<u>Description</u>: Religious Studies 101 is an introduction to the "Life" sequence of courses through the academic study of the Bible and the traditions of its interpretation. Our section of the course will focus on the concept of the kingdom of God in the Hebrew Bible, New Testament, and recent interpretations of them, especially as we approach the new millenium in the year 2000.
