



**Kevin Paige** was released last month on Chrysalis Records. The breaking single is "Don't Shut Me Out" and is getting a lot of airplay on Z-98.

Steven Wayne Horton should be released this month. "Rollover" is the first single from the Capitol recording artist.

J. Leland Braddock finished his latest cassette release of ten songs.

The Goosebumps began work on six new songs for an independent cassette release. Also, demo projects included Chemical Youth, Schizoid and Moonmen.

At MIDILAB Of Memphis, Rodney Smith just completed a 16 song demo project. The demo was sequenced, structured and edited using Texture, MIDI, and an IBM personal computer. Recording was completed using AKAI, Tascam.

Todd St. James and his newly formed band, Roxy Blue, continued work at NEW MEMPHIS MUSIC with Nikos Lyras behind the board.

Larry Nevilles was back in town from Des Moines to cut tracks with Doug Nightwine engineering.

Down on Beale at MEMPHIS SOUND PRODUCTIONS, bluesman Booker T. Laury recorded both a "studio album" and a "live album" (the studio was set up like a nightclub, with a number of guests enjoying the show), co-produced by Robert Jackson and executive producer Dennis Quaid. Musicians included Quaid, Jack Holder, Joe Mulherin, L.T. Smith, Lucky Carter, and Ray Griffin. The project was engineered by Jackson with John Fleskes and the Jammer (Jim Godsey). Quaid, who plans to personally shop the project, hopes a strong blues label will pick it up and generate a renewed interest in Laury and his music.

Mega Jam recording artist Christopher McDaniel's new album was mixed by Mark Richardson, Dan Pfeifer, and the Jammer. The album follows McDaniel's single, "A Woman's Touch," which charted in the 30s in Billboard.

Lance Strode completed tracks for his third single. Strode's first single made Billboard and Cashbox charts, and the second release was delayed while Groovemakers (Cato Walker) penned a new coproduction/publishing agreement with Memphis Sound. The new project is being produced by Jack Holder, Lance Strode and Sam Gay. Musical performances from Strode, Holder, Chad Cromwell, Robbie Turner, and Suzanne Jerome-Taylor are on tape with Dan Pfeifer as engineer.

Memphis Sound's groups Human Radio and The Racers have been doing pre-production work with (respectively) producer David Kahne (for Columbia Records) and Paul Worley (for CBS Music).

## Silent station reminisces with reunion and picnic

Alumni of WLYX FM-89 are planning a reunion for the weekend of August 12-13, 1989. On Saturday evening, August 12, there will be a jam session featuring local musicians at the Antenna Club, 1588 Madison, in Memphis. A picnic in Audubon Park is planned for Sunday afternoon, August 13.

According to Doug Dahlhauser, program director of WLYX from 1979 until the station's first shutdown in 1982, anyone who has ever had anything to do with the station is invited. "We are trying to collect addresses, and would like to hear from former 89ers if they haven't already heard from us," he said. "Of course, all the present student volunteers are most welcome, and the listeners too."

WLYX was begun in 1972 by the Second Presbyterian Church and housed on the fourth floor of the gym at Southwestern (now Rhodes College). It started out as a 10-watt non-commercial daytime FM station. Through the efforts of the paid general manager and some dedicated volunteers, the station grew into a 24 hour, 3500-watt stereo signal.

FM-89 maintained an innovative, creative progressive rock format. Artists such as U2, Elvis Costello, Huey Lewis, Dire Straits, Supertramp and Talking Heads all had their first albums played on FM-89 years before they were heard on commercial stations.

WLYX supported Memphis musicians, not only by playing their tapes and keeping listeners informed about their gigs, but through benefit concerts and live broadcasts from local clubs.

At noon on Memorial Day, 1982, the Southwestern administration ordered the station off the air. It cited a lack of student involvement and conflicts with the college's image, but the reasons were never really clear. It was the end of an era.

Over the past several years, the station has been on and off the air with student volunteers, and will shut down once again on July 31 of this year.

"Working with FM-89 was an unforgettable experience," said Dahlhauser. "Our listeners played a large role in defining progressive rock in Memphis. Many a new DJ would get a call from an avid listener who would tell him to 'stop playing the commercial crap' and play something different."

