We espouse the philosophy that it is through the exchange of ideas brought on, in particular, by educational experiences that include direct human-to-human contact with peoples of other cultures that we can best help prepare you to meet the challenges and reap the joys of working and living in our complex and interdependent world.

The Rhodes Vision states that the "College aspires to graduate students with a life-long passion for learning, a compassion for others, and the ability to translate academic student and personal concern into effective leadership and action in their communities and the world." To this end, the College has made a commitment "to attract and retain a talented, diverse student body and engage these students in a challenging, inclusive and culturally-broadening college experience." Culturally broadening experiences include study, work or service abroad.

The study of human culture can take place as close to home as one's neighborhood and as far away as the other side of the globe. However, because culture involves learned beliefs and behaviors, it can often be best appreciated and studied through opportunities that promote sustained contact and interaction with people who have learned to see the world through a different lens. To truly and profoundly appreciate

another culture, we must experience it first hand —its systems, languages, creations, biases, and values —and become personally acquainted with those who live in and have helped create that culture. International educational experiences provided by study, work, or service abroad present a wealth of opportunities to broaden and intensify students' understanding of how culture has formed the way they think and view the world.

Under the heading of "study abroad" Rhodes students may participate in programs designed and operated by Rhodes College, programs sponsored by Rhodes College, direct exchange programs, or programs operated by other institutions—Non-Rhodes programs. There are very important differences among these program categories, and because study abroad requires substantial planning, students interested in such a course of study should clarify their plans well in advance of their intended trip abroad.



Rhodes offers a number of summer study experiences through programs in Europe and Latin America. Rhodes College financial aid is not available for these programs. However, there are some scholarships for which students may apply.

ELIGIBILITY

Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.50 unless otherwise specified and must be in good social standing. Students are reviewed on the basis of their complete academic record, timely submission of required documents, and maturity. Students not meeting the specified criteria may request a review of their application.

BRITISH STUDIES AT OXFORD

In July and August, students live and study for six weeks in St. John's College, one of the most beautiful and distinguished colleges of Oxford University. The program each year chooses a period of British history and culture on which to concentrate and offers a large number of seminars from a wide range of disciplines (seminars in literature, political history, social history, religious history, history of science, art and architecture, political science, philosophy, and music are regularly offered). The seminars are specially designed for the program and are taught by a carefully selected British and American faculty. Integral to the program are study visits to sites crucial to that year's theme and theater visits to Stratford-upon-Avon and London. The fee for participation includes all these elements, as well as full board and lodging (single rooms) throughout the program. All students take two seminars and may earn up to 9 hours of academic credit. The program is structured so that all teaching for the week usually ends before lunch on Thursdays, allowing students the opportunity to travel independently over the long weekends, and many students travel extensively on their own either before or after the program.

SERVICE LEARNING IN HONDURAS

This three-week experiential seminar provides a setting in which students examine and reflect upon the cultural, social, political and international forces operating in rural and urban Honduras. Students study the process of transformation associated with the collaborative efforts of a non-governmental organization, Heifer Project International. Service is an integral part of the program and participants are expected to work with local leaders and community members on various projects. Most lodging is arranged in guest houses. At least one college-level year of Spanish is strongly recommended.

CORAL REEF ECOLOGY

This intensive two-week field course exposes students to the organisms and biological/geological processes of modern and ancient coral reefs. The program is located at the Institute of Marine Sciences, Roatan Island, Honduras. All students will snorkel and certified divers will SCUBA. Students stay in four-person cabins and three sumptuous meals are served daily. Students enroll in the first two courses of this program during the Spring Semester on campus and receive either upper-level Biology course credit or Natural Science credit.

SUMMER INTENSIVE LANGUAGE PROGRAMS

Rhodes conducts four summer language immersion programs: France, Russia, Spain, and Ecuador. Accompanied by a Rhodes faculty member, students travel to a location in another country for four weeks of total immersion in the language and culture of that country. Rhodes College financial aid is not available for these programs. Generally, a total of four credit hours can be earned. To be eligible for an intensive language program, in some cases, one year of college level work is required. The following are brief descriptions of the language programs:

FRANCE

The Eurocentre Paris provides an ideal environment in which to learn French in classes of 12-15 students. Academic credit may be granted for French 205, 305, or 308 elective. The Eurocentre is located in the heart of the Latin Quarter, near sites such as the Sorbonne, Notre Dame, the Louvre and the Centre Pompidou. Excursion packages to places such as Versailles, Chartres, and the Loire chateaux are optional. Student housing is provided in French homes, and students are provided with two meals per day.

