In an around Port of Spain, the island's cosmopolitan capital, visitors can see several historic sites such as Fort San Andres, built by the Spanish in 1765 to protect the harbor. The medieval-looking cannon emplacements still point out to sea. The fort is used as headquarters by the Traffic Police down-stairs and the Chamber of Commerce upstairs. Still in use too is the old Government House built by the last Governor of Trinidad, Don Jose Maria Chacon in 1794.

Victorian architecture is predominant in Trinidad. Never the Queen's park Savannah is the National Museum and Art Gallery, housing many historic relics. Nearby, the Royal Botanic Gardens form one of the loveliest landscapes in Port of Spain. These 70 acres were laid out by Sir Ralph Woodford in 1818. Many varieties of exotic shrubs and flowers are displayed. The Empress Valley Zoo also has a collection that includes species native to Trinidad and Tobago. A race course and cricket course are in the Savannah.

The old Deanery is probably the only Georgian building still in use in Port of Spain. Landmarks found off Woodford Square include Holy Trinity Cathedral (Anglican), consecrated on Trinity Sunday 1823, Town Hall and the Red House.

Several hours by car outside Port of Spain, over some of the finest roads in the Caribbean, rises Fort George, high in the tropic hills, 1,100 feet above sea level. The fort was built by Sir Thomas Hyslop in 1804 and was as a signal post.

EL DORADO Pitch Lake is one of Trinidad's greatest natural curiosities. Sir Walter Raleigh visited the lake in his search of the fabled El Dorado which lured many adventurous spirits across the seas. The site of El Dorado was rumored to be in the northeastern jungles of Venezuela; Trinidad, across the Gulf of Paria, was used as a docking station for ship and a springboard to the mainland. The deposit of pitch (asphalt) is found in the Ward of LA Brea, 55 miles from Port of Spain. Asphalt is shipped from its tar beds to many countries of the world. It was indeed a gold mine of a kind. The lake is 100 acres in area and many

Oswald P. Bronson Named ITC Prexy

ATLANTA, Ga. — (SWS) — At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Interdenominational Theological Center held at the Center Monday afternoon, Dr. Oswald Perry Bronson was unanimously elected President of the Interdenominational Theological Center in succession to Dr. Harry V. Richardson who had been president of the Center since its formation in 1958 and who had requested the privilege of retiring from the presidency on Aug. 31, 1968.

The announcement was made at the conclusion of the Board meeting jointly by Dr. Henry P. Dusen, formerly President of Union Theological Seminary in New York, the president of the board of trustees, and Bishop B. Julian Smith of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church; vice chairman of the Board of Trustees and Chairman of a special Nominating Committee appointed by the Board last March to search for a successor to Dr. Richardson.

Dr. Bronson joined the faculty of the Interdenominational Theological Center in 1949 as Director of Field Education and Assistant Professor of Christian Education and became Vice-President in 1966.

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U. S. Ambassador To U.N. Resigns; Wiggins Named

WASHINGTON — (UP) — President Johnson Thursday announced the resignation of George Ball as U. S. ambassador to the United Nations and named Washington Post Editor J. Russell Wiggins to succeed him.

Johnson announced the resignation while Ball was holding a separate news conference. The President told newsmen only that Ball's reason for quitting concerned domestic politics — apparently the presidential candidacy of Vice President Hubert Humphrey.

In announcing Wiggins' selection to replace Ball — who has been at the United Nations only since April, Johnson said the United States and the world had gained "an advocate of peace." Wiggins, 65, has been editor and executive vice president of the Washington Post since 1960. Johnson said that he believed few in public life commanded the respect, understanding, good judgment, and "deep compassion" of Wiggins.

Johnson said Wiggins, born in Lawrence, Mass., had been concerned as an editor with "bringing truth to the American public."

At his news conference in the State Department, Ball said: "I have taken this step so that I may devote my time and energy being now and Nov. 5 to help assure the election of Hubert Humphrey and the defeat of Richard Nixon."

"To avoid any misunderstanding of my motives and purposes," he said, "I wish to state flatly that after the November election I shall return promptly to private life. I have asked the vice president not to consider me for any post in his administration."

Ball's statement showed his clear opposition to Nixon in the election.