The reunion will be a weekend of nostalgia and vintage music. There may be some surprise guests on stage. Tapes of WLYX broadcasts from the '70s and early '80s will be played during breaks in the live music.

Robert Jackson worked on material for Denise LaSalle. Demo projects were completed by Kurt Clayton, Arletta Nightingale, Sandra Bray and Keith Shaffer. And, Star Search spent a day in June videotaping auditions in Memphis Sound's stage while a NARAS open house was held in the lobby.

In June, the **Georgia Satellites** were at **ARDENT** working on their new LP for Elektra Records. Joe Hardy produced and engineered.

Australian rockers, The Angels, are tracking their new album for

Chrysalis Records. Terry Manning is producing and engineering.

Also in Ardent from Australia is **Weddings, Parties, Anything.** They are recording for WEA International with Jim Dickinson as producer and John Hampton engineering.

At ROADHOUSE RECORDING last month, producer Danny Jones continued overdubs and editing on the Ellison's upcoming LP. Tim Ray and Mark Patrick assisted.

Roadhouse has added a Lexicon PCM 70 and 12 more channels of Drawmer noise gates to the outboard equipment. \*

# EGAL/—— BUSINES!

Last month this column discussed these three functions of the fullservice music publisher: Song Evaluation, Initial Exploitation and Follow-Up Exploitation. month's column is a continuation of the analysis of the role of the full-service music publisher.

4. FOREIGN EXPLOITATION. The term "subpublishing" is used to describe the business activities of a publisher outside his own domestic territory. The agreement he enters with a foreign representative (the "subpublisher") is known as a "subpublishing agreement." It is frequently the case that recordings are produced in the domestic (or "original") publisher's territory and eventually released world-wide.

The publisher must have someone handling licensing, other administrative activities and (most importantly) collection in those foreign territories where recordings of his works have been commercially released or where his catalogue is being otherwise exploited. The subpublisher also may be assisting the record company in the promotion of sales and air play of the recordings. Depending on the particular needs of the domestic publisher, it also may be desirable for the subpublisher to secure recordings of songs in the catalogue by local artists in the subpublishing territory.

With respect to subpublishing, the domestic music publisher basically has these options: He can establish branch offices in each foreign territory where his works are being exploited. He can make a number of deals with local publishers in each of the foreign territories. He can make a deal with one large multi-national company to handle his subpublishing in all foreign territories.

The option of owning branch offices in foreign territories is not available to most publishers. The obvious reason is the expense involved. The advantages are that the domestic publisher can retain a larger per-

## William Bratcher earns studio time for "Rap It" win

The winner of the Cablevision/ K 97 "Rap It" contest is 19-yearold William Bratcher of South Bratcher, better Memphis. known as "W"-Def, received \$1,000 and three hours of free studio time at Mega Jam Records, a Memphis-based record company.

"W"-Def performed some of his original raps on a Cablevision special spotlighting the winner and the four runners-up in the contest. The special, Rap It, premiered Sunday, July 16 on Cablevision's channel 21.

centage of his foreign earnings and that he has greater control over his subpublishing operation. This option is really only available to the very large publishing houses.

MAKING A NUMBER of deals with publishers in different territories is less expensive than the first option but some control is lost. This is usually the option taken by a fairly well-established independent publisher or a writer-artist who is acting as his own publisher and who also has attained some degree of success as a recording artist.

By making a number of territorial deals, the publisher's attorney will be able to secure separate dollar advances for the different territories. Like the theory of subdividing real estate, this is often more lucrative up front than the next option. (Advances against future earnings are particularly important here because of the expense and difficulty involved in enforcing an agreement with a subpublisher. Most of us cannot afford to periodically drop into our French subpublisher's Paris office and take a look at the books!) Another advantage of this election over the next is that the domestic publisher can be more selective about which subpublisher can best serve his needs in each territory of the world.

