


COACHING STAFF

Dan Gritti
Head Coach

Dan Gritti, who helped the University of Chicago to its best record since 1913 and the UAA conference championship, was named Rhodes College's 22nd head football coach Dec. 23, 2010. Last season, Gritti served as the special teams coordinator as well as the linebackers and defensive line coach for the Maroons.

The Malden, MA, native has 9 years' coaching experience including two conference championships and 20 national Top 25 statistical category rankings. Most recently, Gritti led the Maroons to being ranked 2nd in the country in sacks and 3rd in the nation in tackles for loss.

"Dan Gritti brings unique qualities to Rhodes College and the Lynx football program," Rhodes Athletic Director Mike Clary said. "Beyond being an excellent football coach, we are also very excited about his interest and ability to engage our alumni, parents, faculty and staff to provide the best academic and co-curricular opportunity for our football team."

"It is great to be back in Tennessee. I would like to thank Mike Clary and President Bill Troutt for sharing my vision of bringing a championship football program to Rhodes and recognizing that I was the right person to lead Rhodes football into a new era of success," Gritti said. "The moment I stepped on campus I knew what a special place Rhodes is. I am excited about building a championship football team at such an elite academic school. I promise the Rhodes and Memphis communities that our strong academic requirements will not be an excuse for failure. Instead, it will be the basis for our success."

The 37-year-old Gritti spent the last two seasons at the University of Chicago under Dick Maloney, the school's modern era all-time wins leader. Upon Gritti's arrival, he took over the reins of a Chicago special teams unit which finished no higher than 15th in the nation the previous season. In his two seasons at the helm, every component finished a season in the Top 16 nationally with Top 10 finishes in punting (5th), kickoff returns (8th) and kickoff return defense (8th). Most notably, Gritti ran a punt block team which tied the NCAA record for most punts blocked for touchdowns in a season with six.

Prior to arriving at Chicago, Gritti spent four seasons as the special teams coordinator at Middlebury College (VT). Before taking over the reins of the defensive backs for his final season in Vermont, Gritti spent three years coaching the defensive line. During his time at Middlebury, Gritti led the Panthers to their first outright conference



championship in 15 years and a defense that finished third in the nation. Similar to their performance at Chicago, Gritti's players broke the conference and school single season records for sacks. Additionally, Gritti was responsible for tutoring placekicker Steven Hauschka who has gone on to a successful career in the National Football League.

Gritti began his coaching career in the Big Ten at Indiana University as a defensive quality control assistant. It reunited Gritti with his mentor Gerry DiNardo who served as Vanderbilt's head football coach while Gritti was a student. In his time in Bloomington, the team defeated two Top 25 football teams in the same season for the first time in 10 years and set a school record for defensive touchdowns.

Gritti credits any success to having great mentors in the coaching profession. "Starting with Coach DiNardo, Curt Mallory and Joe Cullen at Indiana and continuing with Coach Bob Ritter at Middlebury and Coach Maloney at UChicago, I have had the unique opportunity to learn from men who are truly the best in our profession. I will draw on the experience and wisdom they imparted to me to build Rhodes into a successful football program once again."

Rich DeMaio Offensive Coordinator

Rich DeMaio enters his first season at Rhodes as the Lynx's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He comes to Rhodes after spending the previous three seasons as offensive coordinator at Farleigh Dickinson University in New Jersey.

In his three seasons at FDU, DeMaio led the Devil offense to set single season team records in total offense, passing yardage, pass attempts, pass completions and first downs. Additionally, under DeMaio's tutelage FDU QB Bill Winters set career records for passing yardage, pass attempts, pass completions and completion percentage which led him to being named Second Team All-Conference.

Before joining FDU, DeMaio coached the tight ends at Middlebury College on the same staff as current Rhodes Head Football Coach Dan Gritti. In his one season in Middlebury, DeMaio was part of the first outright conference championship in school history.