RUSSIA

Students may earn up to 7 hours credit for this four-week program. Credit may be awarded from Foreign Languages, History, Art or IS. Students study at the Gornyi Institute in St. Petersburg, Russia. Tours and sightseeing to nearby points of interest, as well as Moscow and Novgorod, are included. The students live in a Gornyi Dormitory during their four-week stay.

SPAIN

Students study Spanish language and culture at an established language center in either Salamanca or El Puerto de Santa Maria, attending class four hours a day, five days a week. Academic credit for Spanish 205 or 305 may be granted. There are numerous field trips to points of interest such as Toledo, Segovia, Cordoba, Granada and Seville. Excursion fees are included in the cost. Student housing is provided in Spanish homes, and students are provided with three meals per day.

ECUADOR

The course is conducted in conjunction with Estudio Sampere in Cuenca, located in the southern part of Ecuador's central highlands. Cuenca is the capital of the state Azuay, the country's third largest city and site of three major universities. It offers an active cultural calendar and vibrant city life while still providing the increased safety and convenience of a provincial town. Classes are held four hours a day, five days a week. There are no more than five students per class. Academic credit for Spanish 209 or 309 may be granted. Excursions to nearby cities, national parks, and sites of historical and archeological significance are included in the program. Student housing is provided in Ecuadorian homes and students are provided with three meals a day.

Internships abroad can occur as part of a study abroad program or can be a work-only experience. Several non-Rhodes programs provide quality internships during the summer or academic year. Eligibility requirements vary by program. Please see the Director of International Programs for more information.

THE MERTIE W. BUCKMAN INTERNATIONAL INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The Mertie W. Buckman
International Internship is a
merit-based program that places
outstanding International
Studies majors for two months
during the summer with an
international company.



The fellowship competition is open to all IS majors except for graduating seniors who will not be returning to Rhodes in the fall. Eligibility requirements are: a GPA of at least 3.2 both overall and in the major; the completion of at least four IS courses, plus Economics 101 and 102 or equivalent; and fluency in the relevant foreign language. Successful candidates will be expected to complete a research project and to present a twenty page report due by the end of the first month of the fall semester following the internship.

Competition will open on **November 1**. Application packets may be picked up at the International Studies Department, 107 Buckman Hall. Complete applications are due in the IS department office no later than **December 1**.

THE MORRELLE LEGG INTERNATIONAL INTERNSHIP FOR WOMEN

The Morrelle Legg International Internship for Women is a merit-based scholarship funded by an anonymous donor. It is awarded annually to one female student with a major in business or economics to allow her to obtain work experience in a foreign country during the summer following her junior year. The selection committee considers factors such as overall and major grade point average, completion of relevant business courses, and language skills in evaluating candidates. Applications will be available in the office of the Department of Economics and Business as of November 1, and completed applications are due no later than December 1.

Rhodes has exchange agreements with many institutions abroad. The terms of these agreements are simple: each student involved is responsible for paying tuition and other fees at his/her home institution. That payment allows the Rhodes student and the student from abroad to take each other's place during the semester or academic year of exchange. Although absent from Rhodes' campus due to the exchange, these students are still considered Rhodes students and are eligible for Rhodes College financial aid. All instruction is given in the language of the host country; therefore students must have at least an intermediate level of language proficiency. Rhodes exchange agreements are operated on a reciprocal basis; participant selection is competitive.

ELIGIBILITY

Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.50 unless otherwise specified and must be in good social standing. Students are reviewed on the basis of their complete academic record, timely submission of required documents, and maturity. Students not meeting the specified criteria may request a review of their application.

Exchange programs include:

BELGIUM

The University of Antwerp (UFSIA) is one of the most distinguished universities in Belgium. It attracts students from all over Europe. As a medium-sized university, UFSIA's enrollment totals approximately 3,500 full-time students. Faculty and staff include some 600 members.


The Faculty of Applied Economics is one of the largest and most famous in the country (with approximately 2,500 students). It is situated in 16th century unique historical buildings in the center of the city, while the Law, Languages, History, Literature, Philosophy and Political and Social Sciences are accommodated in modern buildings nearby.

Students will appreciate Antwerp's location in Europe. Brussels, the capital of Belgium, is a twenty minute train ride away. Now commonly called 'the capital of Europe', Brussels hosts European Union and NATO headquarters, as well as many other organizations.

From Antwerp you can quickly and at a reasonable price reach Amsterdam (2 hours), Luxembourg (3 hours), Paris (3 1/2 hours), London (4 hours) and many German cities. Weekend travel is a real possibility. Accommodation is provided in student housing. Students may study for either a semester or academic year. Courses taught in the Faculty of Applied Economics are taught in English. For additional information on The University of Antwerp please visit http://www.ua.ac.be.