MAKING A DEAL with one large company to handle subpublishing in all territories of the world is the choice most frequently taken by the small independent publisher or the writer-artist who has entered into his first recording agreement with a nationally distributed record label. The advantage is that the domestic publisher only has to deal with one company. This kind of deal is made with one of the large majors who have world-wide affiliates. Compared to the other options, the expense involved is minimal. However, the domestic publisher probably will have less control over his subpublishing activities than is he had elected one of the first two options.

One or some combination of the above three choices will be made by the domestic publisher with respect to the foreign exploitation of his cata-Which election is made logue. depends upon the domestic publisher's individual needs and

resources.

Next month's column will discuss the administrative function of the music publisher.



# LANCE STRODE and CATO WALKER

Country singer and R&B producer knock down doors with music that's a little different

f this were the old West, simply the lyric of their names could make Lance Strode and Cato Walker living legends. Their names do have a certain musical quality, and Strode even nods in agreement with a "Yes, M'am" like any well-mannered cowboy would. But this is modern day Memphis, where it takes much more than a poetic name and a polite demeanor to scratch the charts oft eyed by wannabe legends.

It is Strode's independent single, "Dangerous Ground," that's blazing the trail for this duo. Produced by Walker and promoted by his Groove-

makers Entertainment Complex, Strode's soulful voice carried this original tune to #92 on *Billboard*'s Hot Country Singles and #5 on *Cash Box*' Indie Singles.

It's a success story of another kind, where the factions of Memphis music crossed lines and made a country music record that breaks all Nashville's formula rules. Memphis, too often accused of not being a fown for country music, proved with this one that it is a nurturing force for good music. Strode's recording (see Memphis Star, Feb. 1989) has the rhythm and soul of vintage Stax and the twang and fresh twist of a Hank, Sr. lyric.

As a teenager, Lance Strode sat in his room playing and singing, too full of stage fright to think about being a

performer. But he wanted an Ovation Balladeer, and his mother dangled the carrot. Realizing her son's talent, she promised him the six string on one condition -- that Lance stand up before an audience and sing like he did "there in that bedroom."

He took the stage at the Country Jamboree in Nesbit, Miss. "My knees were knocking. I was scared to death," recalls Strode. "But I was gonna get that guitar!" His "phenomenal" parents got together and followed through on their deal, and thus began Strode's career as an entertainer.

During his freshman year at Memphis State, Strode wrote a song for the (Memphis Songwriters Association) Demo Derby called "Ideas About Love." Walker, who

had been asked to speak at the event, was able to stay for the showcase through a series of what proved to be fateful circumstances. He was encouraged to listen to this "new country singer." People at the showcase were saying that his music "could bring tears to your eyes."

Says Walker, "I remember thinking, what do I know about a country singer? But when I heard him sing, that's all I wanted to know.


Walker, who also manages J. Blackfoot and Sandra Bray and whose background is principally in rhythm and blues, took on the management and production tasks of his new country protege. Bootstrap Records was formed specifically to launch Lance Strode's career.

xplaining that, in his R&B dealings, he is accustomed to taking his music "to the streets" to see how the people react, Walker tried "Dangerous Ground" out on "thirty young black kids" who were enrolled in a music class he was teaching at Kansas Vo-Tech. They all wanted copies of the record. "These kids were into rap, but they loved Lance Strode!" exclaimed Walker. "His music touches you."

"It's country music," Strode offers.
"But it's a little different. People are having trouble putting it into a category." And the talent that has lined up to help put out Strode's new three-song demo ensures that it will be a well-versed project with an unmistakeable Memphis influence.

# The Five That

Iternative" is an adjective much bandied about the city of Memphis these days, especially in relation to music. It is a singularly curious phenomenon that this raging debate should erupt in a city held to be the birthplace of the very form. After all, what was Elvis but an "alternative" to the country & western, swing music and anemic crooners left over from the '40s?

For years, mainstream Memphis music audiences have supported those bands willing to sacrifice their musical integrity for the rent, playing covers and "classic Memphis music" for the pittance a nightclub has to offer. But while Memphis supports those musicians hitched to a prescribed diet of would-be managers and agents, and insipid boy/girl songs, what about the rest? What about those whose lyrics have substance and who choose to take the advice of Thomas Paine and invest in self-reliance?

