The council on March 6 adopted a resolution opposing the park route and suggested a route along the northern boundary of the park (North Parkway) as an alternative if no other route outside the park were feasible.

Two alternate expressway routes received heavy study in 1965 before the park route was adopted. Previously at least 25 routes had been studied. A northern route would have passed near Southwestern. A southern route would have passed through residential