SPAIN

The Universitas Nebrissensis is a private university dedicated to teaching applied research in the area of the Social Sciences (Economics, Law,



FRANCE

Residence hall accommodations are available. Students may study for either one semester or for an academic year. Students studying at the university have commented on the university town atmosphere and good location. PERU

The University of Lima is a large, modern university founded in 1962. The university is one of Lima's premier private institutions and offers a full range of courses. Students should consult their faculty advisor and the Director of International Programs for specific course information and advice. Students are housed with families chosen by the university, enabling the students to become fully immersed in the language and culture of Peru. Cultural and recreational opportunities are varied in the metropolitan area, including theater, symphony, opera, ballet, and numerous museums. More detailed information about the university's history, curriculum, and faculty can be obtained by viewing their web site: www.ulima.edu.pe.

SCOTLAND

The University of Aberdeen is located in Aberdeen, Scotland on the edge of the North Sea. It is about 500 miles from London, or a little over one hour by plane. Aberdeen is known as the oil capital of Europe. Since the university was founded in 1495 and has over 9,000 students, Aberdeen is also known as a university town. The University of Aberdeen provides students with a

wide array of courses to choose from; however the university is primarily known as a major science center with some thirty departments or specialist units offering undergraduate courses in scientific study. Accommodations are provided in single rooms in one of the residence halls. Students may study at Aberdeen for either a semester or academic year. GERMANY


The Eberhard-Karls-Universitat Tübingen has a reputation as one of the outstanding universities in Europe. Founded in 1477, the institution has had a significant influence on the course of German intellectual history. Tübingen is located about an hour's train ride from Stuttgart, Germany. It is considered a small university town; however, there are approximately 26,000 students enrolled in the university. Private housing is very difficult to procure in the city and students are urged to apply to be housed in a student dormitory as soon as possible. Students may study for either a semester or academic

SOUTH AFRICA

Rhodes University in Grahamstown, South Africa is a perfect place for students interested in living in a very different culture and studying any number of disciplines in English. The university is located in Grahamstown, about 550 miles from Cape Town, on the eastern cape of South Africa. Rhodes University was named after Cecil Rhodes. One of the university's distinctive features is its tutorial system, modeled closely on those of Cambridge and Oxford universities. Students are assigned tutors and tutorial groups within academic departments. Student enrollment is about 4.500. Accommodation is provided in one of the residence halls. Students may study at Grahamstown for either the spring semester or for an academic year. For additional information on Rhodes University please visit their website at www.rhodes.ac.za.



The University of Poitiers is a large public university of about 28,000 students. Founded in 1431 by Pope Eugenius IV and granted a royal charter by King Charles VII, the University of Poitiers had become a leading cultural center by the Renaissance, second only to the Paris Sorbonne. Among its students one finds such illustrious poets, writers, and philosophers as Rabelais, Du Bellay, Guez de Ballzac, Descartes, and Sir Francis Bacon. Today the University of Poitiers is a vibrant, innovative part of the French higher education system and offers a great variety of undergraduate and graduate programs in the Humanities, Social Sciences, Fine Arts, and Natural Sciences.

Rhodes encourages its students to participate on semester-long or academic year-long programs abroad. Rhodes has developed special relationships with some institutions, promoting the study on these programs either by awarding Rhodes academic credit or by allowing Rhodes institutional aid to be applied to the cost of the program. Please note the specifics for any program to which you are applying.

EUROPEAN STUDIES

European Studies is a joint program of Rhodes College and The University of the South, administered through the Buckman Center for International Education at Rhodes College, offering students a choice between two seventeen-week semesters of study and travel abroad in Britain and on the Continent. The aim of European Studies is to offer a varied opportunity to study, on site, the history of the civilization of Western Europe. The program entails four weeks of study at The University of the South with Rhodes and Sewanee faculty, a 10-day practicum conducted by British tutors at the Universities of York and Durham, six weeks with British instructors at Lincoln College, Oxford University, and five weeks of travel in Western Europe, accompanied by the Dean of the Program and British tutors in Art History. The program begins in July at The University of the South, Sewanee, Tennessee and ends in November after a five-week study tour on the Continent.

The first option, Ancient Greece and Rome: The Foundations of Western Civilization, is a broad study of the culture and thinking of Ancient Greece and Rome, intended principally for those who are not specialist classicists. It is designed to show the fundamental contribution made by the arts and science of the Ancient World to modern Western civilization. For satisfactory completion of this seventeen-week academic experience, students can obtain 18 hours of credit: 6 in Ancient Literature, 6 in Philosophy, 3 in History, and 3 in Art History.

