from Clarksville, Tennessee to Memphis with a total of 406 students. With its current enrollment of over 1500 students, Rhodes proves that it has thrived during its lifetime in Memphis. President Troutt and Student Government President Corliss Givens spoke at Convocation. Memphis' Mayor W.W. Herenton also appeared at the ceremony to speak of the many contributions that the College has made to Memphis not only in during his nine-year period as mayor but also in the past seventy-five years. To honor the College's seventy-fifth anniversary in Memphis, Herenton declared August 25th "Rhodes Day in Memphis."
"Our history here in Memphis has been marked by the continuous support of this city's mayor," President Troutt said. "Mayor Herenton, we are here today to thank you and your predecessors over the last seventy-five years for your support of our work here at Rhodes."


The College also honored a tradition of excellence and service by awarding the Charles E. Diehl Society Award to Professor Michael Mclain. During his thirty-three years at the College, McLain has received recognition for outstanding teaching and actively pursued the establishment of scholarships at the College. He also supported both the Kinney and Burch programs, as well as, other community outreach programs and international service-learning trips. Upon presenting the Diehl Award, Troutt said that it represents the College's "gratitude for [McLain's] life spent in pursuit of liberal learning and service to the Rhodes community, the Memphis community, and the international community."

The College also recognized its ties to the community of Memphis as it conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities upon Dr. G. Scott Morris. The degree recognized Morris' outstanding academic achievement and service to the community. Morris founded the Church Health Center in Memphis in 1987 with the vision of creating a place of care for the body and for the soul. His vision became a reality and then grew to include the Hope and Healing Center for disease prevention and education, which opened in the spring of 2000. The College emphasized its own students' commitment to community service as Troutt announced the beginning of the fifth Habitat for Humanity house that the College would construct. Convocation's theme of dedication to academic excellence and to community outreach was one that carried into the school year as students continued the College's seventy-five-year tradition of excellence for many more years to come.

Continuing the eleven-year tradition of observing Hunger and Homelessness Week, the Kinney program prepared for this year like no other. Under the superb direction of Joshua Welter and Kristien Lundberg, a vast number of events were planned and the excitement stirred. Before the week could officially start, on Saturday, November 11 th, the Chi Omega sorority girls kicked off their annual canned food drive, "Chi Omega Kingdom of Cans." They were once again successful, collecting an astounding 3,500 cans of food.

On November 12, the Hunger and Homelessness Week officially commenced. The afternoon was planned around the Soup Kitchen at First Presbyterian Church, in which all students were invited to participate. Later that night, a panel discussion was held in Blount Auditorium on the issues of homelessness. The presenters, members of the Memphis community who are homeless or were formerly homeless, expressed the difficulty of living life on the streets. One presenter, Ricky, moved the audience with a simple statement: "Homelessness is next to loneliness." The next night, students participated in a One-Night-Without-A-Home Sleep-Out. The seventy-five-minute film focused on Ron Taylor, an impoverished former truck driver who ran for the Santa Monica City Council in order to represent the opinion of the homeless. On Tuesday, November 14th, students traveled to St. John's Methodist Church to volunteer for Souper Contact, a


Rhodes-run soup kitchen. With numerous students participating in Souper Contact on a weekly basis, this was not a new experience for many. In fact, many of the regular attendees have developed personal relationships with the individuals who eat at the soup kitchen weekly. "Working at Souper Contact has been a very rewarding experience for me," commented first-year Michael Lamb. "We provide the visitors not only with a hot meal every Tuesday but also with a great deal of fellowship and friendship."

## The College climbs into top tier

Finally, critics have recognized what the College's students have known for years: Rhodes College is.one of the best in the country. US News and World Report ranked the College this year as thirty-ighth in national liberal arts colleges. Through the hard work and strong effort put forth last year, the College has raised its ranking and broken into the top tier of national liberal arts colleges. The US News and World Report ranking system is based on sixteen indicators of academic excellence. The seven steps for determining the ranking of the schools is divided into several categories. The most important category is academic reputation, which accounts for twenty-five percent of the overall ranking. Other categories include faculty resources, financial resources, alumni giving rate, graduation rate and performance.

In addition, the College was hailed by The Princeton Review's "The Best 331 Colleges." A Kaplan Educational Center survey of guidance counselors cited Rhodes as a top American college in three categories: Schools for Academically Competitive Students, Schools That Are "Hidden Treasures," and Schools Providing a Liberal Arts Education. Rhodes is also one of only forty schools featured in Loren Pope's book, Colleges that Change Lives.

These accomplishments show a positive change in the way that critics, parents, and, most importantly, students view the College. The entire Rhodes community has worked hard for the status of placing in the top fifty liberal arts colleges in the nation.

## The College in the Computer Age

# The computer monitor is the main part of the control table that the professor uses to control all of the technological aspects of the classroom. 