"My decision has not been taken lightly," he said. "It stems from a solemn assessment of my obligations to my country, my family, and my own conviction."

He said it reflects his "firm belief that during the years immediately ahead our nation will face unparalleled dangers and opportunities in the large world arena."

"To surmount those dangers and utilize those opportunities," he added, "will require leadership with the most exacting qualities of mind and spirit."

Dr. Dwight A. Burgess Named At Daniel Payne College

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — (SWS) — Prof. Dwight A. Burgess has been elected Dean of Instruction and Professor of Political Science at Daniel Payne College. The announcement came this week from Dr. J. King Chandler III, president of the college.

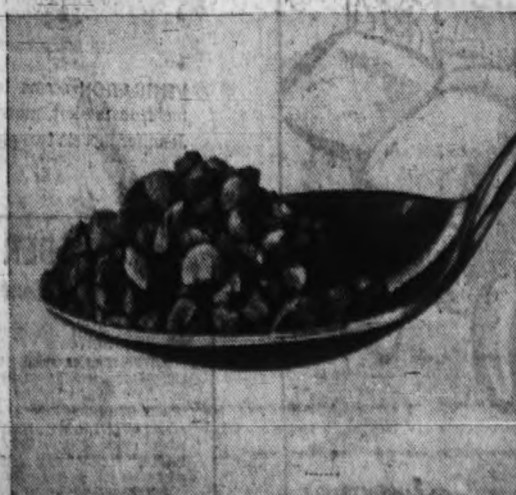

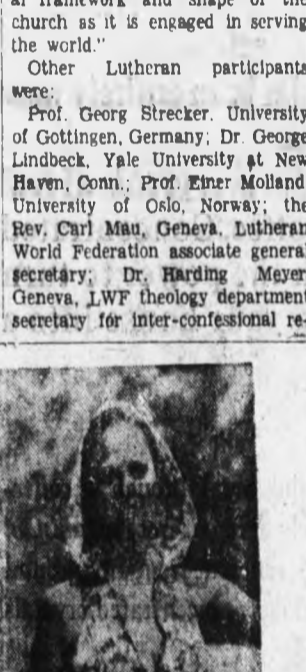

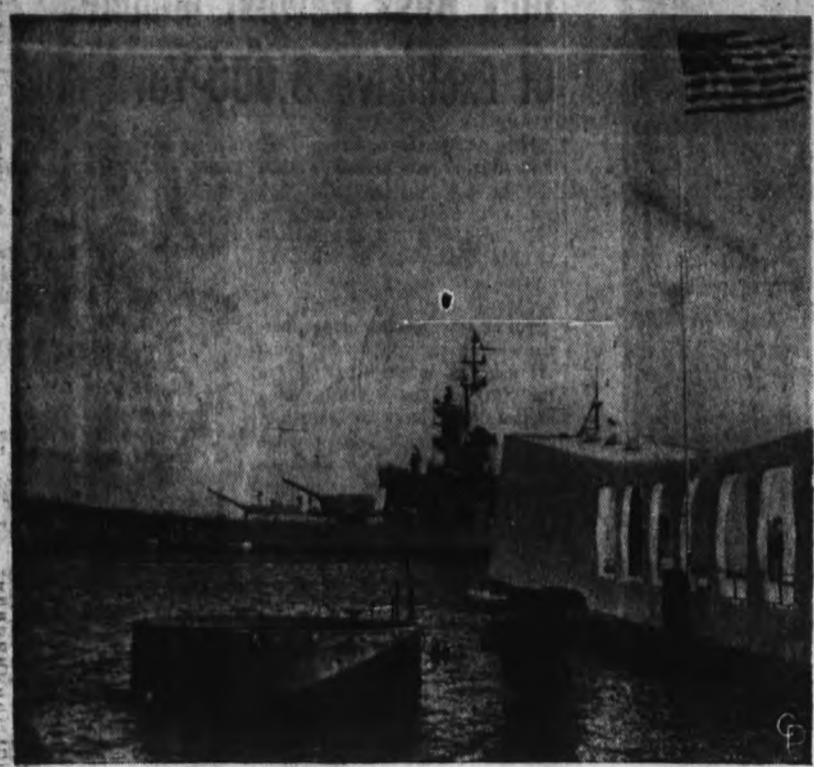