The second option is an interpreted and comprehensive cultural portrait of Western Europe in the Middle Ages and the Renaissance. For satisfactory completion of this academic experience, students can obtain 18 hours of credit: 6 in Art History, 3 in English Literature, 6 in History, and 3 in Reliaion.

The cost of the program includes all tuition; complete room and board while at Sewanee, York and Durham, and at Lincoln College; room and partial board while on the Continent and in London; all excursions while in York and Durham; several day expeditions while in Oxford; a theater visit to the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratford-on-Avon, and to the Royal

Ballet or a London show; all transportation while in Great Britain and on the Continent; and admissions to museums visited for study.

ARGENTINA

Students study in Buenos Aires at the Facultad Latinoamericana de Ciencias Sociales (FLACSO) taking courses in political science, economics, international studies, Argentine and Latin American history, philosophy, sociology, education, and Argentine and Latin American literature. All courses are taught in Spanish and a minimum of 2.75 GPA, three years of college level Spanish, and Latin American studies or social science work are required for admission. Students can attend either for an academic year or a semester. Student lodging is provided in Argentinean homes.

CHILE

Students may choose from the entire range of courses taught at the Universidad de Chile and the Pontificia Universidad Catolica de Chile. All courses are taught in Spanish and a minimum of 2.75 GPA is required as



well as three college level years of Spanish. All students take a two-week language and culture course as well. Students may attend this program for either an academic year or semester. Student housing is provided in Chilean homes.

AIX-EN-PROVENCE, FRANCE

The Aix-en-Provence Program is a semester or full year program conducted in cooperation with Vanderbilt University. Students attend classes taught by French faculty-scholars in the Vanderbilt Center located in the heart of this historic city. To be eligible for the program, students will have completed a minimum of four semesters of college French or the equivalent (i.e.:

French 202). All courses are taught in French. Standard offerings include courses on the European Union, French Literature, Grammar and Conversation, Contemporary France, the French Press, Francophone Film, Contemporary Philosophy, and 19th Century European Art. Those students with more advanced language skills and demonstrated curricular motivations have the opportunity to take courses at other institutions of higher education in Aix. Student housing is in private homes and is assigned according to student preference, ranging from rooms with close contact with hosts to semi-independent studios. Meals are taken with French families four days a week.

A total of 15 credit hours are possible per semester for the completion of the program. Hours earned are applied directly to major, minor and degree requirements and grades are factored into the Rhodes grade point average.

THE INTERNATIONAL STUDENT EXCHANGE PROGRAM (ISEP)

ISEP is a worldwide network for international education, consisting of 245 member institutions in the United States and more than 35 other countries. Since 1979, ISEP has made it possible for more than 21,000 students to study in another country. Through ISEP, Rhodes students have access to over 120 study sites in Africa, Asia, Canada, Europe, Latin America, and the South Pacific. ISEP participants register as regular students and participate in the same activities as students at the host institution. Except for language and civilization courses designed for international students, the courses that ISEP participants take are the same as those attended by local students. Through ISEP, Rhodes students can study abroad in English or in a foreign language. Courses in English are in English-speaking countries as well as in Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Hong Kong, Hungary, Iceland, Japan, Korea, Latvia, the Netherlands, South Africa, Sweden, and Thailand. If your main goal for study abroad is to

improve your language skills, you may select one of the sites that offer language and civilization courses for foreign students. Such programs are available in French, German and Spanish. Most sites offer intensive pre-session language programs or supplemental courses during the academic year to help you adjust; however, two or more years of college-level courses in the target language are strongly encouraged before participating in an ISEP foreign language program.

Rhodes students who want to participate in an ISEP exchange pay Rhodes tuition, room and board. There is also an ISEP application fee, as well as the fees incurred for airfare, text books, and other expenses related to study abroad. All Rhodes financial aid (merit scholarships, grants, need based aid, etc.) is transferable to defray the costs of the ISEP exchange programs. Grades earned at ISEP institutions will be treated as transfer credit for Rhodes students.

NON-RHODES PROGRAMS

In addition to Rhodes College programs, exchange programs, and Rhodessponsored programs, there are numerous programs offered by other institutions and agencies. Information on these programs can be found in the Buckman Center for International Education. Academic credit for these programs will be treated as transfer credit. Rhodes College financial aid is not available for these programs. However, Buckman Scholarships are available.

For other institutions' applications, you should write directly to the program. Addresses can be found on brochures or from reference books such as *Academic Year Abroad* or *Short-Term Study Abroad*. Program information can also be obtained from the web. Request a brochure, application form, course listings and descriptions for the intended term, current cost information, and answers to other specific inquiries. Helpful web sites include www.studyabroad.com and www.iiepassport.org. Please keep in mind that if you are planning to study on a Non-Rhodes program, you must complete two applications: Rhodes Off-Campus Study Approval Form and the application form for the Non-Rhodes program.