Thirty years ago, it was a lot easier. Walk a few blocks to a tiny corner studio, plunk down your two dollars, and wham! You're a recording artist. With a Col. Parker waiting in the wings, fame, fortune and a life of luxurious excess was bound to follow.

Today, the process is a little more involved, and the entrepreneurial spirit of Col. Parker is as irrevocably lost as the days of horse and buggy. Musical success is earned largely through an arcane systematic formula made up of one part originality and hard work, and four parts prayer, boot-licking and compromise.

Or one can mortgage the sheepskin and take a chance on a dream. The Five That Killed Elvis have, and are reaping the benefits of that faith and maintaining their integrity all in the same breath.


"We're pretty ignorant about the power structure in Memphis," admits vocalist Wade Smith. "But there's really no reason why we should know about it when they haven't really done anything for anybody on a national profile. It's nice to read your name in the newspaper - I'd like to read more about us. I don't think it's (lack of status affiliation) holding us back though."

Earlier this year the band -- Smith, lead guitarist Felix Bryan, rhythm guitarist Tommy Coleman, and drummer Patrick Wheeler -- (later replaced by Ross Lester), pooled their resources and took a chance with an 11-song release called *The Other Day* (see *Memphis Star*, March 1989). Self-produced at Easley Recording, *The Other Day*, (which is available on CD and cassette at Pop Tunes and Camelot Records), exemplifies in sound and spirit what the band is all about - making good music, their own way.

Smith explains, "We wanted to expand a little more. A lot of people asked us if we had tapes, and you hate to keep saying no if people keep asking you. And, Doug Easley was really great to work with."

That the Five ("it's just a name we came up with one night") should choose the seeming local guru of "alternative" music comes as no surprise, but apparently it was more than just a given. "We've heard good things (about him) and he had good references," continues Bryan. "Everybody that we knew liked him a lot. And then we went out there and looked at the place and we met him." "It just seemed to click," interjects Smith in that grandiose "allowed" way of interruption that close friends have.

The Other Day was released on GDR Records, which when pressured, the band reveals to be their own shell company. "It's, uh, ours. An independent," Bryan offers hesitantly. "We're open to discussion with anybody (bigger labels), but we're gonna have more albums," he concludes confidently.

#### Getting To Know You...

On stage, The Five That Killed Elvis are an unassuming bunch. In their jeans or baggy shorts, they could just as easily pass for one of the audience as the main attraction. Their show is even less flashy.

Felix Bryan is, at best, an unlikely looking candidate for lead guitarist, yet fills the role amply while his rhythm counterpart Tommy



Third time's a charm; Jungklas strikes vein with simply mature and uplifting album

Rob Jungklas Work Songs For A New Moon (BMG/RCA Records)

Picture a dream world. The sound of bagpipes floating over the shrouded mist of early morning mountain valleys... Of life breathed into Scotch-Irish ancestry just west of the original 13 American colonies... A world where lovers yearn 'neath a fingernail sliver of a moon under the omniscient but neutral hand of a vague but benevolent God.

You should have something of the feel of *Work Songs For A New Moon* Rob Jungklas' third album and first for RCA. (The second LP hasn't been released due to corporate problems.)

Jungklas, the rocker of "Boystown," and "Memphis Thing," is absent here. He's replaced by either a dewy-eyed romantic or a serious student of mankind's search for love and the seeming immortality

that can be derived from finding it. Though he slips into mundaneness on occasion, on balance, Jungklas succeeds mightily.

The opening cut, "To Be In Love Is To Be In Heaven" is an acoustic ballad with Lou Reed phrasing. Jungklas sets his theme and resolutely follows it through the other ten songs. "By the power of love/I invent myself," he sings in "Streets Are Paved With Gold." Philosophically, man is positioned under God, but on his (or her) own, yet still with the power to strive, and perhaps, succeed.

Along with the moody dance number "Ton Of Bricks," "Gold" is the closest to rock that Jungklas allows himself. This time around his tunes owe more to 19th century English and American folk melodies than to any kind of '80s "grooves." Sadly, this is the biggest drawback to the LP -- it doesn't have a hit single. You're gonna have to buy this one -- you won't hear it on the radio.

