
We also help students bridge the gap with SOS—Serving Our Students. Upperclass students of color are paired with first-years, allowing first-years to find meaningful networks by connecting with the campus community.

We bridge the tuition gap, too

Rhodes is more affordable than you may think. Financial aid records from 2006-07 show that:

- The average financial aid package of students with demonstrated need was \$26,000.
- The average financial aid package of students without demonstrated need was \$14,350.
- Rhodes met or exceeded the total demonstrated need of 80% of the students in the first-year class.


Come bridge the gap with us at Rhodes, where it's a way of life, not just an expression.