It may take longer than expected to aquire the signatures necessary for your application, even if your deadline is immenent. Don't wait until the last minute to aquire your signatures or you may miss program deadlines. This is applicable to all Rhodes and non-Rhodes programs.

Approval of courses for Non-Rhodes programs may require considerable time on the part of academic department chairs. You must plan to make arrangements to discuss your course selection with each department chair several weeks in advance of the Rhodes application deadlines.





DOMESTIC PROGRAMS

WASHINGTON SEMESTER

The Washington Semester is a 16-week immersion program at American University in Washington, D.C. The program consists of an internship, a seminar, and an elective course or research project. All applicants must be at least second-semester sophomores with a minimum 2.50 GPA. Upon successful completion of the program, students can earn 12-16 American University credits (depending on program choice) that will be credited as Rhodes grades. Scholarships, grants, and other work awards are available to qualified students.

FRONTIERS OF ENVIRONMENT AND CULTURE: NEW MEXICO FIELD COURSE

Students attend 8 hours of classroom preparation on Rhodes' campus before departing for a two-week field course in New Mexico. Participants explore strategies of sustainability across time and across cultures. Learn how people in this arid region locate, distribute, and preserve scarce resources such as water. Discover what their dwellings can tell us about their approach to natural resource use. Explore what these strategies suggest about their cultural values. A comparison will be made of the life ways of prehistoric Chacoan peoples, Apache, Spanish colonies, Mexican homesteaders, and American traders. Students will explore how these peoples were transformed by encounters between cultures. A service learning project while in New Mexico is also required. Students earn 3 hours of credit as Rhodes ID 250.

ELIGIBILITY

Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.50 unless otherwise specified and must be in good social standing. Students are reviewed on the basis of their complete academic record, timely submission of required documents, and maturity. Students not meeting the specified criteria may request a review of their application.

APPLICATION AND GENERAL INFORMATION

All students interested in off-campus study must meet with the Director of International Programs and complete an Off-Campus Study Approval Form. The Director will assist you in researching study abroad or other off-campus study opportunities, assure that your plans complement your major and degree requirements, and facilitate completion of your application. The necessary Rhodes application forms can be found in this brochure or in the Buckman Center for International Education.

For other institutions' applications, you should write directly to the program. Addresses can be found on brochures or from reference books such as *Academic Year Abroad* or *Short-Term Study Abroad*. Program information can also be obtained from the web. Request a brochure, application form, course listings and descriptions for the intended term, current cost information, and answers to other specific inquiries. Helpful web sites include: www.studyabroad.com and www.iiepassport.org. Please keep in mind that if you are planning to study on a Non-Rhodes program, you must complete two applications: Rhodes Off-Campus Study Approval Form and the application form for the other Non-Rhodes program.

It may take longer than expected to aquire the signatures necessary for your application, even if your deadline is immenent. Don't wait until the last minute to aquire your signatures or you may miss program deadlines. This is applicable to all Rhodes and non-Rhodes programs.

Approval of courses for Non-Rhodes programs may require considerable time on the part of academic department chairs. You must plan to make arrangements to discuss your course selection with each department chair several weeks in advance of the Rhodes application deadlines.

ADMISSION DETAILS

Once the student is accepted to study abroad, the Buckman Center for International Education will send an acceptance packet that includes a student pre-departure handbook.

DEADLINES

Rhodes applications are due on March 15 (or next business day) for summer, academic year, and fall semester programs, and October 15 (or next business day) for spring semester programs. Please note that Rhodes scholarship deadlines are October 1 and February 1. Application deadlines for Non-Rhodes programs vary.

PROGRAM FEES

Program fees for Rhodes programs vary but generally include tuition and housing.

CANCELLATION AND REFUND POLICY

In the event of cancellation of an entire session of a Rhodes program before commencement of the program, all monies paid to Rhodes prior to that time will be refunded. Should an unavoidable event such as epidemic, civil unrest, or the threat of terrorist activity result in a partial cancellation, a prorated refund of all fees, together with an appropriate evaluation of academic credit, will follow. These actions will terminate any further liability on the part of Rhodes.

In the event that a student chooses to withdraw from a program before the start date, refunds will be made only on recoverable costs, less the deposit. After the arrival date, refunds will be considered only in cases of serious illness or emergency requiring the student to return home. The amounts of such refunds are determined individually on the basis of costs recoverable by Rhodes at the time of withdrawal. Refunds for Non-Rhodes programs are dependent upon the policies of the sponsoring institution or provider.

