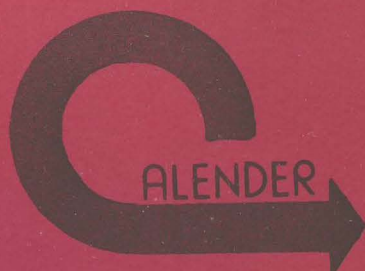

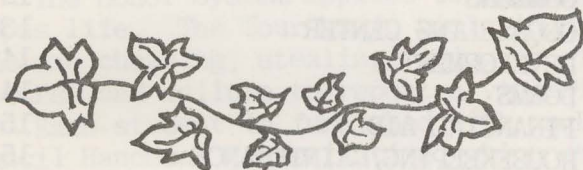

# Honor Council

The freedoms and responsibilities of the Honor System are shared by all members of the Southwestern community. The Honor Council, composed of an elected President, Vice President, and fourteen class representatives, has a positive, judicial role within the system. Its basic responsibility is to foster and protect a spirit of honor at SW. It carries out this responsibility by educating the community and by acting as a court in a case of alleged dishonesty. If a person is found guilty, the Council imposes a penalty that is designed to uphold the system and also be beneficial to the individual.

The Honor System applies to all phases of campus life. The four basic violations of the Code are cheating, stealing, lying in official matters, and failure to report a violation.

Each student is furnished with an Honor Council Handbook (constitution) which should be read carefully and saved for reference. The freshman class will elect two representatives, one male and one female during first term. The Council is made up of SW students who are concerned and interested. Please feel free to ask any members of the Council questions which may come up.

## ASSISTANT DEAN OF STUDENTS

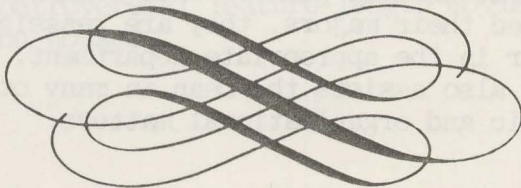

## Academics

Your best plan is to "know your catalog," it will save you time and worry. On pages 34 to 43 of your 1981-82 catalog are the requirements for graduation and the academic regulations of the college. Read it carefully.

This simply means that he/she will assist you in planning the courses you want to take and should take. Fellow students (upperclassmen) are also a very valuable source of information. These coaches serve the entire SW community; you do not have to play a varsity sport or even enroll in a PE class to take advantage of their expertise.

Over two third of the campus participates in the intramural program. Under new Director Bill Jones the season will open with intramural flagball, followed by basketball, volleyball, and softball. Teams can be formed by anyone; members of a commons, a dorm, a fraternity/sorority or merely a group of friends.

All students can enjoy the use of SW athletic facilities. In addition to the gym and regular fields, there are tennis courts, raquetball courts, a new swimming pool, a cross country layout around campus, and a weight room. Check the schedules for various facilities. Please remember to get a red shoe tag to wear while using the athletic facilities.

For those who chose to pursue less strenuous activities, ping pong, cards, backgammon, checkers and a pool table are available in the student center. Frisbee Golf is also a popular past-time. Ask an upperclassman about the course layout. A sport unique to SW is whiteball: just hang around the steps between the

refectory and White to find out what it is all about. Camping equipment and a double bike are also available from the student center.

## Cashier

Pay tuition, fees, fines, and parking tickets here. Mrs. Bowlin is willing to help with any accounts; if you are confused go to her. All UPS, Special Delivery, and Certified letters are delivered here. Stamps and scales for weighing parcels are available.

Students may cash checks for up to \$20. a day and may set up student deposit accounts. A student deposit account offers no interest and check writing is not necessary. The program allows the student to withdraw up to \$30 a day from the account without prior notice. One day prior notice allows for an unlimited release of funds.

## Administrative Services

Students will have contact with this office in matters concerning energy conservation on campus, pet policy, administration procedures, and fire extinguisher fines (\$50 for illegally using fire extinguishers). The SW Bookstore is owned and operated by the college and all the proceeds are directed into the general operating fund.

Used books are offered in as many titles as possible. Full refunds will be given on all unused, clean, unmarked textbooks with cash receipt, within ten days following the start of the term.

# Development

The function of this office is to encourage gifts for the college, which support about one-third of the cost of educating each student. Gifts come from alumni, trustees, parents, and friends of SW. Student volunteers have been particularly helpful by working on the Phone-a-thon, greeting visitors, and helping with the various campaigns for the SW fund--reducing the tuition by as much as 50%.

# Dorms

There are two types of dorms on SW campus; "open" refers to no restrictions on curfew hours for the opposite sex, "closed" refers to restricted visitation times (off limits from 12:00-8:00 am.) First floor Trezevant, Williford 2nd and 3rd floors, University are the close dorms.