DeMaio began his coaching career at his alma mater, Robert Morris University in Pittsburgh, PA. Working for the legendary former NY Jets Head Coach Joe Walton, DeMaio coached the quarterbacks. Prior to entering coaching, DeMaio was a standout quarterback at the FCS institution still holding records for most completions and most passing yards in a game.

Said Head Football Coach Dan Gritti, "We are excited to add a coach of Rich's quality to our staff. He is a true technician who will help our quarterbacks maximize their potential while being on the cutting edge of offensive schemes."



Gordon Ellingsworth Offensive Line

Gordon Ellingsworth is entering his 32nd year with the Lynx. Over the years the veteran coach has molded many quality offensive linemen who have opened the holes for the Lynx running game.

Ellingsworth is a 1970 graduate of Augustana College in Rock Island, IL. While at Augustana, where he was a favorite target of Cincinnati Bengals NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Kenny Anderson, he put in 3 outstanding years at tight end and 1 at offensive tackle. He was also a 4-year starter on the baseball team, and was the team captain and MVP his senior year.

Prior to arriving at Rhodes, Ellingsworth gained both teaching and coaching experience at Ridgeway High School in Memphis, where he was the football team's defensive coordinator and head coach for the baseball team. There, he coached with one of Memphis' all-time great head football coaches, the late Sonny Winters.

Ellingsworth joined the Rhodes athletics staff in 1980 as the head baseball coach and a defensive coordinator for the football team. From 1981-92, he served as Rhodes' head baseball coach, leading the Lynx to 3 Collegiate Athletic Conference (CAC) titles.

In addition to coaching the Lynx offensive line, Ellingsworth also currently serves as an assistant golf coach at Rhodes. From 2000-02,

he was the head women's golf coach, and led the team to 2 conference championships and 3 Division III Top-5 finishes. This accomplishment earned him recognition as the SCAC Women's Golf Coach of the Year.

Ellingsworth has a daughter (Wendy) and a son (Chuck). Both are graduates of Rhodes. He also has 3 grandsons and 1 granddaughter.



Jeremy Longstreet Defensive Line

Jeremy Longstreet enters his first season as defensive line coach for the Lynx. Longstreet comes to Rhodes after finishing his playing career at the University of Memphis in 2010. During his time at Memphis, Longstreet lettered all four seasons, played in 41 games and started 22 games. Both a running back and linebacker during his collegiate career, his best season saw him finish second on the team in tackles in 2008. His first appearance at running back vs. the University of Tennessee resulted in 8 carries for 26 yards and 3 receptions for 40 yards.

Prior to playing at Memphis, Longstreet played for Coach Jamie Mitchell at Olive Branch High School (MS). He led the team to a 12-2 season with a team-high 88 tackles and 8 sacks. He led OBHS in solo tackles with 48, and was listed as a finalist for the 2005 *Commercial Appeal* Defensive Player of the Year Award.

Head Coach Dan Gritti commented, "Coach Longstreet's recent playing experience provides an important perspective to our staff on the ever evolving game of football. Additionally, his unmatched work ethic will play a pivotal role in our defensive performance next season."



Glenn Reese Running Backs

Glenn Reese is entering his first season as the Lynx's running backs coach. Reese comes to Rhodes from Lincoln University (MO) where he served in the same capacity beginning in 2009. During his time at Lincoln, Reese coached the Blue Tigers running backs to over 2800 yards rushing which garnered a Top 15 national ranking in rushing offense. In so doing, Lincoln defeated a Division II opponent for the first time in 9 years as well as ended a 20-year losing streak to their chief rival.

Prior to joining the staff at Lincoln, Reese spent two years as the wide receivers coach at Washington University in St. Louis. He began his career at Blackburn College (IL) coaching the defensive backs for the 2006 season.

"Coach Reese has coached at a wide variety of institutions which gives him a unique ability to understand the strengths and weaknesses of our players" said Coach Gritti. "Coupled with his playing experience at Mississippi State, where he earned his B.F.A. degree, Coach Reese is able to relate to players from all different backgrounds as both a coach and a positive role model."