To my mind, either "Water Into Wine" or "Lion And The Lamb" would make excellent singles, at least for adult contemporary radio -though this should be music for teenagers. "Thirsty At The Well," though, is the finest song. Full of stately sounds over a marching beat, Jungklas is at his most reflective. He sees love, even is consumed by it, but at the same time is aware of its limitations. He concludes, "I ask not for consolation but for passion and for grace/I ask not for comfort but for clarity."

Work Songs is a damn fine record. Jungklas shows a maturity in writing that is matched to a confidence in simple tunes and sparse instrumentation. He engages both the body and the intellect, and ultimately uplifts the spirit.

# First family of "fonk" returns with a vengeance

The album of the year, plain and simple.

The drama behind this project, the requisite stout clout politically, and the resulting triumph makes this a shoe-in, even with McCartney's comeback and the Grammy committee's fabled myopia.

And merited, sho-nuff.

Solid harmonies atop new jackswing textures, and lethal songs, unerringly weave the perfect historical mate to *ABC*, the Jacksons' first completely fire album. Already two singles are pushing this sucker's sales to figures Michael might even notice.

"Nothin (That Compares 2U)," has kicked off the reverie with a monster sound which creates the groove that Prince, most notably, and nearly everyone else is searching for. The synth bass line is as close as it gets nowadays to real *fonk*, yet light enough not to scare away teenyboppers' and radio's mutual mindset.

Its companion, the title track, has built a head of steam by its lonesome.

Featuring the whole publicly familiar family, including those scamps Michael and LaToya, plus a retinue of off-spring, "2300 Jackson Street" is a power ballad in none of the usual ways. Bereft of melodrama in saluting their parents' fruitful dedication and sacrifice, the tune's honesty and emotion is so sincere that it is disquieting.


"Art of Madness" propulsively kicks off the set with an energy rarely evidenced, on wax, by the Jacksons.

Rock hard, baby. After "Nothin" and "Maria" (another likely hit) strutby, the upstaging "Private Affair" incredibly saunters into your psyche. So good, voluptuous, direct, it's like having an ivory inlaid, quad barrel. 38 derringer in your belt buckle.

Side two is highlighted by Jackie's lead turn on "Alright With Me," a quite, fired-up little number. This is a fitting peak to their career. As a fan, how sad it would have been had *Victory* been their last group effort.



10,000 Maniacs Blind Man's Zoo (Elektra Records)

# Harmony and content score big points for folk-rock leaders

10,000 Maniacs takes the prize for rock's most misleading name. Sounding as if they should be a bmovie thrash band like the Misfits, 10,000 Maniacs are in reality the most refreshing folkish-rock band in their genre', a cadre' of females that includes Tracy Chapman and Suzanne Vega. Maniacs vocalist Natalie Merchant has a voice easily more accessible than the wispy Vega or the throaty Chapman, and for the most part, the Maniacs have achieved their notoriety through word-ofmouth rather than tons of radio-play. which can't be said for their notable peers.

Blind Man's Zoo is every bit as good as its predecessor, 1987's sleeper hit, In My Tribe. Waltzing through eleven folk-rock epics, dealing with topics from the Iran-Contra scandal to chemical spills in the ocean, producer Peter Asher channels Merchant's lyrical insights through the spacious arrangements of the Maniacs' ever-improving musicianship. Their music is not one of instrumental solos, but of poetic picture-taking. Merchant recounts her visit to the Vietnam War Memorial through the eyes of a boy left without his vet-father in "The Big Parade," and imagines herself as a pregnant teen in the delightful "Eat For Two." 'Dust Bowl" is a somber ballad about a penniless mother in a

starving farming community, and "Hateful Hate" points up the LP's cover concept, the plight of Africa's countryside and wildlife in the midst of European colonization.

The Maniacs score their biggest points when they achieve harmony in content and melody, a blend of musical lyrical eloquency found within the record's best cuts: "Trouble Me," "Eat For Two," and "You Happy Puppet." Yet as with others in their niche, folk-rockers should be expedient, careful not to preach their causes from a wooden soap-box. For the most part, Merchant and the Maniacs are graceful, worthy of their stature. Blind Man's Zoo is a lyrical masterpiece, as easily read as listened to. \*\*

Debut for Memphian sounds as good as it looks.