Coin-operated washing machines and vending machines are located in almost all dorms. Draperies and carpeting are available in Williford only. Some beds in the men's dorms are oversized, so it might be better to wait before you buy your fitted sheets. Pets are restricted to the aquarium or cage type. Well, to answer your 3001 more questions, you will be assigned a student counselor soon, and he/she will be able to answer your questions by personal letter. Also please note that all dorms will be closed during Christmas, Spring Break, and part of the summer.

## Financial Aid

Students who are on work/study or campus employment will receive their checks once a month (on the fifth working day) from this office. Be sure you know which program you are on; there is a difference.

## Housekeeping/Maintenance

Housekeeping is responsible for all routine interior cleaning, while the maintenance office maintains the physical and the mechanical work of the campus and dorms. All student requests for service must be made by forms that can be picked up from your R.A.

## Infirmary

The Moore Moore Infirmary has 13 beds with 24 hour health care extended to all full time students. Flu shots are offered in the fall for the price of the serum. Allergy shots can also be administered in the Infirmary. Shots are free, but a small fee is charged for the disposable syringes. Bring your own medication, with directions, to the Infirmary when you arrive on campus. Make sure you bring enough to last until you return home; out-of-town prescriptions are NOT refillable.

Certain routine medications and services are furnished free of charge as part of the Infirmary's function. Special services, x-rays, and laboratory work are billed directly to the student. If you have to go to the emergency room, be ready to pay cash or checks from a local bank; out-of-town checks are not accepted. Night emergencies should be reported to the R.A., and he/she will contact the nurse

The nurse's hours vary daily according to the doctors' visits.

## Library

Many students study here since there are large tables in the reading room, carrels in the stacks, comfortable chairs in the lounge downstairs, and individual study rooms which can be checked out at the front desk.

\*there are special extended library hours during exams.

Books can be checked out (and you'll need your ID card for this) for 2 weeks with fines at 5¢ per day. NOTE: Fines are halved to the nearest nickel if paid at the time of returning or rechecking the book.

Reserve books ("Man" students note this may be checked out for two hours and for overnight after 4:30 pm. Overnight due time is 10:30 am the next morning with huge fines of 25¢ for the first hour and 5¢ every hour there-

after. Be sure to ask the reference librarian if you can't find anything.

Many students go to the Memphis Public Library on Peabody and McLean which is a great escape from campus. A disadvantage is the 9 PM closing hour. The Memphis State Library is farther, but has a great number of hard to find books and periodicals.

The chemistry, math and physics dept. have journals in smaller libraries in their respective buildings open to students with a prof's OK (good place for an all nighter).

## Mail

### Student Center

All students are assigned mailboxes during the first week of school. Mail is sorted out by name and is up by 10:00 am. Mailboxes are also used for many inter-campus announcements. Out-going mail may be deposited in the mailboxes in front of the Infirmary. Mail is picked up twice a day and once on Saturday. To weigh any parcels or foreign mail go to the cashier's office.

## Pub

### Student Center

The Pub is operated as a service for the students, faculty and staff by the Publynx Corporation. All surplus funds derived from sales are used to support student activities.

The Pub serves a variety of draft and imported bottled beer. You must be 19 years old to consume alcoholic beverages in the state of Tennessee. Therefore, all new students should be prepared to show an ID when they ask to be served at the bar. You should also remember that the Pub was established to foster responsible drinking habits and irresponsible behavior will not be permitted. The bartender has the right and responsibility to refuse

service.

New this year will be a student managed snack bar. The hours and menu will be established in the fall. you can expect lots of homemade goodies and special treats at reasonable prices.

All-in-all the Pub is a great place to meet people, relax and enjoy some fine entertainment without ever having to leave campus.

## Refectory

The Catherine Burrow Refectory is the College dining hall. ("Refectory" is a medieval term usually applied to the dining halls of monasteries and convents.) This is the place where minds and stomachs meet.

ARA will continue a third year as the food service at SW. In the past they have planned such features as a weekly "steak night", holiday meals, ice cream extravaganzas, late night study breakfasts, and a donut machine. A student food committee works with the food service to air your complaints and to try to bring you what you want.

The Honor Code applies to the refectory. You will be required at first to show an ID as to which meal plan you are on as you go through the line. Non-boarding students can purchase books of meal tickets at the cashier's office. It is also against the Honor Code to take utensils, dishware or FOOD out of the refectory for later use.

# Student Organizations

## BLACK STUDENT ASSOCIATION

The Black Student Association (BSA) was organized to promote and coordinate the efforts of the black students of SW. The main objective is to educate all students in black culture. The BSA sponsors a yearly "Black Awareness Week", SW community dinners and various other cultural and social activities.