Craig Stutzmann Receivers

Craig Stutzmann enters his first season at Rhodes after spending last season at Idaho State University where he was in charge of the development of the wide receivers. He went to Idaho State after serving as the graduate assistant coach at the University of Memphis.

While at Memphis, Stutzmann oversaw the receivers, teaching fundamentals and techniques to all players, and conducted and led receiver meetings. Other responsibilities at Memphis included signaling in offensive players, film break down, assembling opponent scouting reports, putting together offensive game plans, coordinating defensive and special team scout teams along with recruiting Hawaii, California, Washington, Oregon and American Samoa. Stutzmann also put together recruiting lists and evaluations, and created offensive play books.

Before Memphis he was the assistant coach at Portland State from July-December 2009 under Jerry Glanville. While at Portland State, where Aaron Woods was ranked fourth in the nation for all-purpose yards at 175.36, Stutzmann oversaw the wide receivers and slot backs, took charge of implementing the pass game and oversaw the kickoff returners.

Stutzmann served as a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, Hawaii, for just over a year in 2008 and 2009. His responsibilities included overseeing the wide receivers and slot backs along with the punt and kickoff returners.

Before jumping into coaching in the collegiate ranks, the Bengal receiver coach coached four years at Saint Louis High School from 2004-08 while teaching physical education classes. From 2003-04 he was a teacher and the offensive coordinator at Kalaheo High School.

Stutzmann, who graduated from Hawaii with a degree in political science in 2002, was a 3-year starter and all-WAC player under June Jones from 1999-01. As a senior in 2001, he was named team captain for Hawaii. He played for the CFL's British Columbia Lions in 2002.

He is a member of the Polynesian Coaches Association and coached the receivers and quarterbacks in the 2010 Hawaii All-Poly Camp.

Head Coach Dan Gritti said, "Having played for and worked with such coaching greats as June Jones, Mouse Davis and Jerry Glanville, Coach Stutzman has always been on the cutting edge of offensive football. His unique perspective and skill set will serve as an important foundation for our program as we continue to rebuild Rhodes football for the 21st century and beyond."



Tres Sullivan Cornerbacks

Tres Sullivan enters his first season as cornerbacks coach for the Lynx. Sullivan comes to Rhodes after spending the 2007-09 seasons at the University of California at Davis. Prior to his moving into the college game, Sullivan coached for 6 years in the Arena Football League. His stops included the role of offensive coordinator with both the Kansas City Brigade and Nashville Kats.

Additionally, Sullivan saw time coaching with the New Orleans, Macon and Wichita franchises.

Sullivan's collegiate playing career began at the University of Texas-El Paso and ended at San Francisco State University. He continued to play quarterback in the Arena League for the Arizona Rattlers in the 1995 season.

Head Coach Dan Gritti stated, "Coach Sullivan brings a unique perspective to defense, and his deep knowledge of offensive football will be a significant asset for both our cornerbacks and our coaching staff."



David Szentesy Defensive Backs

David Szentesy enters his first season as the defensive backs coach and Athletic Department strength and conditioning coordinator for the Lynx. He comes to Rhodes after coaching the last three seasons at Middlebury College (VT).

Following his career as a three-year starter and three-time All-Liberty League selection at Hobart, Szentesy coached at his high school alma mater in Lackawanna, NY. He ascended to the college ranks with a one-year stint at Hamilton College (NY) before moving onto perennial Division III power Alfred University (NY). During his tenure at Alfred, Szentesy coached four all-league players and made postseason appearances in both of his two seasons.

In 2008, Szentesy moved to Middlebury where he worked with Rhodes Head Coach Dan Gritti for one season. During his three-season tenure, Szentesy produced three first-time all-league players.

On hiring Szentesy, Coach Gritti commented that "Coach Szentesy is a winner and will bring Division III playoff experience to our staff as well as personal knowledge of what it takes to be a successful student-athlete at an institution very similar to Rhodes. Personally, I am very excited to work with someone who understands our defensive concepts so well and can play an important role in its continued evolution."





