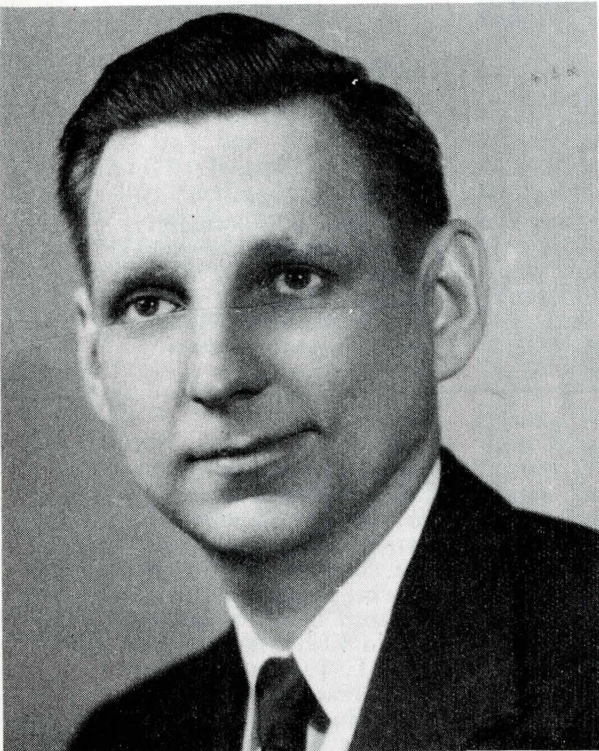

Jay W. Stein Assumes Duties As Librarian

The new librarian is Dr. Jay W. Stein, who came to Southwestern on March 1 from the New York Public Library. He fills the position formerly held by Miss Mary Marsh, who left Southwestern on January 1 after almost twenty-five years of service as head of the library.

During his brief professional career Dr. Stein has engaged in an amazing number and variety of scholarly pursuits. A native of Sauk Centre, Minnesota, and the son of a Lutheran clergyman, he attended the University of Minnesota, which granted him the Bachelor of Arts degree, cum laude, in 1942. His fields of major interest in the university were German and French. While there he was admitted to membership in Phi Beta Kappa.

In 1943 he was commissioned an ensign in the navy and spent four years in the service doing educational, public relations, intelligence, language, and chemical warfare work.

In 1949 he received his Master of Arts degree in political science at Stanford University. In 1950 he took a Master of Science degree at Columbia University's School of Library Service, and in 1952 he received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Columbia in the field of political science. The title of his dissertation was "The Ideologues: Their Theories and Politics," a study of the intellectuals during the French Revolution and the Napoleonic era.

Among his other articles and papers are: "A Classified Bibliography of Arbitration,"

Synod Of Mississippi Launches \$200,000 Drive

The Synod of Mississippi is in the midst of a campaign to raise \$200,000 for the Southwestern Development Fund. The drive was launched on February 1, with the Central Presbyterian Church, of Jackson, as headquarters, and with Mr. Jameson C. Jones, of Corinth, as General Chairman. The Reverend Marc C. Weersing is pastor of the Central Church in Jackson. Mr. Thomas D. Davies, of the New York firm of Ward, Well, Dreshman, and Reinhardt is Campaign Director. Plans call for the completion of the campaign by May 1.

The members of Synod's General Committee, in addition to Mr. Jones, are as follows: Mr. Samuel C. Caldwell, of Hazlehurst, represents the Mississippi Presbytery; Mr. Otis M. Barry of Jackson, the Central Mississippi Presbytery; Dr. John K. Johnson, Oxford, the North Mississippi Presbytery; and the Reverend Walter L. Bader, Moss Point, the Meridian Presbytery.

The Reverend S. E. McFadden, of the First Presbyterian Church, of Tupelo; Mr. Ed Edens, of Okolona, and Mrs. Edens represent the Presbytery of East Mississippi.

The Reverend Grayson L. Tucker, of the Laurel Church; Mr. Harold Barber, of Gulfport; and Mrs. Jerry Alexander, of Hattiesburg, represent the Meridian Presbytery.

The Reverend W. H. McAtee, of the Brookhaven Church; Mr. Neil Beck, of Columbia; and Mrs. Irvine Anderson, of Natchez, represent the Presbytery of Mississippi.

The Reverend R. A. Bolling, of the Cleveland Church; Mr. Lewis Graeber, Jr., of Marks; and Mrs. Jack Webb, of Sumner, represent the Presbytery of North Mississippi.

Last year the Synod of Louisiana conducted a joint campaign, with Southwestern and the Negro Work of the Church as the beneficiaries.

