# COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course will introduce students to the nature of historical investigation by focusing on the life and thought of Mohandas Gandhi. Students will be exposed to the process of interpreting historical documents and constructing a historical narrative of events. In this way students should leave this course with a better appreciation of what it is that historians do when they research and write historical works. It is also expected that students will arrive at a solid understanding of the historical events surrounding the life of Gandhi, a major figure in twentieth century world history.

#### COURSE REQUIREMENTS

This course will conducted as if it were a seminar. Students will be expected to complete all readings on time and to be fully prepared to participate in class discussions based on those readings. Those who find it difficult to participate actively in class discussions may submit a journal of the assigned readings to be graded. There will be two short essays, one due in mid-October and the other at the end of the semester. The first essay will be analytical and a topic will be assigned for it; the second one will require inte gration of course materials and the service-learning component of the course (discussed below). Both assignments must be handed in by class time on the date specified; all late papers will be automatically reduced by one letter grade. Grades will be determined as follows: class participation - 25%; first essay - 30%; second essay - 20%; final examination - 25%. All written work will be evaluated on the basis of a combination of factors, including style, content, coherence, mastery of the subject and number and nature of sources consulted.

#### SERVICE-LEARNING

This course has a mandatory service-learning component. This will entail community service activities for the entire class (including the e professor) at three different periods during the course of the semester. In late September we will twice serve at the Rhodes soup kitchen (Tuesdays, 4-6 pm); on October 31 we will help build the Rhodes College Habitat for Humanity home (two shifts, 9-12 or 1-5); and on November 18 we will assist in the annual Oxfam fast and fund-raiser (in addition, we will attend the Interfaith circle on that same day to hear Arun Gandhi--grandson of M. K. Gandhi--speak on the issue of fasting). In addition, we will keep an on-line collective "journal" of our service-learning activities and of relevant course readings; all students are required to read, and contribute entries to, this journal

throughout the semester. The point of all this is to combine the academic material that we learn in the classroom with practical service to the larger community in which we live. Since Gandhi himself was a great advocate of serving one's community, and preferred practical education to bookish learning, this service-learning component is a natural fit for this particular course. Similar service-learning courses are being offered in many different disciplines on this campus, all of which are being coordinated by Billy Newton, the Rhodes chaplain. Those interested in knowing more about service-learning in general should contact the chaplain's office.

The service-learning component of this course will culminate in a written essay that will be graded. This essay can take a variety of forms: it could be a reflective essay that cogently relates the issues raised in the course readings to our experiences serving the Memphis community; also welcome would be an essay that weaves together, say, materials in the course readings relating to Gandhi's fasts and analysis of the origins and impact of the Oxfam program. All essays will be graded on the basis of quality of ideas, clarity of thought and organization, and <u>familiarity with relevant course materials</u>.