Rhodes College reserves the right to cancel, alter, or amend any part of a Rhodes program or to increase fees should circumstances make these actions advisable or necessary.

MEDICAL INSURANCE

Health insurance is an important component of study abroad. Students participating on Rhodes programs and Rhodes exchange programs will be covered by a comprehensive international insurance plan mandated and paid for by Rhodes. Rhodes has chosen an excellent international health insurance provider: HTH Worldwide. The company has an established reputation and an excellent track record in handling claims in various languages and from medical providers around the world. A schedule of benefits can be obtained from the Buckman Center for International Education.

Students on non-Rhodes programs should check with their program to determine if insurance is provided. If it is not, comprehensive overseas medical coverage that includes medical emergency evacuation and repatriation of remains must be purchased independently.

PASSPORTS AND VISAS

Apply early for a U.S. passport. Processing an application takes four to six weeks—longer during the peak travel season. You may apply in person at selected post offices, at a federal or state court of record, or at one of the passport agencies of the U.S. State Department (www.travel.state.gov). A visa is written permission to visit a country granted by the government of that country. Visas (often student visas) are required by most countries for a semester or full year of study. However, in a majority of Latin American, African, Asian, and Oceanic countries, visas are required of all visitors no matter the duration of the stay. Check with a travel agency or with the

embassies or nearest consulates of the countries you plan to visit (locate them through www.embassy.org) to determine if a visa is necessary. If so, apply directly to the embassy or consulate of the country(ies) in question. Visas cannot be obtained from the Passport Service of the U.S. State Department.

HEALTH PRECAUTIONS / TRAVEL INFORMATION

Consult your physician six to eight weeks before you leave. Immunization requirements vary. Many countries require no immunization, however doctors recommend that everyone receive a primary series of immunizations against tetanus and diphtheria and a tetanus-diphtheria toxoid booster injection every ten years. If you are required for medical reasons to take any drug that may be subject to abuse statutes, be sure to have your prescription bottle and a copy of your prescription with you. Access to the latest information on health issues can be obtained via the Centers for Disease Control (CDC); you may visit the CDC website to determine whether any specific vaccinations are needed to visit a country or learn of any dangerous outbreaks of disease at www.cdc.gov. You may obtain U.S. Department of State travel warnings/advisories and consular information for the country to which you are traveling at www.travel.state.gov/ or www.travel.state.gov/travel warnings.html.

ACADEMIC CREDIT

Credit earned through Rhodes programs is Rhodes credit. Credit earned at institutions via exchange programs is also treated as Rhodes credit.

Satisfactory completion of courses abroad with certain other programs, closely related to Rhodes College, will also be treated as Rhodes credit.

Please confirm with a member of the Buckman Center for International Education staff the details of your course credits. Credit earned in programs sponsored by other institutions or agencies (Non-Rhodes programs) is treated as transfer credit. Normally a student cannot earn more credit while on a full-year study abroad program than could have been earned in a regular academic year at Rhodes.

REGISTRATION FOR SEMESTER OF RETURN

Registration instructions will be e-mailed and/or mailed to you prior to the time registration begins on campus provided that you have noted the correct overseas address on the Rhodes Off-Campus Study Approval Form or that you have sent the information to the Buckman Center for International Education.

HOUSING FOR SEMESTER OF RETURN

If you are to be away from Rhodes during the spring semester and plan to live on campus the following fall, a housing deposit of \$200.00 payable to the Rhodes College Bursar's Office is due February 1. By March 1, you must provide, to the Residence Life Office, the name of your proxy—the person who will act on your behalf during the housing selection process in March.

If you are to be away from Rhodes during the fall semester and plan to live on campus spring semester, you must put your name on the waiting list in the Residence Life Office. You are encouraged to contact Residence Life late in the fall semester to offer additional input with preferences. In most cases, you will be notified of your housing assignment by January 1. Every effort will be made to accommodate your housing requests, but there is no guarantee of housing or of meeting requests.

FINANCIAL AID

Need-based financial aid as granted by Rhodes applies to the Rhodes European Studies program, ISEP and all exchange programs, Students in the European Studies program pay their tuition and fees to Rhodes and receive need-based financial aid as granted by Rhodes. Aid is limited to the amount that would be granted in support of a semester's study at Rhodes. Students participating in ISEP or any one of the Rhodes exchange programs pay tuition (and in some cases room and board) to Rhodes, receiving financial aid as if they were at Rhodes. The payments to Rhodes meet the expenses of the exchange student from abroad while at Rhodes; the Rhodes students receive tuition, or tuition, room, and board abroad. Students enrolled in semester or year long Rhodes-sponsored and Non-Rhodes programs may obtain non-campus-based Title IV funds for which the student may qualify. However, no Rhodes funds or campus-based Title IV assistance will be available. In order to continue any existing federal financial aid (e.g. Stafford Loan, Pell Grants, Parent Loans, etc.) when participating in a non-Rhodes program, students must complete the Consortium Agreement for Financial Aid form.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Rhodes College has several endowed funds, the annual income from which is used to support students. Award decisions are based upon a combination of financial need, academic merit, and program choice. In order to apply for a Study Abroad Scholarship, you must have 1) applied for financial aid through Rhodes; 2) filed a Rhodes Off-Campus Study Approval Form with the Buckman Center for International Education; 3) maintained a minimum GPA of 2.75.