## DILEMMA

Operated exclusively by SW students and financed by private contributions, this symposium features an intellectually stimulating weekend of guest speakers and seminars. SW presents Dilemma to the college and Memphis communities. The symposium is usually held in the spring, so watch for your chance to get involved.

## DRAMATICS

The "New Southwestern Players" is an organization open to all students wishing to work toward the development and promotion of the performing arts. Productions range from classical to popular to avantgarde, including dance, mime and original student works. The players work closely with the Communication Arts Department. Interested students are encouraged to experiment with different dramatic forms. Look for organizational meetings this fall.

## KINNEY PROGRAM

Beth Simpson, Director

The Kinney Program is a student coordinated community organization which offers SW students the opportunity to work as volunteers in local service projects. Leading a scout troop, visiting the handicapped or elderly, serving as a Big Brother/Sister, working in a hospital or acting as a penpal to an inmate are typical

kinds of projects of the Kinney volunteers.

Dawn Huff and Brian Sanders will be the student coordinators this year. Students who are interested in giving 2-3 hours a week in this kind of service should watch for the orientation meetings at the beginning of each term or go by the Kinney office upstairs in the student center and express your interest. More than 200 students participate each year, fulfilling a desire to give of themselves to others.

#### MUSICAL ACTIVITIES

The Southwestern Singers are selected by audition during orientation. Under the direction of Tony Garner, the Singers this past year presented a number of concerts and toured the mid-south in the spring.

First Generation, a modern branching of the Singers, includes choreography and costuming in its' performances.

The Madrigal Singers are the 16th and 17th century version of the Singers and contribute a unique facet to SW musical opportunities.

The Southwestern Orchestra holds two scheduled concerts a year and appears with the Singers in at least one joint concert. Small ensembles for brass, woodwinds, strings and mixed instruments play for many occasions both on and off campus.

The Pep Band is a student disorganized and directed group of "hams" who provide the half-time show at the football games. Kazoos, combs and paper as well as real instruments are all part of the entertainment.

Women's Choral is a group composed of talented singing women and is offered only in Term 2.

The Uncommon Houses are the performances of any interested students on the stage in the Student Center. These informal performances allow the talented individual a chance to "show their stuff".

## PUBLICATIONS

There are currently 6 student publications at SW, meeting a variety of interests and needs. Students are entrusted with maintaining a balance between freedom of expression and responsible journalism. All students are encouraged to work on all aspects of publication - writing, layout design, art, etc. Quality publications thrive when enthusiastic students are involved.

Faces is the directory of pictures, phone numbers, and addresses of students, faculty and administration. It is an invaluable aid!

Lynx is the SW yearbook. It is a creative publication that attempts to give an overall picture of the life at SW during that year. Student participation and assistance is essential for this publication. Watch for signs.

The Sou'wester is the student newspaper which covers student activities, current issues and articles of interest to the community.

SFA, Student-Faculty-Administration newsletter is a weekly bulletin that lists the upcoming events both on campus and in Memphis.

Currents is the annual campus literary, scholarly and creative arts magazine. All the entries are original student work.

## SOUTHWESTERN FELLOWSHIP

The Southwestern Fellowship is made up of students exploring their relationship to Christ in evangelism, discipleship and missions while in college. Students meet in small groups for study and fellowship and as a larger group for programs and speakers.

The SF is a chapter of the nationwide Intervarsity Christian Fellowship and participates in retreats and camps at various times of the year with other IVCF chapters.

## STUDENT CENTER ASSEMBLY

This group works to make the student center a lively place for students to gather. With a small budget, the group sponsors a wide variety of activities for the student body: beer busts, bands, movies in the pub and a student center weekend in the spring. General membership comes from participation.

## WLYX

At 89.3 on the FM dial, WLYX is Southwestern's own volunteer-run, 24-hour, community radio station housed in Mallory Gym. The music format features mainly 'progressive rock' with frequent special programs. In addition, WLYX offers a close-circuit reading service for the visually handicapped.

Station manager, allen Cook, encourages student participation in all aspects of programming, production and broadcasting. Anyone interested should contact Allen. No experience necessary!

## TOWNIES

Commuting students are just as much a part of SW as the "live-ins", but they need to make an effort to keep from falling into the habit of going straight home after class. An occasional meal in the refectory or participation in some of the evening events will keep you in touch with the SW community.

There are lockers available in the basement of the Student Center - check with the center assistant. Town students are assigned mailboxes also. these will often contain important on-campus announcements and notices, so check them regularly.

Involvement in the "commons" system can be particularly rewarding to townies. All town students belong to Robb Common. Their participation is both needed and encouraged to help make this system a success. Attend commons meetings and functions whenever possible; this, more than anything will make you feel a part of the SW community.

### MUSEUMS AND GALLERIES