With a goal of \$300,000, \$240,000 was pledged, of which \$160,000 is to come to Southwestern. It is possible that the remaining \$60,000 of the \$300,000 target will be raised, in which case a total of \$200,000 would come to the College.

Mrs. Sidney W. Farnsworth Gives Shakespeare Collection

Mrs. Sidney W. Farnsworth, of Memphis, has recently presented to Southwestern a very unusual and valuable collection of Shakespeare materials. It consists of about one thousand engravings of Shakespearean actors who were great names of the theatre

Coach Mays

Coach Mays Lays Plans For Lynx Eleven of '54

Southwestern has recently signed a new football coach—Richard C. (Rick) Mays, of Memphis. An alumnus, he played his college football at Southwestern and coached here under Shorty Propst in 1937.

He has entered upon his new duties with enthusiasm and is shaping plans for the '54 campaign. He expects to install a "T" formation modeled on that used so successfully at Georgia Tech in recent years.

E. A. ("Oscar") Wright, who was line coach during the past year, will assist Mays in developing his team.

In gaining Coach Mays Southwestern is not losing anyone from its coaching staff. During the past few years Glenn Johnson, Head Coach and Director of Athletics, has coached four sports, football, basketball, baseball and track, three of them without assistants—much too heavy a burden for even a man of Coach Johnson's energy. When Coach Johnson asked to be relieved of football the athletic committee immediately and enthusiastically recommended to the Administration that Coach Mays be secured if possible.

Rick played football four years at Southwestern. At that time he tipped the scales at a burly 130 pounds and thought nothing of playing a full sixty minutes against such Southeastern Conference teams as Tennessee. During the 1935 campaign he played 58 minutes against such giants from Ole Miss as Bruiser Kinard and Buster Poole.

Coach Mays is a Memphis insurance man, but he has not been able to get far away

in co-operation with the American Arbitration Association; "A Classification for Communications Materials," for Columbia University; "The Soviet Intelligensia," published in the *Russian Review*, 1951; and "Inventor of the Airplane: New Soviet Version," which appeared in the *American and East European Review* in 1951.

Despite these scholarly activities, Dr. Stein has also found time to study Modern European and Ancient Grecian Civilization at Oxford University in England and has done graduate work in Georgetown University, in Washington, D. C. In addition he has studied Russian at the United States Academy of Languages and at the University of Colorado Navy School of Oriental Languages.

Among the positions he has held are the following: research assistant at Hoover Library and Institute, Stanford, California; bibliographer for the Russian Collections at Columbia University Libraries and Russian Institute, in New York; consultant with the Communication Study of the Russel Sage Foundation at Columbia University; organizer of the Library of the American Arbitration Association in New York; instructor in public communications at Columbia's School of Library Science; and cataloguer in economics, New York University, Washington Square Library.

Since March, 1953, he has been catalogue planner in economics and related fields in the New York Public Library, Preparations Division.

His official title at Southwestern will be Librarian and Assistant Professor of Social Studies.

Accompanying Dr. Stein to Memphis was Mrs. Stein, who holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Barnard College in New York, and a Master of Arts degree from Columbia University.

in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. In these engravings they are dressed in costumes which they made familiar through their portrayals of the various Shakespeare characters.

The prints were collected by Mrs. Farnsworth's grandfather, William Appleton Drown, who owned an umbrella and parasol manufacturing company in Philadelphia. Acquiring the prints was for him the expression of a genuine interest in Shakespeare and an exciting adventure in a pioneer field. Fortunately his business made it necessary for him to make frequent trips to Europe, and he always brought home from these trips a rich harvest of prints.

Mr. Drown had intended to mount his pictures in fine leather folios, but he died prematurely at the age of fifty-four, before he was able to realize his plans.

Among the pictures are those of Mrs. Siddons, celebrated eighteenth century actress, immortalized in a portrait by Sir Joshua Reynolds; John Kimble, manager of Drury Lane Theatre and Covent Garden Theatre, who was also an outstanding actor; and Charles Macready, the outstanding Shakespeare actor in the first half of the nineteenth century.

The prints show very clearly the kind of costume and staging used in Shakespearean productions in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries and provide valuable pictorial information on the history of the theatre.

The collection will be housed in the Burrow Library. In behalf of the college President Rhodes has expressed his gratitude to Mrs. Farnsworth for this unique gift.

David E. Matthews, Physicist

Professors and students returning from Christmas vacations were shocked to learn of the death of Professor David E. Matthews, Professor of Physics, on December 29, 1953. He became ill during November and had required an operation, but on the campus his condition was not thought to be critical. He was only thirty-four.