Applicants may apply for multiple Rhodes scholarships; however, only one Rhodes Study Abroad scholarship will be awarded per student.

Sponsored by the U.S. Department of State, the Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program provides awards for study abroad for U.S. Citizens or U.S. National Students who are receiving federal need-based financial aid under Title IV. FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Why should I study abroad?

Do you want to become a well-rounded student? Do you want to be successful in your career? Do you want to be successful in your personal relationships? Become a global citizen!

How long should I plan to stay?

Method long you stay really depends on what goals you have for your experience and what kind of program you choose. The longer you stay, the more complete and beneficial your cultural and academic immersion will be.

What can I study?

In general, you can select a study abroad program that will offer courses in your area of interest.

Will it count toward my degree?

Abroad experience for assistance in selecting appropriate courses in order to meet Rhodes' requirements.

Where can I go?

A Nearly anywhere, because study opportunities are available all over the world. The Buckman Center for International Education has all the necessary information.

How do I choose between programs?

Men you choose a program, you will need to look at both your personal goals for study abroad and characteristics of available programs. After you have looked at these variables, you can make an evaluation of the programs and a decision based on your priorities. The Buckman Center for International Education and your academic advisor will help you.

When should I start planning my trip?

As The earlier you begin planning, the better. If you allow six months to about a year, you'll have plenty of time to take care of all the logistical concerns and to improve your background in the host culture and language, if necessary.

Remember, placement, preparations, and travel arrangements take time.

Can I get financial aid?

A: Need-based financial aid as granted by Rhodes applies to Rhodes European Studies program and all exchange programs. Students in the Rhodes European Studies program pay their tuition and fees to Rhodes and receive need-based financial aid as aranted by Rhodes. Aid is limited to the amount that would be granted in support of a semester's study at Rhodes. Students participating in ISEP or one of the exchange programs pay tuition (and in some cases room and board) to Rhodes, and receive financial aid as if they were at Rhodes. The payments to Rhodes meet the expenses of the exchange student from abroad while at Rhodes; Rhodes students receive tuition, or tuition, room, and board abroad. Students enrolled in Rhodes sponsored or Non-Rhodes programs may obtain non-campus-based Title IV funds for which the student may qualify. However, no Rhodes funds or campus-based Title IV assistance will be available. In order to continue any existing federal financial aid (e.g. Stafford Loan, Pell Grants, Parent Loans, etc.) when participating in a non-Rhodes program, students must complete the Consortium Agreement for Financial Aid form.

Will studying abroad delay my graduation?

Not necessarily, particularly if you plan far enough in advance. Students sometimes do end up taking an extra semester to graduate, but the benefits of studying abroad far outweigh any disadvantages of staying in school an extra term. Your study abroad experience will be meaningful on many different levels—academic, professional, and personal—and you can use the experience you gain to your advantage when you graduate.

How much will it cost?

A Rhodes exchange program costs are based on the cost of tuition, room, and board at Rhodes or tuition only. You can study at institutions around the world for about the same cost as studying at Rhodes. Study abroad options not based on exchanges have varying prices.

What do I need to do to study abroad?

First, choose a study abroad program. Second, complete the application process. Applications are available in the Buckman Center for International Education, 201 Palmer. Applications will need to be returned to the Buckman Center for International Education before application deadlines.

How do I get my visa, passport and other paperwork?

The participant also agrees to discharge all other indebtedness or obligations to Rhodes before the conclusion of the program and understands that failure to do so may result in the withholding of credit and the payment of administrative fees for the subsequent discharge of these obligations.
- Indemnity: The participant agrees to assume the liability for, and to indemnify and defend Rhodes from, any and all claims or damages for any sickness, personal injury, death, property damage or any other loss that may arise, either wholly or in part, out of any negligent, intentional or other act or omission by the participant in connection with the program, including those claims or damages that may arise out of the joint or concurrent negligence of Rhodes.
- Substance Abuse Policy: The sale, distribution, use or possession of a controlled drug or substance, or unauthorized prescription while a participant on this program represents a serious breach of conduct and will result in expulsion from the program and notification of the appropriate officials

of the parent institution and/or others who may be concerned. Also, to be present, though not a participant, during a violation of this policy will in itself be deemed reprehensible and subject to penalty.

