# FILM STUDIES PROGRAM

Film Studies (FS) at Rhodes College offers a critical understanding of the history, theory, and criticism of moving images. Interdisciplinary by design, FS course offerings are drawn from Art, English, History, and Modern Languages and Literatures, providing students with analytical tools for evaluating varied film styles and movements and their relationship to other cultural phenomena. More broadly, FS courses stress the key components of a solid liberal arts education, with strong emphasis on critical thinking, effective and engaging writing, informed research and analysis across disciplines, and an appreciation of diverse ideas and interpretive methodologies. FS is one of the fastest growing areas of concentration at American colleges and universities, largely because in today's multimedia world, audio-visual literacy has become essential for careers in a variety of professional fields, including writing, business, education, government, public relations, and entertainment.

#### FILM STUDIES MINOR

A total of twenty (20) credit hours as follows:

#### **ENGL 202: Introduction to Cinema**

An introduction to film analysis. Students learn and practice close readings of films through an examination of technical elements (*mise en scène*, cinematography, editing, sound, and so on) as well as issues of ideology, aesthetics, and power.

#### Three courses designated as Film Studies Electives.

(One of these requirements may be satisfied by a directed inquiry or an internship.)

### **ENGL 382: Film Theory**

An advanced seminar where students investigate major paradigms and debates in classical and contemporary film theory, such as realism, montage, auteur theory, genre, semiotics and psychoanalysis, apparatus and spectatorship theory, feminist and queer theory, critical race theory, cultural studies, globalization, and digitization.
