## Two Major Gifts To Southwestern

### HYDE FAMILY GIVES \$130,000

Memorial gifts totaling \$130,000 were presented to Southwestern by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Reeves Hyde, Sr. and family in memory of Miss Ruth Sherman Hyde, their daughter. The donation was divided into two parts—\$125,000 to be used for building a women's gymnasium and swimming pool adjacent to the present gym, and the remaining \$5,000 to be used for financing a mathematics faculty office in the new Science Center.

Mr. Joseph Hyde is chairman of the board of Malone & Hyde, Inc., wholesale food distributors, a firm he helped form in 1907 with the late Taylor Malone.

Donors of the \$5,000 gift were Mrs. Jane Hyde Scott '30 and her daughter, Mrs. Daly Thompson, Jr. '58. Their gift is in memory of their late husband and father, Robert A. Scott '30.

Participating in the other share of the gift are Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Hyde, Jr., both of the class of 1932, parents of Mrs. Charles Boone (Susan Hyde '62), and Miss Margaret Ruffin Hyde '34, who is closely affiliated with Southwestern as present alumni advisor for the Chi Omega chapter.

An enlarged program of physical education for women will be made

possible by the construction of the Ruth Sherman Hyde Memorial. The exact cost is not yet known, but the Hyde family gift constitutes a substantial portion.

### MR. E. H. LITTLE GIVES \$100,000

The largest pledge Southwestern has received from an individual was announced when Mr. E. H. Little of New York and Memphis, retired president and chairman of the board of the Colgate-Palmolive Co., presented a gift of \$100,000 in early January. The benefaction is in honor of Mr. Little's late wife, the former Miss Suzanne Trezevant of Memphis, and in memory of her parents, M. B. Trezevant, Memphis banker, and his wife, Susan Keith Trezevant.

Mrs. Little was the aunt of Stanley H. Trezevant, Jr. '46.

Southwestern president David Alexander '53 said the \$100,000 gift will be used as matching funds in the Challenge Campaign to raise 3.8 million dollars, in an attempt to match two for one the 1.9 million-dollar Ford Foundation grant.

Mr. Little said he was impressed by the fact that Southwestern is one of three Southern colleges recently added to the list of colleges and universities aided by the Ford Foundation.

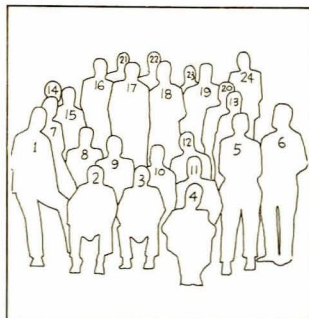
The group of ten men and ten women set a new Southwestern record for the largest number in the history of the school to be selected for this honor.

## DILEMMA '66 Society in Search of a Purpose

A challenging project was undertaken by the Southwestern student body in the spring of 1964, and after two years of diligent and enthusiastic effort this dream will become a reality on February 25-26, 1966.

**Dilemma '66**, to be a symposium of some magnitude, will be comparable to similar programs on the campuses of Princeton, Wake Forest, Randolph-Macon and Vanderbilt. With guidance from the administration, a student committee is handling all aspects from contacting potential speakers to obtaining financial assistance.

As a student-initiated and student-sponsored symposium, **Dilemma '66** is a meaningful representation of the Southwestern student's desire to expand his means of learning and his willingness to take the responsibility for its fulfillment upon himself. The purpose of **Dilemma '66**, then, is to complement the classroom scene; it will constitute a synthesis of knowledge practically applied to 20th century society. The fruits of individual application are evident in the speakers themselves, all of whom are prominent in their fields.

### To Create an Awareness

It is these men whose stimulating talks will prompt an evaluation of today's purpose and create an awareness in tomorrow's society of its need for a conscious direction. A stand such as that demanded can be intelligently taken only after gaining understanding of the actions and attitudes of today's leaders. It will be the purpose of **Dilemma '66** to make possible the con-

frontation of an open-minded society with several prevalent topics.

Dr. Arthur Larson, professor of law at Duke University and past presidential and State Department consultant, has consented to participate in the symposium.

Dr. Frank Barron, a research psychologist at the University of California and the author of several publications, will take part.

Another representative from the area of science is Dr. Charles Hudson, president-elect of the American Medical Association.

From the field of religion, **Dilemma '66** was able to interest Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, Stated Clerk of the United Presbyterian Church. He is past president of the National Council of Churches.

Also from the field of religion is Dr. James Daane, assistant editor of **Christianity Today**.

### Jesse Hill Ford to Speak

Author Jesse Hill Ford from Humboldt, Tennessee will bring the literary arts to the symposium. His latest book, **The Liberation of Lord Byron Jones**, was a Book of the Month selection for July, 1965.