When Kevin Paige appeared on the cover of the March issue of the Memphis Star, over-the-counter sales received a healthy shot in the arm. The photo on the cover of his debut album ought to have a similar effect for Chrysalis Records. Upon closer examinaton, though, the songs and lyrics from this young Memphian should earn respectable lauds on their own merit.

Recorded and overdubbed at Memphis' Ardent and Kiva Studios, the album is jammed with hard-driving dance music. And while some of his lyrics could've spent

additional time in the cooker, there's not a turkey in the bunch.

Running a fast and furious gamut of styles from soul to funk to rocking pop, Paige destroys all doubt that he can get down. The lead single, "Don't Shut Me Out," snaps and crackles with live passion. He addresses racial stereotypes and social restrictions in such cuts as "Anything I Want," "Black and White" and "Believe In Yourself." "(You Put Me In) Another World" is a happy, little love song that harkens to the golden days of soul when Sam Cooke was king and Otis Redding the heir apparent.

Paige wrote all the tunes on the album, with the exception of "A Touch of Paradise." He also plays all instruments, with some additional guitar work added by longtime Memphis associates Angelo Earl and Joe Duke. He shares producer credits on the project with veteran Fred Maher (Scritti Politti, Lou Reed).

Underpinning the funk Paige places a deep-running current of social awareness and care for his fellow man. In "Believe In Yourself," he confronts the nation's growing teenage drug problem, urging kids to "... believe in yourself/you can make a new start/You can change your destination, you can end up on the top."

He probed his own thoughts and beliefs deeply and came up with the dramatically stark "Black and White." Paige asks a world in turmoil, "How many children is there no future for/They're trapped behind the walls of war./How many songs must be written to say/That 'peace and love' are the only way?"

Paige obviously draws on several influences for inspiration and guidance in his delivery and style, but chooses them carefully from the daring (Prince) and the dramatic (James Brown). As he develops and matures further, borrowed mannerisms, which occasionally border on maudlin, should be eliminated in favor of his own.

Word has it Chrysalis Records has launched a unique and massive promotion advance on "Don't Shut Me Out." The single is already receiving airplay from local stations including K-97 and Z-98. From the sound and the looks of things, the rest of the world won't shut Kevin Paige out either.

The Call Let The Day Begin (MCA Records)

The success of 1986's LP Reconciled with its hit single "Everywhere I Go," put The Call at the forefront of American music for the first time since their Modern Romans LP in the earlier '80s. Their follow-up, Into the Woods, was a critical, although not a commercial success, as group leader Michael Been made his acting debut in the controversial Last Temptation of Christ. Let The Day Begin is The Call's first record for MCA, and a release that could be their biggest success yet.

Its centerpiece is the title track and first 45. Melding irrepressible optimism with a video that solves the band's image problems, the incredible "Let The Day Begin" is the brightest song of the summer. Elsewhere on the record, Been co-writes "Watch" with actor Harry Dean Stanton, and features Stanton's harmonica work on side two's opener,

Keyboardist Jim "For Love." Goodwin co-writes a number of tunes with Been, and collaborates on the LP's production.

The Call, despite their nagging obscurity, are not going to go away, nor should we want them to. Let The Day Begin, promises a fresh start from a new record label, as well as a focal point for renewed success. This is a record to be proud of, and a band

Love And Rockets Love And Rockets (RCA Records)

Love and Rockets have often been a noteworthy band, after exiting gothic-rock pioneers Bauhaus and venturing into their own uncharted territory. Their cover of the '60s classic, "Ball of Confusion" was a bright dance hit from '86, and "No New Tale To Tell" was a video and radio success from their last LP, Earth, Sun, and Moon, in '87. Their music was dark and murky, like old

T. Rex LPs immersed in a British bog, and their image inspired dedication from an alternative crowd growing weary of R.E.M. and U2 clones.

