

Murals, Bright Colors Proposed To Beautify Downtown Alleys

Phase of Program To Spark Area

Bright-colored paint and wall-sized murals for beauty, along with good drainage and paving for practicality, will create "art ways out of alleyways" in the Downtown Association's Alley Improvement program.

George Houston, head of the Association's alley improve-ment committee, outlined the program today, one of the 24 steps in DT's plan of action to revitalize downtown. He will give further information at the Association's building restora-tion and modernization workshop at Hotel Claridge at noon Monday.

"Plans are to start with a pilot project, a block-long alley area, by the middle of July," Houston said. "Several architects have volunteered their services to help design the improvements."