In the field of politics, **Dilemma '66** is proud to have several outstanding men. Senator Thruston Morton, Republican from Kentucky, and presently chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, will speak, as will Morris King Udall, a freshman Representative from Arizona.

**David L. Osborn**, 396 N Street S.W., Washington, was recently appointed deputy assistant Secretary of State for Educational and Cultural Affairs. After graduation from Southwestern, David studied Chinese at Harvard. By the time WWII broke out, he was proficient in Chinese, plunged into the study of Japanese, was selected by the Navy as a Japanese language officer, and spent the war years in the Pacific. In 1945, he was escorting two Japanese prisoners to the Marshall Islands and the newly formed War Crimes

investigating group there. Arizona Senator William Mahoney was at that time the prosecuting attorney for the Navy Trial Commission. They met and became friends; David stayed on to help Senator Mahoney work up some of the most famous war trials in U. S. military history. In Phoenix recently, the two reminisced, recalling the time they "out-smarted protocol and wangled themselves guests-of-honor privileges at General McArthur's headquarters," and some of the dare-devil exploits that took David alone into enemy territory and on to high decorations for valor. Since those days, he has received his M.A. from Harvard, joined the Foreign Service, and continued language training at Yale and Harvard. He was assigned to the diplomatic section of the staff of the Supreme Commander of the Allied Powers in Tokyo, and in 1949 was loaned to USIA for a two year stint in Taiwan. Subsequently, he has served in the U. S. Office of Chinese Affairs, as adviser to Ambassador U. Alexis Johnson in talks with Chinese Communists, and as political counselor in Taipei and chief of internal affairs in Tokyo. An expert on political reporting, negotiating, and foreign service, he has just been handed something brand new. His present assignment is one of administration. He explains, "The Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, that was started in 1938 with eight people and a budget of \$28,000, today has a Washington staff of 400, 300 USIA overseas employees, and an annual budget of \$55 million. It conducts exchanges with 130 countries from which, last year, 9000 persons were brought over to the U. S." In spite of such impressive figures, David continues to adhere to the basic philosophy of the department: "That the primary role of government in cultural relations (abroad) is to encourage the widest possible initiative by non-governmental organizations—colleges, universities, foundations, corporations, women's organizations."

Recently announced: the association of **T. H. "Bill" Smith** as a registered representative with Howard, Weil, Labouisse, Friedrichs and Company, Investment Securities, with offices in the Memphis Bank Building.

An article in a recent Memphis newspaper carried the headline "Memphian's Outfit is 'Good Neighbor,'" and told the story of the men of the 10th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing of the U. S. Air Force. Commanded by **Col. DeWitt S. Spain**, the unit, based at Alconbury, England, won the silver cup offered by the commander-in-chief of the Air Force in Weisbaden, Germany, to the USAF installation that had developed the best community relations. This is the first time any unit based in the United Kingdom has won the cup. A few examples of how DeWitt's men swing into action to help out in local emergencies? When five nuns arrived from the U. S. to set up a convent in Daventry, Northampton, 19 airmen—not all of them Roman Catholics—spent their weekends whitewashing ceilings, cleaning out rain gutters, and weeding the garden for the sisters; when the owner of a mink farm near Alconbury let it be known that the noise of the jets causes the minks to have miscarriages, orders went out from the colonel that no jets fly over the farm during the breeding season; Christmas, 1964, the airmen repaired over 2,000 toys to distribute to needy families and provided food baskets for 60 elderly persons—they had even bigger plans for Christmas, 1965. DeWitt is quoted as saying, "Good community relations are a hard-headed business proposition. The better we get along with the local population, the better we can do our work on the base."

In December, Memphis became the first city of its size in America in which three home builders have won the Better Building Citation Award in one year . . . one of the winners was **Vernon Kerns**. For the past three years, Vernon and his wife, Pat, have been creating an adaptation of Colonial Williamsburg in their Heritage Colony, a subdivision inspired by the 18th century town. Their idea is not to presume to recreate Williamsburg, but rather to build on the best from the past with the best from today. The

traditional 18th century architecture remains a handsome style which adapts readily to modern demands . . . the 18th century Williamsburg story-and-one-half allows for minimum land consumption, half the necessary roof construction, and complete lack of wasted space under attic areas . . . garages adapt their exteriors from stables, carriage houses, and removed kitchens of Williamsburg. As the only builders, as well as developers, in Heritage Colony, the Kerns have used only underground wiring. Further control over the finished picture is maintained through the forbiddance of exposed carports, chain-link or other inappropriate fencing. Vernon refuses to duplicate any exterior, and will not build the Williamsburg facade in any other subdivision. Builders and developers from all over the country are interested in doing a Heritage Colony in their towns, and the Kerns are working on a franchise package operation which would free the builders themselves from the vast amount of research, study and "ironing-out the wrinkles" it has taken to develop Heritage Colony.