Their self-titled third LP has given the band its first Top 40 hit, the INXS-like "So Alive," but the rest of the record is quite a distance from what radio is growing used to. The band, with co-producer John Fryer, has created a collection of songs that are often unlistenable because of the harsh grains of their instruments. David J.'s vocals on the LP's first cut, (Jungle Law)" are hideously distorted, and much of the rest of the record follows in the same direction.

Not all of the material is lost, however. Songs like "No Big Deal," 'Rock and Roll Babylon," and "No Words No More" are salvagable because of their lyrical axis, but the rescue of the LP's whole is in doubt. If the band's excuse is that their music and image run together, one fitting the other, then it's obvious that it's the music that's suffering. The LP's listeners shouldn't have to.

Coleman bolsters the far end of the stage. The grandfather of the band, bassist Johnny McDonald is, at 27, the most experienced of the band and is most apt to let his emotions control his stage demeanor, working facial and body language concurrent with the sound quality in the particular venue.

Holding sway over it all is the lithe, sloe-eyed Wade Smith. He drapes himself over his microphone stand and stares off at nothing in particular while he sings of open graves and delivers the most honest and sincere rendition of "I Fall To Pieces" since Patsy Cline packed her bags and went home.

Tommy Coleman introduced himself the weekend before at the Antenna Club. Easy-going and likeable, he offers to spring for beer. He's a respectable rhythm guitarist and a genuine human being. Unaffected by trends, despite his baggy shorts, his religion is not in his lipstick.

True, Smith's posturing owes something to Michael Stipe. "They (R.E.M.) are my favorite band," he laughs at the quasi-accusation. "I do think they make people realize that you can do it (on your own). You don't have to put out a big publicity thing. You just have to keep putting out the product and let it sell itself. That's what we're trying to do. Maybe we'll make it and maybe we won't, but we'll have albums."

And while there is an argument that The Five That Killed Elvis does indeed put out a big publicity thing, as attested to by their thorough plastering of the city with flyers in advance of every show they perform, it is the grass-roots spirit of that publicity that makes them stand apart. When compared with the other, higher-profile approach of more visible local bands, Bryan queries, "Who makes those decisions? Who's in charge of any music scene?"

The Five's sound is an appealing mixture of melodic guitar lead founded on a base of rhythm fills and solid bass and drums. No fancy keyboards mask the energy and thoughtfulness of their music. Coleman and Bryan employ only the sparest of effects to enhance the natural

ringing guitar sound of what Coleman deems "heavy leather."

Their live shows are an amalgamation of creativity, mixing their own moody and enigmatic originals with an eclectic selection of

covers ranging from the aforementioned Patsy Cline, Elvis and the most laid-back and believable cover of Van Morrison's "Brown-Eyed Girl" to come down the pike in a long while.

# Words For The Audience

Johnny McDonald is a comparatively older bassist who plays with an affected ennui. He's much nicer in person, although he treats interviews with an off-handedness that leads one to believe he is far more experienced at this than he probably is. He described the band's songwriting process. "Everybody gets to experiment and try what they want to do. If it fits in, we play it, instead of one person saying, 'okay, here's a song. This is your part, this is your part' 'cause I've been in bands like that."

Bryan diplomatically explains the band's influences with a safe and predictable list that includes Jason and the Scorchers and the Rolling Stones, only to have McDonald interrupt laughingly with, "Let's face it. We've

heard from a lot of people that we sound like R.E.M." And while this is true, the band also owes a debt of thanks to innovators such as Guadalcanal Diary and the Velvet Underground.

Their lyrics cover a range of topics such as racism ("Wall of Color") and the widely acclaimed King of rock'n'roll - Elvis Presley ("Open Grave.") A paean to the death and crass commercialization of Elvis, "Open Grave" is a simple memorial that in a way acknowledges their debt both for their name and the musical form itself. Smith sings dreamily over Bryan and Coleman's acoustic guitars: "Without the slightest hint of a pause/I had championed the open cause./And I knew the future and he closed his eyes/And in a naked hole he lies."

"As for the covers," Smith continues. "The good ones stay. The rest fall out. The covers we're doing now are songs we really like. The percentage of originals depends on the venue. At Antenna, it's 80-90%. Anywhere else, it's 30-40% (due to the length of the show)." Shows which begin earlier and run longer require the addition of more covers to flesh out the set.

