Rhodes at a Glance

The College

One of America's premier liberal arts and sciences colleges, Rhodes is located in Memphis, Tennessee, and is affiliated with the Presbyterian Church.

The Campus

Quietly nestled in an attractive residential neighborhood, the beautiful campus is composed of 100 wooded acres and 46 Gothic stone buildings. Thirteen Rhodes buildings are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The new, \$42 million Barret Library was completed in 2005.

The Students

There are approximately 1,700 students representing 43 states and ten foreign countries. Seventy-seven percent of students live on campus.

Academics

Rhodes offers 24 majors and 27 minors as well as eight interdisciplinary majors. Students also have the opportunity to build an individual major. Students work with a faculty advisor all four years and declare a major by the end of their sophomore year.

Course Schedule

Classes meet for 50 minutes on Monday, Wednesday and Friday or 75 minutes on Tuesday and Thursday. Students take four courses per semester and earn four credits per course. Our liberal arts and sciences curriculum is based on 12 foundation requirements, which can be found in our catalog.

The Faculty

Ninety-five percent of our full-time faculty hold the Ph.D. or other terminal degree in their discipline.

Class Size

Rhodes has an average class size of 13 students and a student-to-faculty ratio of 11:1.

74% acceptance to medical school, 95% for students with at least a 3.4 GPA and 26 on the MCAT 95% acceptance to law school 100% acceptance to business and divinity schools 90-100% for all other graduate programs

Student Government

Rhodes Student Government:

student-elected members represent the needs and concerns of the student body to the faculty and administration.

The Honor Council:

student-elected representatives uphold the Honor Code and rule on violations of the Code.

The Social Regulations Council:

student-elected representatives investigate social offenses and enforce regulations pertaining to social and moral conduct.

Rhodes Activities Board:

produces a wide variety of campus events to unite the campus and promote responsible social activity.

Community Service

A variety of programs provide students with opportunities to serve the community through dozens of campus- and community-based service organizations. Projects include tutoring children, working with the elderly, health care, hunger and homelessness services, a student-run soup kitchen, community organizing, Habitat for Humanity, and alternative Spring Break trips to Mexico. Over 80% of Rhodes students participate in community service during their years at Rhodes.


Fine Arts

Campus Safety

Campus Safety provides a number of services including 24 hour surveillance cameras, escort service, campus access (access onto campus is primarily controlled at the two welcome centers), emergency telephone service and strategic city monitoring.

Financial Aid

More than 75% of our students receive some form of financial assistance. The average Rhodes student with demonstrated financial need receives more than \$28,000 per year in a combination of fellowships, scholarships, grants, loans, and work study. Each year more than 50% of all entering students receive four-year competitive scholarships, fellowships, and awards that average over \$13,500 per year.