The computerized movable dry erase boards are just one of the great aspects of the "smart classrooms" that are located throughout campus, pictured here is a room in first floor Buckman.

The technology at the College is in a class by itself. The "smart" classrooms in Buckman Hall and Frazier-Jelke and the Music program's computer software, both of which are available to students, are of particular interest.

SmartMusic is a program that allows a computer to provide the keyboard accompaniment for a soloist. This is a great practice tool because it interacts with the tempo and intonation of the performer. The SmartMusic software allows the user to interact with the keyboard without a keyboardist being physically present.

The "smart classrooms" in Buckman, Palmer, Clough, and Frazier-Jlke offer several interesting features, including a moving projector screen that descends and ascends from and into the ceiling with a push of a button. Classrooms in Frazier Jelke and Buckman also feature coliseum-like seating with swivel-out chairs. Lighting is never a problem with switches for variable intensities, providing for the perfect brightness or dimness for tests or for movies. Even the dry erase boards in the Buckman Hall rooms are technologically advanced. This technology involves several "layered" dry erase boards, one behind another, on a mechanical system that slides the boards one at a time, up and down and left and right.

Also, many classes meet in the computer labs in Buckman to work with various computer programs for classes including Marketing Management, Probability and Statistics, Statistical Methods in Psychology, and Global Change. With such a helpful and advanced use of technology in the classroom, it is no wonder that the College was named by Yahoo! Internet Life magazine as one of the nation's "mostwired colleges." Using the available technological resources makes academia easy and fun for students and professors alike.

The College's chapter of Habitat for Humanity, a very active organization, has long played a vital role in community service programs. Rhodes Student Government is an integral part of the College community, allowing students to speak their minds with one another along with faculty members. The College's students are quite prolific, and with six campus publications, Rhodents can easily access an outlet to vent their creativity, opinions, and individuality openly in print. Not so evident, however, is the driving force behind this surge of self-expression. The Publications Board, overseen by members of the student body, engages in the task of overseeing the production of all six of Rhodes student publications: Cereal News, the daily brief; Colossus, the student web server; Confluence, the humanities journal; The Lynx Yearbook; The Southwestern Review, the literary magazine, and The Sou'wester, the weekly newspaper.

Comprised of editors of each of the publications, as well as representatives from each class, the Publications Board handles a host of responsibilities. For members, decision making and problem solving dominate their two meetings each month. The members balance budgets and field concerns of students and faculty, as well as engage new ideas for prospective publications. Currently, the Pub board is considering plans to revive the College's radio station, silent since the early 1980's, assessing the possibilities of a cable, an Internet, or even a broad band FM broadcast. Though the idea remains in the preliminary stages, the Pub Board, led by Kasey Sweeny, is pursuing all options. Kasey, a senior, rose to the elected position of publications Commissioner after tackling a year as Editor in Chief of the yearbook. "It's not as tough as being Editor of the Lynx," she says, "and I wanted to still be involved with the publications." Kasey's successor to Editor in Chief, Andrea Hutchinson, finds her position in the Pub Board a refreshing one and a chance to "get to know the other editors." Amidst the challenges of organizing the publication of the Lynx, the support and camaraderie the board offers is quite welcome. As a permanent fixture on campus, Pub Board will continue to support all student publications.

The group was started this year by five ambitious and energetic students who saw the networking potential for the College community; the five now serve as the executive committee for the group (Ben Chastain-president, Kate Hazelrig-vice president, Courtney Neff-secretary, Nicole Truhe-treasurer, and Grace Williams--alumni liason).

Members benefit from the group's contact with Rhodes alumni as well as other notable leaders in the Memphis community. Despite a few tough losses during the season, the Lynx football team fought during their final game against Millsaps and emerged victorious in a thrilling double overtime $9-6$ win, resulting in a $5-4$ season. The Lynx opened their season earlier in the year at Depauw University, beating the Tigers 17-12 and setting a SCAC season record of number of interceptions in a game with four interceptions.

Individual players fared well among SCAC statistics. Andy English ranks among the game leaders for not only the number of field goals made in a game with three against Colorado College but also the longest field goal with a 49 -yard goal against Centre College, C.W. Sheehan, Sylvester Chisom, and Corliss Givens also rank among the leaders of the SCAC for interceptions in a game.

Kevin Gennusa and Bernard Quinn are among the leading rushers in the SCAC with 69.4 and 54.4 rushing yards per game, respectively. Gennusa is also among the leading all-purpose players with 82.6 average yards per game, and Chris Huff is among leading tacklers, turning in an average of 8.7 tackles per game. With many starters returning next season, the future for Lynx football is bright. Captain William. Henry said, "You can't evaluate a season by your record alone. I definitely had fun playing this year, and I think we did a lot of good things for next year's team to build on. Next year's team should be pretty fun to watch."