And the audiences that make getting to the restroom at a Five show a serious bitch are an even more curious mix. The clean-cut, painfully pressed and prepped college twits and their vapid dates chit and chat over sorority business until the band plays something they like. With great attention to the angle of their cigarettes and their imported beers in tow, they sway back and forth like so many lemmings for as long as Biff deems it cool. The more enlightened (and less uptight) individuals of the midtown variety maintain, finding Smith's soaring, slurry vocals and the band's jangly, pop-ish sound worth the effort.

Wade Smith comes across as slightly goofy, but affable. He's charming in a space-cadet sort of way, but is a lot sharper than meets the eye. Kind of a young Harry Lee to Bryan's more cautious John Adams. He laughs as the conversation turns to the local music scene, and specifically, the alternative music scene. As Bryan deadpans, "It's unique unto itself," Smith noncha-

lantly adds, "This is where everybody shoots themself in the foot."

"We're very happy with the club scene in Memphis. There's mainly only one club in each (other) town, in the same way that bands coming

through here will hit the Antenna," he adds. "The club scene here is definitely expanding. We've played here three weeks in a row (at different places) and we've got largely different audiences."

# Smarter Than Your Average Band

The Five That Killed Elvis spend a prodigious amount of time on the road, hitting small towns and college communities in other states, along with comparable cities as well. "We play 11 states," allows Bryan. "We bought a new van in August and it's already got 24,000 miles on it. Surprisingly, Alabama - Tuscaloosa, Birmingham, Athens - (give us) absolutely the best (reception)."

It was while on the road they recently made the transition to working with a "real" publicity firm, Nashville's Metrox, under the guiding hand of April Watkins. "We work with an agent, Bill Puryear (also Tony Moon and Bruce Binkley) of Crescent Moon Talent," explains Smith. "He recommended her (Watkins) highly. And then one time



when we were gigging up there we stopped in and had a meeting. She impressed us."

Felix Bryan greeted us at a show with an eagerness which belied the thoughtful caution he displays later

sacrifices they've made. Not many young men would be willing to forsake home and all its comforts for a life living out of a van, not knowing if the people in the next town would rather listen to your music or chuck longneck bottles at you.

"The only goal I have is to release the albums," says Smith. "It's nice to have a bigger deal, more marketing, more people hearing them. Even though we had to put up the front money for this (*The Other Day*), it's paid for itself. So we could keep doing this as many times as we want to. And that's the important thinghaving stuff recorded well."

"We're full time, if that's what you're asking," stresses Smith. "We'll play anytime and anywhere we're gonna come out financially ahead." McDonald adds, "We've gotta look at it realistically. We do put the work into it."

The band universally attests to the uniqueness of life as musicians. Though young (all are 23, except for McDonald, whom Smith qualifies with "bass players age better onstage"), they know only too well of the hardships that life throws back in return. "It's a great way of life," says Bryan. "But as much as we travel, you don't see your home forever. We do 16-18 dates a month, and most of those are on the road."

Smith agrees with "It takes up so much of your time. The more you try to do, the more it unbalances you... if you're ever going to try to live any kind of normal life . . . I can't see myself doing rock'n'roll, the way it should be done, when I'm 30. I think

in interview. Seated at an ad-man's desk, he carefully examines the desk-top paraphernalia while searching his thoughts for responses which are neither non-committal nor self-incriminating. The obvious brains behind the outfit, he is a bit more reticent with his praise, adding "So far everything's been okay. We haven't seen any big results, but it's worthwhile to have a good promo kit."

# Getting It Right

Promo kits notwithstanding, The Five That Killed Elvis are undeniably one of the hardest working bands from Memphis. Their dedication to their music is visible in their performance and the



Killed Elvis are obviously not constrained by any "accepted" rule of the music biz. They've earned their accolades and answer for whatever errors they may make only to themselves.

Engineer/producer Doug Easley once said, "It doesn't matter if it's (music) good, what matters is if it's right." What's right for The Five That Killed Elvis is doing it their own way.