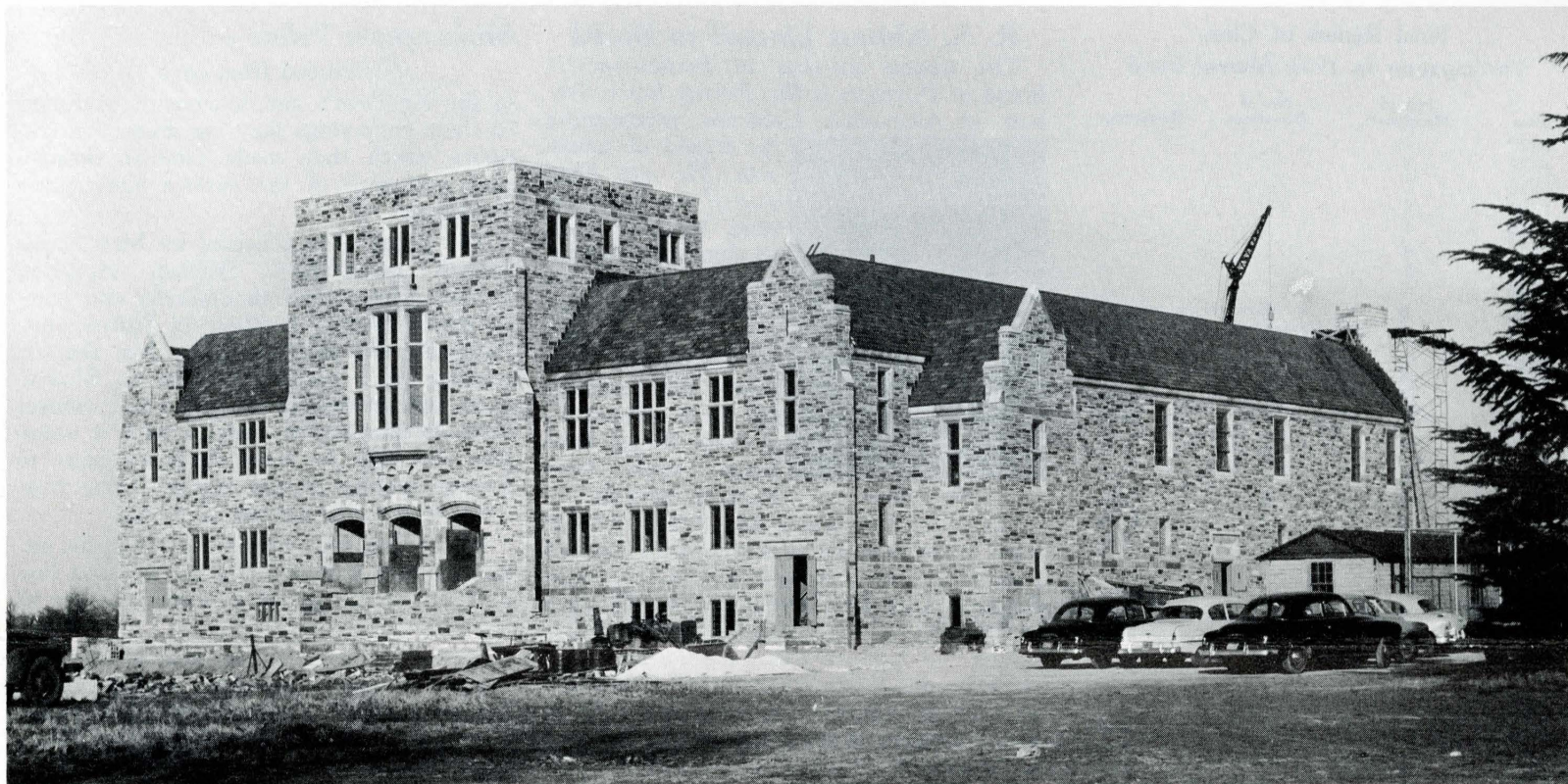
Dr. Matthews' home was in Union, Kentucky, where his parents still live. He received his higher education at Western Kentucky, Ohio State University, and Vanderbilt. From the last he received his Ph.D. degree. Before coming to Southwestern in 1952, he taught in Ohio State, Birmingham-Southern, Vanderbilt and Ole Miss.

Last summer he did special research work at Oak Ridge and this fall was beginning work under a \$9,400 grant from the National Science Foundation. His project was entitled "Critical Energy for Secondary Electron Emission."

He had to his credit several technical publications in addition to his dissertation.

The entire college community deeply regrets the loss of so excellent a professor and so fine a gentleman.

He is survived by his wife, the former Eleanor Elizabeth Pickard, of Montgomery, Alabama; David, Jr., two and a half; and Carol, five.

Mary Clay, who holds the position of film librarian for The Commercial Appeal television station, took about six months to type "The Collector's Item" into 300 pages of Braille.