- Termination Policy: If any participant should have his or her participation terminated, then Rhodes shall have the right to require the participant to quit the program without refund of fees.
- Travel Arrangements: Rhodes will endeavor to adhere to all arrangements made but nevertheless reserves the right to change or alter any arrangement of location or content of the program or travel arrangements should Rhodes deem such alteration necessary.
- Cancellation and Refund Policy: In the event of cancellation of an entire session of a Rhodes program before commencement of the program, all monies paid to Rhodes prior to that time will be refunded. Should an unavoidable event such as epidemic, civil unrest or the threat of terrorist activity result in a partial cancellation, a pro rata refund of all fees, together with an appropriate evaluation of academic credit, will follow. These actions will terminate any further liability on the part of Rhodes. In the event that a student chooses to withdraw from a program before the start date, refunds will be made only on recoverable costs, less the deposit.

After the arrival date, refunds will be considered only in cases of serious illness or emergency requiring the student to return home. The amounts of such refunds are determined individually on the basis of costs recoverable by Rhodes at the time of withdrawal.

- Document Responsibility: No responsibility is accepted by Rhodes for failure by participants to carry the relevant passports, visas, tickets, or other documents required for the purpose of travel or for their loss or replacement
- Governing Law: This Statement of Responsibility and Assumption of Risk
 is to be construed under the laws of the State of Tennessee, U.S.A. without
 regard to its choice of law provisions, and that if any portion hereof is held
 invalid, the balance hereof shall, notwithstanding, continue in full legal
 force and effect.

The Buckman Center for International Education Consortium Agreement Instructions

The Consortium Agreement is an agreement between Rhodes College and your host institution establishing the guidelines by which Rhodes College will remit federal, state, and/or institutional aid to your host institution for your involvement in their program. The host institution indicates the costs of the program and Rhodes College states what aid is available for the student.

Rhodes Programs

Need and merit-based financial aid as granted by Rhodes applies to the Rhodes European Studies program, ISEP and all exchange programs.

Students enrolled in semester or year long Rhodes programs may receive both non-campus-based and campus-based Title IV funds for which the student may qualify. The Buckman Scholarships for Study Abroad are eligible to travel with the winner of the scholarship, regardless of whether the student is on a Rhodes or non-Rhodes program. (Consortium Agreements already exist between Rhodes College and its seven exchange partners, European Studies, and ISEP. If you are studying abroad with one of these programs, you do not need to complete the Consortium Agreement).

Non-Rhodes Programs

Students enrolled in semester or year long non-Rhodes programs may receive Title IV funds for which the student may qualify; however, no Rhodes funds will be available. In order to continue any existing federal financial aid (e.g., Stafford Loans, Pell Grants, Parent Loans, etc.) when participating in a non-Rhodes program, students must complete the Consortium Agreement for Financial Aid form on the next page. The Buckman Scholarships for Study Abroad are eligible to travel with the winner of the scholarship, regardless of whether the student is on a Rhodes or non-Rhodes program.

These instructions should help you to complete the Consortium Agreement accurately.

Step 1.

In the information you have received from your program provider, you should be able to complete the top portion of the Consortium Agreement, including the small table indicating the breakdown of the costs and the cost of the program in total.

Step 2.

After you have completed the Student Section in Step 1., take the consortium agreement to the Financial Aid Office at Rhodes. A staff member of their office will fill out the section labeled Step 2. and then give it to you to send or fax to your host institution.

Step 3.

The host institution, upon receipt of the Consortium Agreement, will fill out the section labeled Step 3. and then mail or fax the Consortium Agreement back to the Rhodes College Financial Aid office.

Step 4.

The Rhodes College Financial Aid Office will process the Consortium Agreement.

Consortium Agreement for Financial Aid

This Consortium Agreement is entered into by Rhodes College (the Home Institution) and the Host Institution indicated below. The agreement will remain in effect until terminated by either the *Home* or the *Host Institution*.

The Home Institution, Rhodes College, agrees to:

- Process and award all appropriate federal Title IV, state, and institutional financial aid for which the student may be eligible
- Continue to indicate the student is a regular student, enrolled in a degree program, expecting to receive the degree at Rhodes College, but receiving a portion of the educational program at the Host Institution
- Maintain all applicable financial aid and other records and to assume responsibility for determining aid eligibility, disbursing funds and distributing any return of funds (i.e., refunds), in accordance with federal, state and institutional requirements
